DISCUSS WIDENING HIGHWAY 70

Groundwork already is being laid for the widening of Highway 70 east and west through Olton.

Ralph Glover, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce Highways Committee, and Basil Sherman, committeeman, met with Engineer McCarty of Lubbock, Tuesday. McCarty is district engineer for the State Highway Department. He visited Olton Tuesday. Mr. Glover quoted Mr. McCarty as having said a 100-foot right-of-way will be needed for the widening.

Farm-To-Market 304 was widened north and south through Olton in recent years.

FFA LADS WIN FOUR BANNERS

Olton FFA boys Saturday took four banners in five events entered at the district FFA contest in Muleshoe.

First place in radio broadcasting was taken by a team composed of Bill Austin, John Wayne Hair and Jackie Pinson. Second place in senior farm skills was taken by a team made up of Eugene Howard, Wendell Breland and Roy Neal Jones.

The junior farm skills team also took second place. It is made up of Gary Lobaugh, Billy Hair and Elmer Reich.

The Olton senior chapter conducting team came in third and just 16 points out of first place. It is made up of Jerry Moore, David Cole, James Simmons, Dewey Hukill, Jimmy Robbins, Mike McGill, Phil Neinst, and Gerry George.

The junior chapter conducting team won fourth place. It is made up of Larry Timmons, Jerry Thomas, Louis Earl Calame, Harold Featheringill, Layton Covington, Lynn Whitefield, Fred Riney, Gerald Simmons, James Hukill and Coy Carlisle.

Banners were presented at the district banquet Tuesday night at Littlefield. District Secretary Jerry Moore delivered the response to the welcoming address.

FIVE OTHERS SELECTED FOR HONORABLE MENTION HONORS

Two Olton Mustangs were named to the all-district football squad while several others were given honorable mention.

Those named to the first team were Jack Roye Straw and Jack Hysinger, both team captains.

It was nothing particularly new to Captain Jack Hysinger. He made the all-district team last year.

Jack was named to the offensive team this year as a tackle. He weighs 210 pounds and is described by Coach Joe Turner as "college football material."

Jack is a three-year letterman with the Pony team.

He also is an honor student, having been elected to the National Honor Society.

Jack Roye—who chalked up 71 of Olton's points this year—made all-district fullback. He also is a three-year letterman and weighs 150 pounds.

Jack Roye made a good showing this year in spite of injuries. He battled with a shoulder injury and a knee injury all season and picked up good yardage in every game in which he participated.

Jack Roye also is a member of the National Honor Society and plays a prominent part in student activities at high school.

Those who received honorable mention include Billy King, who is the third captain of this year's Mustang team.

Others on the honorable mention list are James Carson, Don Edwards, Clinton Billingsley and Ronnie Dennis.

Dennis is the lad who in four years out for football never missed a practice. He wound up his football career in a blaze of glory by making a touchdown against Dimmitt. It was Ronnie's first touchdown in four years of playing.

