## Parade and Citywide Yule Program Planned For Thursday Afternoon

A community Christmas program complete with parade, Santa and his reindeer and candy for the youngsters is being planned here for 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon, Dec. 22.

Tentative plans for the big Yule program were discussed Monday night at a meeting of Chamber of Commerce and Ministerial Alliance representatives.

The Olton High School band, Santa and his reindeer, and floats entered by local organizations and churches will highlight the parade, which is scheduled to begin at 2 p. m.

All local organizations, and especially churches, are being asked to enter floats, most of which are expected to have a religious theme. All organizations planning to have floats in the Christmas parade are asked to contact V. L. Smith, deputy sheriff.

The parade will begin at the north edge of town, wind down the main street and around the square to a point on the hospital lawn where a big Christmas tree will be erected.

A community Christmas program will be held at the Christmas tree under direction of the Ministerial Alliance.

At the conclusion of the program, approximately 500 bags of fruit and candy will be given to the children. Mr. Smith estimates that about \$70 will be needed to purchase the candy and fruit, and anyone desiring to donate should contact Mr. Smith or Pop Schreier.

# Booby Trap Skyrocket Blasts Home; Life of Sleeping Child Endangered

## Citizen Group Will Patrol Olton Streets

A fireworks misdemeanor might well have resulted in MURDER here Sunday night as pranksters set off a souped-up skyrocket near a residence window.

The blast shattered the window pane, blew chunks of wood from an air conditioner support, set fire to dry grass in the yard and splattered the bed of a sleeping child with shattered glass.

Glass was blown completely across the room. Fragments from the explosive were found inside the bed room.

Concussion rocked the neighborhood.

Witnesses said that had it been tossed inside the room, the little girl sleeping there might

Think before you light that fuse.

Under Texas law, if a person in the act of perpetrating a misdemeanor (setting off fireworks is a misdemeanor in Olton) accidentally commits a felony, he then may be adjudged responsible for the felony.

For instance, if someone were killed by or as a result of fireworks you set off inside the city limits of Olton, then you might be charged with MURDER.

have been killed by the blast which rocked the residential district.

The bomb was manufactured by using friction tape on a huge skyrocket. The tape confined the explosive charge causing it to ignite with terrific force on the ground instead of zooming skyward.

Hulls of two such explosive charges are in the hands of officers.

Olton citizens became alarmed after Sunday night's incident. A citizen committee has been formed to patrol city streets at night to prevent a recurrence.

Authorities have warned that fines for setting off fireworks inside the city limits range from \$5 to \$100. One person already has been fined under the provisions of city law and officials promise vigorous prosecution of any other violators.

Bombs made from skyrockets have been set off in various parts of town.

## Cotton Harvest, At 31,937 Bales, Near Completion

Harvest of Olton's cotton crop is virtually complete, with only a few bales still trickling into gin yards.

A Wednesday afternoon survey of Olton area gins showed that 31,937 bales have been ginned. That compares with the 29,824 bales reported a week ago.

Gins covered by the survey include Circle, Thompson, Farmers, Straw-Burrow, Olton Co Op and Smith. The last four named have weighed in a total of 27,391 bales.

Ginners say that much of the cotton reaching gins the past few days has been "bunky," and that approximately one-fourth of it is falling to meet government loan standards.

Sponsors of the contest have advised contestants to have decorations up by Dec. 20.

## Hart Folks Vote Saturday On Incorporation

Hart residents Saturday will go to the polls to decide whether Hart will become an incorporated town.

A move to incorporate Hart has been underway for about a year. Will Gilmore, Hart grocer, has led the movement.

Mr. Gilmore said Hart has a population of about 400. He said the community hopes to get a bank established there if the vote carries.

Entered in the girls' division are teams from Olton, Morton,

Play will continue through Saturday, with first-round losers scheduled to participate in consolation brackets.

Final pre-Christmas action for OHS boys' and girls' teams is slated Monday night, Dec. 19, when both clubs will play Anton at Anton.

Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the Littlefield Drive Church of Christ in Littlefield. Burial was in Littlefield Cemetery.

Mr. Pace is survived by his mother, Mrs. Side Pace of Littlefield; seven sisters, Mrs. James Zachary, Mrs. Foy Bell, Miss Sherry Pace and Miss Judy Pace, all of Littlefield, Miss Becky Pace of Big Spring, Mrs. James Lester of Austin, and Mrs. Jones; and one brother, Ronald Pace of Littlefield.

"The change will work out better with the Christmas vacation plans of many of our families, and it will not cause any trouble in the school schedule," Mr. Macon said.

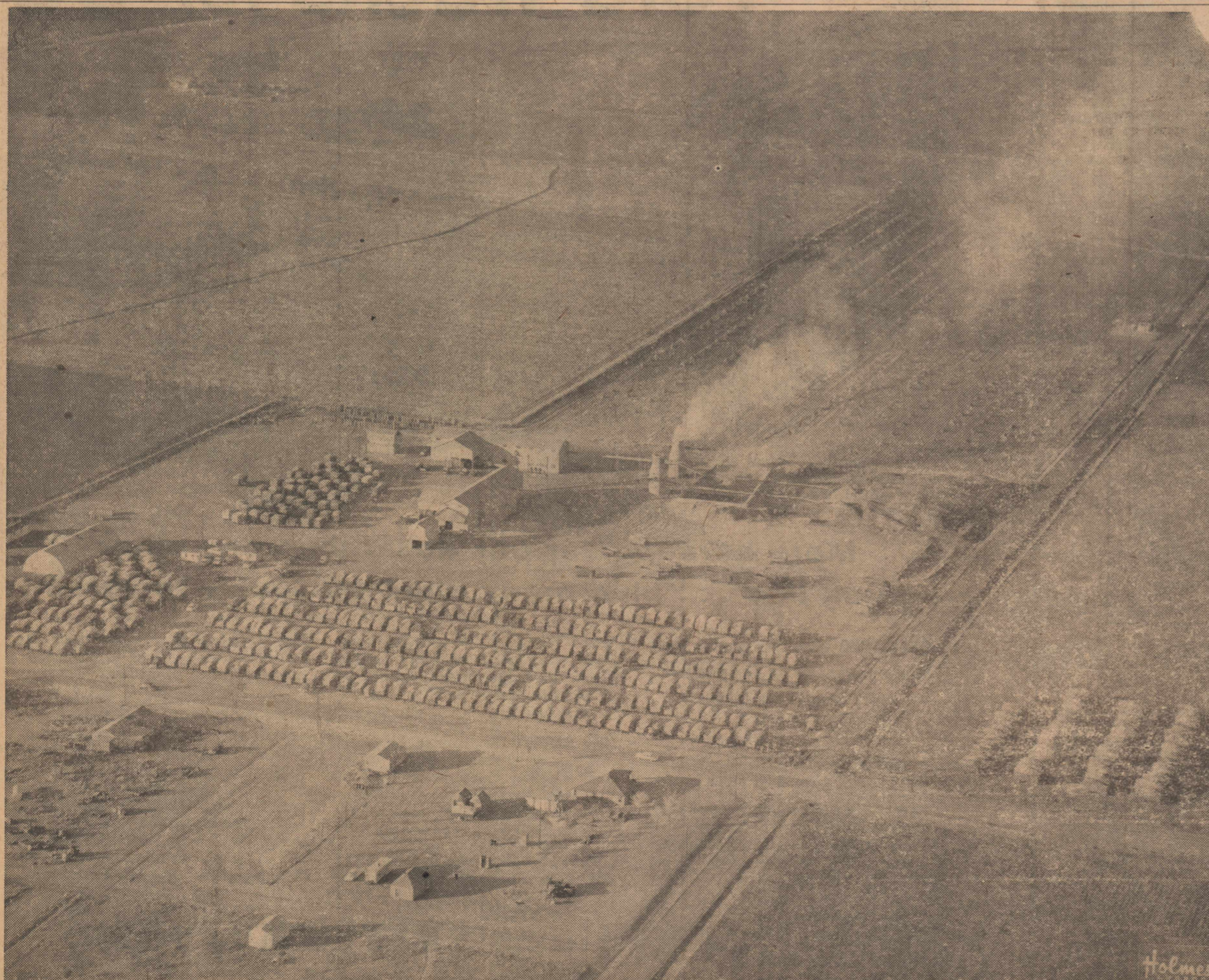
Public schools will dismiss for the Christmas holidays, or originally announced, at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Dec. 21.

