Olton FFA Boys Make Excellent Record At Littlefield, Lubbock

Olton FFA boys made good showings in both the Littlefield Stock Show Friday and Saturday and the Lubbock show early this week.

The boys exhibited 21 hogs at the Littlefield show and 15 of these stood in the blue ribbon class. The remaining six were in the red ribbon group. There were about 100 entries.

Animals were placed in blue, red and white ribbon groups. No grand champions were named in that show.

Sammy Thomas exhibited a blue ribbon Hereford calf and Houston Hamby exhibited a red ribbon Angus. The Olton boys showed only two calves.

Twelve Olton boys qualified for a Littlefield Chamber of Commerce educational tour to Corpus Christi and then to the

King Ranch. Houston Hamby's Southdown lamb was judged grand champion Southdown lamb of the Lubbock show. He also placed another lamb 17th there.

Sammy Thomas placed his Hereford seventh in a field of 50 at the Lubbock show.

Neal Keasler's Berkshire barrow placed sixth in the lightweight division. Jerry Moore's lightweight Hampshire placed third in a field of 62. He also placed a hog in fifth place in the middleweight division.

James Carson's light Hampshire placed tenth. Don Kidd's light Hampshire placed 15th.

Douglas Smith's spotted Poland China placed second in the middleweight division. Jerry Edmonson placed hogs second and tenth in the lightweight spotted Poland China class.

OHS 440 Relay Team Wins 1st At Lockney

The OHS 440-yard relay team won first place and Mustang thinclads picked up enough points in other events to nab fifth place in Saturday's first annual Lockney Relays, which attracted 27 schools from all reaches of the Panhandle-Plains area.

The Mustang 440-yard relay team was composed of Wally Stewart, John Jefferies, Jarrell Edwards and Teddy Estes. The quartet clipped off the quarter mile in 46 seconds flat to nip Lorenzo's highly-regarded 440-yard relay team.

The Mustang mile relay team finished third. Olton also placed Teddy Estes third and Wally Stewart fourth in the 100-yard dash and Kirk McAdams third in the 880-yard run.

Abernathy's versatile Antelopes won first place with 26 8/15 points.

Four Other Olton Lads Hurt As Auto Skids Then Overturns

An Olton teenager was fatally injured and his four companions hospitalized early Saturday night when his car went out of control, hit a culvert and overturned.

The accident occurred about 7 o'clock on Highway 70, some four miles west of Plainview.

LARRY BENNETT, 16 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bennett, died a few minutes after arrival at Plainview Clinic and Foundation.

Less seriously injured were: ALVIN WALLACE, bruises and lacerations. Still under observation at the hospital Tuesday.

CHARLES MOORE, slight concussion. Dismissed from the hospital Tuesday morning.

THURMAN ADAMS, transferred to Olton Memorial Hospital. Rib fractures.

TERRY ALLEN, less seriously hurt than the others. Dismissed from the hospital Sunday morning.

Possibly the best description of the tragedy was furnished by

Frank Bishop, who recently established the Bishop Shoe Repair Shop at Olton.

Mr. Bishop said the car driven by young Bennett careened out of control while it was trying to pass his car. Both vehicles were east bound on Highway 70.

Mr. Bishop said the Bennett car was about a block behind him when he first noticed it.

"I saw another car coming from the east and looked back to see that the car behind me was trying to pass. I realized that he couldn't make it and increased my speed in an effort to give him time to get back in his lane. I couldn't get my speed up fast enough to give him the time he needed.

"He whipped back in his lane but was not able to cut down his speed soon enough. He either had to hit me or go around on the right side.

"He tried to make it around the right side. The best I could tell his rear wheels hit the gravel at the edge of the road and slid sideways.

"The next I could tell he came alongside me and hit a culvert. I saw it throw three of the boys out. I didn't see the fourth thrown out and I helped the fifth boy out of the car myself."

As best the story could be pieced together, Alvin Wallace, Charles Moore and Thurman Adams were in the rear seat. Terry Allen and Larry Bennett were in the front seat.

The Wallace boy is reported to have opened the rear door of the car and thereby possibly have saved the lives of his companions in the seat with him.

Mr. Bishop said the car did not overturn completely but hit the ground on its top and skidded along.

Jesse Parker and Lloyd Graham were among the Olton people to arrive on the scene shortly after the accident. Ambulances were called by folks living in a house nearby.

The five lads were en route to Plainview. Young Bennett and Wallace both had participated in a track meet at Lockney during the day.

Relatives of the dead boy quoted a truck driver witness as saying that he did not believe that young Bennett was driving at more than 70 miles an hour when the accident occurred.

The tragedy cast a pall over Olton High School this week. Young Bennett was a popular student in the freshman class there. He participated in athletics and was popular among the student body.

"I missed his smile today," declared Coach Joe Turner Monday afternoon. "Everyone liked him. He was a good boy. He always had a smile on his face."

Larry was born Oct. 25, 1939 at Hollis, Okla. He came to Olton with his parents the year he was in the second grade and had attended school here since. He was a member of the Church of Christ.

Survivors include the parents, the paternal grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Bennett of Clarendon and the maternal grandfather, S. T. Parker.

School was dismissed for the funeral services which were held Tuesday afternoon in the school auditorium. Officiating was S. A. Freeman, former minister of Main Street Church of Christ. Burial was in Olton Cemetery under direction of Parsons Funeral Home of Plainview. The body was in state at the family home until time for the services.
