Tornadoes Compared To Air Raids As Twister Fear Grips Olton Area

Frightened babies . . . dragged uncomprehending from warm beds into drenching rain . . . anxious mothers scanning the flashing sky . . .

Banshee wail of sirens . . . traffic moving through the torrent at speeds not quite safe enough. Safety? Where? How long?

Olton had a taste of war Wednesday night. The sleep-walking dread that filled the town as tornadoes danced in the sky could be compared only to the nightmare of an air raid.

Just like in real war, Olton had its men who risked life and limb—members of the police department and the volunteer fire department—to protect their town.

The police went on the alert about 10:30 Wednesday night. It was about midnight that authorities became alarmed.

Mayor D. Y. Ray, Deputy V. L. Smith, and Police Chief Vernie Head led in the meantime joined Officer E. E. Burrow at City Hall.

As the boiling, black clouds approached, the officers raced through the town with sirens on to alert the people.

Lights flicked on across Olton. Most everyone who does not have a cellar knows of one to use in an emergency.

Families of Louie Mack Hardy, Lester Thompson and Troy Martin shared the Clarence Mason cellar with the Masons and Mr. and Mrs. C. B. Hines.

Seventeen people and Elvis—the Thompsons' Rock and Roll kitten—huddled in the Mason cellar while the storm threatened.

Authorities said two funnels were sighted Wednesday night. One was seen southeast of town and the other was in the air almost over the town.

Wary Olton residents returned home only after the moon and stars began to shine. Radio

brought the news of the Silverton disaster.

Olton doctors rushed to Silverton to help, Ray Thornton also took the Olton hospital ambulance.

Fire Chief Tom Smith said police and firemen go on the alert when storm clouds are in the area. When a bad cloud approaches the police car goes through town as on Wednesday night with sirens sounding.

As a funnel cloud moves in, the alarm at the fire station is sounded. "It's time to get in the cellar then," Chief Smith declared.

Appreciation of the gallant work of the fire department and police force was aptly expressed by Mrs. James Martin.

"I hope the fire boys and officers know how much I appreciate the warning," she declared. "I depend on it."

Citizen's Committee To Study Varied Needs of Olton Schools

A citizen's committee appointed by the Board of Trustees of the Olton Independent School District met Tuesday night at the high school to lay plans in making surveys and studies of the present and future needs of the school community.

Welcomed by G. T. Sides, school trustee, the group heard Suppt. Carl Macon outline the purpose of the citizen's committee. He stated that "It is the belief of the board that the schools are for the children, and that a cooperative and democratic effort of all the people is necessary if the needs of the child is realized."

Mrs. H. B. Carson was elected general chairman of the committee and Mrs. R. V. Allcorn, secretary. The 25 men and women appointed to the committee

auditorium to elect permanent officers and a board of directors. The Board will consist of the four officers, four others elected by the Center, and one selected by the city council of Olton.

All who are interested in membership in the Center are urged to attend the Monday night meeting. Those who have already joined will be contacted by mail, telephone or in person.

Swimming Pool Drive
Ninety memberships at \$200 apiece furnished the necessary financing for the golf course, well, and underground tile, cost of which had been set at approximately \$18,000. The next 11 memberships already procured are earmarked for a swimming pool, the second facility planned for the Center. Work on the golf course will get underway in the immediate future.

To build both the golf course and the swimming pool, 175 memberships will be required. With only 74 memberships lacking to meet this goal, many are optimistic that the two facilities can be a reality this year. Estimated cost of the swim-

ming pool, including a filtering plant and heating system, is \$17,000, making the total cost for the golf course and the pool approximately \$35,000.

Land Surveyed
The 90-acre tract donated by the A. D. Meltons for the Center has been surveyed by Jeff Williams of Plainview and the deed is being drawn up. The land will be deeded to the City of Olton. There has been enough wire and posts donated to fence the 90 acres.

Preparations are being made to have a scale drawing made of the Center in its entirety, consisting of the golf course, swimming pool, club house, diamonds, courts and picnic areas.

Installment Plan
A pay-out or installment plan has been set up for prospective members of the Center. Payments may be made on the \$200 membership at the Olton State Bank by contacting Owen Norfleet, temporary treasurer, who has the system set up for the convenience of those desiring to take advantage of this plan.

Must Be Member
A membership in the Center is required before an individual or his family members can use the facilities of the Center. When the Center is opened for use, annual dues of \$60 will go into effect. No one can participate on dues alone.

