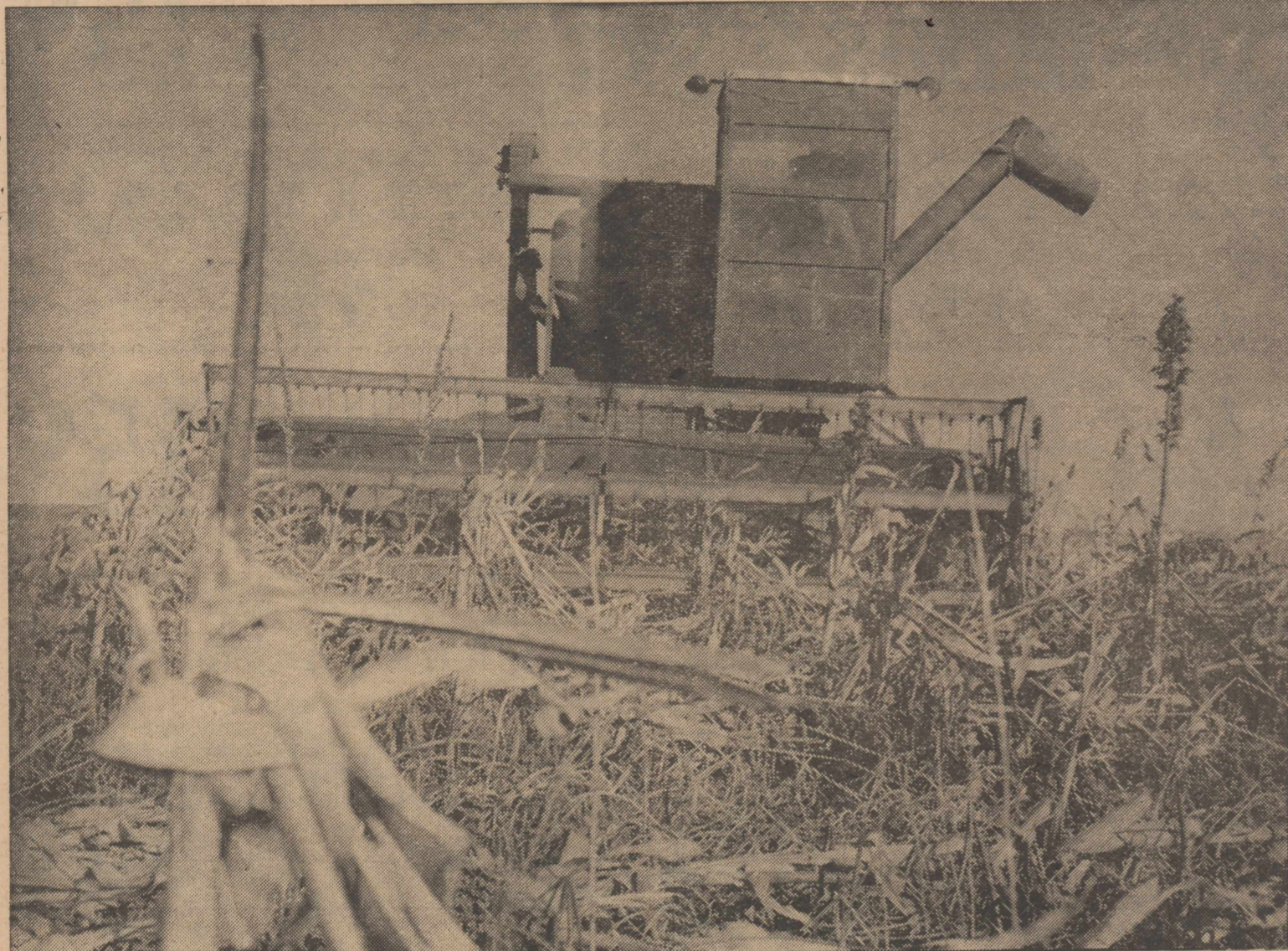

Cotton Harvest Rolls As Sun Shines Across Area

HIGH WINDS FLATTEN GRAIN SORGHUM REMAINING IN FIELD

Sunshine accelerated the cotton harvest here this week while the grain harvest neared completion.

At noon Thursday, some 12,160 bales had been weighed in at the six gin firms serving Olton and surrounding community. Gin men said machines are pulling most of the cotton.

Reports vary on the amount of damage done by the weather. County Agent Bill Kimbrough said the farmer has been hit smack in the pocketbook about 40 percent dollarwise.

One report here said machined cotton is bringing 23 to 26 cents.

In the meantime, estimates on the number of bales expected to be produced here has increased sharply since immediately following the freeze.

At that time, one estimate gauged Olton's crop at about 21,000 bales. One man close to the industry this week said he believes the community will produce more than 30,000.

