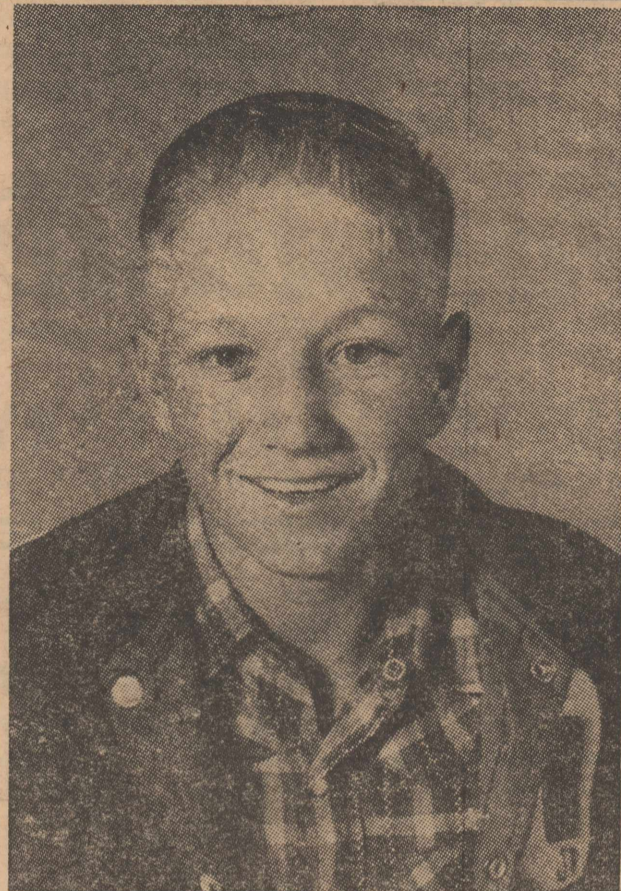

This information came Wednesday from Elvis Hatley, manager of the organization.

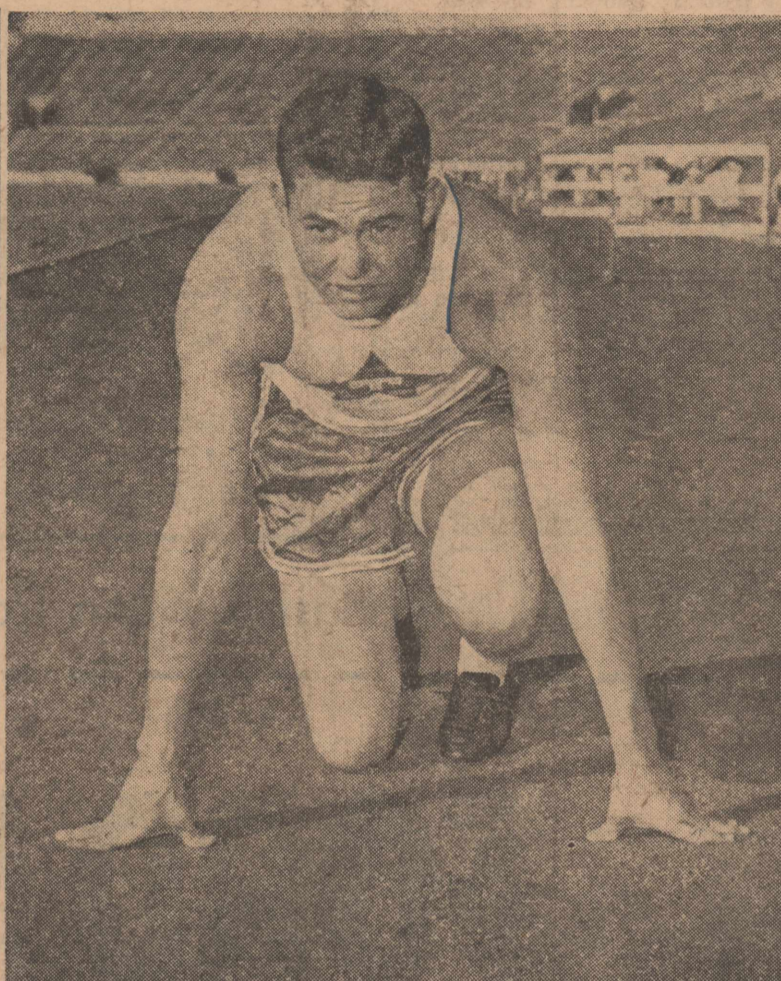
Mr. Hatley's office is in the same building with that of Tom Beard, just across the street from Olton Farm Supply.

Polls will open at 8 o'clock Tuesday morning and will close at 6 o'clock Tuesday evening.

Presiding election judge will be Howard Hall. He will be assisted by Bill Thomas, Jack Silcott will serve as election clerk.

In the race for city council are T. M. Campbell, Lynn Fite, J. C. Hamby, Ed Thompson, S. E. Whittington and V. L. Smith.

The next election on tap is the school trustee election.

No additional candidates had filed for Olton school board at noon Wednesday, according to school business manager Rae Porter.

Petitions have been filed for the candidacy of Louis Hair and G. T. Sides to succeed themselves on the board.

Filing deadline was Wednesday afternoon at 5 p.m.

School board election is scheduled for Saturday, April 7, in the school lunchroom, and Walter Schreier will serve as presiding judge.

School trustees are elected for three-year terms.

Holder trustees include I. V. Fent, V. Y. Jefferies, E. C. Jones, Owen Jones and L. H. Neinast.

At the same time local school trustees are elected, voters also will name a county school trustee. In this race are incumbent George Bohner and Glen Exter.

In the meantime, precinct and county races are shaping up. Two are in the race for County Sheriff, including the incumbent, Dick Dyer.

Four have their hats in the commissioner ring. They include incumbent Don Bryant and Ford Lahn, R. A. Green and C. M. Moss.
