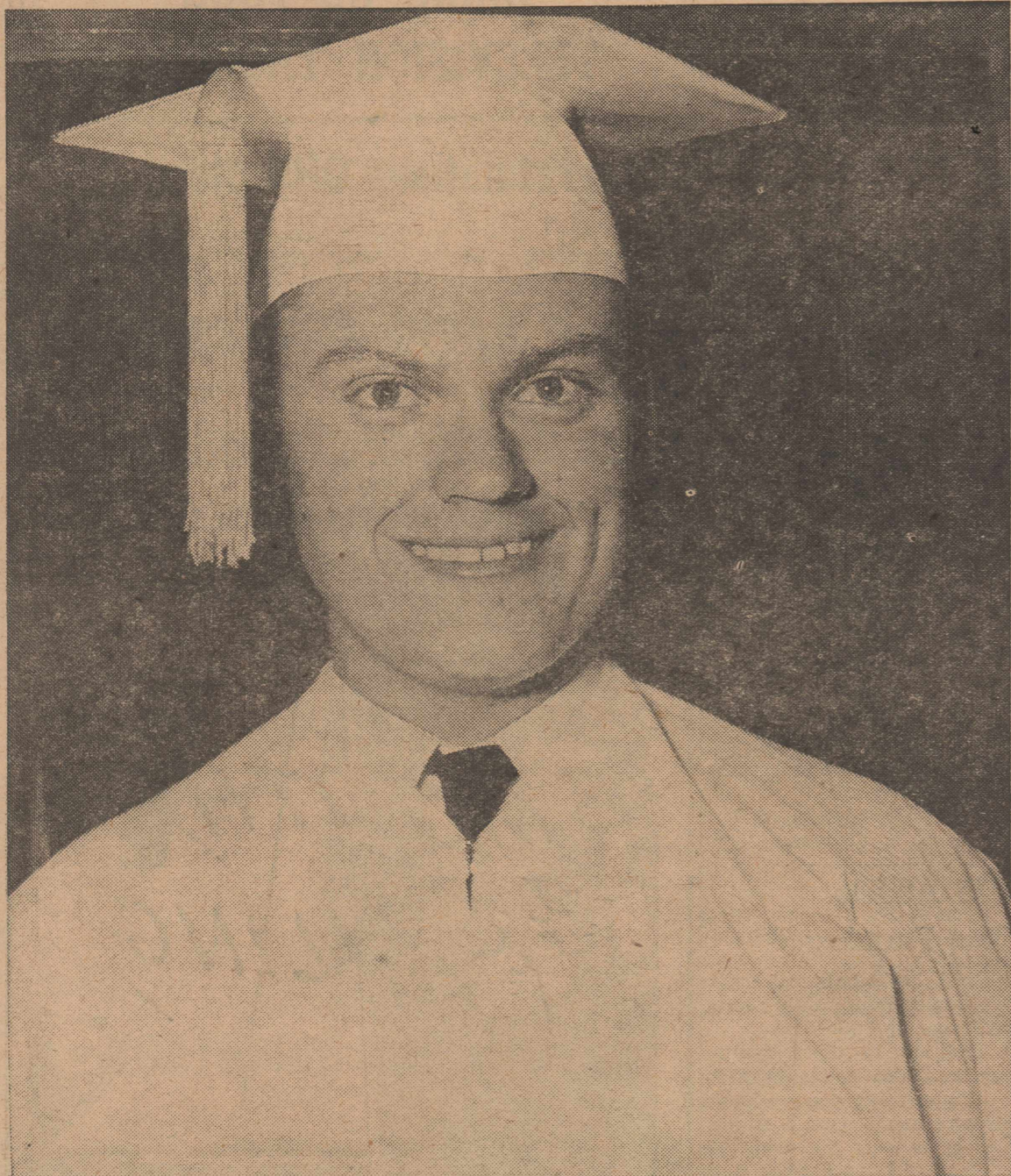

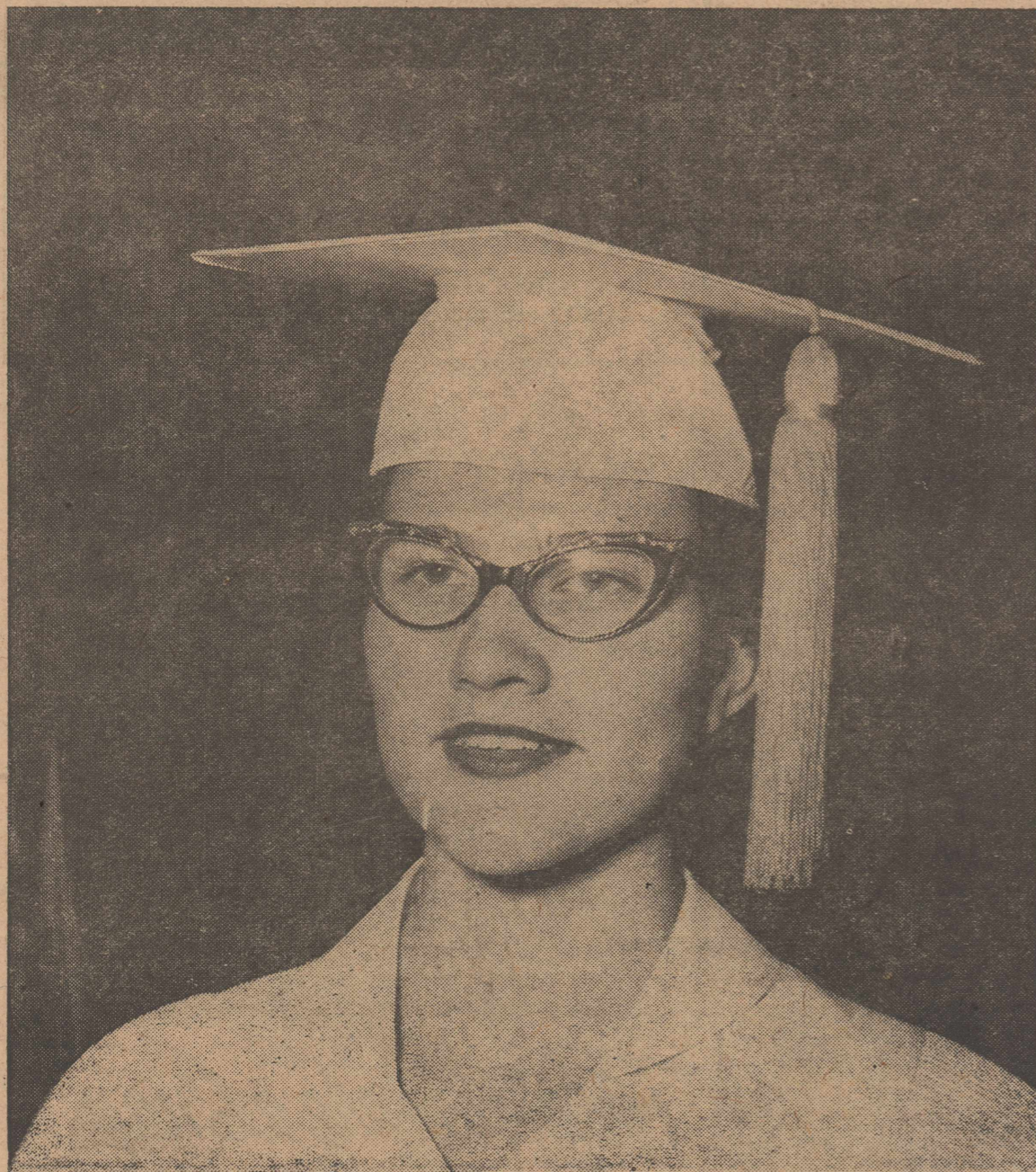

Free Vaccine Program Being Carried Out

Smallpox vaccinations were administered to approximately 118 children Thursday, the last day of school, according to Fred Gordon, elementary principal.

He stated that 131 pre-schoolers and grade students had signed up for free shots. Those who were not inoculated Thursday are asked to report to Dr. Ben Souders, City Health Officer, who will give the shots. Children whose vaccinations do not "take" are also requested to report to Dr. Souders.

This free vaccine program was arranged in connection with the decision that no grade school child will be allowed to enroll in the Olton schools next fall who has not been vaccinated against smallpox.

Death Claims Supt. Carl Macon Educator Suffers Heart Attack



Olton Mourns Passing Of Great School Teacher and Administrator

Monday was the last day of school for Carl Macon.

Mr. Macon was killed in action—a casualty in the world battle now raging for the minds of men.

Olton's great educator, civic leader and humanitarian died about 8 o'clock Monday night at his home following a

severe heart attack. He was 50 years old. He had been superintendent of Olton Schools since 1952.

Mr. Macon spent the day in his office at Olton High School. During the day he mentioned to friends and associates that he had been feeling rather tired.

Long Hours

The superintendent had been on a long trip in quest of school teachers for the 1957-58 school term only last week. He had mentioned on several occasions recently that teachers were becoming increasingly hard to find.

During his jaunt last week he traveled for 30 hours in a stretch with only a few hours of sleep. Monday evening he and his son-in-law, Carol May, had worked in the garden at the rear of the Macon home. Mr. Macon came into the house and sat down in the living room.

It was then that he was stricken. Mr. May stayed with his father-in-law while Mrs. Macon went for help to the J. A. Williams home next door. The neighbors hailed Clovis Poteet and he rushed into a meeting at the school auditorium where he found a physician.

The physician worked for several minutes and then summoned the coroner. The people of Olton had lost one of their great friends.

Dedicated Man

Mr. Macon was a dedicated school man. He was indeed a great Texan, standing tall among the educators of this state.

He came to a strife-torn Olton School District in 1952 and with the sheer force of his personality he welded the community together.

Two years and only a few days after his arrival, Olton dedicated a new school plant. For the first time in the half-century history of the community the school had an auditorium which is used exclusively as such.