Even this figure is a far cry from the bumper 1956 crop.

Machines are expected to pull most of the cotton now remaining in the fields. Latin-American laborers became discouraged and began mass exodus to the south several weeks ago.

Elevator men said the grain harvest has slowed to a trickle. One estimate placed the grain harvest at 95 percent complete.

Grain remaining in the field is being harvested with specially constructed combine reels. High wind last week flattened fields of grain sorghum, the stalks of which had been weakened by the weather.

COTTON VOTE IS TUESDAY

The cotton marketing quota referendum for "B" Community will be conducted at Olton City Hall Tuesday, December 10.

Earth Elevator is the polling place for the "A" Community. Notices are now being mailed to each farmer who has a cotton acreage allotment by the Lamb County ASC, informing him of the place where he may vote in the referendum.

"All persons," state ASC representatives, "who, as landlord, tenant, or sharecropper, engaged in the production of upland cotton in 1957, are eligible to vote in the upland referendum. If there is any question about eligibility, farmers are asked to check with their County ASC office."

The community referendum committees responsible for conducting the referendum throughout the county have been announced. All members are farmers eligible to vote. Many of the referendum committeemen are also elected community committeemen.

The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee urges that both husband and wife cast their votes.

Grid Menu For 1958 Announced

Olton's complete 1958 football schedule was announced this week by Coach Joe Turner.

The season opener will be September 5 with Petersburg. Coach Turner said Petersburg has a number of its starters back. This is that team's first clash with Olton.

Other scheduled non-conference tilts include Floydada there, Sept. 12; Littlefield here, Sept. 19; Hale Center here, Sept. 26; Hereford here, Oct. 3; and Dimmitt there, Oct. 10.

The conference schedule opens Oct. 17 at Muleshoe. Oct. 23 will find Olton at Morton and Oct. 30 Lockney will play here. Nov. 7 the Mustangs will wind up regular play against Abernathy here.

Community Christmas Program Will Feature Treats and Musical Floats

"Christmas At Olton" will be Monday afternoon, December 16, with an all-music parade beginning the activities at two o'clock.

V. L. "Smitty" Smith is parade marshal. The Christmas program is being sponsored by the Olton Ministerial Alliance, with Rev. Russell McAnally, chairman.

All churches, organizations, businesses and individuals are invited to enter floats in the parade. The committee requests, however, that regardless of the size and type of float, each one should have a singing group included.

"It may be a choir or a quartet," Rev. McAnally explains, "just so they're singing."

A reviewing stand on the east side of the hospital square will listen to one song by each music group, and community singing of all the voices will then be led by Duward Price. Plans also include for the groups to disperse among various shut-ins in town for serenading, following the festivities.

Groups desiring to enter floats are to contact Rev. McAnally, phone 4351, or Rev. Winfred Ritter, phone 2776.

Victory Dinner Set For Friday

A Victory Dinner is slated for Friday night at 8:00 p. m. when Olton Methodists will hear reports from solicitors of funds and pledges on their new building in progress.

This will mark the culmination of an intensive six-weeks campaign to raise funds for completion of the \$110,000 edifice. Truitt Sides is campaign chairman and about 45 solicitors have been at work securing funds and pledges.

Rev. Russell McAnally, pastor, stated Wednesday evening that cash contributions and pledges exceeded the \$80,000 mark, and added that he was extremely pleased with the results of the campaign so far.

Construction of the building is continuing steadily, with the frame completed on all parts except the sanctuary. Asbestos shingled roof is being worked on at present, and most of the sheetrock is up. Plumbing is completed on the entire plant; the heating system is installed and duct work almost finished in the educational unit.

Ask United Fund Donations Tues.; County Campaign Off To Fine Start

"Give only once, instead of four times."

This is the sales pitch some 50 or 60 Olton persons will be using next Tuesday, December 10, as they solicit cash and pledges for the United Fund campaign.

The United Fund provides a way for persons to make contributions to four organizations—Red Cross, Boy Scouts, Salvation Army and Girl Scouts—at one time for an entire year, rather than at separate campaigns for each organization.

It also provides a method for individuals to pay their contributions by installment, rather than a total cash donation.

Olton workers, led by J. W. Brown, chairman, will shoot for a \$4200 goal Tuesday. This is Olton's quota in the Lamb County goal of \$28,665. By Wednesday, after a number of other towns in the county had campaigned for two days, the drive had exceeded the 40 percent mark.

Workers are divided into three main groups, with sub-committeemen and solicitors working under eight captains. Basil Sherman is chairman of the businessmen's group, with team captains Howard Hall and Ralph Glover.

