Swimming Pool By May 1 Is Olton Rec. Center's Goal

200 TOTAL MEMBERSHIP WILL ASSURE POOL SAY OFFICIALS

Swimming pool by May 1.

That was the goal for Olton Municipal Recreation Center as an intensified membership campaign was kicked off this week.

"We need 200 members by January 1," declared Elmer Moore, who heads the membership drive. "We are working toward a swimming pool and we believe that that number will assure a pool by May 1."

Mr. Moore said some have indicated interest only in a swimming pool. He said that for those an arrangement has been worked out whereby persons buying a membership solely because of

The Center already has spent \$23,750 on improvements at the site south of Olton.

Much of this expenditure overlaps with needs for future development of the site. For instance, a great deal of the cash outlay was for a water system which was necessary for operation of a swimming pool.

The Center already has a fine well and water system capable of supplying the future water needs of the Center.

An elaborate sprinkler system criss-crosses the site, making possible the beautification of the entire 90-acre tract upon which the Center is located.

Already 184 trees have been planted and Olton Municipal Recreation Center promises to be one of the most beautiful spots on the High Plains within the next few years.

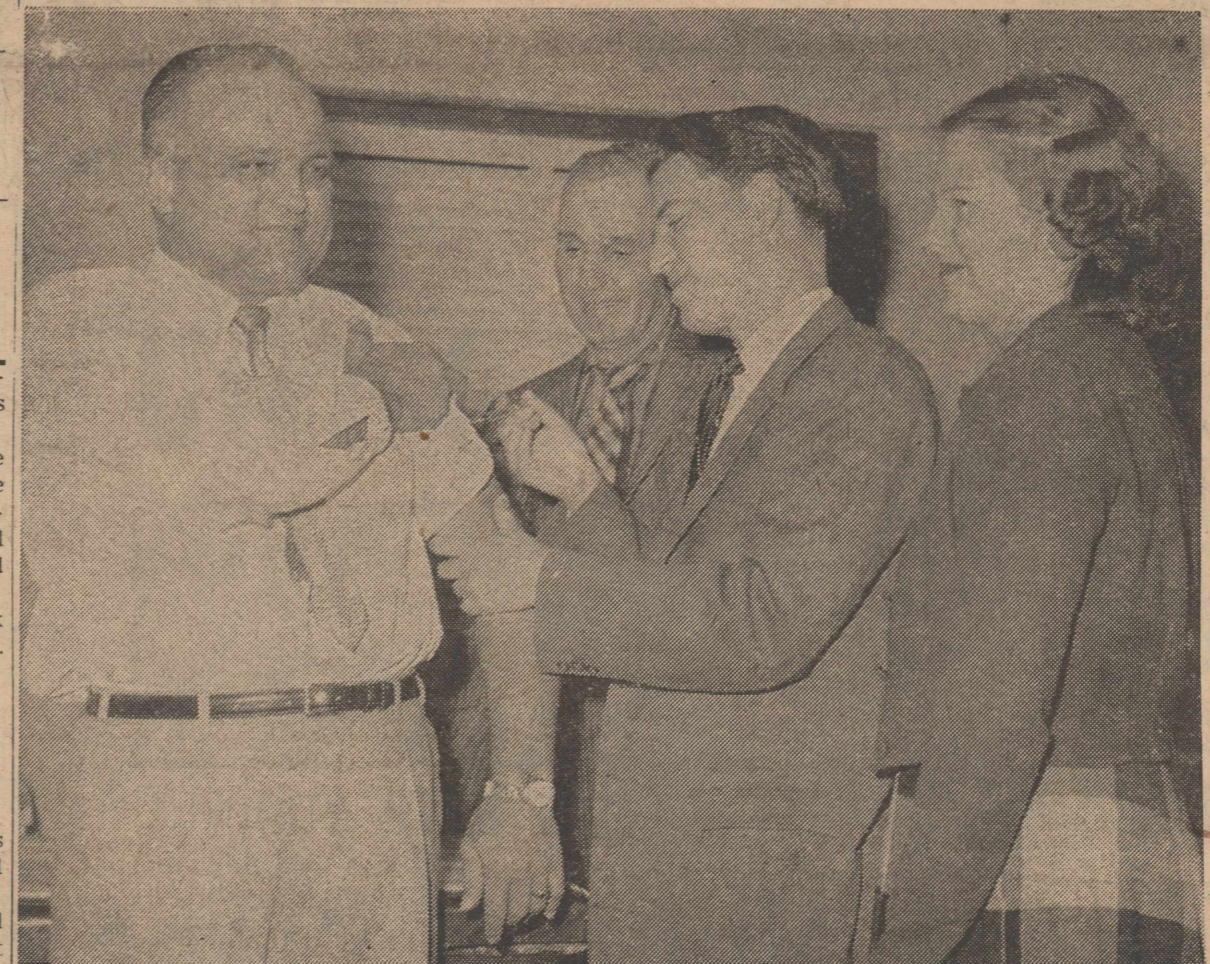

Thugs Take \$30 In Two Grocery Entries At Springlake Sunday

Yeggs made off with \$60 in cash and a cash register in two grocery store burglaries early Sunday morning at Springlake. Entered were the Chitwood Grocery and the Skinner Grocery.