Under the able guidance of the board of trustees and Mr. Macon, the quarter of a million dollar improvement to the school was carried out. New rooms and facilities were added to meet the demands of Olton's finest crop—children.

Trusted People

"Let the people know and they will do the rest," Mr. Macon declared as he talked about his success in administering school affairs. "I believe in the people when they are informed," Mr. Macon often declared.

Mr. Macon felt that his first duty was to the children themselves. He served them above and beyond the call of duty.

He instituted a counselling program and counseled each senior personally. Sometimes he would spend as many as three hours with one senior—hours that often meant that he would have to work on into the night to keep abreast of his other duties.

Mr. Macon had held most of the offices of county and area teachers associations. He was a friend of teachers everywhere and stood in the forefront of the fight for better pay for school teachers.

Vote Of Confidence

It was just two weeks ago that the board of trustees gave Mr. Macon a vote of confidence and an expression of gratitude for his services.

Boys and girls at Olton High School knew Mr. Macon as a kind, fatherly man who was always willing to go more than half way with them. And too, they knew that the latch string was always on the outside, day or night, at the Macon home and that on the inside were two people who really cared for them and were willing to listen to

their problems at any hour.

Back through the years, Carl and Mrs. Macon put many a boy and girl on the right track and on the road to success. At home they kept a box of letters from these students. The letters tell stories of success and appreciation.

Carl referred to it as his "glad box." When the going was tough and the world seemed unappreciative, Carl and Mrs. Macon would get down their "glad box" and draw new strength and rededication from those letters.

"There aren't any bad boys and girls," Carl often said. "They are what we adults make them."

Olton students paid tribute to Mr. Macon Tuesday morning in a memorial service at the school. Olton students will place a memorial portrait of Mr. Macon in the school.

A keen insight into the character of Carl Macon may be had by observing the unswerving loyalty of those who worked under him.

"I never knew a better superintendent or a fairer man," declared Coach Joe Turner who came to Olton at the same time as Mr. Macon.

Mr. Macon was born Oct. 30, 1906 at DeLeon. He was graduated from DeLeon High School and then attended Texas Tech. He received his BS degree from Howard Payne at Brownwood. He received his Masters Degree from Eastern New Mexico University.

Mr. Macon was indeed a county school teacher. He began his career at the age of 19 in a two-teacher school at Fairview, near Gorman in Eastland County. He taught some boys older than himself.