Heading the employees' group is Louie Mack Hardy, assisted by Gerald Bizzell and Jesse Parker. Captains in the rural area are Fred Hicks, Elmer Mc-

Gill and J. A. Carruth. A fourth is yet to be secured.

Campaign workers will be guests at a kick-off breakfast next Tuesday morning, after final plans are laid at a meeting tonight (Thursday).

Olton Woman's Father Dies

Funeral arrangements are pending in Chadbourne, NC for J. W. Johnson, father of Mrs. LeRoy Hackler of Olton, who died in a Chadbourne hospital Wednesday.

Mr. Johnson had been in ill health for some time. Mrs. Hackler only returned from his bedside the first part of the week. He was 68 years old and a retired lumberman. He visited in Olton on numerous occasions, the last being the summer of 1955.

J. W. Johnson was born Aug. 8, 1889 in Horry County, SC. He had lived in Chadbourne about two years.

Survivors include Mrs. Hackler; a son, C. C. of Columbia, SC; three brothers; four sisters; and one grandchild, Jamie Hackler.

A JUVENILE OFFICER?

Lamb County seems bent on hiring a county juvenile officer. On the surface this sounds like a good and laudable undertaking.

If Lamb County hires a juvenile officer who has been adequately trained to do the job, then the project has our complete sanction.

We have seen Hutchinson, Potter and a number of other counties finally arrive at the conclusion that a man with a fine record as a policeman did not necessarily make a fine juvenile officer.

In many instances the outcome is just the opposite. A man well versed in dealing with adult law breakers may know little or nothing about dealing with juveniles.

We understand that Judge Pat Boone will report to commissioners court on his investigation into the possibility of hiring a juvenile officer. We sincerely hope that Judge Boone has talked to such able men as Amarillo's Judge Jerry Kolander on the subject.

We hope that Judge Boone will advise the commissioners court to seek a man with the educational background and experience to handle the job.

Likewise, we fervently hope that the commissioners will not install in this office some man—however brilliant his past record—who has retired from the strenuous task of pursuing adult evil doers and is looking for a softer touch.

We need a young man. We need an experienced man. We need a man trained in the field.