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith, one of the investigating officers, said the cash register still had not been found Wednesday. However, a suspect was being held in county jail at Littlefield and was being questioned in connection with the two break-ins.

Deputy Smith said the burglaries must have been well-cased.

The Chitwood grocery was entered through the front door. A pane had been smashed near the latch. Officers theorize that the crook broke the glass and then reached through the hole to flip the latch and gain entry.

Both the cash register and about \$30 were missing from that firm.

About \$30 was taken from the cash register at the Skinner Grocery. A small hole was broken in a high window on the east side of the building.

The crook again, apparently reached through the small hole and opened the window, gaining entry.

City Hall To Have Holiday

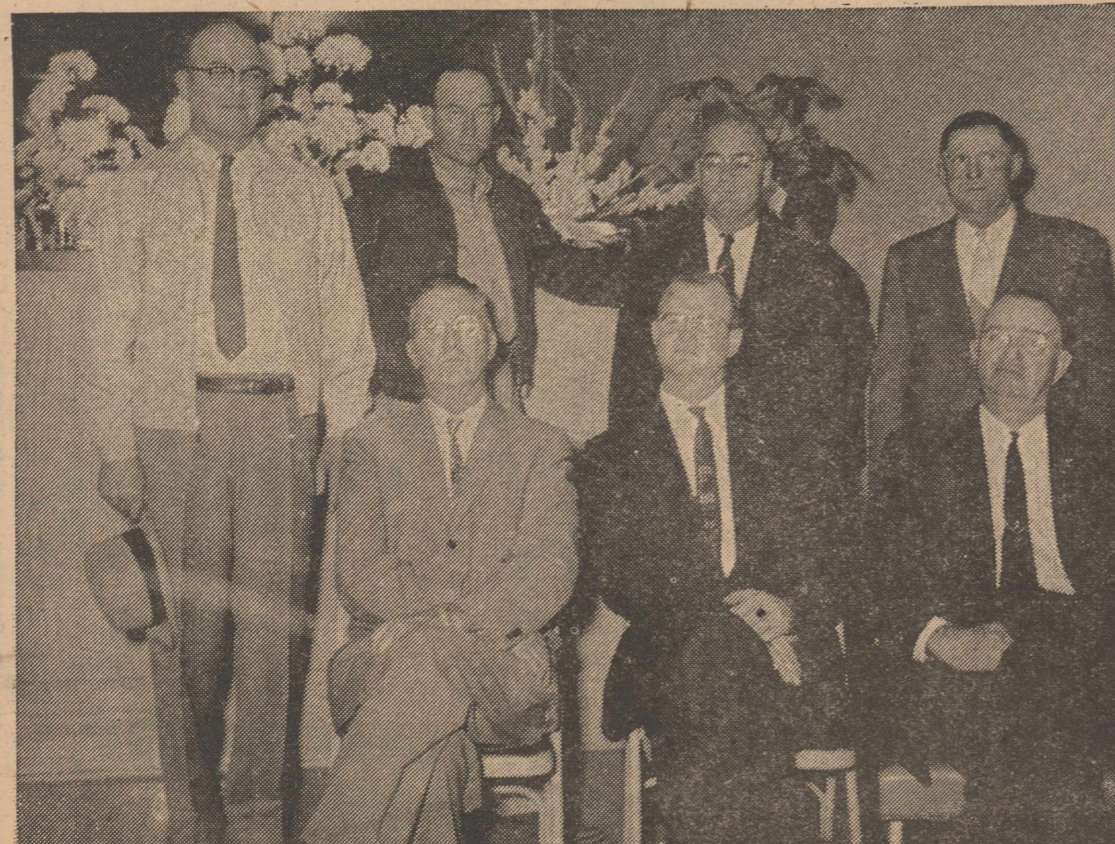
Mayor D. Y. Ray announces that December 24, 25 and 26 will be holidays for city employees.

