## Crash Takes Life Of Tahoka Woman As Five Others Are Injured Sunday

One person was killed and five others injured late Sunday afternoon in a head-on collision of two automobiles at the brink of a hill 1 1/2 miles south of Hart Camp.

Dead is Mrs. Daniel R. Proffitt of Tahoka. Highway Patrolmen said she is believed to have been killed instantly. She became Lamb County's first traffic fatality of the year.

Injured were identified by officers as:

Mrs. Ellie V. Wilson, Hart Camp, arm and leg injuries. Treated at Olton Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Willie James Wilson, 25, Hart Camp, identified by authorities as driver of one of the cars, treated for minor injuries at Lubbock.

J. L. Wilson, Hart Camp, knee, wrist and facial injuries.

Frank Miller, broken arm and facial cuts. Treated at Littlefield.

Daniel R. Proffitt, 50, Tahoka, identified by officers as driver of one of the cars involved and husband of the dead woman. Facial cuts and chest injuries.

Highway Patrolmen said the car driven by Wilson was north bound on the farm-to-market road. The Proffitt vehicle was south bound.

Officers said the two cars met head-on on pavement wet from recent rain at the brink of a hill.

One of five occupants of the Wilson car was thrown from the vehicle. The auto smashed to a stop in the center of the pavement only about five feet from the original point of impact.

The Proffitt car came to rest in the east road ditch. So violent was the crash that both cars were demolished.

A little girl riding in the Wilson car was unhurt.

## State-Federal Aid Would Make Huge Hi-way Bond Unnecessary

Lamb County voters will go to the polls Saturday to decide the fate of a proposed \$800,000 bond issue—purportedly for the widening of Highways 84 and 70.

Actually, the only roadway in the county that CAN be widened into four lanes in the foreseeable future is some 13 miles of Highway 84 east from Littlefield to the Hockley County line.

State funds already are available for widening of this section of highway. No state funds have yet been set aside for the other proposed improvements.

## US-State Will Foot Bill For Some Highway Right Of Way In Near Future

Texas Highway Commission announced a "radical change" in policy Wednesday under which the state will buy future right-of-way for the 2,900-mile interstate highway system in Texas.

The action is contingent, a commission statement said, upon passage by Congress of the federal highway bill in its present form. Local city and county governments presently buy right-of-way.

Under the bill, the commission said, the federal government will pay for 90 per cent of the right-of-way for such highways, but if the money is not used for

that it may not be used for construction.

"Under these circumstances, the commission felt that it would be an injustice to the people of Texas not to take advantage of this federal money and relieve Texas taxpayers of the burden of rights-of-way purchase on the interstate system," the commission statement said.

Interstate routes selected in Texas are:

US 66 across the Panhandle; US 80 from the Texas-New Mexico border near El Paso to the Texas-Louisiana border near Marshall; US 290, State 27 and

US 87 from near Van Horn to San Antonio; US 90 from San Antonio to the Texas-Louisiana border near Orange; US 81 from the Texas-Mexico border at Laredo to Fort Worth; US 77 from Hillsboro to the Texas-Oklahoma border near Gainesville; US 67 from Dallas to the Texas-Arkansas border at Texarkana, and US 75 from Dallas to Galveston.

The commission said money is not available to adopt the same policy on the primary or trunk highway system. But if additional revenue is made available by the next Legislature, the commission said

it was hoped the state could put up 50 per cent of the cost of right-of-way on prospective four-lane sections with local city and county governments putting up 50 per cent.

The commission pointed out that the first available funds to the department from the federal aid highway bill for the interstate system will be used for construction of projects where adequate right-of-way has already been obtained by local agencies.

Chairman E. H. Thornton, Jr., said this plan would be fairer to those counties which already have obtained right-of-way.

Olton voters will ballot at city hall. Polls open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and close at 7 o'clock Saturday night. G. T. Sides is election judge.