SNOWFALL HAMPERS HARVEST

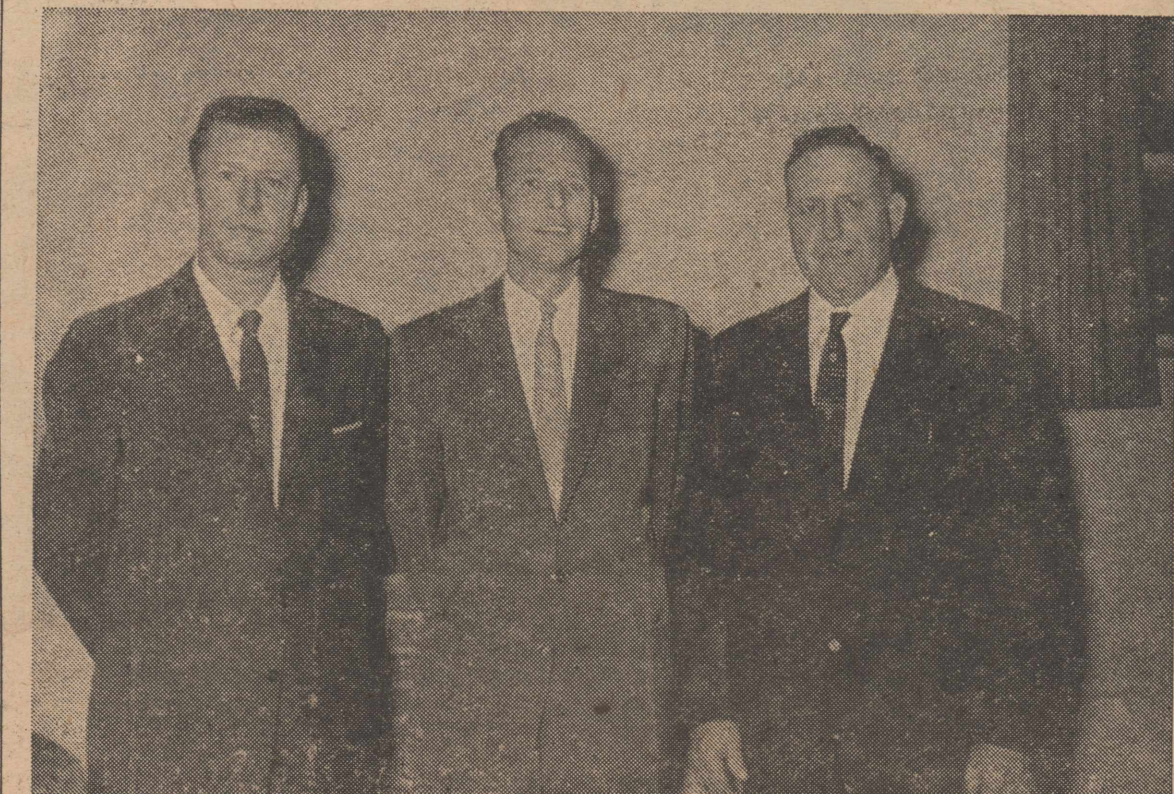

Books on Parade

This week I intended to tell you about an exciting new book about Texas I just read called

"Reluctant Empire" by George Fuermann.
But because it is Thanksgiving, and I've just finished a well-aged borrowed book, I want you to share a portion of it with me... if you didn't read it years ago.

The chapter about one Thanksgiving in the life of Francie Nolan, principal character in Betty Smith's novel, "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn" is a touching episode. It seems that Francie, child of the slums of Brooklyn, had never tasted pumpkin pie. And on this day before Thanksgiving at the

grade school Francie attended, a pumpkin pie was used in the program.
When the teacher offered the pie to someone to take home, thirty little mouths watered, but not a hand went up to offer to take the pie. All were too proud to accept charitable food.
But Francie wanted that pie. It symbolized to her a food of covered wagon people—of Indian fighters...

In a flash Francie concocted a lie about not wanting the pie for herself but for a very poor family she knew.
She took the pie and ate it on the way home. It tasted like soap to poor conscience-stricken Francie.
How Francie colored her story to teacher about the poor family and finally admitted it was all a lie taught Francie an embarrassing but profitable lesson.

This story about Francie Nolan, her background, her family, and her struggle for survival against overwhelming odds makes you understand the symbolic meaning of the quotation on the flyleaf of the book, "There's a tree that grows in Brooklyn. Some people call it the Tree of Heaven. No matter where its seed falls, it makes a tree which struggles to reach the sky. It grows in boarded-up lots and out of neglected rubbish heaps. It grows up out of cellar gratings. It is the only tree that grows out of cement. It grows lushly... survives without sun, water, and seemingly without earth. It would be considered beautiful except there are too many of it."

And even though Francie's little body starved, her mind was well-nourished. For Francie went to the library every day. Through books Francie found lovely new worlds far away from the sordid tenement district.

When Francie was fourteen, she wanted to go to high school more than anything in the world. But she had to go to work in an adult world to help support her widowed mother, her little sister, and brother.

How Francie studied and worked and eventually was able to enter college (by passing entrance exams) without ever having gone to high school is stimulating reading.

And one reason the book was so interesting to me was because last summer while in New York, Lois Turner and I went sight-

seeing via taxi.
And the cab driver happened to be from Brooklyn, and when Lois asked him if there really were trees in Brooklyn...
"Of course, there are trees in Brooklyn, lots of trees," he replied.
He showed us every tree in Brooklyn, almost...
And I couldn't see Brooklyn for the trees.