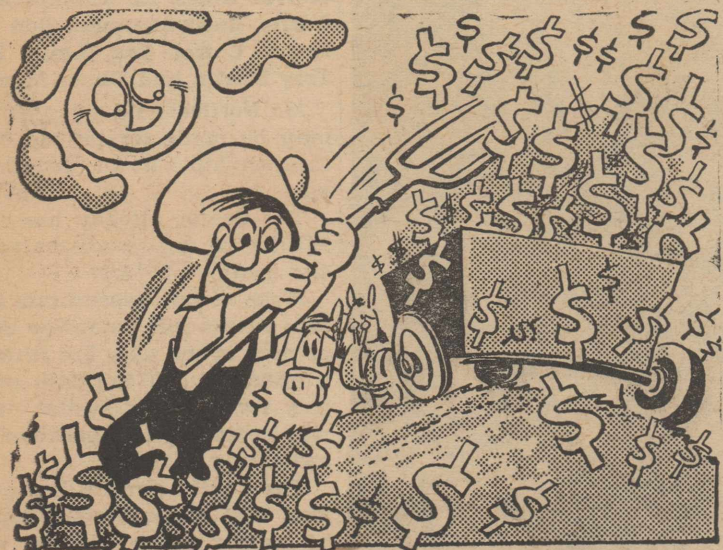

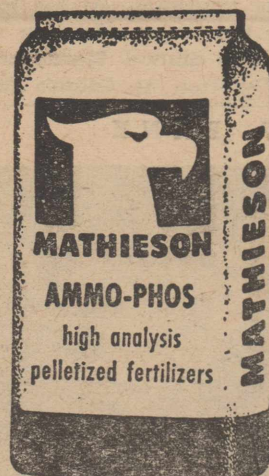

The children in the house found the little kitten snuggled down in a pretty box under the tree and decided Santa had brought the nicest gift of all—a Christmas kitten.

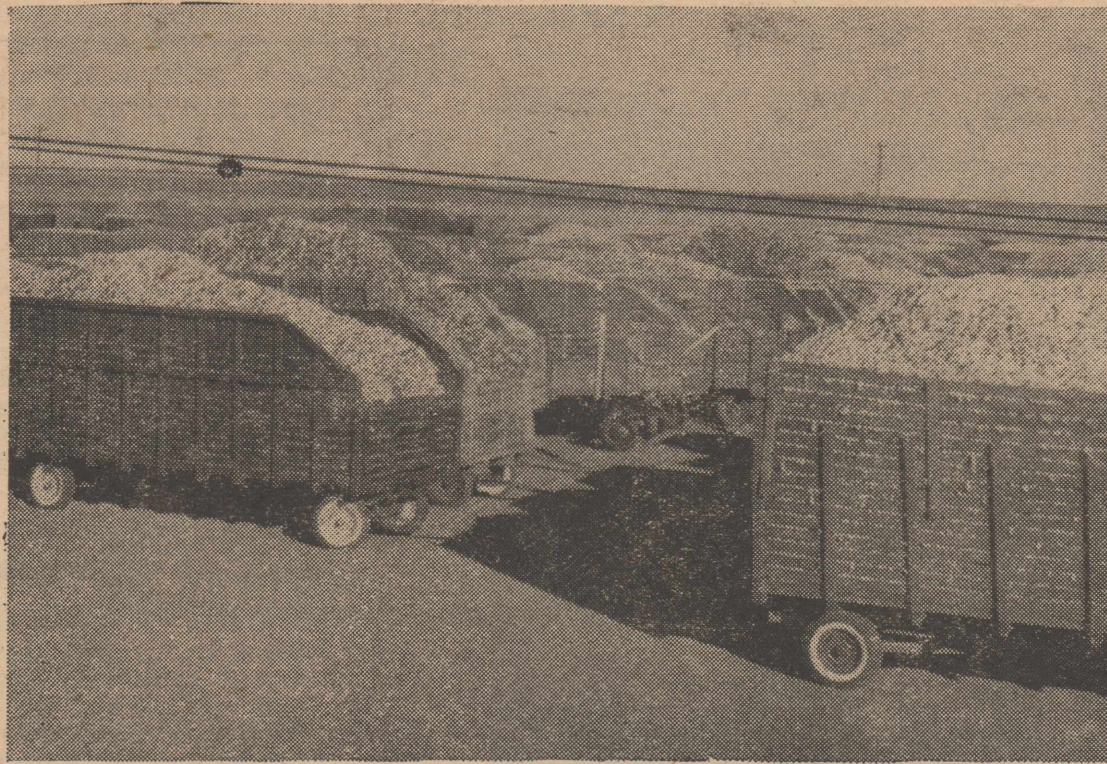
Twenty-one Children by Virginia H. Ormsby, published by J. B. Lippincott Co., \$2.25.

