

# WHEAT HARVEST ON—ALMOST DONE

★  
Olton's wheat harvest is on. The first load of wheat was brought in to Ben F. Smith Grain Company Saturday from Quentin Redinger's farm southeast of Olton. The wheat was cut and transported to the elevator by

O. J. Lee, who operates a custom combining and trucking service here. Louis Mack Hardy, who operates the grain company, said the wheat showed about 15% moisture content and was about 60 pounds to the bushel. "It was excellent quality wheat," Mr. Hardy declared. Lee cut a second load of grain

from the Redinger farm and then shut down operation because of mud in the field. No estimate has been set on the yield at the Redinger farm but Mr. Hardy said it is good wheat. He estimates weather damage at about eight bushels per acre. The sturdy stalks of wheat were knocked down in places

and much of it was knocked too low for the combine fingers to pick it up. A considerable amount was threshed from standing stalks by hail and is washed into piles in the field. A number of farmers are harvesting this week. Among them are Dick Redinger, E. T. Hines, Earl McLain and Jack Allison.

Among those who have completed their wheat harvest are Hubert Waldrop, Earl Holley and Roy McFadden. Although no exact figures are yet available, Mr. Hardy said he believes the yield here will average about 25 bushels per acre. He said about 3,000 acres were planted to wheat in this vicinity.

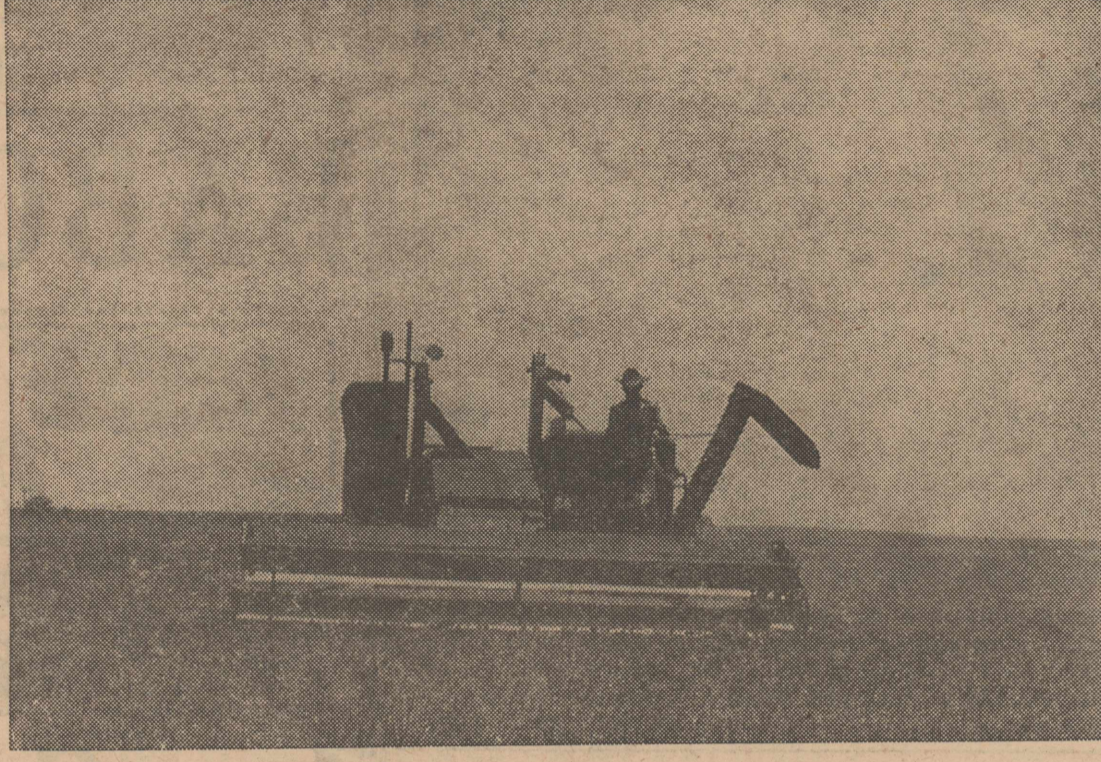
In the meantime, the battle with the weeds for Olton's row crop is on. Because farmers have been held out of the field by bad weather, the land is foul in most places where crops are up. Cotton choppers were streaming into the country by the score. Vegetable harvest appears to

