Ladies' Night Group Hears Blind Spokesman

Olton Lions and their ladies heard a talk by Johnny Crawford of the Texas Blind Shops Caravan at a Ladies' Night meeting held in Legion Hall here Tuesday night.

Mr. Crawford, who was blind until he was 17 and who now has sight in one eye, told his audience that Texas now has two factories, at Houston and at Fort Worth, where only blind people are employed.

Lion-sponsored broom sales, such as the one to be held here this Friday, make possible the employment of blind people in these factories.

The blind shops, he explained, are non-profit organizations.

Curtis Schaefer, 8-year-old youngster who recently attended the Texas Lions Crippled Children's Camp at Kerrville for two weeks, recounted his experiences at the camp. Curtis, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Schaefer, told his audience, "It was a wonderful experience, and I sure hope I can go again next year."

Coach Joe Turner is not normally given to singing the blues about the Mustang football team. But he has his crying towel out this week. And for good reason.

A series of injuries has plagued the Mustang squad, and Turner finds himself with only four backs of sufficient experience for starting duty.

A week ago Monday, he had seven.

Injured first was Wally Stewart, speedy 150-pound senior halfback candidate. Stewart suffered a painful hip muscle injury on the opening day of practice. He is taking part in light workouts, but no scrimmages, Turner says it is possible that Stewart may be ready for action in the Sept. 9 opener at Abernathy.

That left the Mustangs with six backs.

Then last Wednesday, quarterback prospect James Ray Hyatt knocked his left elbow out of place. He will be out for at least two weeks, and possibly for three weeks.

Hyatt's injury left five backs. David Price, 175-pound junior halfback candidate who has shown up well in early drills, turned up this week with a bad foot infection that put him out of action. He may not be ready to go again for a couple of weeks.

The loss of Price left only four backs. They are Teddy Estes, Jack Royce Straw, Bobby Johnson and Jackie Gray.

Coach Turner has a deep and abiding interest in the health of each.

New-comers are urged to attend the tea, announced Mrs. Brigrance.

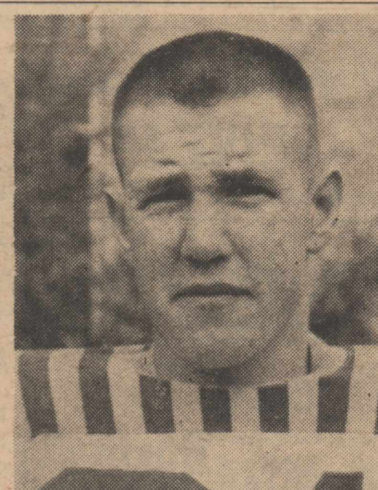
THANKS PARENTS FOR PARKING COOPERATION

PAN-AMA WILL BUILD THREE SAMPLE HOMES

Joe Cooper of Pan-Ama Homes of Amarillo turned a shovel of dirt Wednesday and Hillcrest Addition became a fact.

The shovel of dirt was the ground breaking for the first of three sample homes to be constructed in the addition at the western outskirts of Olton by Pan-Ama.

Sponsors of the project said commitments already have been issued for the three homes and construction will begin immediately.

The ground breaking ceremony followed a watermelon feast in one of the newly constructed streets at Hillcrest.

Oldtimers and newcomers feasted on free watermelon and talked about how Olton is growing.

Jim Speer, co-sponsor of the project acted as master of ceremonies. Rev. J. Henry Cox gave the invocation.

Here for the occasion were Joe Cooper, Mickey McGuire, Jim Persefield, Roy Snodgrass, Charlie Bates, Tutt Cooper and Bob Duncan, all of Pan-Ama Homes; and Gunter Klaus and Frank Smith, of Niles, Mich., representing a building metal firm.

Others who came here for the ground breaking included Ben F. Smith of Plainview, co-sponsor; Ralph Douglas, city engineer; and many others.

"I'm glad things are out of the talking stage and we have reached the building stage," declared Mr. Duncan who is a salesman for Pan-Ama.

The land where Hillcrest is situated is a part of the old Daugherty estate.

It was sold to J. T. Jones and later when Mr. Smith and Mr. Speer conceived the idea of a housing project there they purchased the 40-acre tract from Mr. Jones.

The ground breaking was the culmination of many months of work and planning. It was necessary to take sewer and water facilities to the project. In January of this year Olton folks voted two-to-one for a \$175,000 bond issue to make necessary improvements there and in the remainder of the town.