As a young school teacher he made about \$1,000 a year and found it necessary to take odd jobs in order to make a living. He stuck tenaciously to his profession. "He felt that the Lord had called him to teach," declared Mrs. Macon.

Mr. Macon was married March 3, 1934 to Miss Mildred Miller at Dublin. They attended college together and taught together through the years.

Mr. Macon held his first superintendency at Oplin, near Abilene.

Superintendent At Morton He later went to Bula and then to Morton, where he was superintendent for seven years.

Mr. Macon was a deacon in the Baptist Church. He was a Sunday School teacher at Olton First Baptist Church. He was a 32nd degree Mason and the immediate past president of the Olton Lions Club. He was a life member of the P-TA and an honorary Future Farmer.

Funeral services were held at 3 o'clock Wednesday afternoon in Olton High School Auditorium. Officiating was Rev. John Lewis, pastor of the Olton First Baptist Church. He was assisted by Rev. Ollie Robinson, pastor of Morton First Baptist Church.

Palbearers were members of Mr. Macon's Sunday School class. Honorary pallbearers included members of the school board and Coach Joe Turner, David Tullis and Fred Gordon. Members of the Masonic Lodge sat in a body at the services.

Burial was to have been Thursday in the DeLeon Cemetery.

Survivors, other than the wife, include a son, Don, a student at Howard Payne; a daughter, Mrs. Sue May, Olton; a grandson, Scott Alan May, Olton; his father, R. L. Macon of DeLeon; and three sisters, Mrs. Wendell Decker, Mrs. Coy Cowan and Mrs. Fred Valencia, all of Tuscon, Arizona.

During her four years in OHS, she has excelled in many areas of activity. She has been a twirler and drum major in the Mustang Band, Choir Sweetheart, National Honor Society secretary, freshman class secretary and favorite, assistant editor of the annual, president of Future Teachers of America, Lions Club Sweetheart, and Miss OHS.

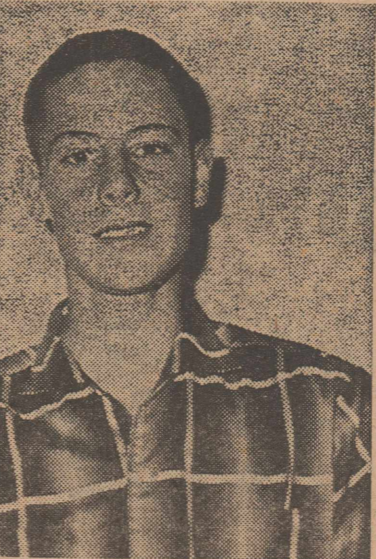

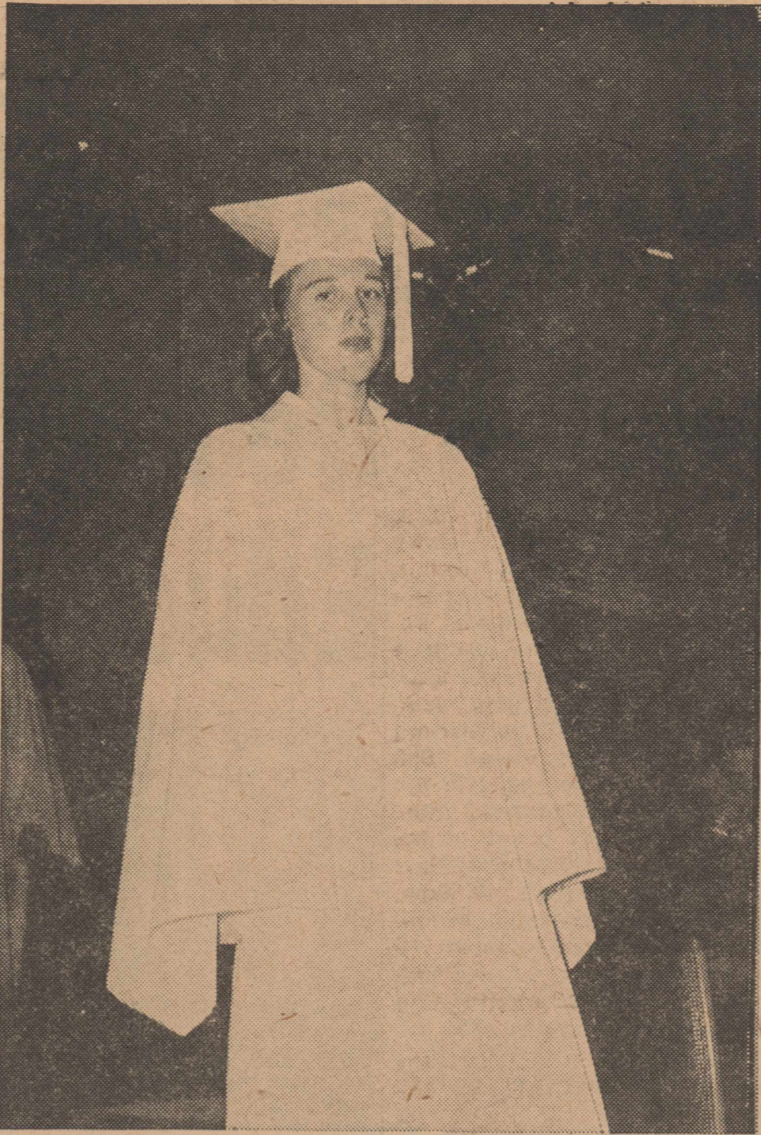
Essie, who ranked sixth in her class with an average of 89.65, plans to attend WTSC at Canyon where she will major in business education. Her ambition is to become a secretary.