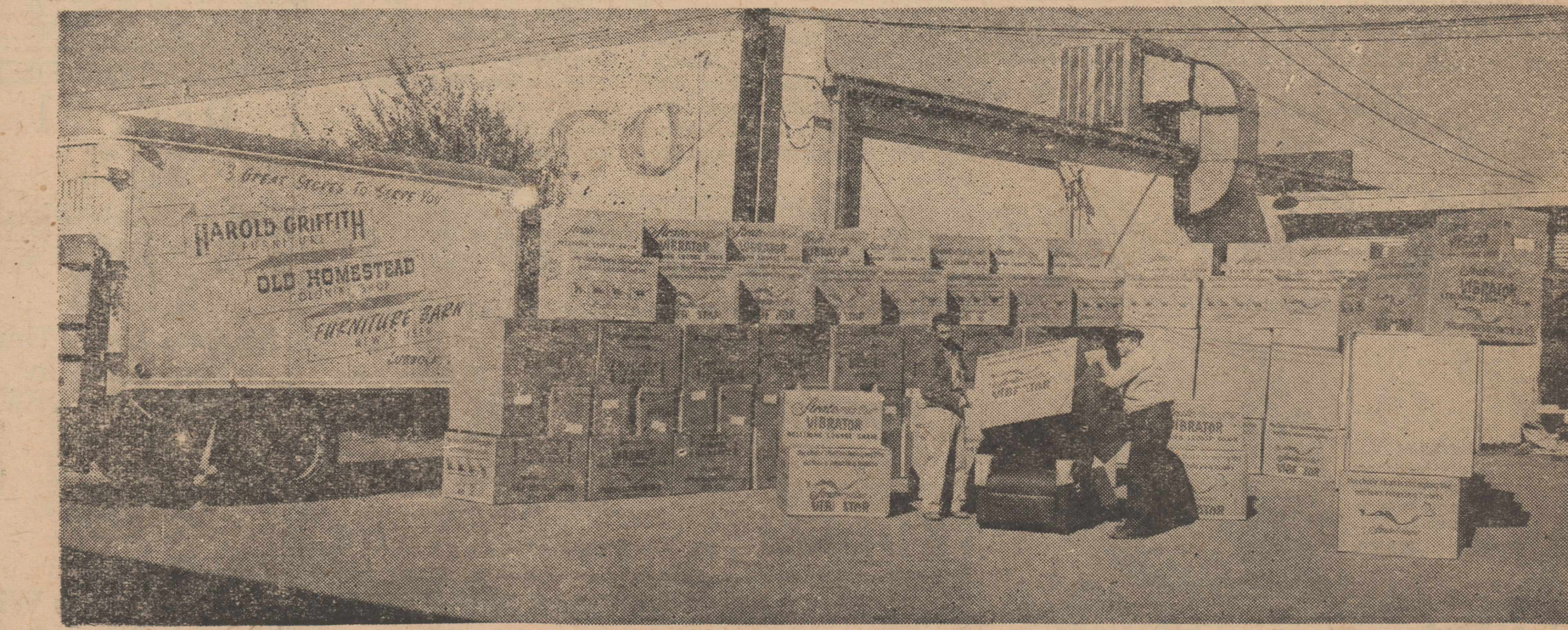

Death Takes Father Of Olton Woman

Funeral services for Hubert Ziegler, Plainview real estate man and father of Mrs. Joe Hy-singer of Olton, were conducted Saturday afternoon in the First Methodist Church of Plainview.

Dr. J. H. Crawford, pastor, officiated, assisted by Rev. Harlan Harris, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Plainview. Music was furnished by the music director of the Methodist Church.

Mr. Ziegler, 72, died at 9:15 p. m. Thursday in the Plainview Hospital & Clinic. He had been ill for several months and had been hospitalized for about two weeks.

Knights Templar conducted ceremonies both at the church and in Plainview Memorial Park Cemetery, where interment was made.

Mr. Ziegler was born May 1, 1885, at Denton, and moved to Plainview from Clarendon in 1931. He farmed south of Halfway a few years before moving to Plainview. He was a member of all the Plainview Masonic bodies.

He served as illustrious master of the council, most excellent high priest of the chapter and was recently appointed district deputy grand master of the council of Plainview district. His membership was at Khiva Temple in Amarillo. He was also a member of the First Methodist Church of Plainview.

Survivors are his wife; three daughters, Mrs. S. W. Murchiski of Venezuela, SA, Mrs. Dell Sanders of Plainview, and Mrs. Hy-singer; one son, John R. Zeigler of Tulsa; two brothers; one sister; and ten grandchildren.