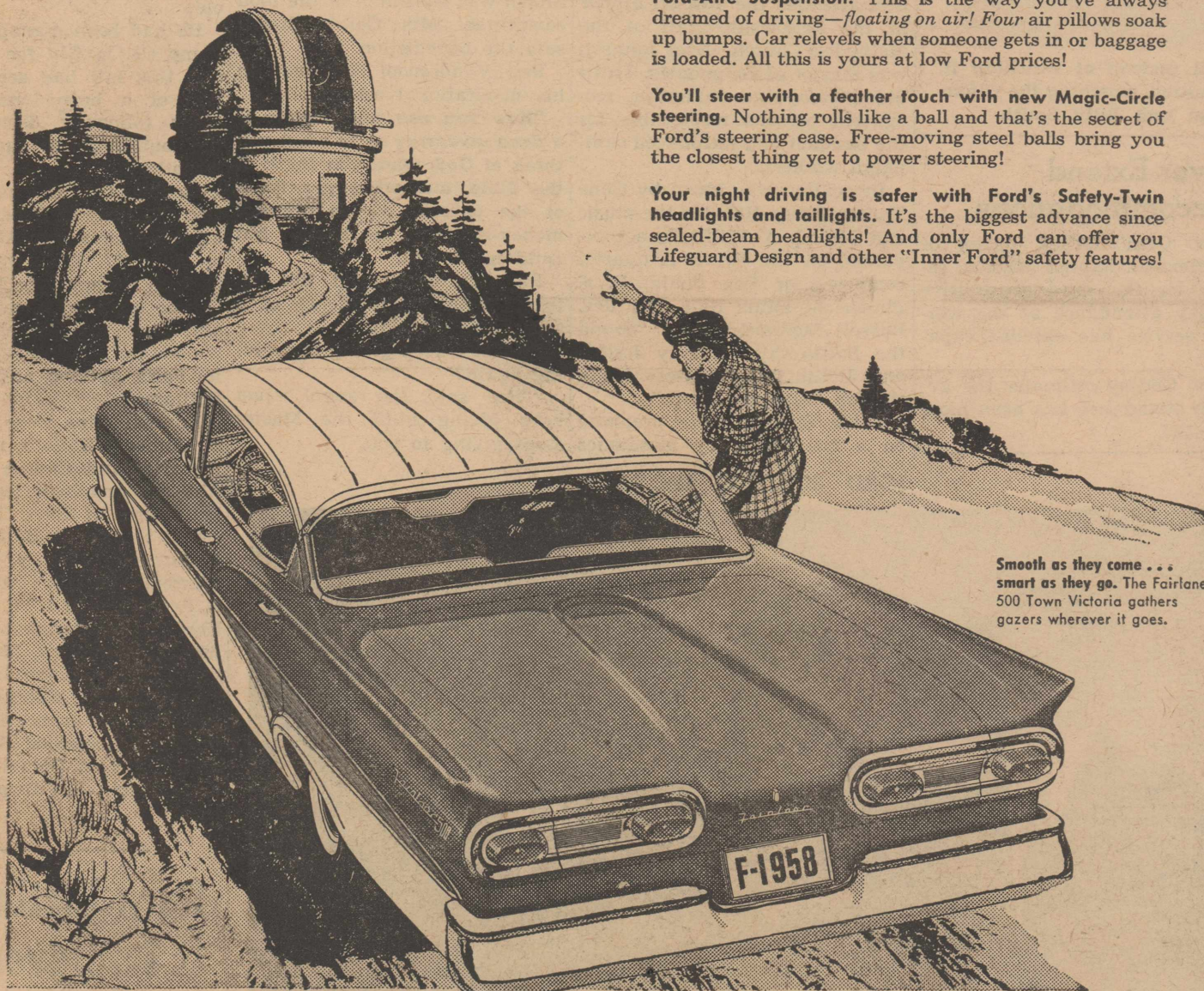

Have a happy Thanksgiving Day this year, but please, don't forget why we celebrate Thanksgiving!