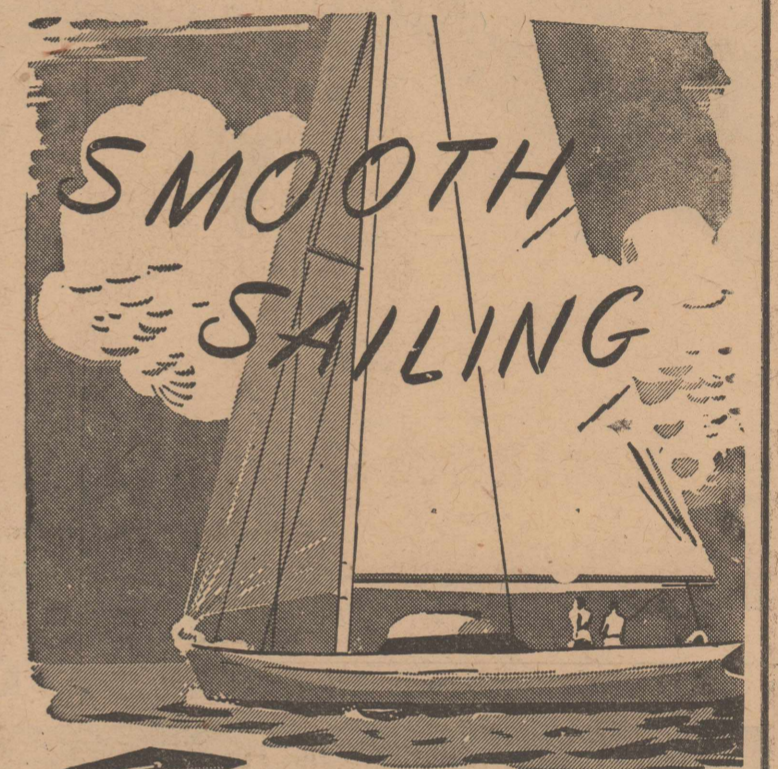

last Friday night at the Hart Camp church was postponed due to weather conditions. No further date was set for the banquet.

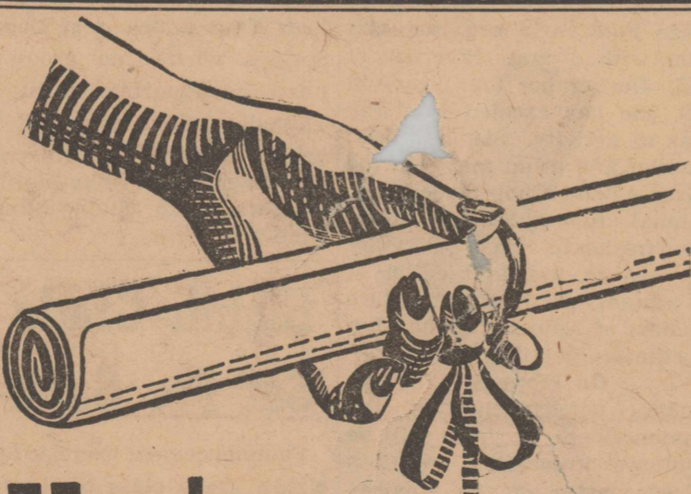

—Olton Clubwoman Of The Year To Be Selected From Slate Of Seven—

Nominees from seven local clubs and organizations for Olton's Clubwoman of the Year for 1956-57 have been elected—one of whom will be selected as the most outstanding by an impartial committee of men and women who have no affiliation with any club or group participating.

Following the committee's action, an engraved plaque will be presented the honoree by The Olton Enterprise. This project, spearheaded by Mrs. Troy Martin in her "Ironing Things

Out" column, is to become an annual event in which recognition will be given the woman considered by the committee to have contributed most to her club and community during the year.

Identity of the Clubwoman of the Year will be disclosed early in June.

Members of the seven participating clubs elected their nomi-

nees on the basis of the following considerations: personal integrity, loyalty to organization and its purpose, willingness to work, attitudes and compatibility, resourcefulness and leadership "all-around" activities, and outstanding contributions this club year.

Nominees were submitted by the New Century Study Club,

1956 Bykota Study Club, Homebuilders Home Demonstration Club, Olton Garden Club, Classroom Teachers Association, Olton Study Club, and the Olton Parent-Teacher Association.

Mrs. Glen Exter

The New Century Study Club's nominee is Mrs. Glen Exter who has served as president during the past year. A P-TA member, she teaches a Ladies Bible Class at the Main Street Church of Christ and a pre-school Sunday School class, as well as a Children's Bible class at Hart. She was the leader for the March of Dimes Mothers' March sponsored by her club, assisted with the Red Cross Dallas Disaster Drive, and serves as substitute teacher in the Olton schools.

Mrs. Paul Burrus

Mrs. Paul Burrus, nominee of the Olton Study Club of which she has been a member for 24 years and in which she has held every office, served on the club's Girl Scout committee this year and was department chairman of Club Institutes. A life member of the P-TA, she was chairman of the Legislative and Publications committee during '56-57, marked her tenth year as a recognized Girl Scout leader, and is an active member and teacher in the Main Street Church of Christ. In community affairs, she is a member of the Red Cross, helps with the March of Dimes, and is a leader in civic improvement projects such as the community recreation project.

Mrs. John Campbell

Elected as the nominee of the Classroom Teachers Association is Mrs. John Campbell, eighth grade teacher, who helped organize this group and served as president for the past two years. A member of the newly-organized Kappa Kappa Iota in Olton, she has been an Eastern Star member for 30 years and is a Past Worthy Matron. She was active in the Home Demonstration Club for five years and has completed her 11th year as a member of the Olton school faculty. She is an assistant teacher of the Young Married Ladies Class at the First Baptist Church. Helping to organize the Future Teachers Association two years ago, she has been its sponsor since that time.

Mrs. H. B. Carson

Mrs. H. B. Carson, who has served the first of her two-year term as president, has been submitted as the nominee of the Olton Garden Club. A life member in the Olton P-TA, she was district Founders' Day Chairman in '56-57 and served on the Resolutions committee at the district spring conference. She recently went into the Olton Study Club as a new member. Mrs. Carson is a teacher and active member of the First Baptist Church. She lends her assistance to numerous civic activities such as Red Cross and March of Dimes, in addition to church and school affairs.