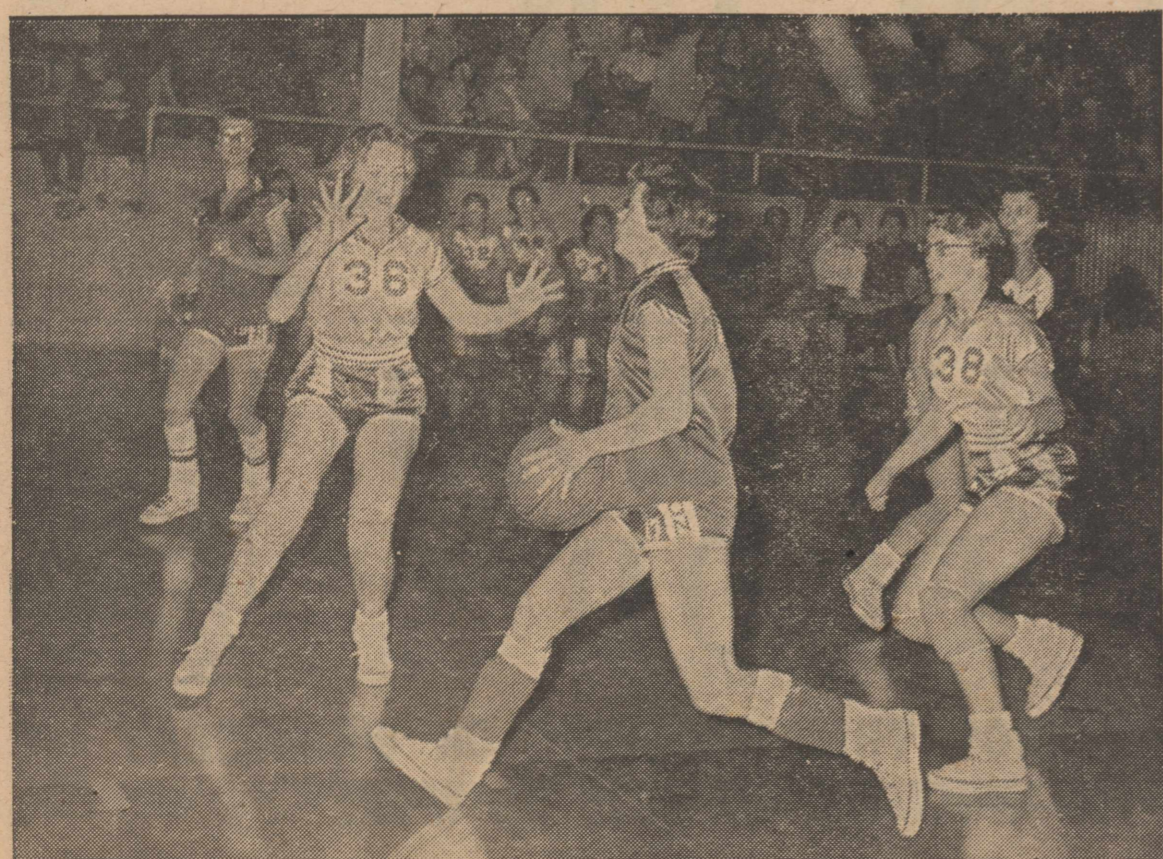

Favorite Recipes

Mrs. Freddie Burgess recommends a doughnut recipe "good to keep around for coffee." She says this is her very favorite recipe and she has used it two years.

It was a favorite of her aunt's, Mrs. Floy Sluder for years. Mrs. Burgess adds that the doughnuts keep well in a deep fry pan covered with foil.

1 qt. lukewarm water
2 c shortening
2 c sugar
3 cakes yeast
2 eggs
Flavoring
Flour, approx. 16 cups
Mix well and place in refrigerator, covered, to cool. Cut into doughnuts (thickness desired—probably about 1/2-inch). Let rise for about an hour. Fry in deep fat, hot enough that when a center is dropped in it pops up and floats, then drain. While still hot, roll in 1 box powdered sugar, 1/2 c warm milk or water, 1 t. vanilla. Drain and serve. Makes about 100 doughnuts.

Margie Slatten submitted this. It's a very good dressing for salads or lettuce. (She uses this in the school lunchroom, where she is supervisor.)

POPPY SEED DRESSING
3/4-cup sugar
2 teaspoons dry mustard
2 teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons onion juice (or onion powder—1 teaspoon.)
2/3 cup vinegar
2 cups oil (Wesson)
3 tablespoons poppy seed (optional)
Mix sugar, mustard, salt, onion and vinegar. Blend well. Add oil gradually, beating constantly with mixer. Add poppy seed last. Shake well before using.

One of the favorites of Olton schoolsters is this cinnamon roll recipe of Mrs. Ray Slatten's, lunchroom supervisor. (Ed. Note: If you can't cut it down to one-ten measurements, you're a better mathematician than this writer. This recipe makes 900 five-inch rolls.)

10 lbs. butter
10 lbs. brown sugar
6 cups cinnamon
1 1/2 qts. mincemeat or apple butter
1 cup vanilla
15 lbs. white sugar
60 lbs. roll dough

Cream first five ingredients until smooth. Add white sugar and mix well. Roll large rectangle of dough 1/4-inch thick and spread generously with butter and cinnamon mixture. Make into roll and slice 1 inch thick. Place on baking sheet an inch apart and bake in 400 degree oven for 20 minutes. Serve warm.

Margie Slatten also chalks this cornbread dressing recipe as a "specialty."

12 gallons meat broth
40 lbs. cornbread
40 lbs. bread (loaf or heels)
10 dozen eggs
1 cup baking powder
2 1/2 cups poultry seasoning
1/2-cup black pepper
12 large cans milk
1 1/2 gallon chopped celery
1 1/2 gallon chopped onion
6 lbs melted butter

Mix dry ingredients and cubed bread. Add hot broth, milk, eggs, butter, celery and onion, which have been cooked together until tender. This mixture should be very moist. Bake at 350 degrees for about 40 minutes.

P.S. This recipe will make 18 (12" x 18") steam table pans of dressing, or enough to serve 900 persons. Do not try to make this all at one mixing as it will make a No. 3 tub full!