On a direct question put to him at a recent meeting in Springlake, Marshall Formby, state highway commissioner, said that there is no assurance that any highway not already approved by the state highway department will ever be widened.

In other words, according to Mr. Formby, it will be some time in the future before the state will even contemplate widening Highway 70 or improvement of any part of Highway 84 other than that already designated.

In the meantime, Wednesday it became apparent that the state and federal government will participate in right-of-way purchase on all US-State highways where these governmental agencies deem widening necessary.

In the light of new federal road legislation, the state and federal government will foot the bill when, and if, the time ever comes that widening of Highway 70 becomes necessary.

In the meantime, Olton civic leaders have gone on record as being opposed to the bond issue. The Olton Lions Club authorized printing of handbills designed to defeat the issue.

Most folks here oppose the issue principally upon the grounds that they feel that it has been poorly planned. One county official said that the proponents of the bond issue were asked to present an estimate on the cost of right-of-way. This was never done, he said.

## Entomologist Reports Bad Infestation

This area has one of the heaviest infestations of thrip in history, according to Dub Jones, Chipman Chemical Company entomologist from Plainview.

"It's the worst I've ever seen," Mr. Jones declared.

Mr. Jones said thrip made its first noticeable appearance in this country about 1949 and has been a threat to cotton crops since.

He said thrip can travel as far as 300 miles on the wind. Thrip stunts cotton and delays maturity as much as two weeks. Infested cotton takes on a dog-eared appearance as if it had been hit by hail.

The entomologist said from now until July 10 in the critical period. He also warned that with the hot days we have had lately the residual effect has been cut some. He said farmers can expect protection for about five days from the average spraying.

He advised farmers to spray early and then quit about July 10 to let beneficial insects build up.

Most Olton folks already have figured out that the \$800,000 proposed bond issue has been well sugar-coated so as not to gag people living north of the sandhills.

We're quoting from a column in a newspaper SOUTH of the sandhills a statement which we feel should be debunked.

"Most civic leaders north of the sandhills are particularly anxious to see the election pass." Either the writer of this bit of information neglected to interview Olton civic leaders or else did not print what some of them had to say.

Here's what some Olton folks had to say about it:

G. H. Bley, Mayor of Olton: I am against this bond issue because among other things I believe it has been premature, poorly planned and improperly presented."

V. T. Tanner, Mayor of Springlake: I have not made any comment to ANY NEWSPAPER on how I feel about this bond issue.

Basil Sherman, president of the Chamber of Commerce and president-elect of the Lions Club: "I'm against it. It has been poorly planned. I have no assurance that our highway will ever be widened. I think it has been improperly presented."

O. J. Lee, farmer: I'm against the bond issue. We have no assurance that any road will be widened other than that 13 miles from Littlefield to the Hockley County line.

D. M. Granbery, president of Olton State Bank—I'm opposed to it. It is premature and poorly planned."

Judge E. S. Rowe, Littlefield—"I don't think this bond issue is a good idea. There has been no estimate on how much this right-of-way is going to cost."

Littlefield proponents of this roadway certainly have not made a great deal of effort to get Olton folks out to the so-called public discussion meetings of this bond issue. Every time a meeting has been announced it has been after Enterprise press time to be held before the Enterprise could be brought out again to inform the people of the date and place.

Not once have the proponents of this issue contacted this publication BEFORE a public meeting. Our feelings certainly are not hurt by our being snubbed. We just don't think that this issue has been properly put to the people.

Former county judge, Stanley Doss, of Littlefield, was over to see us the other night. Here's what he had to say about the issue:

"The issue has not been properly explained. The public has not been told what they're voting on. What is Olton, or Littlefield for that matter, going to get out of it. I'm not voting for a bunch of bonds when I don't know exactly how, when and for what they're going to be spent. By the time we get a bond issue like that paid off—it will cost us \$2 million or more. We ought to be careful."
