


## CALLED BY THE GOSPEL

# Freedom's Hope In '55

Governor Shivers has proclaimed March 7-12 as "Public Schools Week in Texas," so that makes it official.

But the unafficial fact is that few people realize -- parents of school children included -- just how great a role our public schools, functioning in the free air of America today, will play in preserving that freedom tomorrow and in the years to come. Most of us know that our liberty is a heritage which must be defended day to day, not an iron-clad inheritance that can never be taken away; each new example of despotism over the globe impresses us with that fact. And we know that only popular understanding and appreciation of our individual responsibility will cause our freedom to continue.

These basic ideas we seem to have known all our lives. What we tend to forget is where we got them. Chances are it was another basic institution, our system of public schools, which injected and furthered the concept of our American ideals in the minds of most of us.