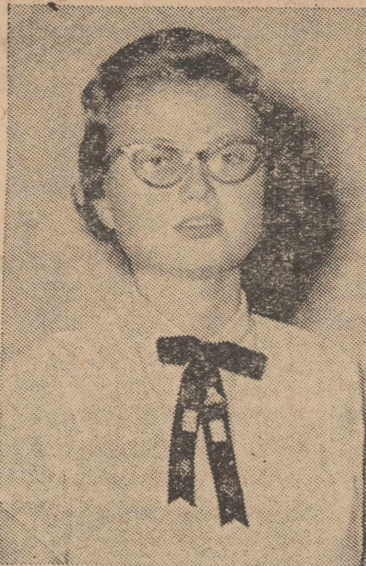

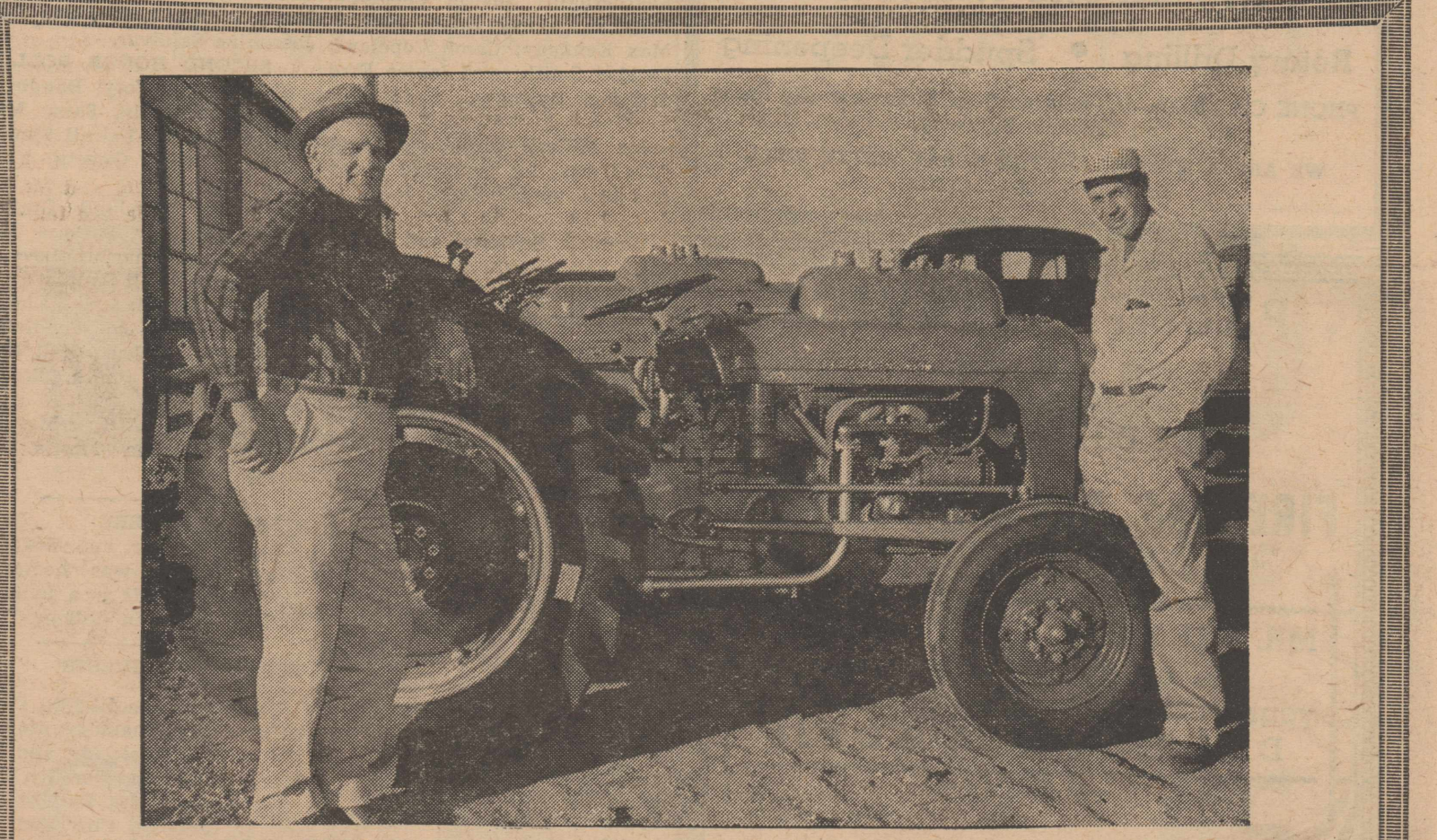

 20 candied cherries, cut fine.
 Mix well. Mold in loaf pan lined with foil. Let set in refrigerator several days before serving. This is better if kept several weeks. It improves with aging and is nice to serve during the Christmas holidays with coffee.

JAM CAKE

- 1 c butter
- 2 c sugar
- 1 c jam, any kind of jelly
- 6 eggs
- 1 c buttermilk
- 3 c flour
- 1 c pecans
- 1 t soda
- 1 t nutmeg, cinnamon, allspice and cloves.

Cream butter, sugar, jam and eggs. Then add milk, flour, then spices and nuts. Bake in layers (or this is a good cake to be baked in loaf pan if you don't frost it.)

Filling

- 2 c sugar
 - 1 c milk
- Let milk come to a boil, then add ½-c browned sugar. (To brown sugar, stir constantly in skillet until brown.) Cook until creamy. This cake won't be light. It resembles a fruit cake.

Holt Issues Christmas Mail Instructions

The local post office hopes to keep its good record on handling Christmas mails by getting everything processed and delivered well before Christmas Eve, Postmaster I. B. Holt said this week.