Mrs. H. H. Shanks

The Homebuilders Home Demonstration Club selected as its nominee its president, Mrs. H. H. Shanks. 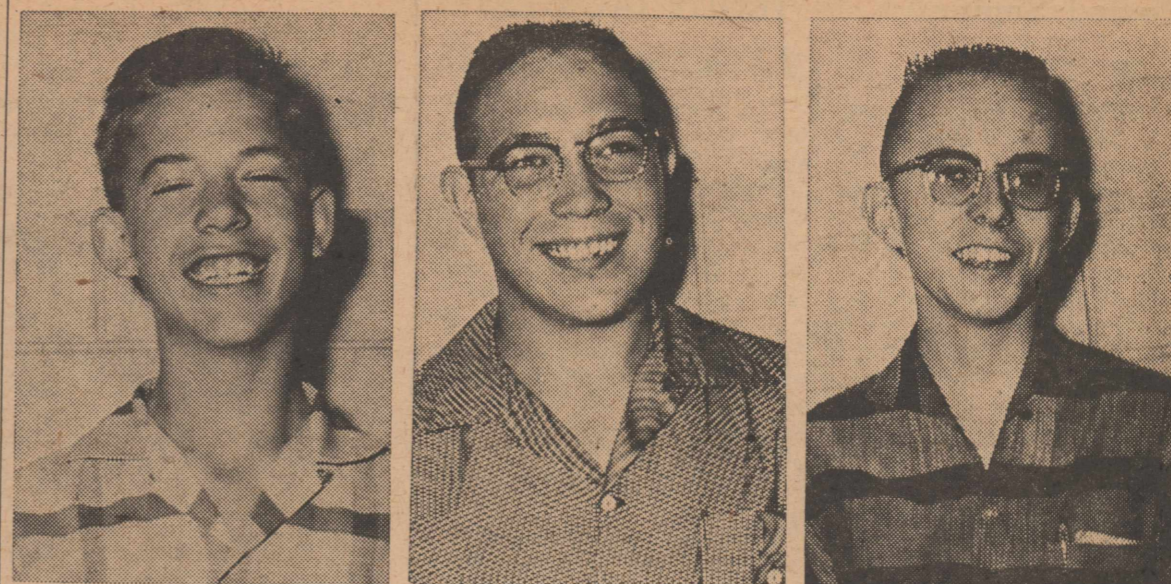

Co-captain of the Mustang football squad this year, Jerry Edmonson has a long record of other activities to his credit in OHS.

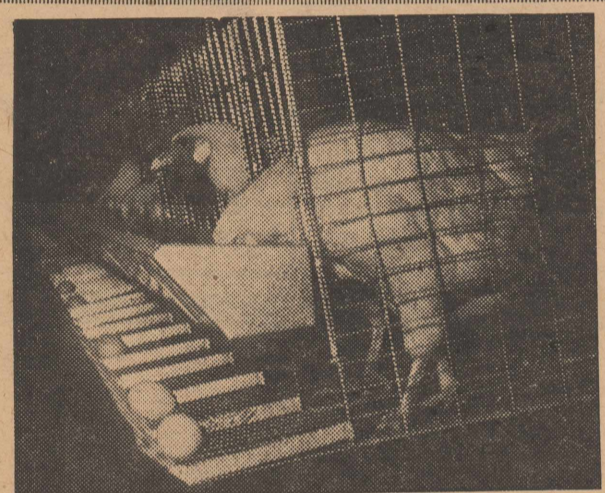

OHS librarian, Carmen Rodriguez, will attend Draughon's Business College in Lubbock after graduation. She will become a private secretary.

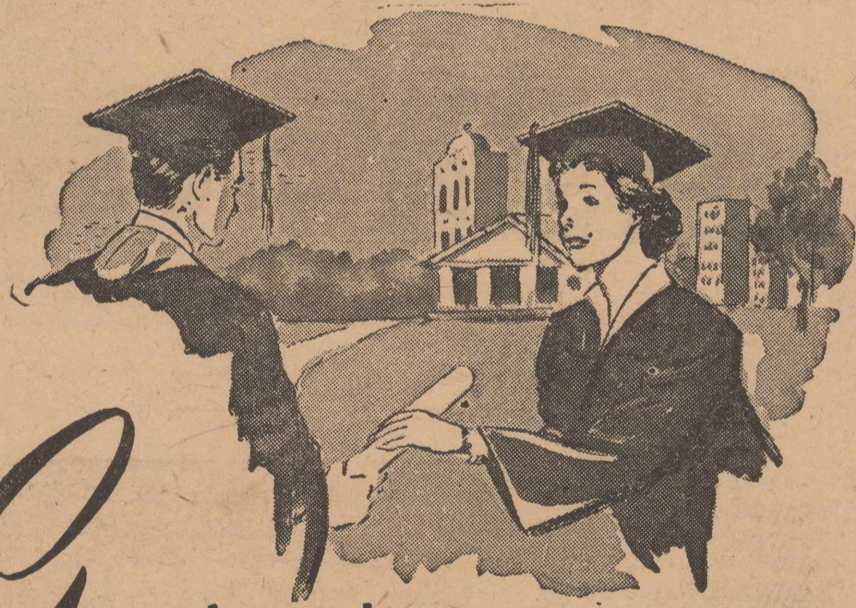

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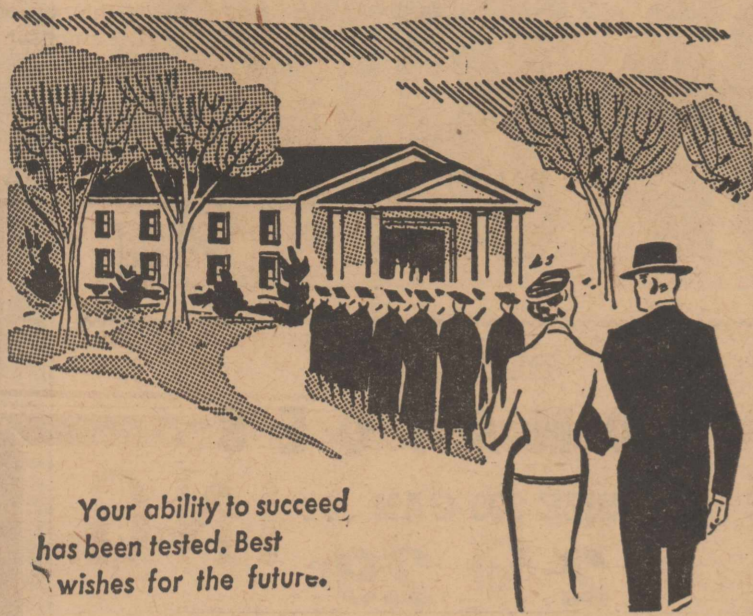

David's ambition is to attend West Point military academy.



