Martin of The Enterprise has been requested by Senator Ralph Yarborough to collect all the data possible on American soldiers being held prisoner by the Communists, Senator Yarborough has promised to carry the fight for their liberation into the US Senate. In the words of Lt. Gen. Stratemyer, "the Flag should follow the Soldier." The General also states, that "he does not know

The American Prisoners of War Association sent innumerable messages and telegrams to the White House without one single reply on this.

I talked with a man, formerly of a National Organization, who spoke in Boston on this subject and who told me, personally, he was sent by Eisenhower to Korea to make an investigation. He did investigate and stated, that from time to time a South Korean escapee returns to Seoul, reporting that American Prisoners of War are still being held

in Communist jails and described these jails and how many prisoners inhabited these jails from which he escaped. Our Government is in possession of these facts, Mr. Martin. I have other information, also which I will forward to you, which establishes the fact that a larger percentage of men are M. I. A. in the Korean conflict than in any which this Nation was ever involved.

The abandonment of these men, Mr. Martin, is one of the blackest pages in our Military History. Strictly dishonorable, strictly un-American.