He added that how well the mail moves will depend a great deal on the cooperation local people give in getting their packages and Christmas cards mailed during the next ten days. "It's important in the small town as well as in the city to

mail early during the Christmas season," the postmaster said. "Most people appreciate the early arrival of a gift or card, and where there is a heavy concentration of mail, early mailing could mean the difference in on-time and late delivery."

"And be sure to use the correct address," Mr. Holt added. "Wrap and address packages carefully. Take a little extra time and place the address inside the package just in case it should come unwrapped."

The address on all mail destined for the larger cities should include zone numbers to insure faster delivery.

The postmaster also advocated the use of first class postage on Christmas cards. First class postage—a three-cent stamp—allows

a written message to be included inside. There are other advantages, too. The post office considers first class mail as preferential mail which is entitled to the fastest handling. Also, a Christmas card with first class postage may be forwarded or returned to the sender.

"Incidentally," the postmaster concluded, "it is socially correct to place your return address on the envelope bearing a Christmas card."

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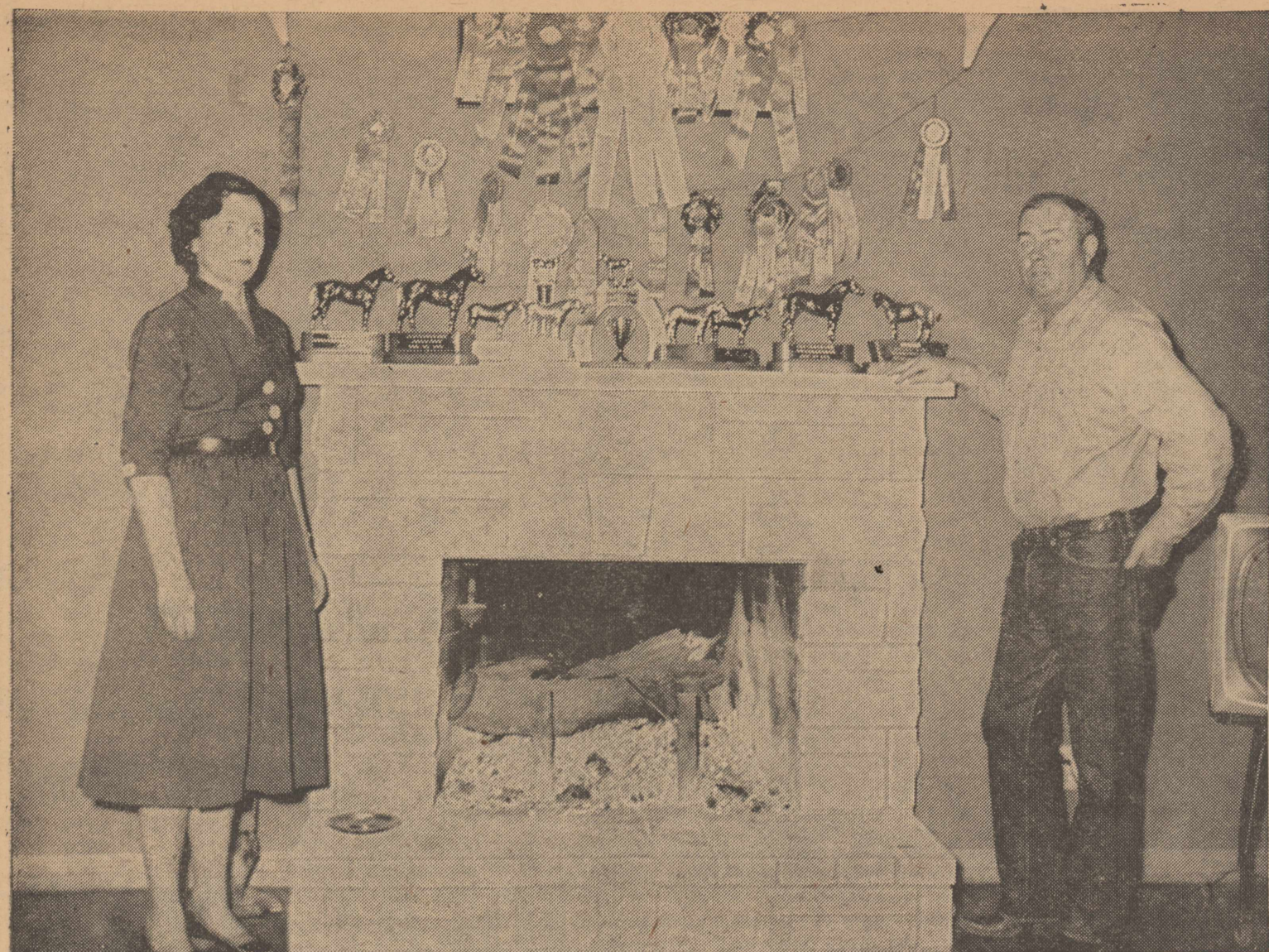

At almost the same time, J. Frank, a Texas University senior, was distinguishing himself in the Southwest Conference track meet at Austin as the only man on the Texas team to win two first place honors. He came in first in the 100-yard dash and the 220.

