New Ambulance Service Opens In Plainview

Two Plainview funeral directors have announced plans to discontinue ambulance service. The two firms, for the most part, serve the Olton territory.

They are Lemons Funeral Directors and Wood-Mitchell Funeral Home.

In making the announcement, the two funeral directors pointed out that the area has developed to an extent that specialized ambulance service has become necessary. This service now is to be provided by Plainview Ambulance Service.

In an advertisement appearing elsewhere two numbers are listed for ambulance service. Both are Plainview listings.

"Our facilities will always be of service to this and neighboring communities in case of extreme disaster," the two funeral directors declared in a joint statement. "We feel that we can better serve the funeral needs of the public with this new arrangement," they said.

STOCKHOLDER DIVIDENDS NEAR QUARTER MILLION DOLLARS

PATTERSON, LAMBRIGHT NAMED TO CO-OP BOARD OF DIRECTORS

Olton Co-Op Gin stockholders divided up almost a quarter of a million dollars Saturday night at the annual stockholders meeting held at the gin company warehouse.

Dividend checks handed out brought such disbursement for the season to \$228,804.50.

The company's barbecue dinner was attended by more than 1,100 persons. In the business meeting that followed,

O. E. Patterson and Milford Lambright were elected to the board of directors to succeed C. W. Phillips and Clova Fancher.

H. A. Hysinger, president of the board of directors, presided over the business meeting.

While ballots were being passed out and voting was going on, stockholders heard talks by Roy Davis, Lubbock, manager of the Plains Co-Operative Oil Mill; Don Davis, manager of Plains Cotton Co-Operative Association; John McQuien, manager of the Plainview Co-Op Compress; Alex Williams, auditor from Muleshoe; and Edwin Merriman, Lubbock, auditor.

Mr. Merriman reviewed the history of the gin under the management of Lloyd Graham.

During the 1956-57 season the double battery gin processed 20,647 bales of cotton—a record barely outstripping the previous record of 20,190 in the 1954-55 season.

Ginnings in 1956-57 brought the total ginnings during the past four years to 75,765.

"There's lots of states that don't gin that much," Mr. Merriman declared.

Referring to Lloyd Graham as a million dollar manager, the auditor pointed out that the total earnings of the gin during the past four years come to \$1,085,064.72. He said total dividends paid come to \$729,446.04.

"We were proud to have such a good attendance," declared Mr. Graham.