be just around the corner. Already this week, preparations were being made at the potato shed in Hart for the handling of this year's crop. The weather again buffeted the Olton area Saturday night and Sunday. Turbulent weather brought a blinding sandstorm and a fierce blow here Saturday night then leaden

skies dumped another .57 of an inch of rain early Sunday morning. The weather had turned off hot by mid-week but the horizon still had a murky haze and the weather threatened. The humidity remained so high that evaporative air conditioning lost a great deal of its effectiveness.

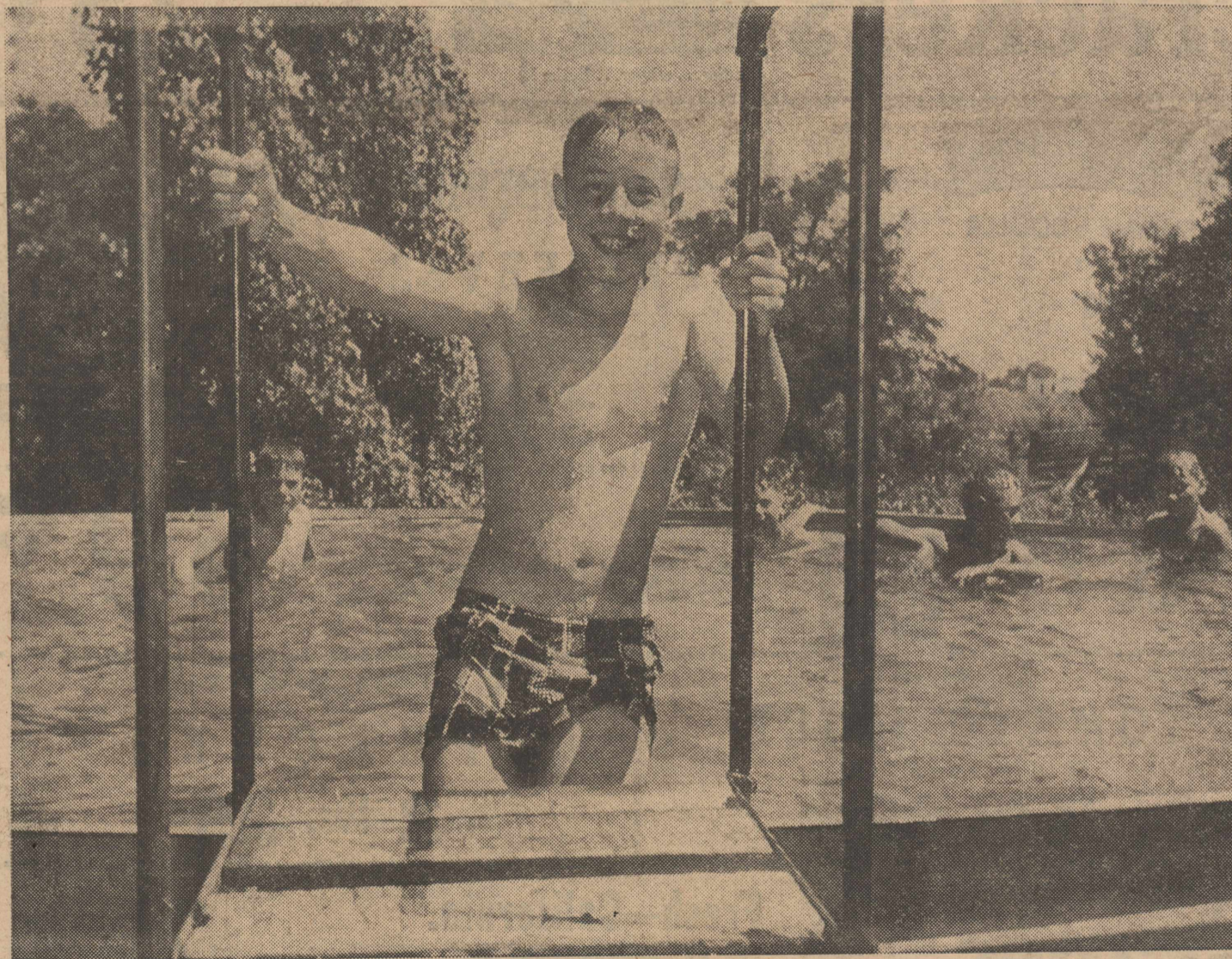

## Crooks Take Cash At Implement Firm After Smashing Rear Door

### THUGS IGNORE CASH REGISTER, GET MONEY FROM FILE CABINET

Crooks took more than \$200 in a break-in Monday night at Bodkin & Nixon Implement Company.

Firm officials did not reveal the exact amount of the haul.

The thugs left behind some \$40.00 in change which was in a sack on the counter and apparently ignored the firm's cash register which was left open when employees closed the building Monday night.

City Police Chief Vernie Head said the cash register had contained some change.

The police chief said the money taken was in currency and had been hidden under some papers in a filing cabinet.

Entry was gained through a rear door of the front office. The front portion of the firm is in a separate building from the service department.

Head said the door through which entry was gained is located between the two buildings and is well shielded from view. The officer said the door was kicked open.

Head said a window was smashed at Olton Farm Supply next door but there was no evidence that entry was gained there.

This is the second time Bodkin & Nixon has been burglarized in recent years. The other time it was burglarized, Cash Way Food Store, Olton Auto Supply and Olton Farm Supply also were victimized.

City Officers Vernie Head and Emmett Burrow and Deputy Sheriff V. L. "Smitty" Smith are investigating the burglary.

Authorities said the break-in was discovered when Bud Andrew, a mechanic, went to Bodkin & Nixon for some parts about 2 o'clock in the morning.

### FFA HAPPENINGS

WITH J. C. LANE  
and

Jack Hysinger was busy changing a plow on his tractor when we dropped in. Jack is doing his best to get a calf started on feed for the Olton Spring Stock Show.