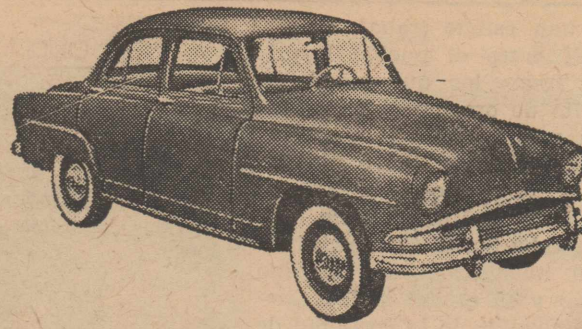

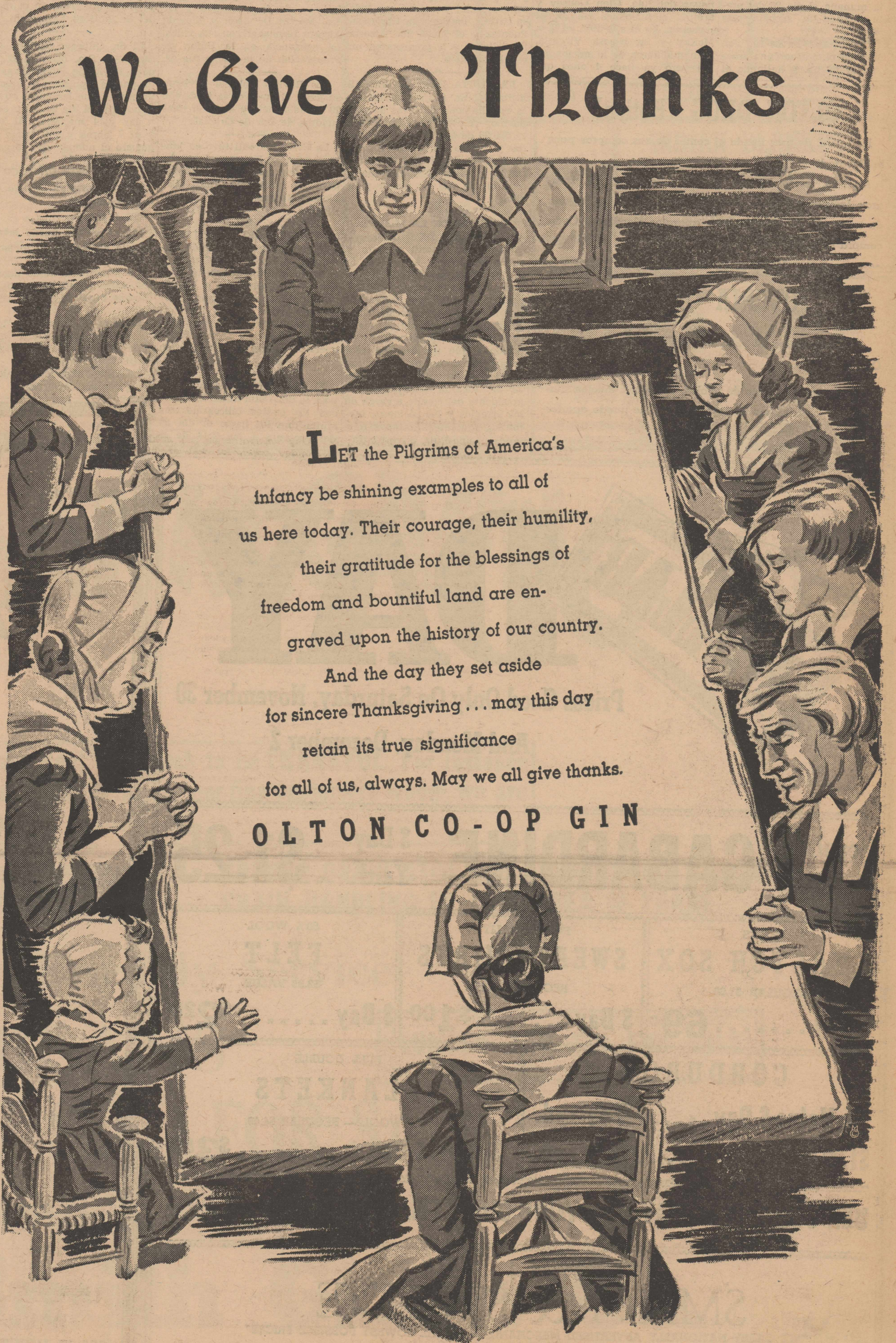

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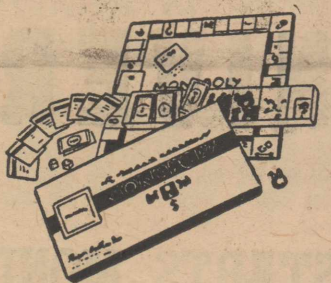

"Olton and Shallowater are alike, in that they are both farming communities and the people of both towns are very friendly," says Tech student Sherrill Alexander.

