Producers reminded to report forage losses

Haskell County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) USDA's disaster assistance Executive Director Shawn programs, contact the Haskell Ferguson reminds livestock producers who suffered grazing losses that occurred Resource Center website. In throughout 2015 due to a continuing effort to better drought or wildfire that they serve the public, USDA have until Feb. 1, 2016, to report their losses and to Emergency Management enroll in the Livestock Forage Agency and other disaster-Disaster Program (LFP).

LFP provides compensation to eligible livestock producers who suffered grazing losses for covered livestock due to drought on privately-owned or cash-leased land or fire on federally-managed land. Producers in Haskell County are eligible to apply for 2015 LFP benefits on small grain, native pasture, improved pasture, annual ryegrass or forage sorghum. Livestock producers are encouraged to contact the Haskell County FSA Office with any questions regarding specific forage crops that are eligible.


"Drought conditions created a need for livestock disaster assistance programs in Haskell County," said Ferguson. "I encourage all affected livestock producers to contact the Haskell County FSA Office to schedule an appointment to enroll in the program before the Feb. 1 deadline."

Livestock producers must complete the LFP application and required supporting documentation no later than Feb. 1, 2016, for losses that occurred throughout 2015.


Eligible livestock includes alpacas, beef cattle, buffalo, beefalo, dairy cattle, deer, elk, emus, equine, goats, llamas, poultry, reindeer, sheep or swine that have been or would have been grazing the eligible grazing land or pastureland.

Haskell Indian kicker Caleb Wheat, a sophomore, has been named to TheOldCoach Class 2A Division II All State Team, as a first team kicker.




Indians' basketball