We went by to see James Carson. James was chopping his cotton. He has five acres this year. It was taking him about four hours to make a round on half-mile rows. This is typical of most early cotton this year.

Royce Bodkin was planting hybrid milo to 20-inch rows. This practice has been used by several farmers over the past few years. Some seem to think they get an increase in yield, less weed problem because the feed shades out the weeds. They contend that less water is required because they say there is less evaporation. The biggest problem seems to be with cultivation.

Wayne Bodkin was mowing weeds when we were by. His Shorthorn cattle are in real shape due to the very good pasture they are on.

Joe Riney had a little trouble with his hogs this week. We went by to see about them.

Dewey Hukill has his hogs on good alfalfa pasture. They seem

to be doing well. John Paul and Roy Neal Jones are spending the summer in Colorado. They took their lambs and calf up with them. Two of their calves are being cared for by Jerry Mathis.

The Dennis boys, Ronnie and Deryl, are making arrangements to move their lambs down to the vocational agriculture farm south of town. The pens are not quite complete but should be by the week-end.

#### Reminders

It would be well to weigh all of the calves pretty soon to check daily gain. Remember the top weight on Dallas calves is 1,150 pounds. Some of our calves are crowding 1,000 now and we may have to change our feed to hold some of them down. Jerry Moore weighed his calves and found he had gotten a gain of a pound and a half to a pound and three quarters from the start—not at all bad.

I have seen several calves that need to have their feet trimmed. Any time a calf is on full feed you can expect the hooves to make rapid growth. If their feet are neglected too long it can

cause crooked legs. Remember to keep plenty of fresh water out for all of your stock through these hot days. Be especially careful on this score with hogs. I hope you are able to avoid the use of a wal-low. Some of these pigs we have seen lately did not have water available.

The extension reports we're getting say there are some infestations of thrip in cotton in some of the areas over the cotton.

Dry fly baits seem to give the best results for controlling flies around your pens. Be sure to follow directions carefully in its use.

### Aten Asks Cooperation Of Farmers As Cotton Acreage Measuring Starts

Measurement of the 1957 cotton acreage in Lamb County already is underway, according to Lamar D. Aten, Jr., office manager of the Lamb County ASC.