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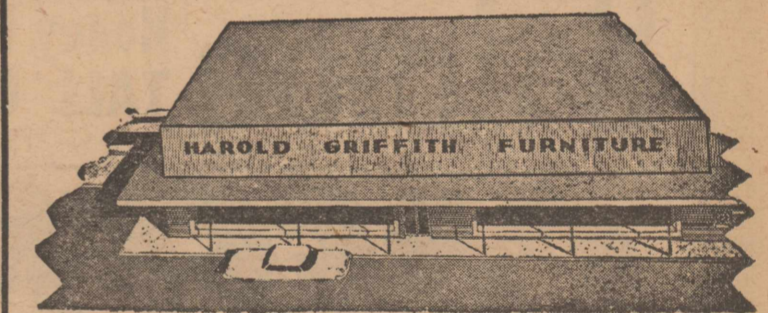
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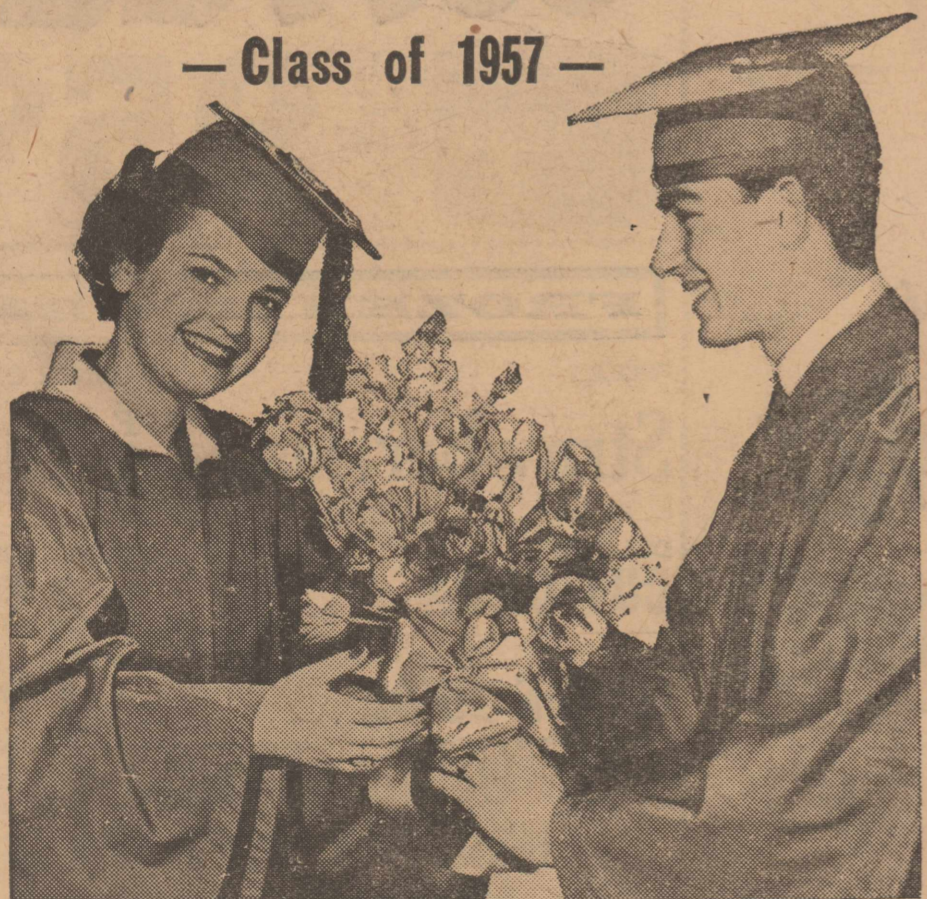

Olton's "Mr. Baker" Has Served Area 19 Years

PAT A CAKE, PAT A CAKE

One business of which Olton can boast that few other towns of comparable size can is a full-fledged commercial bakery. In fact, the Olton Bakery and a Hereford concern are the only two small bakeries in West Texas that bake bread.

Prior to World War II, the story was different. One or more "bread baking" bakeries thrived in numerous area towns, large and small. But in post-war days one by one they became the victim of rising labor costs and the staying power of the large city bakeries. Ironically, progress and prosperity

threw the lethal punch, for one of the largest contributing factors to their downfall was the improved highways and transportation which allowed the city bakeries to serve even the smallest villages with their products almost as easily as an outlying suburb.

To Olton In 1938

The persevering owner of the Olton Bakery is Russell Rucker who inevitably and admittedly has weathered some mighty "lean periods" to keep in operation the business he bought in March of 1938.

He purchased the Olton Bakery from George Schulze, son of a pioneer baker who had sold its large Abilene bakery to a newcomer, Mead's, in the 1920's. The bakery was then located on the site now occupied by Sherman Food. In 1946, after returning from a stint in the shipyards during the war, Mr. Rucker moved to his present location.

Long In Business

The aromatic atmosphere of a bakery has long been familiar to this smiling-faced, affable man. As a young lad of 12, his father died, leaving him responsible for his mother and three young children. He worked at odd jobs, quit school awhile, and then during his high school days in 1933 got employment with a bakery in Floydada, his hometown.

After his marriage he moved to Turkey where he worked in a bakery owned by Mr. Schulze. For a year after Mr. Schulze sold out and moved to Olton, Mr. Rucker remained with the Turkey bakery. He then moved to Olton—population 540—and bought out Mr. Schulze who died a year later.

Time Makes Changes

In 1938 a pound loaf of bread was retailing for 10 cents, a nine-inch pie for 25 cents, cookies for 15 cents per dozen, and doughnuts for 30 cents a dozen. Whereas his volume was \$5,000 to \$8,000 annually, it now runs in

the neighborhood of \$35,000. "The margin of profit was much greater then," stated Mr. Rucker, "so you have to maintain volume these days to keep out of the red."