INSECT MEETING MONDAY—

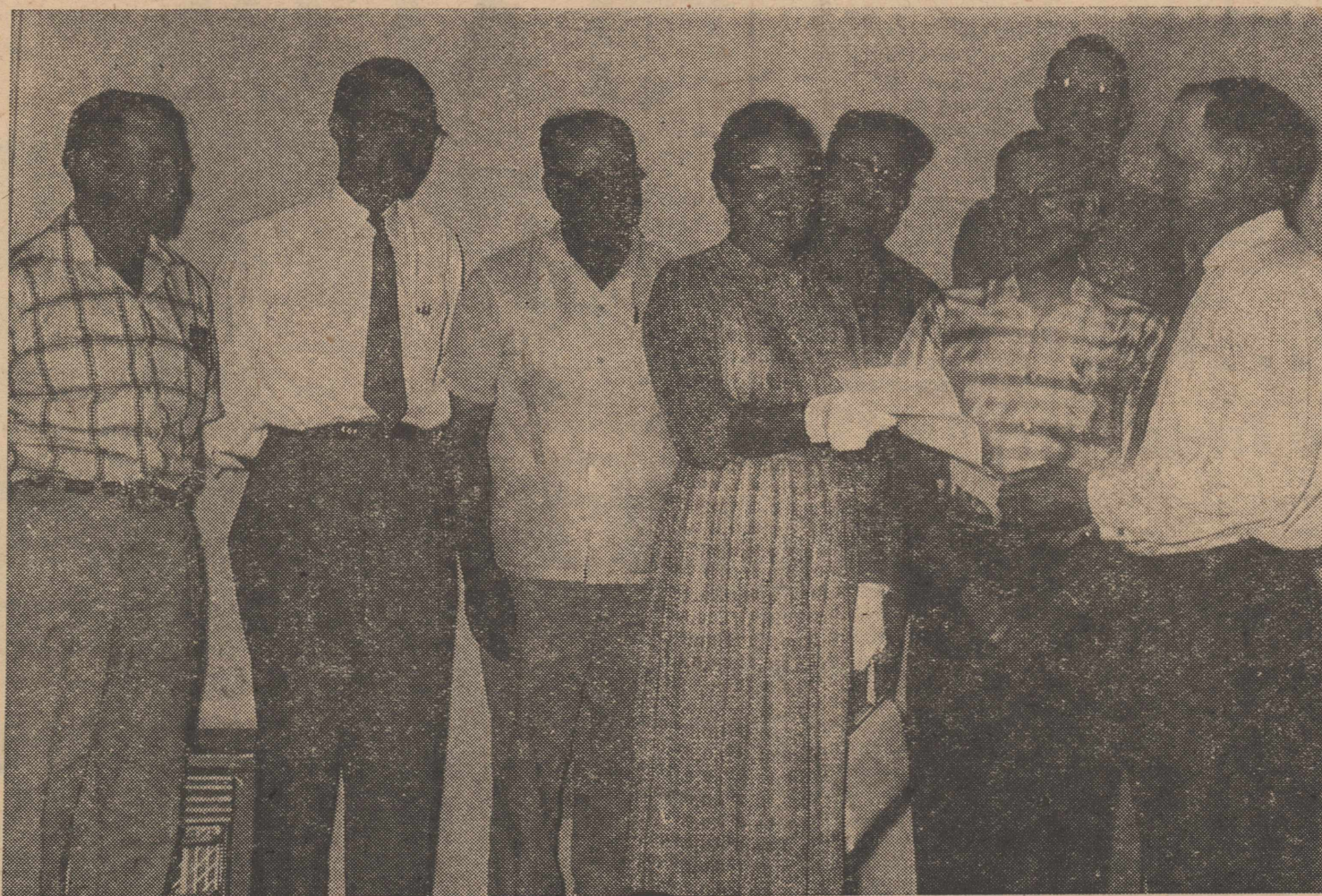

OFS Has New Mixing Machine

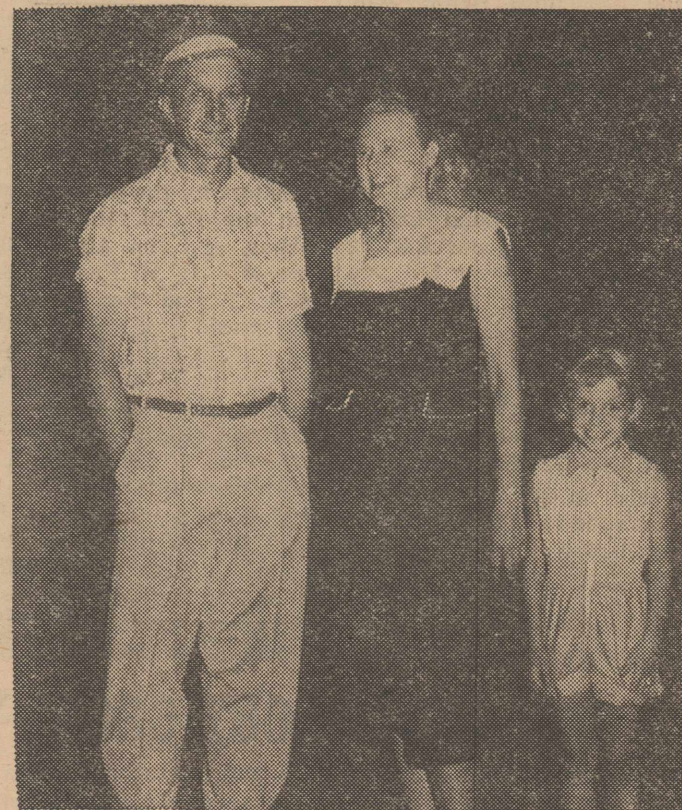