"We'll build as many homes as you want," declared Mr. Bates, president of Pan-Ama.

1,000 Enrolled As Classwork Is Launched

Classwork in the Olton public schools got underway this week with an estimated 1,000 students in attendance.

"It has been impossible so far to get an accurate attendance count," Supt. of Schools Carl Macon said Wednesday. "Some families still are on vacation, and we will have many more students enroll in the next week or so. It looks like we will have well over 1,000 students."

Of the estimated 1,000 now in class, about 700 are in grade school (grade 1 through 7), and about 300 are in junior high and high school.

The 1,000 figure does not include attendance at Bohner school.

MUSTANG GRIDDERS TO TANGLE WITH HEREFORD ELEVEN IN PRACTICE FRAY THIS FRIDAY

The Olton Mustang football squad will journey to Hereford this Friday for a 6:30 p. m. scrimmage test against the Hereford Whiteface eleven.

"It will be a good test of how much we have accomplished during the first two weeks of practice," said Coach Joe Turner. The Mustangs will open their 1955 schedule at Abernathy on Friday night, Sept. 9.

At mid-week, Coach Turner indicated that he plans to trim the A squad to about two dozen boys. Other candidates will be transferred into the capable hands of Jimmy Goss, B squad coach.

All prospects have been assigned probable positions. "But there is still a wide-open fight for practically every berth on the team," Coach Turner commented.

Irrigation is nearing completion. Most farmers feel that this is the last going over for most of the crops. Some few have already finished the cotton and are putting the finishing touches to the grain fields. However, none will commit themselves in saying that they may not again water some of the cotton. Too many remember some of the past Septembers when the cotton

almost burned up. The majority of the fellows do prefer never to water after the last of August if at all possible.

Some of the older cotton is showing a few open bolls already. The fellows north of town, across the draw, who were fortunate to keep some of the April and early May crops report that the crop is fast maturing out and scattering open bolls can now be seen. The community as a whole, however, will be much later as most of the cotton in the vicinity of town was late May and even June planted.

With each passing week, harvest appears even closer. Fields of ripening grain are more predominant. The great fields of redening grain is a sight to behold. One may be amazed at the number of acres that have been planted in corn and sargo. Most of these fields have been grown for the purpose of making ensilage which is being used extensively by beef feeders. This appears to be one of the most profitable crops being used to replace the cotton allotted acres and the cheap grain forced by government parity being lowered.

One of the new crops being tested for this area is some Broomcorn being grown by Lawrence McLain near Hart. The production appears to be very good and the quality of the straws should meet all requirements for commercial use. The outcome of this crop is anxiously watched by many as it could be another crop to prove profitable to the irrigated areas.

It is quite clear that the term CHRISTIAN is not prefixed by another name; that SAINTS are set apart from the world (see Joh. 17:15-17); that the members are CITIZENS of God's house; that the individuals are BRANCHES in Christ; and that God has no CHILDREN out side of His FAMILY (CHRIST'S BODY, THE CHURCH).

Some might say, "I am an Apollos Christian" and another say, "I am a Cephas Christian." Notice what Paul says about this matter. "Now this I say, that everyone of you saith, I am of Paul; and I of Apollos, and I of Cephas; and I of Christ. Is Christ divided? Was Paul crucified for you or were ye baptized in the name of Paul? (1 Cor. 1:12, 13).

An Editorial

There's an old story of the Roman twins, Romulus and Remus. The boys were tossed to the wolves by their parents when they were only babies.

They made friends with the wolves even at the price of turning against their own kind.

The story of Romulus and Remus is almost the story of some of our boys who were imprisoned in Red China. And it is indictment of our foreign policy and our top shelf brass in the pentagon.

We're not defending the turncoats. We're just asking a few simple questions.

What would you do if: Your government had put you in the field to fight an enemy and then tied your hands behind you? Given the enemy sanctuary (behind the Yalu in this case)?

How would you feel if your government were shaking the hands of diplomats who had strangled women and children and murdered your buddies?

How would you feel if you were rotting away in an enemy prison camp with little or no hope of rescue even though you knew at the time that your people had the means to free you and were making no effort to do so?

Who could blame you radically if you --- like Romulus and Remus --- threw in with the wolves in order to survive?

Certainly those turncoats did not act like American Soldiers ordinarily should be expected to act.

We're ashamed of them. And neither has our top level leadership acted like our diplomats of old who declared "Millions for defense of our American Nationals but not one cent for tribute."