Lamb Co. ASC Manager Announces Wheat Quota Vote Set For June 20th

As announced by Lamar D. Aten, Jr., manager of Lamb County ASC office, Littlefield, Thursday, June 20, has been set as the date for a referendum to determine producer approval or disapproval of wheat quotas.

The ASC manager also stated that the minimum national average support for 1958 crop wheat in the 36-state commercial area has been set at \$1.78 per bushel, if quotas are approved; this price reflects 75 percent of estimated transitional parity; and that for price-support computations, the wheat supply is estimated at 141.8 percent of the normal supply and indicates a support level at the minimum of the variable range or 75 percent of parity.

At least two-thirds of the producers voting in the referendum on June 20 must approve quotas for the 1958 crop before they can be put in effect said Mr. Aten. For the benefit of the wheat growers in Lamb County the ASC manager gives the following information:

"Growers who will have more than 15 acres of wheat for harvest as grain in 1958 come under

the regulation of quotas and will be eligible to vote in the referendum.

"Marketing quotas have been approved by farmers for the last four wheat crops. In last year's referendum on quotas for the 1957 wheat crop, 87.4 percent of the farmers voting favored quotas. In the previous vote on 1956 quotas the vote was 77.5 percent favorable.

"The law provides for a variable national average wheat price support level on the basis of the estimated supply of wheat available for the marketing year. The variable range is 75 to 90 percent of parity. The wheat supply for the 1958-59 marketing year is now estimated at 141.18 percent of the normal supply for the 1958-59 marketing year. If the net supply is more than 90 percent of the normal supply a support level of 75 percent of parity is indicated. This gives the minimum national average support of \$1.78 per bushel.

"This minimum average support will not be reduced but may be increased if a combination of the actual wheat parity price as

of July 1, 1958, and the wheat supply relationships as of that same date indicate a higher support price.



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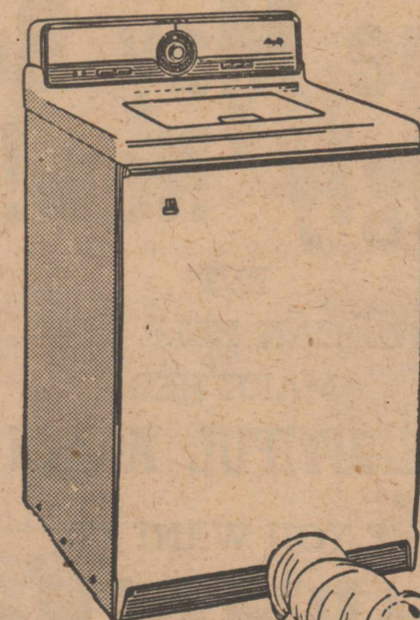