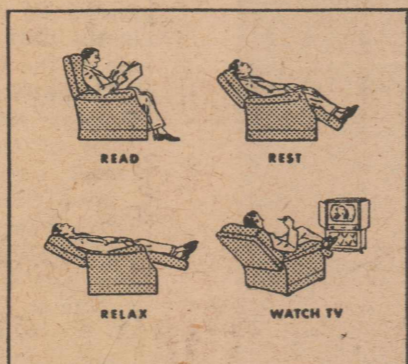
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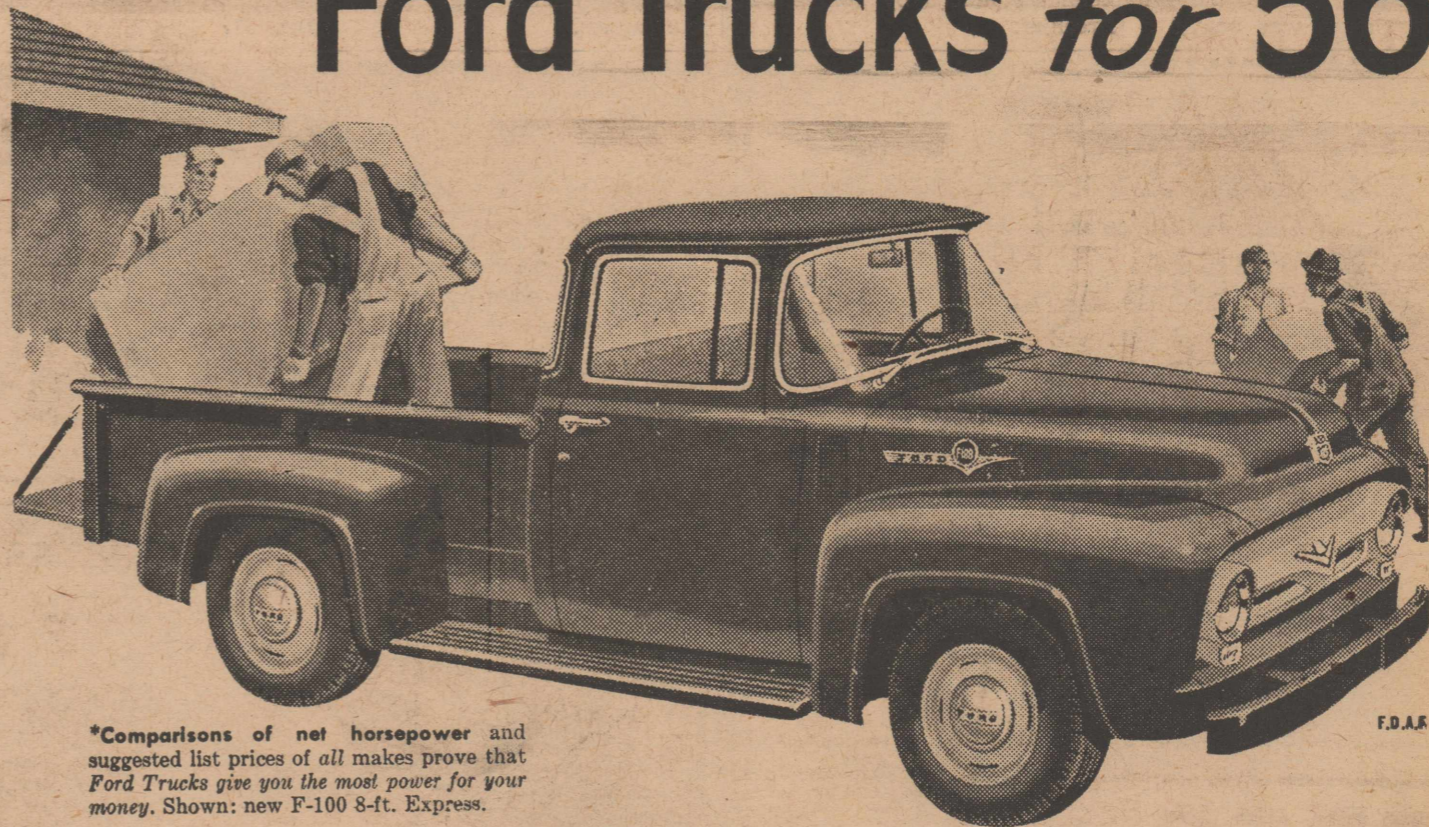