Pandarita Hill this year won first place and was named grand champion in quarterhorse shows in Paducah, Canadian and Fort Sumner, NM; she won blue ribbon and reserve champion honors in shows in Amarillo, Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Clovis, Hereford, Levelland and Poraulita, NM.

When asked if he'd take \$30,000 for her, Curly replied, tongue in cheek, that he wasn't interested in selling the mare. He explains that if he did sell her, he'd just have to compete against her with other horses, and that would be illogical.

Other top honors this year have come to the Daughertys' two-year-old mare Panzarita Hill, No. P-51,639 in the AQA, who was shown six times and won six times. She was named reserve champion and first-place winner in a show at Tucumcari, and placed first in shows at Canadian, Fort Sumner, NM, Santa Fe, NM, Clovis, NM, and Post.

Both mares were sired by Showdown, a stallion given to J. Frank and Bob Norfleet by the King Ranch, with No. P-33,178. They also have foundation in a mare raised by the Norfleets, Panzarita 747, who was never out-run on a race track.

Curly asserts that the Norfleets are responsible for the outstanding quarterhorses of the entire western country, and are the oldest quarterhorse breeders in the west. He has obtained many of his horses through them.

The mother of Pandarita Hill, Mayflower Daugherty, leads the

nation this year as the producer dame, having won about 20 first places in this class. These honors are judged on the merits of colts produced by the mare. Showdown Joe is her companion colt, and her registration number is P-24,811.

Furthermore, the mother of Mayflower Daugherty, now about 15 years old, won about 16 grand champion trophies at the height of her showing. She is Panzarita Daugherty, No. 2121 in the AQA.

In 1948, Curly received two blue ribbons, the grand champion award, and a saddle for the showing of Patsy Daugherty, P-963, who is a sister to the fabulous Panzarita 747.

Traveling to and from shows and preparation for them occupies a great deal of time for both Curly and his wife who farm and ranch here. They have shown in the American Quarterhorse Association every year since its origin in 1940, and have chalked up about 50 grand champions to their credit, with wins every year.