Mr. Aten said he realizes that some errors will be made by ASC employees and asked for the cooperation of farmers in order to avoid as many errors as possible.

Mr. Aten released the following statement in connection with acreage measurements:

"The crop reporters will be instructed to contact the farm operator or a representative on the farm before the measuring is started. If you want to personally assist in the measuring, please tell your employes to so advise our reporter.

"It is very important that all the land that has been planted to cotton be measured, even though part or all the cotton has been destroyed and the land replanted to feed or some other crop, so please show the reporter all the land that has been planted to cotton during 1957. The land actually in cotton will be measured separately from the land where the cotton was destroyed, so you will not be charged with the part that is destroyed except to bring the planted acreage up to the allotment.

"Areas of land in the cotton field that are not in cotton will be deducted provided they are at least .2 chain wide and contain at least .1 acre. The width will be measured from a point 1/2 the row width from the stalks of cotton. This means that if you have 40-inch rows, it will have to measure 200 inches from the stalks of cotton on one side of the area to be deducted to the stalks on the other side.

"If you should have excess cotton acreage in 1957, we have been advised that you will be allowed 20 days from the date of the notice of excess cotton to destroy the excess, and that the county committee cannot extend this date more than 10 days. The extension must be based on a written request from you and it must be because of reasons beyond your control that the excess was not destroyed. In the extent you want to deduct the irrigation ditches, we suggest that you make them 200 inches wide early in the year. We will give you other information about this when you are sent the official "Notice of Measured Cotton Acreage."

"We expect our reporters to be as courteous and cooperative as possible with you. They will have definite instructions about measuring the crops and will be glad to explain their reasons for making certain measurements if you will request an explanation."

## We Presume Our 450 Men Dead Because Reds Deny Holding Them

The State and Defense Departments say that the 450 Americans, missing in Korea and known to have been taken prisoner, are presumed to be dead.

Unofficial figures set the number of victims at more than 2,000 in Red China alone.

It may be true that there has been no recent evidence that any of them is alive. But the only evidence we have that they are dead is that the Chinese Reds deny holding them. Gen. Van Fleet says that the Reds still hold 400 of the 3,141 Americans missing in Korea, including his son.

Two years ago Washington wore a red face over this issue. A Defense official said the department did not consider any of the missing men alive. That statement was based on the fact that the Communists denied holding any of them. In other words, the evidence we had was no good because the Reds, who tell the truth only when it serves their purposes, deny it.

But shortly after that Peiping embarrassed the administration by admitting that it held 15 airmen. We allowed the Reds to blackmail us into the interminable conferences with them in Geneva, at which they have hoped to obtain American recognition, in return for the repatriation of these 15 plus two civilians the government presumed dead.

May the Chinese Reds not now be planning further blackmail? They probably are if in fact any of the 450 men are still alive.