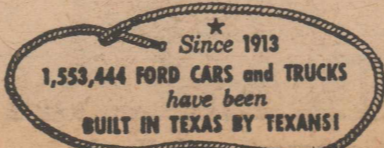

Well, we're back again after a long absence. Hope everyone has enjoyed the rest.

We read the most absurd bit of news in the Avalanche Tuesday morning. Cong. George Mahon is laying the cotton surplus at the door of the Republican party and the Eisenhower administration.

Mr. Mahon accused the GOP administration of failure to find

a world market for surplus cotton. Possibly Mr. Mahon does not know that it was the Truman administration which cut US cotton off the world market about 1951 at a staggering loss in price to the US farmer.

### Malone Receives Navy Advancement

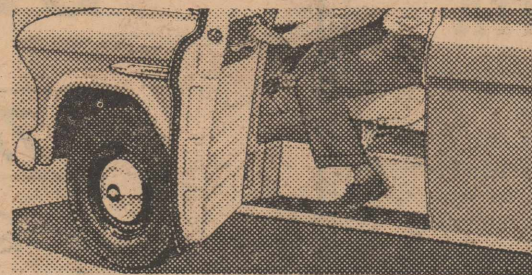
The Bureau of Naval Personnel authorized the advancement

last month of Melvin Max Malone, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Malone of Olton, to aviation structural mechanic third class, USN.