"You also have to keep hustling and making changes," he declared. As in other businesses, he takes trade journals to keep up with new ideas and formulas.

His bread has gone under the same name, "Golden Krust", for the past 19 years. But just last week, as a bid for added customer appeal, he came out with a new bread wrapper. The familiar red, white and blue wrapper has been replaced with a pink checked pattern.

New cookies and other products "come and go" in popularity, the perennial favorite remaining those of oatmeal, honey scotch, honey, coconut, short paste, and chocolate chip. "I haven't changed the recipes for these in the past 15 years," he said.

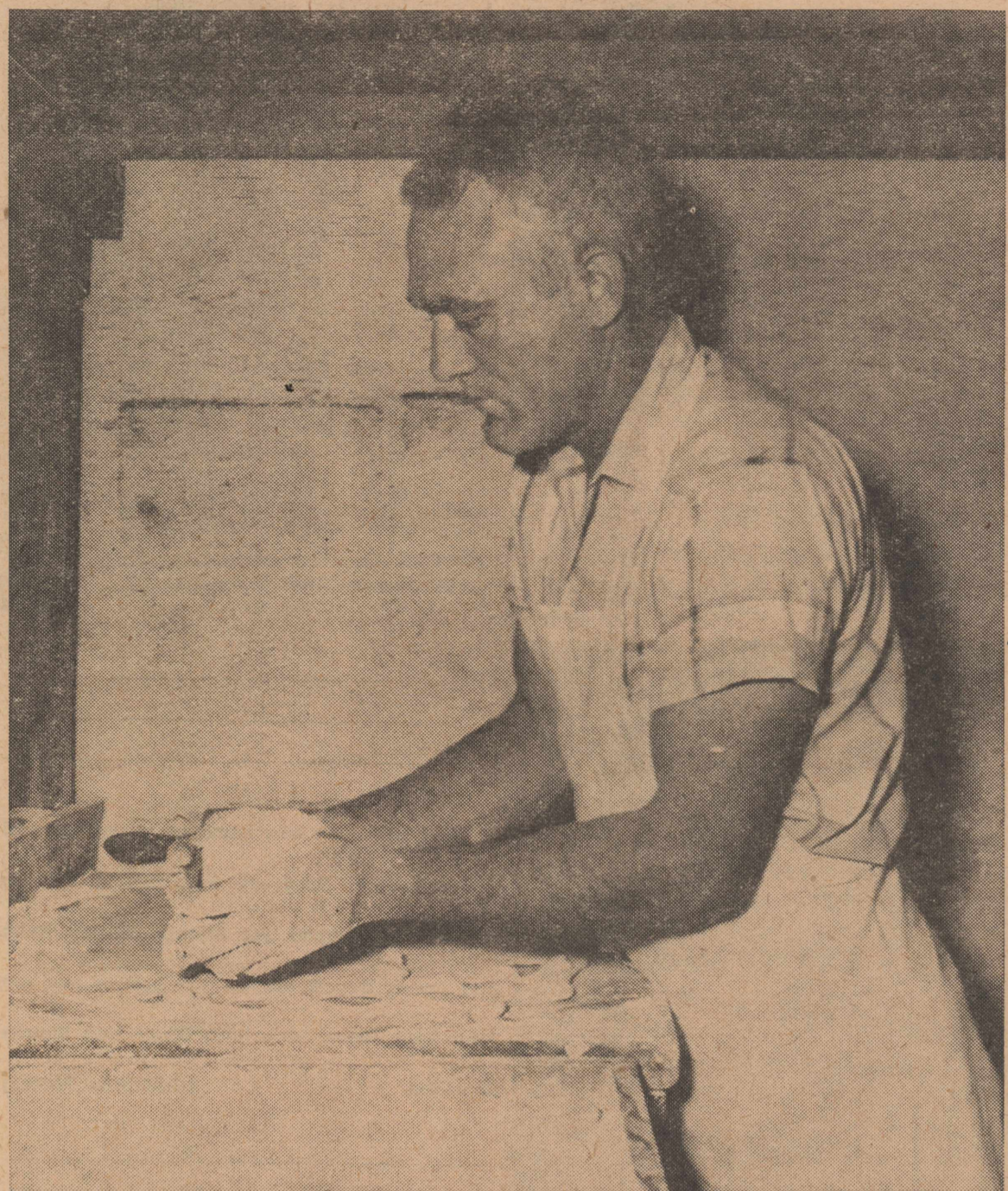
Three Employees

Employees of the Olton Bakery are Wallace Mathews, who has been with Mr. Rucker for the past four and a half years as the main baker and cake decorator; C. E. Lunsford, a full-time bakery helper; and Glenn Tubb, a high school boy who works after school and on Saturdays. Mr. Mathews, who moved from Sulphur Springs, has worked in a bakery since the age of 15, including four years in a service bakery.

Varied Products

Doughnuts are the No. 1 seller at the Olton Bakery, followed by cookies and bread. Pies, bread, and doughnuts are baked daily, except Sunday, while danish rolls, cookies, cakes, and other products are baked as needed. "Golden Krust" bread is sold in Olton grocery stores and White's Super Markets in Plainview.

Special orders such as birthday and wedding cakes constitute a heavy load of business. "However, there's a very little profit

in those orders," Mr. Rucker said. The largest cake he's baked was a 250-pound one for Sherman Food on its fourth anniversary and Grand Opening of its new store. It was baked in the form of the new grocery building, complete with such decorative features as windows, air conditioning units, and store sign.

Preparing The Bread

Bread—the staff of life and mainstay of the bakery business—is the most time-consuming operation. The Olton Bakery markets what is termed as a "dough break" bread, more near-

ly approaching the old-fashioned home baked product.

The sponge, consisting of 60 per cent of the flour, the yeast, malt, yeast food, and water, is set at night in the mixer, which has a 600-pound capacity. After aging overnight, this sponge is mixed with the sugar, shortening, milk, and remaining flour. The mixture is then dumped into a large trough and taken to the dough breaker where 35 to 40-pound pieces are put through the rolls of this machine. As a kneading operation the dough is folded and put through the rolls 14 to 20 times for loaf bread and up to 35 times for hamburger buns. This operation is eliminated in bakeries that use only high speed mixing machines.

