Election Interest Soars

Olton Parent-Teacher Association Urges Children To Have Check-ups

With the return of school days and hundreds of Olton children and youth flocking to the classrooms, the local Parent-Teacher Association Health Committee, headed by Mrs. A. E. Cade, recommends that each child have a complete medical and dental pre-school check-up.

Each of these children, according to the committee and school officials, should be as free as possible from all physical defects that can be corrected, and protected against diseases which frequently spread through classrooms.

Children who have not yet received their smallpox vaccinations are urged to do so. If possible, first graders should have a vaccination certificate at the time of registration.

Free Vaccine Available

Vaccine for those unable to pay is available through the State Public Health Department. Dr. A. E. Maurer, County Health Officer of Littlefield, states, "Smallpox vaccinations for children entering public schools is required by state law, and free vaccine is furnished for indigent children."

The vaccine for this purpose is being procured by the City Health Officer, Dr. B. J. Souders. Parents may take these children

to Olton Memorial Hospital or to Dr. Souder's office for free inoculation, preferably Tuesday, August 23, between 3 and 5 o'clock.

It is requested that area farmers who employ families with school children make effort to see that these children are vaccinated.

As part of the public school health program, Mrs. Cecile Roebuck has been employed on a half-day basis as school nurse. She will administer the school first-aid program and will serve the needs of the children as they arise.

SWPC SETS NEW SAFETY RECORD

Employees of the Southwestern Public Service Company have established a new all-company safety record of working 3,020,404 man-hours without loss of time from accident.

This information came this week from Orville Overstreet, manager of the Olton office of Southwestern Public Service Co. The new record exceeds the old record of 3,019,075 man-hours set in 1954. It was reached at the end of the working day last Friday.

"We are proud of the fact that we have set this new record and we are still adding to it," declared A. R. Watson, executive vice-president and general manager of the power company.

The company has eight safety groups which are made up of the five divisions headquartered at Amarillo, Guymon, Plainview, Lubbock and Roswell, NM.

Two Important Precinct One Posts At Stake In Next Saturday's Vote

More interest has been indicated in the Democratic runoff election to be held Saturday than was shown in the July primary. Two popular candidates are battling it out for the office of commissioner of Precinct 1. They are incumbent Don Bryant and Ford Lain.

Bryant led Lain by 44 votes in the first primary. Bryant received 361 votes while Lain received 317. Bryant and Lain are staking their hopes on votes counted for the losers C. M. Moss and R. A. Green. In the balance are 316 votes.

In another Precinct 1 runoff, Truitt Sides and Wilton Bodkin will be on the ballot for the office of Democratic precinct chairman.

Sides lacked one vote receiving plurality in field of some 20 write-ins. Sides received 103 votes and Bodkin was the next high man with 39.

Hottest of all the races is—of course—the gubernatorial race in which Price Daniel is pitted against Ralph Yarborough.

Daniel is the incumbent US Senator. He led his opponent in the first primary. A block of votes polled by W. Lee O'Daniel will decide the Democratic nominee for governor.

Here at Olton, the polls will open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and close promptly at 7 o'clock Saturday evening.

Presiding judge again will be Eldon Franks. Balloting will be at the school cafeteria.

Scouting for talent: Bonnie Buchenau is a dandy artist; Murrel Snyder is a lovely "decorator"; Nig James is fluent with description.

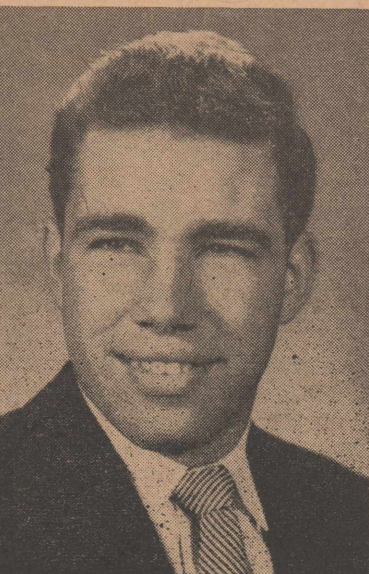

It all began when, after trying to get work as a bookkeeper at the bank, typist, receptionist, or just anything, I dropped by to chat with Troy at the newspaper office. Out of the clear blue sky, he offered me the job as society editor.

My parents didn't have to tell me that his offer was absurd, like being offered a job by a Hollywood producer as a star of a big studio's next movie. And the fact that I had studied journalism in college and worked on my college and high school papers didn't make it any less absurd. A literary background like that is about as impressive to a newspaper publisher as a background of small parts in school plays to a producer.

I accepted, although I was frightened at the thought of writing all those stories—also, I was frightened because I'd be following in Korbye Martin's footsteps, who was a perfect writer and society editor as far as I was and am concerned.
The other workers in the office at that time—Gordon Tompkins, Roy Melancon, and Korbye—were aghast when they saw the kid who was to have the responsibility for writing up about 75% of the news in the paper.

They watched me, shaking their heads, for the first week while I tried to learn the tricks of converting the stories club-women brought me to the correct typed form for the type-setters, deciding what events merited photographs, keeping track of the dizzying confusion of stories and pictures in my

desk so that no picture would ever appear in the paper with the wrong caption or story.
Those first few days, I was all thumbs and butter fingers, and scared to death. I never was so mixed up in all my life. But I tried. I tried as hard as I could, and after a while it all began to make sense, and I knew what I was doing.
I've been working here a year and a half now—and I think one of the biggest lessons I've learned is getting along with others and understanding people. I think love rubs off; if you love everyone they love you back.

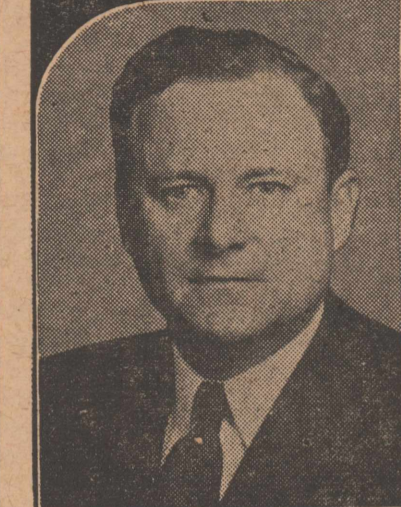
And so it goes on—the round of teas, the luncheons, fashion shows, fun with Husband, and the basking in my job.