Alexander graduated from Olton in 1957, but lived most of his life in Shallowater. He said that although he hated to leave Shallowater at the time, he has come to think very highly of Olton.

Now attending Texas Tech, Alexander is an architecture major and is planning a five-

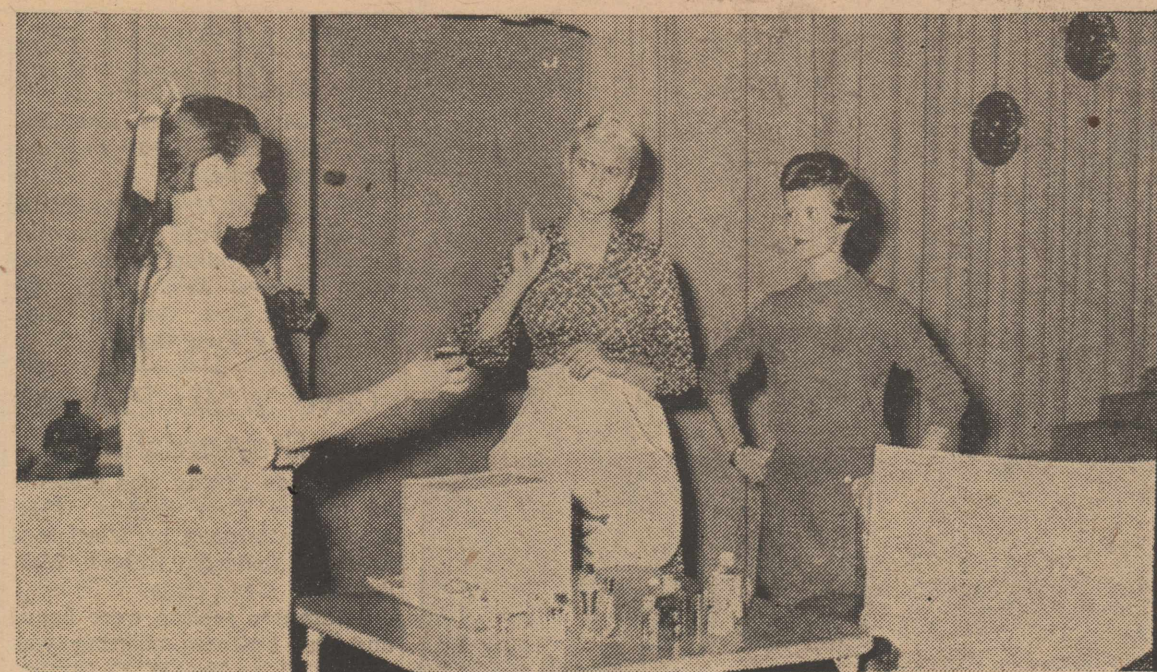
year curriculum. The courses he is taking this semester are trigonometry, algebra, English, principle of design, freehand drawing and physical education basketball.

The expertly-designed buildings at Tech will attest to the efficiency of the Tech architectural department. Tech is one of the few colleges in the Southwest which has buildings of just one design—a design that is derived from early Spanish Renaissance style and which blends very well with the expansiveness of west Texas.

Alexander lives off campus and is a member of the Tech Engineering Society. A Methodist, he belongs to the Valley View Methodist Church northeast of Olton.

then moved to Chattanooga, Okla., with his parents.

He lived in Chattanooga one year, completing the fourth grade there.

After the year in Oklahoma, the Alexanders then moved to the Shallowater where they were to spend the next seven years. Midway through Sherrill's junior year, the Alexanders moved to Olton.

The year after he moved to Olton, the popular boy was elected senior class favorite and senior class vice-president. Alexander ranked ninth in the 1957 graduating class at Olton High with an 89 plus average and was also candidate for basketball king.

He is possibly best known at Olton for his abilities on the basketball court. Coming to Olton midway through the 1955-56 basketball season, he was ineligible to compete on the Olton varsity basketball team until a year later.