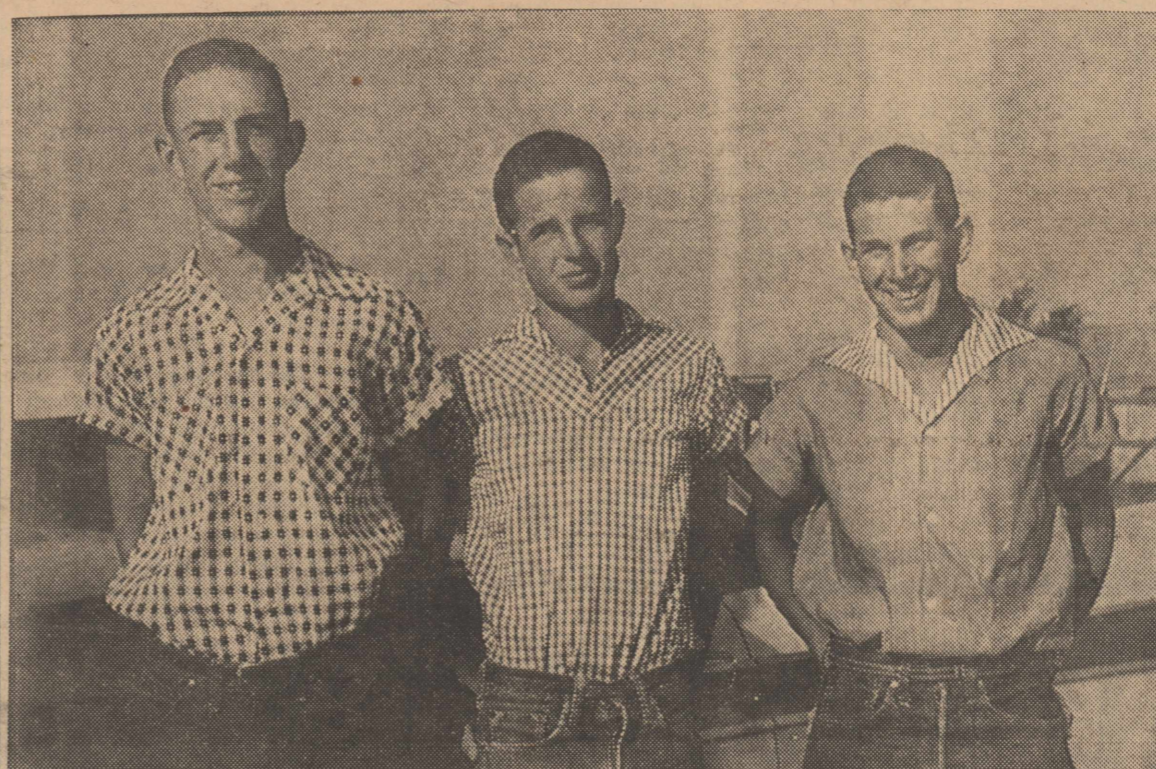
Meanwhile, the President makes his unfortunate remark indicating that he does not preclude this country's reconsidering our embargo policy toward Red China. It is to be hoped that this remark was a slip of the tongue. For how can trade relations be formalized without some sort of diplomatic contacts?

Meanwhile, too, our forces in South Korea are in deadly danger because the Reds, in violation of the armistice terms, have vastly increased their fire power.

The Korean War may have to be fought all over again some day, with our side in approximately as grave a condition of unreadiness as before. And in the meantime we supinely accept the fate, whatever it is or was, of the 450 men known to have been taken prisoner by the Reds.

## Post Office Hikes Special Service Fees

Olton Post Office has announced changes in fees charged for special services effective July 1. The changes are the same for all post offices throughout the country, according to Postmaster I. B. "Doc" Holt.

They are: Registered mail: up to \$10, fifty cents; \$10.01 to \$100, seventy-five cents; and \$100.01 up to \$1,000, fees graded up to \$2.

Dr. John Andrews, optometrist in Plainview, has the answer to his patient's worry with children while in his office.

He has a little nursery chair and table, with color book and crayons, right in his reception room, available to all children.

Of course, my Kaysee still had to leave her brand on his WALL!

Nevertheless, if your children are somewhat more bridled, it's an ideal setup.

I know Littlefield is 30 miles away, and I know it seems uncalled for to run all that distance just to have a chest x-ray made, when you're just sure it will be negative.

Unfortunately, however, some are NOT negative, and finding out in time could make a great deal of difference. "They" say this Red Cross X-ray unit will reveal not only symptoms of tuberculosis, but lung cancer and some heart ailments.

So here's my two cents on urging more of you to take advantage of this service. It will be

set up at 507 Phelps Ave. from 8:30 to 5:30 next Wednesday, the day before July 4. Relative small price to pay for added peace of mind.

What do you do when your two-year-old has a dozen fresh eggs out on the divan in the living room, and when she is the type who is prone to throw things in fits of anger?

Boy! Your impulse is to shriek and run to the rescue of the divan (or the eggs), grabbing them all up hurriedly and frantically. But better judgment tells you that would be disastrous.

So you begin cajoling the child as you approach, all the time she's shuffling the eggs like

dominoes and putting them in and out of the carton as if they were wooden pegs. You hold your breath. You walk slowly. Finally you get to her, and even then you have to maintain your calm as she meticulously places the eggs back in the carton.