We're just as ashamed of our state department and our high level leadership as we are of our turncoats.

Our turncoats should wear the label "Made in the Pentagon."

When America is again willing to assert itself and defend its soldiers and nationals with all its might and sinew, then is the time we should begin standing turncoats up against the wall and having them shot.

But until America is ready to deliver its severest blow for the rights of even a single citizen --- then who knows, the turncoats are just acting like the rest of the government. They're just getting along with the Communists.

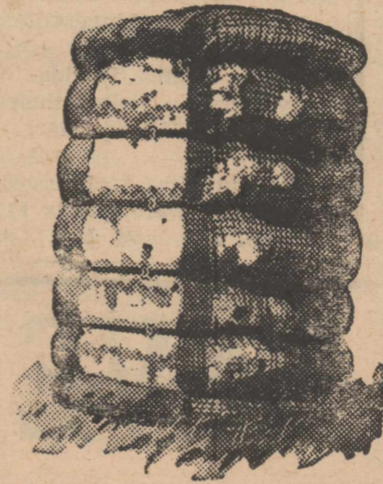

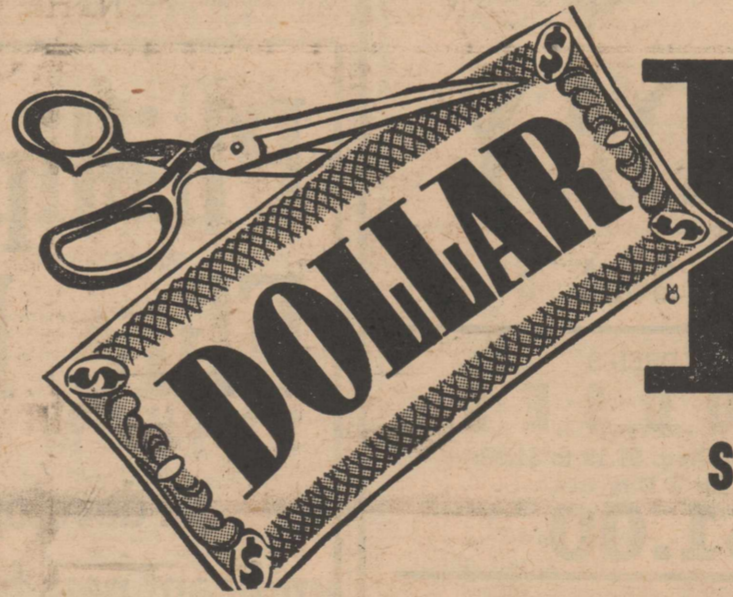

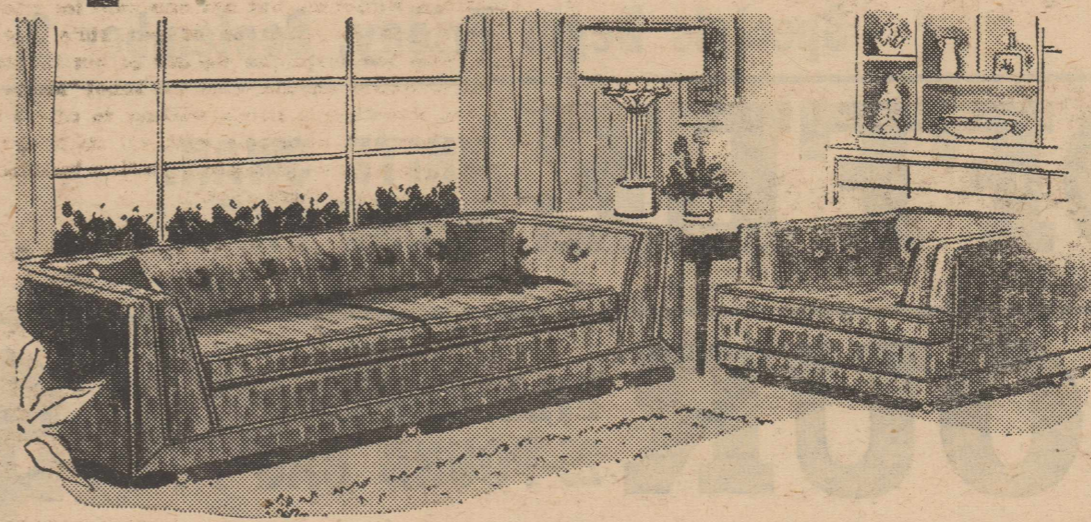