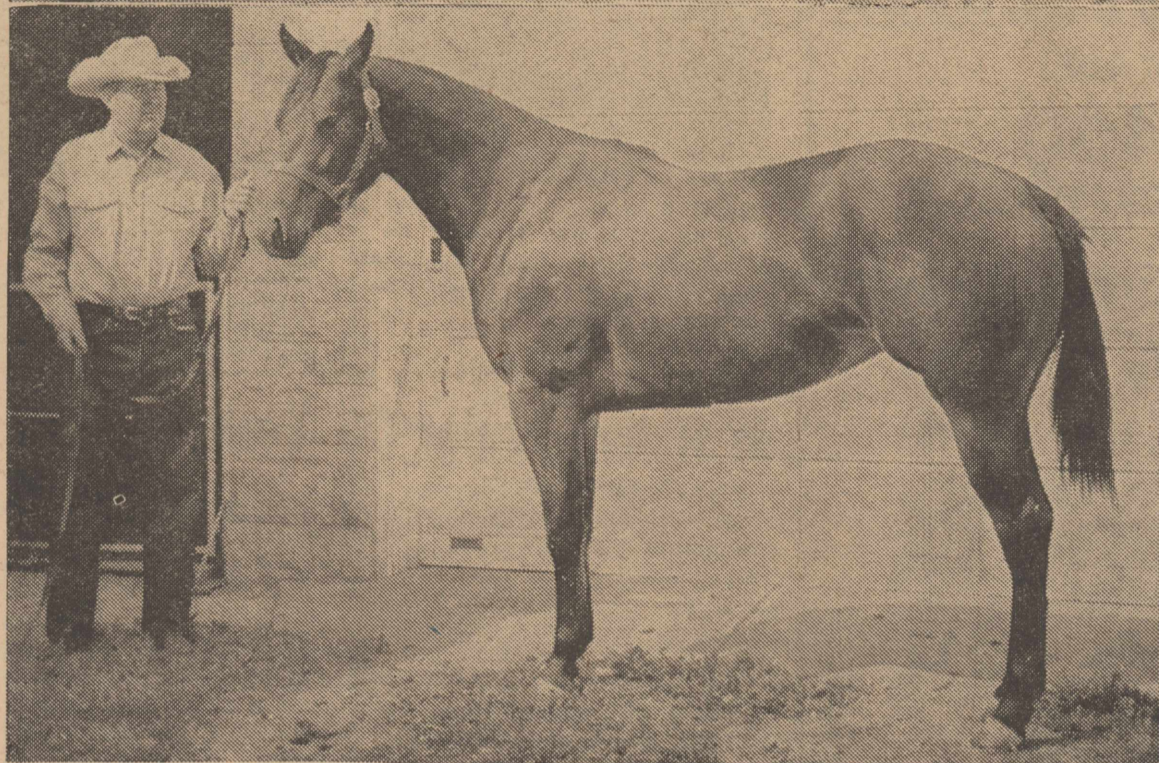
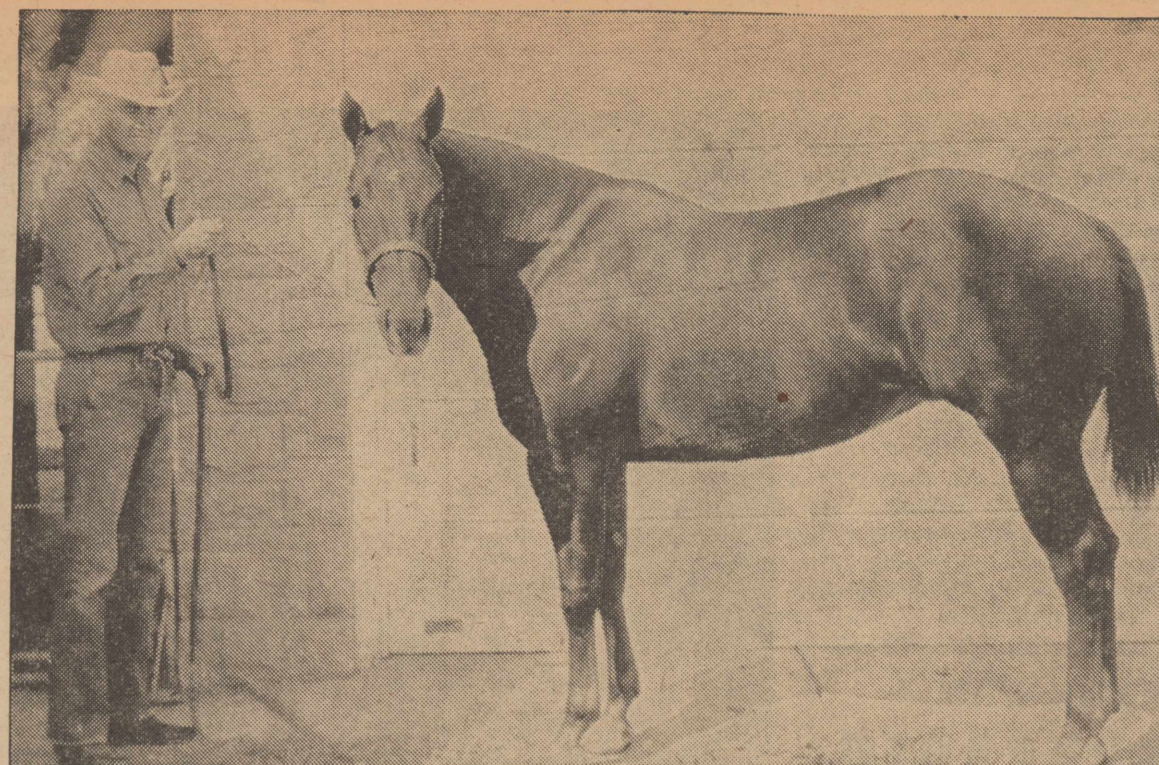
Most of the Daugherty animals have permanent registration numbers, which means the horse does not even have to show before it is registered. Its breeding has been proved good enough.

The Daugherty family has produced top animals for many years on the home place south and west of Olton. They spear headed the "Olton Stampede" for a number of years here, with both racing and roping.

"We'd race our horses," Curly recalls, "and then do roping with the same ones. Many of the highest honors went to Norfleet horses, too."

Coincidentally, Walter Schreier, who now occupies a brick home in Hillcrest Addition, was a top rider in the Olton roundups on the very same site in the 1920s.

Curly is assisted with the care and preparation of the quarterhorses by his son, J. Frank, who just finished school at the University of Texas. The eyes of the athletic world were on J. Frank when, as an OHS senior, he ran the 220 faster than any American high school boy had ever



done, to set a record of 20.5 seconds, two-tenths faster than Jesse Owens had run 20 years before.

Then when a junior at the University, J. Frank raced ahead of Dell Shofner by a yard to break the world's relay team record at a meet in Kansas.

Finally, Curly entered the stocker-feeder show at Clovis this year for the first time, and his pen of 20 Herefords won "Grand Champion Steer Yearlings" honors over about 3,000 other head.

The Daugherty cattle still bear the 7-D brand his dad originated,