Whew! All done, and all done in! And the entire episode just a few short seconds in the life of a mother.

Mr. Charlie Guy over at the *Avalanche-Journal* is really beating the drums for better education and fairer methods. Now, I'm not very much in the know about this progressive method, or any new modern method, but it looks as if Mr. Guy is having a rather hard time getting response from the right people over in Lubbock, the "right" people being the School Board, etc.

Here's one reader of his column who's at least keeping up with things from his side, and maybe we all could learn a lesson in something besides education if we follow the developments over there and draw our own conclusions—you know, if the shoe fits, wear it.

Understand it's too late to enroll now, but the lucky ones who first enrolled in the Red Cross course being taught by Dr. Ben Souders are carried away with it.

It really is something more of us should know more about, isn't it? During our recent experience outside of Lubbock when we came upon the accident victim, as I watched the young boy administer artificial respiration, I just asked myself if I would be able to remember how to do that in an emergency. I also thought, what if this man had other wounds, would I be able to administer the RIGHT kind of first aid?

Even around the house, there might be times when you need to use a tourniquet, make a temporary splint, etc. How many of you could do that?

(It's possible Dr. Ben might give another course when this one's finished; if enough people insist, that is. Maybe you're interested?)

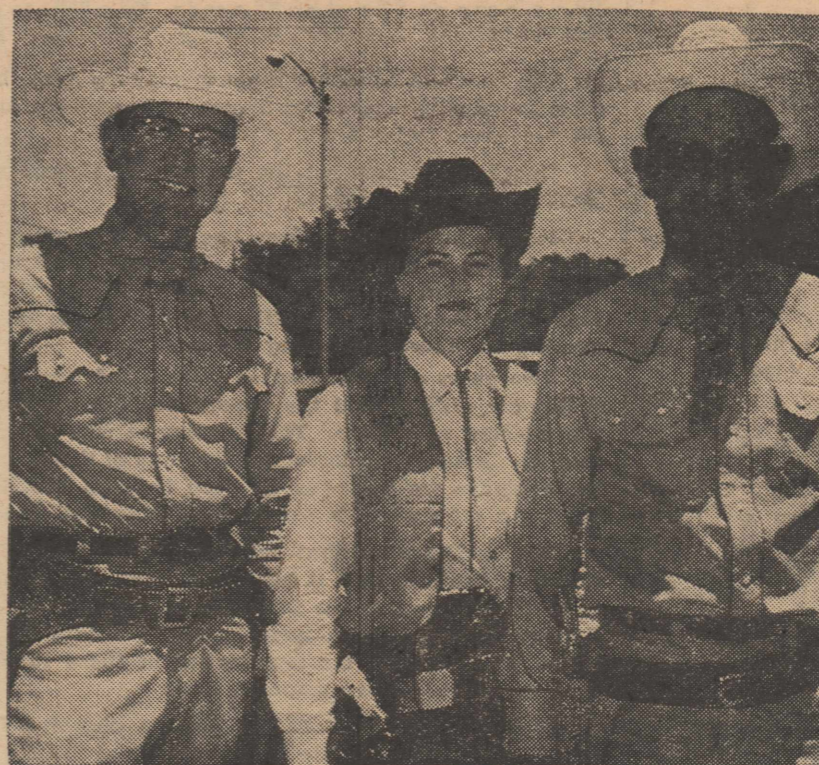

### COTTON RESEARCH UNDERWAY

Research on cotton varieties at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, will consist of observation plots, test plots and variety comparison in acreage plots.

Sixty-one varieties have been planted in observation plots 22 feet long. Each of these 61 varieties are repeated four times on plots in different areas of the 310 acre farm. These cotton varieties are new or untried in this area.

Thirty-four varieties have been planted in one hundred foot plots with four rows to the plot. The tests will be made from the two center rows. The outside rows will not be used because the results might be influenced by the fertilization or irrigation program conducted on the adjoining plots. Each variety plot will be repeated four times. The research results to be determined by the average of the center rows in the four plots.

Eight leading varieties of cotton have been planted for comparison in acreage blocks. These varieties are those now in common use in the High Plains area.
