



The play of any contract is influenced by several factors: how many tricks declarer must take, for example, or even whether the final contract is doubled. The right play in today's six-heart contract is determined by the opening lead. Plan your own play after the queen of spades lead, but do not look at the East-West cards.



The queen of spades lead gives declarer a small margin of safety in the play. Since the contract is for only 12 tricks, he can afford to sacrifice one trick if doing so will increase his chances of making the slam. The key to success is to set up extra winners in the diamond suit and then be able to get to dummy to use them. South should win the king of spades, play one high trump from his hand and then lead a low diamond and duck it in dummy. He can then win whatever the defenders return, play a diamond to dummy's ace and ruff a third diamond high. He can then play two more rounds of trump, ending in dummy. The remaining high diamond honor should pick up the last outstanding diamond, and dummy's long diamond becomes the slam-going trick. This approach in the play wins whenever diamonds are 4-2, although it sacrifices a trick when the diamonds divide 3-3.

Why was the play affected by the opening lead? Had West led a club at trick one, declarer could not have afforded the luxury of giving the opponents a cheap diamond trick. He would then have had no choice except to go after diamonds and hope the suit was splitting evenly.

NFL sidelines Duper, Scott

MIAMI (AP) - The Miami Dolphins will be without wide receiver Mark Duper for the remainder of the season because he violated the NFL's substance abuse policy, but offensive guard Roy Foster says the rest of the team is clean.

"(Coach Don) Shula lets us know what's happening as far as the drug situation," Foster said. "I don't believe we associate ourselves with drugs of any sort. He weeds out those kinds of

Cowboys' defensive back Victor Scott for violating the league's substance abuse policy. The suspensions are for 30 days, which means both players will miss the rest of the season.

Neither the league nor the teams would say what drugs were involved.

Duper, 29, became the first Miami player to be penalized for substance abuse since 1983.

"It's one of the toughest things I've had to deal with," Shula

suspended Duper and Dallas straightened out, and Mark is able to resume his career with the Miami Dolphins next year."

Shula declined to comment on whether Duper's problem was an isolated one for the team.

Scott, 26, also was suspended for 30 days last year for substance abuse. He became the second Cowboy this season to be penalized under the NFL's drug policy; offensive tackle Kevin Gogan was suspended for a month near the end of training camp.

Duper, a seven-year veteran and two-time Pro Bowl performer, has done work with the "Say No To Drugs" program. Several teammates said they were shocked by the suspension.

"Dupe's locker is right next to mine, and I just didn't have any idea at all," safety Glenn Blackwood said. "I talk to him every day. There was no indication of pot or anything like that."

Foster said Duper is not the kind of person to use drugs.

'It just doesn't add up," Foster said. "I just don't want to believe that Duper's caught up in anything like that."

Duper was unavailable for comment, and his agent failed to return two phone calls.

Duper had only four pass receptions for 44 yards in the past four games. He caught no passes Sunday against the New York Jets and finished the game on the sidelines because he was bothered by a sore left arch, Shula said.

The coach said he supports the league's drug policy.

"The most important thing the National Football League can do is to prove it's a drug-free game," he said.

The action against Duper and Scott brought to 24 the number of players suspended this season for violating the drug policy.







Parliament adopts Russian reforms

MOSCOW (AP) - The Supreme Soviet today voted overwhelmingly to adopt President Mikhail S. Gorbachev's overhaul of the political structure, but a handful of "no" votes and abstentions testified to a continuing controversy over the reforms.

The vote came after unusually fiery debate in the parliament. Legislators sent an amended version of the restructuring plans back to Kremlin leaders for review before today's vote.

In the Soviet of Nationalities, made up of half of the members of the bicameral Supreme Soviet, the vote was 657 in favor, 3 against and 26 abstentions on amending the constitution to incorporate Gorbachev's proposals.

The Soviet of Unions voted 687 in favor, 2 against with 1 abstention to approve the same measures. A companion package revising the election law was adopted unanimously by both houses

Critics said Gorbachev's plan centralized too much power in the Kremlin and in his new presidency. In particular, opposition focused on Gorbachev's plan to create a national Congress and similar bodies in each of the nation's 15 republics, which would in turn elect smaller and more active Supreme Soviets, or parliaments.

Until recently, the national legislature merely approved actions already taken by the leadership, without debate or dissent.

This time, the Supreme Soviet heard 37 of its members criticize and propose changes in the plan submitted by Gorbachev.

The 1,500-member body recommended dozens of changes over two days of debate.

Convicted mass killer blames others

HUNTSVILLE, Texas (AP) — A man convicted of slaying his former girlfriend and three of her he said. "So I took them to the siblings says it was two mysterious, long-haired men who stabbed the four family members to death.

Leo Narvaiz Jr., 20, in his first extensive interview since the April 15 slayings, said from Texas' death row Wednesday, that he was wounded by one of two men who did the killings.

Narvaiz, who arrived last week on death row after being sentenced to death last month, acknowledged being at the mobile home where Shannon Mann, 17, her sisters Jennifer, 19. Martha, 15, and brother Ernest, 11. were stabbed to death.

"I wouldn't be that dumb to kill four people," he said. "All I admitted was I was at the scene of cops. I panicked and I ran. I ran vaiz as her attacker. the crime. I didn't have any part

"I know there's a lot of people that think I actually did it, but -I'm innocent.'

The four Mann children were brutally stabbed. Some of the knife blades were broken and still. embedded in the bodies, which were scattered throughout the Manns' mobile home. Authorities have described the scene as the worst in Bexar County history.

Narvaiz, his voice wavering at times, said he has nightmares about the slayings.

'I pray in the morning and at night when I'm going to bed," he about this. I can't believe this is happening to me.

Narvaiz said he had been drinking at a friend's house and had downed perhaps three sixpacks of beer and had smoked some marijuana when he left about midnight to go shoot pool.

"I was still in my right stage of mind," he said. "I can handle it. I only drink on weekends.

On the way to the pool hall, he said a man he knew as "Joe" and another unidentified man asked if he knew where the Manns recently had moved.

Narvaiz, who wears the designation "DR 923" on his white prison suit, described his new life on death row as lonely, with about three hours of recreation daily dur g which he plays basketball or sits in the prison yard talking with other prisoners and enjoying the fresh air.

He said he did not know until this week that Ernest Mann Sr., father of the slaying victims, got himself arrested last week to he could get inside the Bexar County Jail and kill him. Narvaiz said he felt secure in prison, but feared for the safety of his parents, brothers and sister.

Collider funding **'tough**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Texans in Congress will have a tough time convincing their colleagues to spend the billions of dollars needed to build the super col-

Even when seven states were candidates for the potentially lucrative physics project, Congress was adamant about financing the super collider, voting earlier this year to give it \$100 million - less than one-third of President Reagan's request for \$363 million — and decreeing none of the money could be spent

"It's going to be uphill and tough, and particularly now because it's just one state. We had seven states working on it before," Bentsen, chairman of the influential Senate Finance Committee, told a group of Texas reporters in Washington on

Now that a site in Ellis County has been chosen by the Energy Department for the super collider, at least one member of Congress from a state that lost its bid to host the project is questioning the feasibility of finding enough construction money. It is expected to cost \$4.4 billion, and to create thousands of construction and scientific jobs.

said last week that the superconducting super collider was in trouble and would likely be doomed by budget constraints and opposition from others in the scien-

"And quite honestly, the way the program has been set up, the consequences are that there's really very limited support outside of one particular state," said Dingell, chairman of the House **Energy and Commerce Commit**tee. "I haven't said it's going to go down the drain, but it's in serious difficulty.'