Cub Scout Leaders Hold Meeting

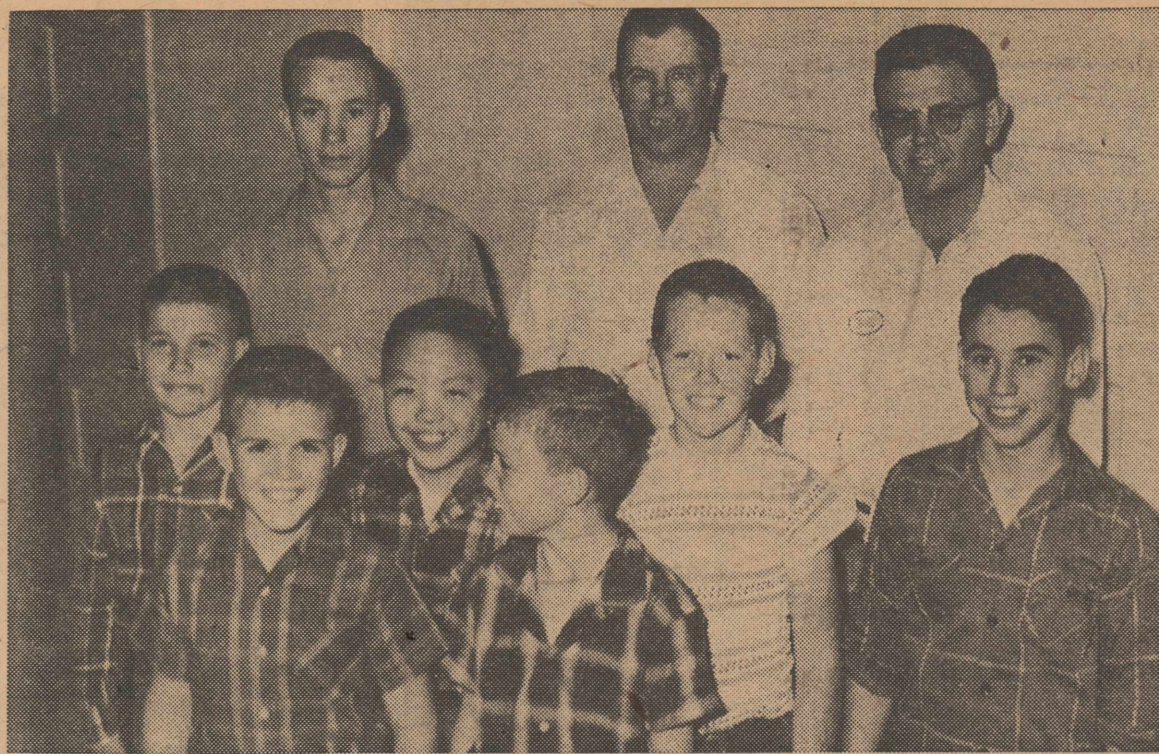

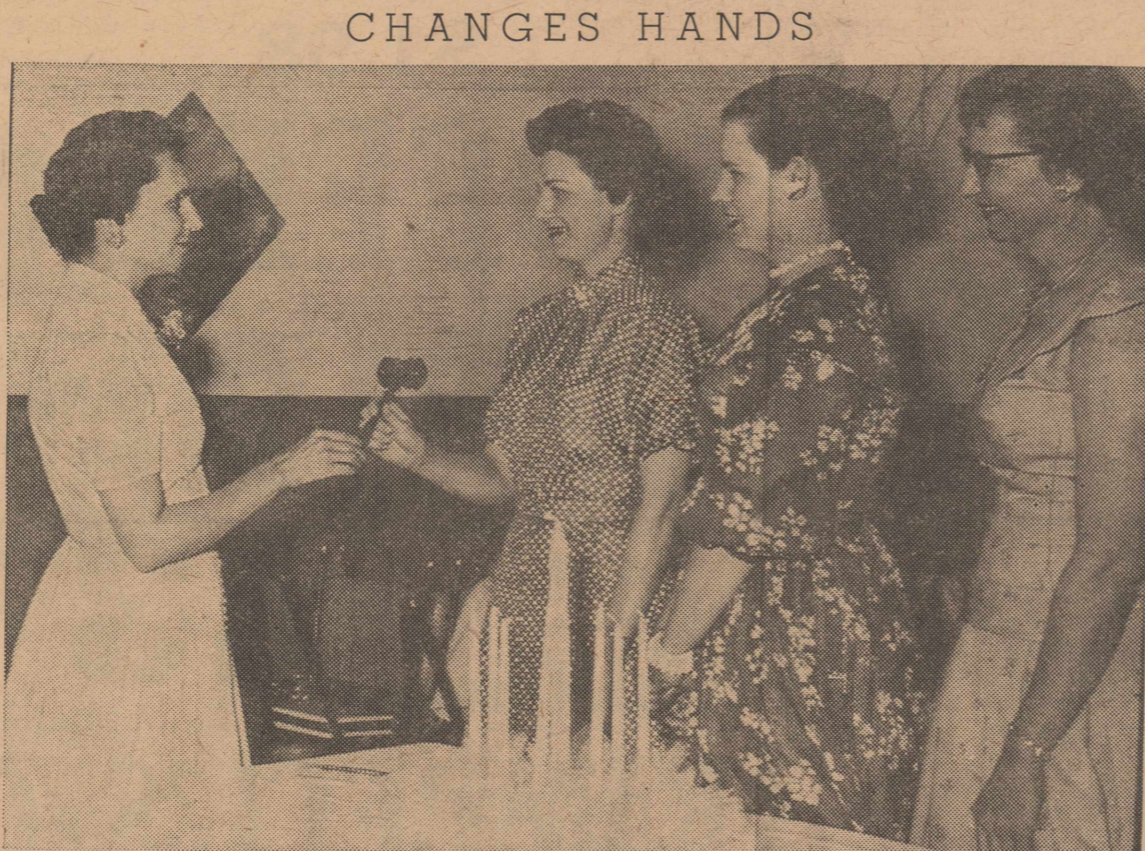
