Record Vote Cast By Olton Folks Tuesday

Led by Mayor candidate G. H. Bley, write-in office seekers made a clean sweep of all three city posts Tuesday as Olton voters trooped to the polls in an all time record number.

Carrol Cox and D. Y. Ray ween the two commissioner seats by narrow margins.

The city commission-elect immediately pledged support for 'anything for the progress and good of the community."

Bley thwarted a fourth-term try by Incumbent Lefty Hollingsworth.

Election Judge Marshall Camp. bell said a total of 353 votes were cast.

Bley received 186 votes and Hollingsworth 154 in the mayorality race. Cox with 172 votes led the commissioners race and Ray was second with 167 votes. Incumbent Eldon Franks received 159 votes and Incumbent W. B. Smith 157.

Campbell said one ballot was thrown out because of mutilation and 12 ballots were unmarked.

Voting was spirited throughout the day. City officials said it was believed to be the biggest city vote on record here. Total. number of votes cast were only 13 short of the total number of poll taxes paid here this year. Of course several overage persons who are exempt from paying Il tax and therefore not on fi poll tax roll, cast votes in the election. Mayor Hollingsworth said his successor and the new commission will take office at the first regular city commission which will be held the first week in May. for high school assembly next Thursday morning.

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
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