The dough is then taken to a large wooden table where it is "scaled out." Bread dough is weighed out in approximately 18 ounce pieces for each pound loaf, as around 2 ounces in moisture are lost in the baking. It is then placed in a molder, coming out as a long strip of dough which is put in the pans (greased the preceding night) and placed in the proof box for an hour. If the dough is twisted, two slender strips come through the molder and are placed in the pan, the method followed in the Olton Bakery until a few months ago.

For hamburger buns, about four and a half pounds of dough—enough for three dozen buns—is placed into a bun divider machine. Each of these 36 pieces is rounded out by hand on the wooden slab, placed in a pan and flattened.

"The feel of the dough is of primary importance, and it takes lots of experience to know the feel of a 'just right' dough," said Mr. Rucker.

Baking Process

After its stay in the proof box, the bread is rolled on racks to the huge master oven which is constructed with eight revolving shelves. The oven's capacity is 256 one-pound loaves, 144 pound and a half loaves, 48 dozen hamburger or hot dog buns, or up to 400 pies. The wheel, which is electrically turned, makes a complete revolution in two minutes. An indicator shows which of the eight shelves is at the door, and although the oven is thermostatically controlled, the baker checks all during the baking process as the bread or other contents can get too brown on a two-minute round.

After taken from the oven, the golden loaves are cooled on the waiting racks to room temperature and then taken to the combination slicing and wrapping machine.

This veteran baker said the test of a good loaf of bread is whether the sides and bottom of the loaf are smooth after baking. This smoothness indicates that the dough was "kneaded" sufficiently in the dough breaker.

Bread is baked in "straps"—individual pans constructed in one unit. Small loaves are baked

shape.

Cake and pie dough, cookies, whole wheat bread, doughnuts, and sweet doughs are mixed in a vertical or all-purpose mixer. This mixer is equipped with a 30 and 60-quart bowls.

In the fall of the year when larger quantities are required, cookies are cut out by a machine. During the remainder of the year, all cookies are hand cut. Such cookies as sand tarts, of course, have to be hand molded.

In addition to the regular bread slicing machine, two other slicing machines for thin sliced sandwich bread and "Texas sliced" bread are used.

Swift Manipulation

Mr. Rucker and Mr. Mathews have perfected the art of "no lost motion" in the hand cutting of doughnuts. In fact, only last week they tried out an automatic cutter and discovered that instead of gaining efficiency,

they lost it. In half the time they could pick up the cut dough from the cutting board, they could "ring" the doughnuts in a fast sleight of hand and place them on a wooden tray. These filled trays are stacked one upon the other until the doughnuts are ready for frying.

Much Equipment Required

An important piece of equipment utilized by the bakery is a large freezer in which are stored brown and serve rolls, nuts, baked sheet cakes ready to ice, bulk roll dough to sell to individuals and cafes, and other perishable items.

Even in a small bakery, the outlay is heavy for equipment. Approximately \$40,000 has been expended for equipment, much of which was purchased second-hand. Mr. Rucker declared he uses about 1,100 one hundred pound sacks of flour annually.

Sugar, both powdered and granulated, is purchased in 100-pound bags and shortening in 110-pound tins.

"Of course, this doesn't compare with the large bakeries, but it's a lot for a small shop," said Mr. Rucker.

Likes Own Product

Running a bakery is a dawn to dark proposition. There's always mixing, baking, decorating, cutting, cleaning, delivering, and numerous other tasks to be done to keep fresh bakery products rolling out to the consumers.

After a nearly a quarter of a century in the bakery business, does Mr. Rucker still like bread?

"It's still one of my favorite foods," he smilingly declared as he munched on a slice of fresh Golden Krust bread. "I never tire of it."

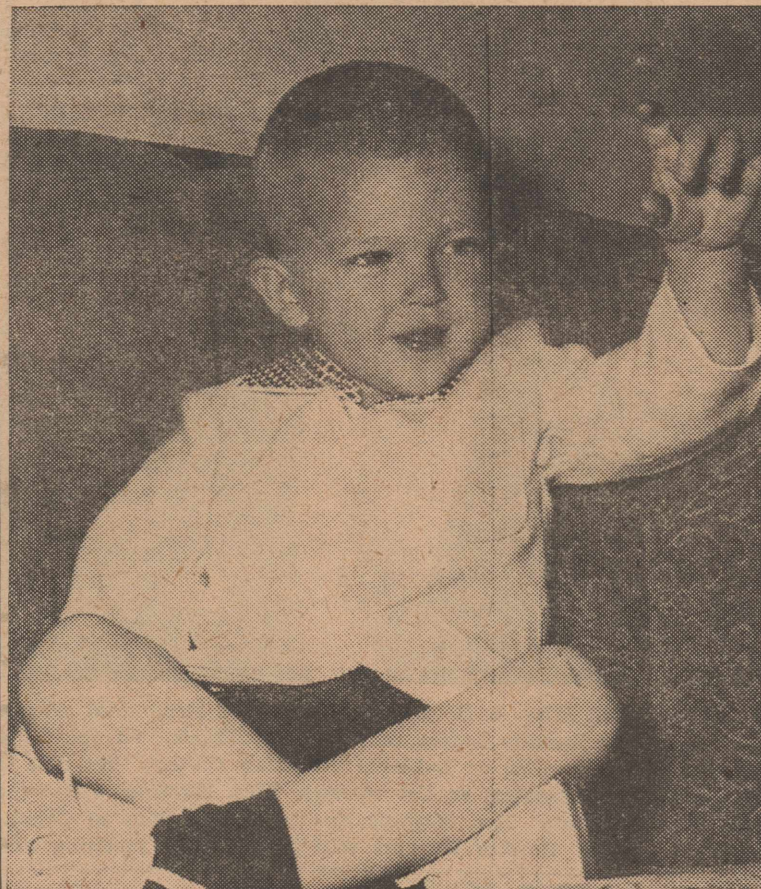