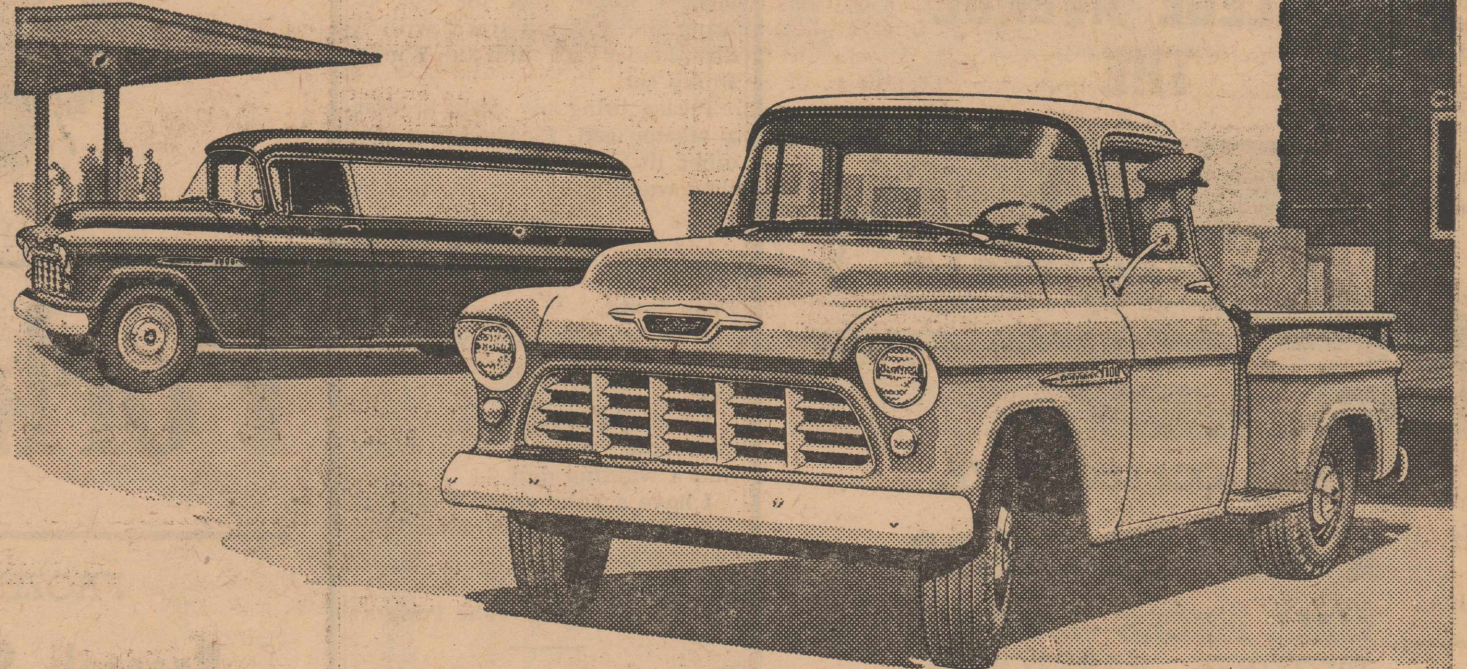
Max received the advancement while serving aboard the attack carrier USS Oriskany. The advancement was the result of fleet-wide examinations conducted in August.