Alexander was on the Student Council for one year and took part in the junior play. He was junior class most handsome man and tied for sophomore class favorite.

In Future Farmers of America at Shallowater High, he was vice-president his junior year and secretary his sophomore year of the local chapter of FFA.

While he was a freshman, Alexander competed on a poultry judging team that went to state. As a sophomore, he competed on the livestock judging team that qualified for state.

He was treasurer on the junior chapter conducting team.

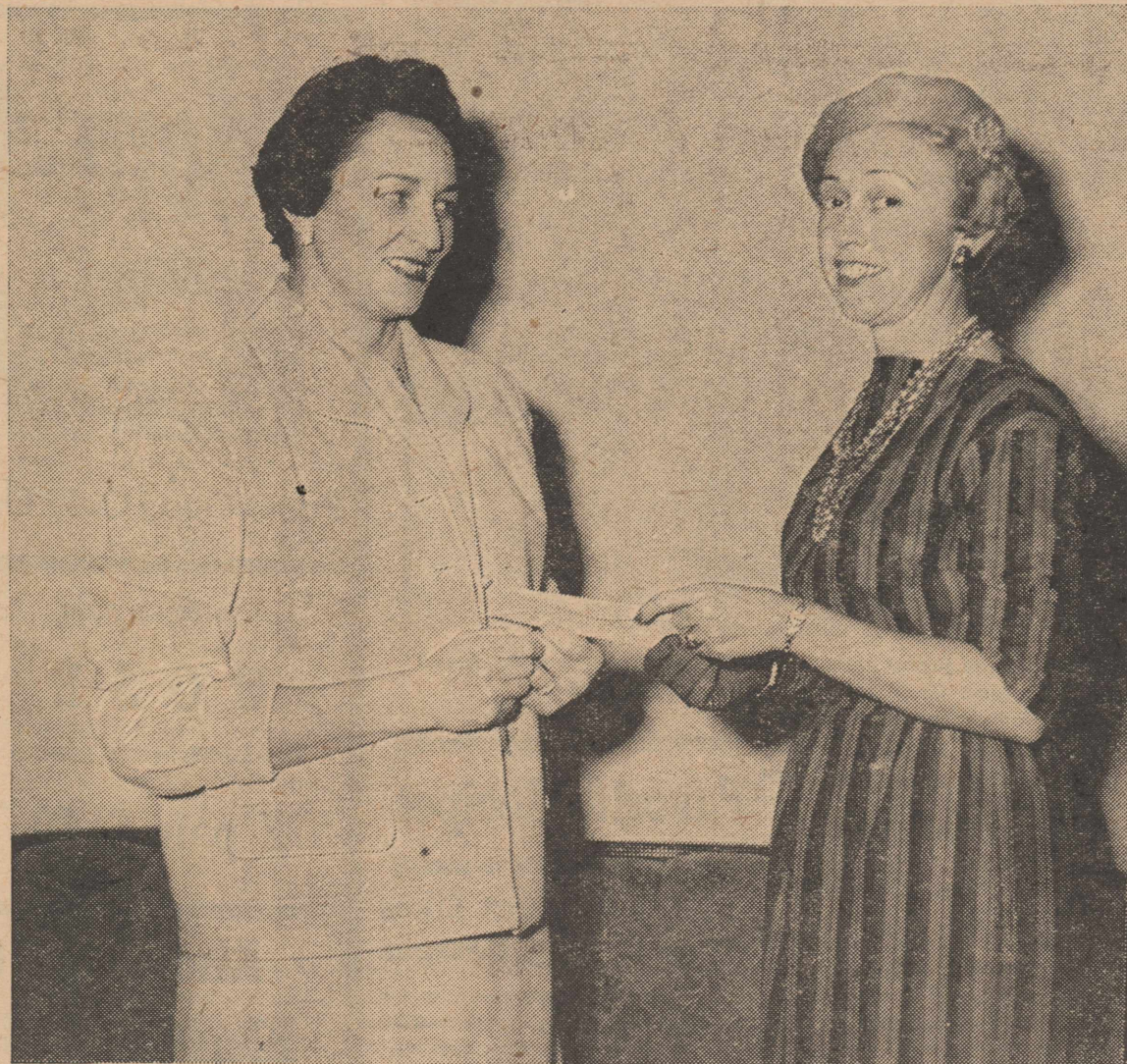

Early Mailing Assures Delivery Before Christmas Says Postmaster

Postmaster I. B. Holt said today, "Early mailing of all Christmas cards and gifts is the biggest factor in getting all of the mail delivered before Christmas." The postmaster urged special care in preparing gift packages for the mails. Make sure that all addresses are legible and complete.

