Workbench Glamor For Class Misfits

Serious thinkers have been stroking their beards thoughtfully of late and crying that the great American middle class is being squeezed almost to death by the pressure of hard times. What they fail to add is that the great middle class has just been asking for it by taking unto its bosom a great many people who would be happier and more prosperous elsewhere.

This fact was neatly touched on recently by the publicist, William Feather in an article in Nation's Business

In spite of unemployment, says Mr. Feather, the nation today suffers from an acute shortage of skilled workers, and the shortage is going to be even more acute in the near future. And why? Because the average ambitious high school lad of today has his heart set on a dignifid white collar job, and scorns the prospect of being an expert turret lathe operator, a first-class pattern maker, a skilled machinist or anything else that requires manual labor

It isn't the ambitious high school lad's fault. We have glorified the white collar man; as Mr. Peather remarks, we have taught the young chap to look forward to a career rather than a job. He feel that it would somehow be disgraceful for him

The result of all this is that the swollen middle class is jammed with people who simply can't make a decent living in their chosen occupations.

We have penniless young lawyers who wait with desperate anxiety for the practice that never materializes; hopeful young dentists who can find no teeth to fill; salesmen by the score and the gross who skimp along on a hand to mouth basis, a scant jump ahead of the sheriff; clerks who get along on day laborer's pay; and a whole army of luckless mortals who try half a dozen jobs in the course of a decade, succeeding in none of them and eternally driven by the haunting fear of poverty.

Yet all the while the skilled lack men, and the skilled worker goes along happily and comfortably on an income that would look like very heawen to these harassed white collar misfits.

What's the answer? Mr Feather suggests, simply, that we devise uniforms to take the place of overalls; and before you start laughing just consider the prestige which a neat uniform gives to the jobs it goes with

We have an abundance of good technical high schools to prepare boys for the skilled trades. It would be a fine thing if we could find some way-whether Mr. Feather's or some other-to show young men that the white collar is not the only badge of distinction in this country.

Maybe the uniforms would do it. Maybe a unithe solution, it is high time we found it.

Poverty to End of Time

From the Bonham Favorite: "What mass poverty needs is prevention," says a newspaper writer. But the way to prevent poverty is not pointed out.

There is a way to prevent mass poverty, but it is not by legislation. Somebody in every age has dreamed about abolishing poverty. Many efforts have been made, many plans suggested and a few adopted. But poverty is still with us. It will be with us until the end of time, unless a way is found to completely change the lazy into the energetic, the spendthrift into the saver, the profligate into the thrifty, the prodigal into the penitent, the pleasure lover into the self-denyer.

Just as long as a majority, or even a sizeable minority of men and women are willing to spend more than they earn, willing to rest when duty demands action, willing to feast today and let tomorrow take care of its own needs, willing to shirk their responsibilties and doend on others to supply their needs, just that long will poverty grip

Legislation can't abolish poverty; perhaps it may mitigate some of the evils of poverty, perhaps it may aid the worthy poor and the unfortunate, but it may also create more poverty than it re-

The dream that poverty can be abolished, without remaking the majority of the poor is an idle dream. Most poverty (except that caused my misfortunes), is the direct result of want of energy, or judgment, or ability-and legislation can cure none of these.

Why Wait For Safety? (Wichita Falls Post)

Reports from drivers license examinations reveal that poor vision is one of the most common defects found in those seeking license to drive an automobile in Texas. The percentage of motorists found with defective vision is rather high. In most instances the drivers had no previous knowledge of their defects, but in many cases they knew of their weakness but had neglected remedying it.

As a result motorists of Texas have faced unnecessary hazards. We must continue to face many such hazards until April, 1939, when all motorists will be required to pass the examination.

That is the greatest weakness of the new drivers' license law. It postpones the date of effectiveness too long, and allows those who are not properly equipped to operate a motor vehicle fee ase of the highways too long. Most of us can qualify for driving by having glasses fitted, etc., and there is no reason we should not do it now, rather than wait until April of 1939.



Slow Cooking Adds Tenderness to Roast

The various studies carried on the Division of Rural Home Research and from which recent findings will be briefly reported here, classify under Food and Nutrition, or Textiles and Clothing. or Family Economics, three of the five broad subject matter decisions which comprise home economics.

Dr. Cover's experiments with ooking "paired roasts" (corresponding cuts from right and left side of the same carcass) have indicated that tenderness is influenced more by length of cooking ime than by over temperature. In general, the longer the cooking time the more tender the roast. The results were the same in the paired roasts cooked to the same degree of doneness whether one was cooked at a high tempera-ture, the other at a low, or both were cooked at the same low oven temperature, one roast having skewers stuck in it to shorten the cooking time and the other without skewers. The unskewered slower-cooked roast was the more tender of the pair. The housewife is therefore advised that using slow cooking for roasts will increase her chances for having them tender when served.