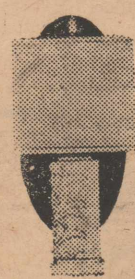

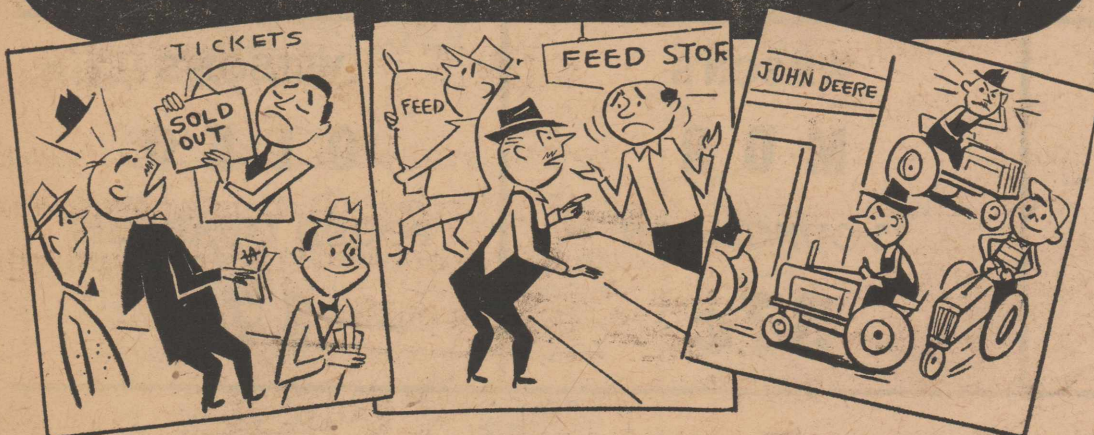

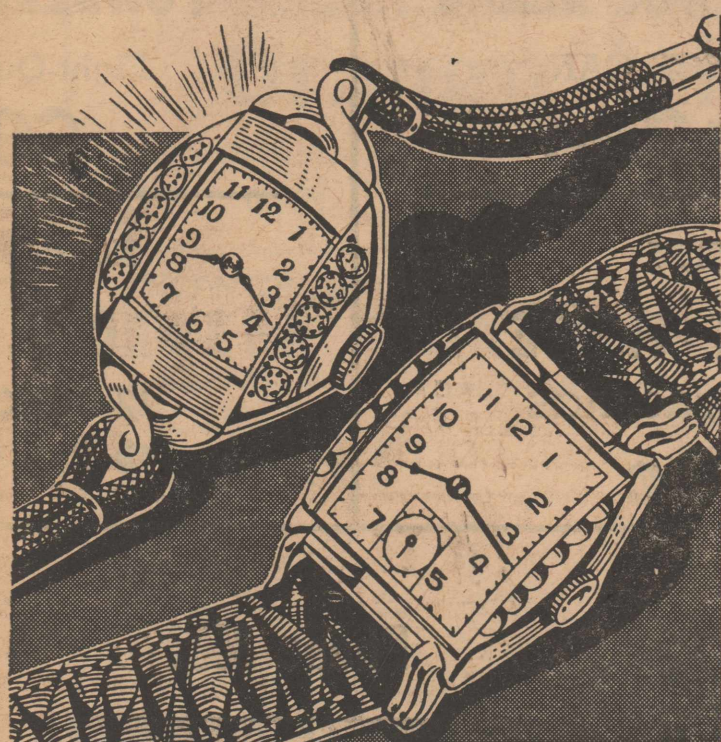

**Holt Predicts Record-Breaking Flood Of Mail**

Checking the progress on his "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, Postmaster I. B. Holt predicted today that the 1955 holiday season will be a real record breaker as he noted the mounting flood of Christmas cards and gift packages.

The Postmaster went on to say that the mounting volume of Christmas mail makes it doubly important for everyone to help on the "Mail Early for Christmas" program. He warned that packages mailed to out-of-state points after this week may not be delivered in time for Christmas. He said that the flow of Christmas cards is running about normal but parcel post is definitely behind schedule and suggested that all out-of-state parcels still to be mailed should be sent by air parcel post, and pointed out that Christmas cards addressed to the most distant points should be air mailed.

Postmaster Holt again reminded that all gifts should be wrapped securely with plenty of heavy paper and tied with strong cord. "Write legibly or better yet, print the recipient's full name, street address, zone number, city and state on all mailing labels and Christmas cards," he urged, pointing out that a new pamphlet, "Packaging and Wrapping Parcels for Mailing" is now available free of charge.

Keep in mind that gift packages may not be sealed, unless the return address and this notice appears: "Contents, Merchandise—May be opened for postal inspection." Christmas seals and "Do Not Open Until Christmas" stickers may be used but always place them on the back of your gift parcels or Christmas cards, leaving the address easy to read.

"Try to bring your parcels to the windows before 10:00 a. m. or between 1:30 and 3:30 p. m. to avoid the noon hour rush," the Postmaster concluded.

### FARMS

Cool, brisk weather continues to dominate the entire plains area, with cold, strong winds harassing most outdoor operations.

Practically all the harvest operations are over. Some few farmers are stripping the scattering bolls of cotton and men with sudan are getting it threshed. Otherwise, farm operations are limited to cutting stalks, discing and breaking land. Moldboard plowing continues to be predominate as moisture remains sufficient for good plowing.

I had the privilege of representing the South Plains Oliver Dealers at a Dealers Supervisor Council held by the Oliver Corp. in Dallas last week.

Oliver, the first of the major companies to institute such supervisor council composed of dealers' throughout the Dallas branch, realizes that the desires of the farmer consumer is what keeps the implement manufacturers in business.

The selling of the ads in the catalogue helps finance the ribbons and cash prizes offered by the

organization for the winners of the show. This is not used to finance the sale of the animals at the auction sale following the show.