Mrs. Ruth Hudgens: I'm so thankful for so many things I wouldn't know which one to put first. I guess the good health my family and I enjoy is the most important.

"If you have any articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the post office before attempting to mail them," the postmaster warns. The limits on size and weight of packages varies, depending on where you mail your package.

When wrapping gifts for mailing, it is always better to use corrugated cartons, especially where there are a number of various sized objects in the shipment. Use plenty of wadded tissue or newspaper for extra protection against shock, and securely wrap each package or carton in heavy paper, and then tie it with strong cord. Be sure to include an extra label with your return address and the recipients address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Another good idea is to place a piece of transparent cellophane tape over the address portion of the label on your package to prevent defacing in transit, and always make sure to include the recipient's full name, street address, city, zone and state.

"Remember these three rules," the postmaster said, "Wrap securely, address correctly, and mail early."

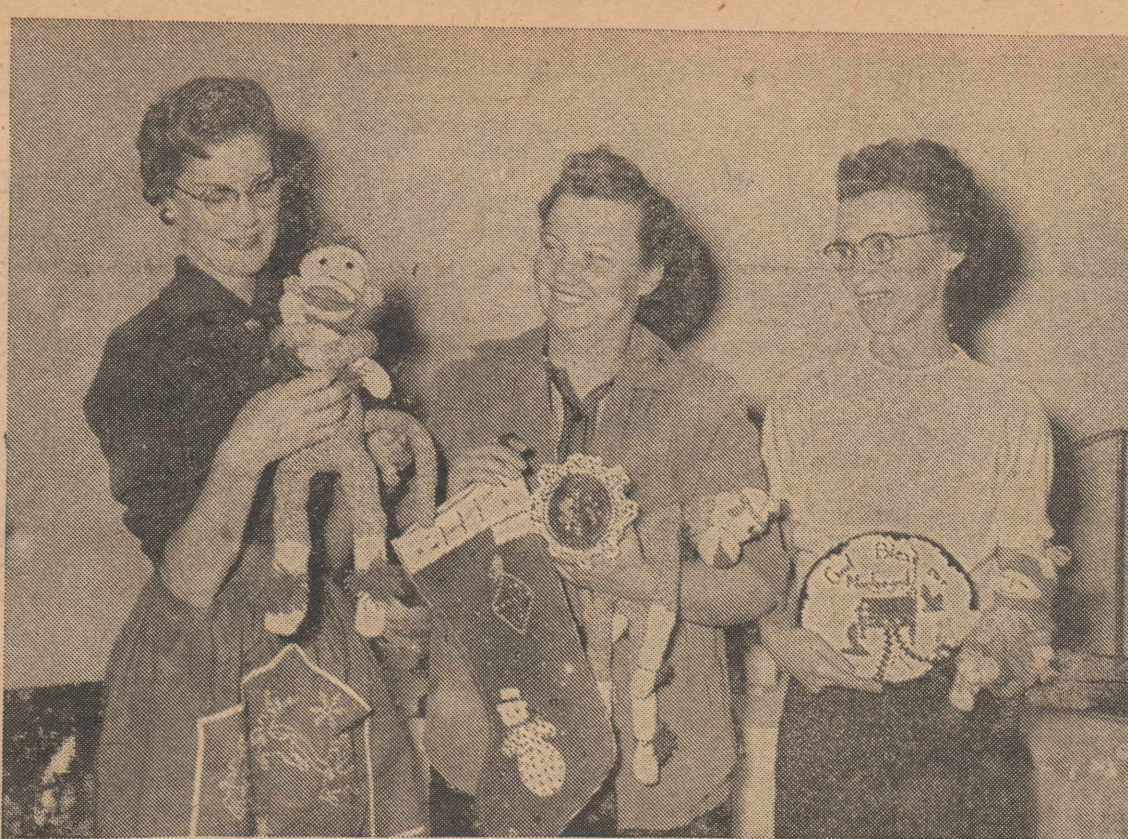
