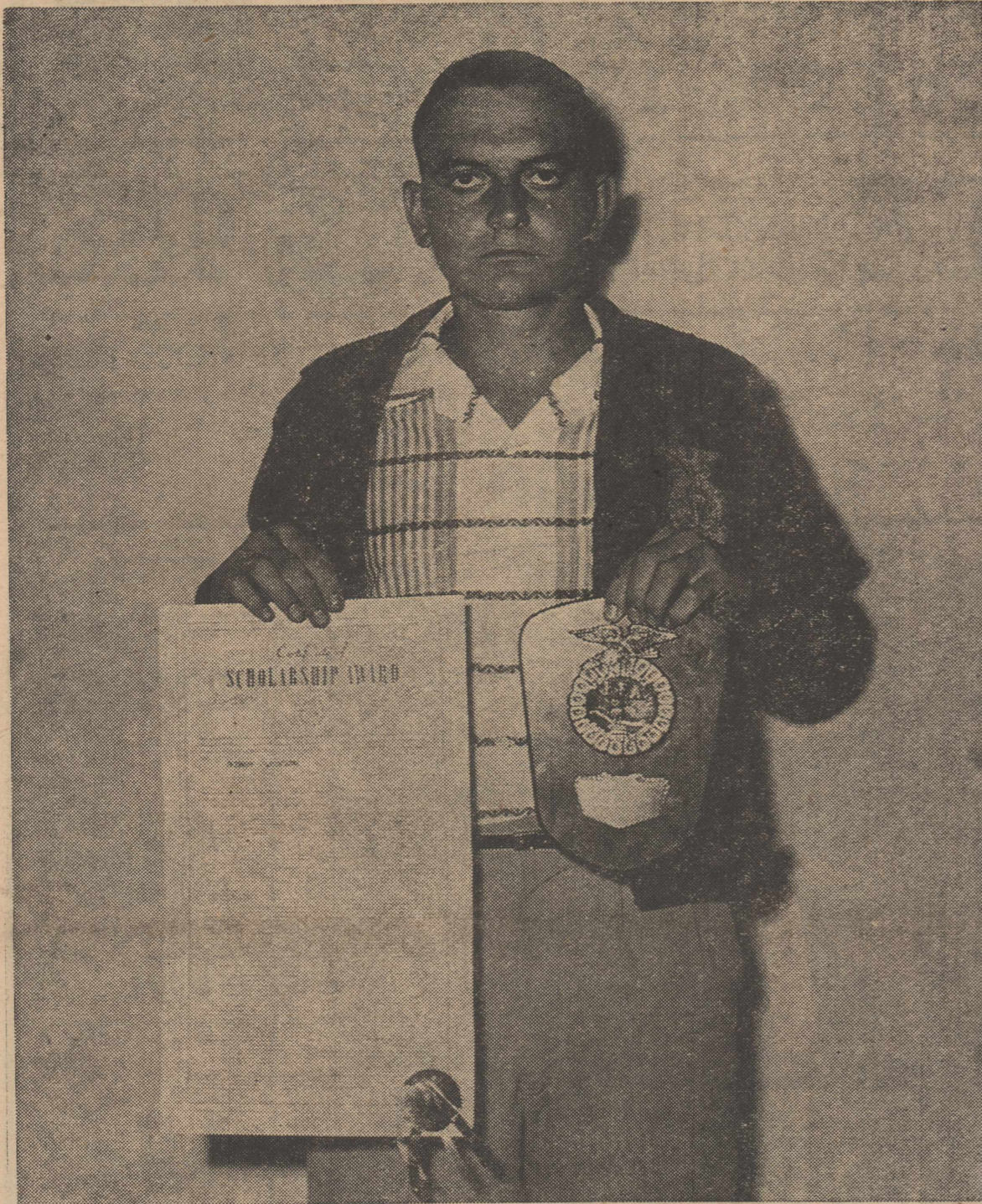

## Olton Patrons Pay Only 22% School Expenses

Olton school patrons may be somewhat surprised to learn that Olton folks pay less than one-fourth of the cost of operating Olton Independent School District.

This is according to a chart prepared by School Supt. Noel Johnson.

The State of Texas shoulders the biggest part of the burden, paying 65 percent of the cost. Last year the state's share came to \$197,625.

Non-resident property owners paid 13 percent or \$39,525. Local property owners paid \$66,888 or 22 percent.

The total 1956-57 budget was \$304,038.

His hand was caught in a power saw. He also suffered lacerations of the hand. He was treated by Dr. B. J. Souder.

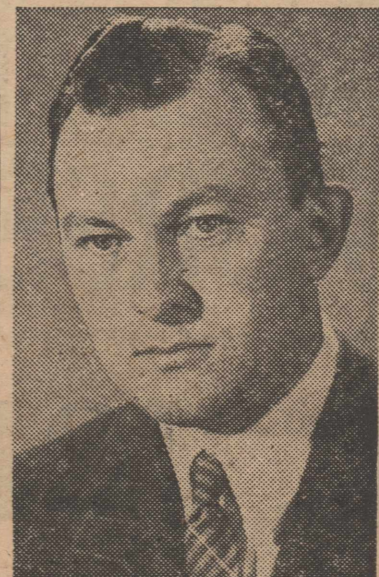
## 4-H Girls Hold Meet

## Farm Bureau President Says Rural Road Program At Stake

Lamb County may well have seen its last mile of farm-to-market road construction if a recommended change in the State's rural road program is approved, Herman Neuenschwander, president of the Lamb County Farm Bureau, has declared.

Neuenschwander said that the Texas Research League is advocating that laws governing construction of farm-to-market roads be changed. In a study made for the Texas Highway Commission, the League said the change would prevent the State from becoming burdened with a rural road program far in excess of its needs. It said that part of the funds earmarked for farm-to-market road construction should be used for maintenance.

"We have many miles of unpaved rural roads right here in Lamb County," Neuenschwander said. "If the rural road program is changed to suit those who want to get our hard-won farm-to-market road building funds, we may never see another mile of country roads paved in the county."

The county farm organization leader said that 26,000 miles of rural roads have been paved under the farm-market rural road program, but that more than 100,000 miles remain unpaved. He pointed out that the \$36 million spent for farm-to-market road construction and improvement last year was less than one-tenth of the total State expenditure on highways.

Neuenschwander charged that the plan to use funds earmarked for construction to pay maintenance costs was a scheme to limit the building of an adequate rural road system. He further contended that rural interests, in lobbying for the rural road program, had to be satisfied with less than the amount thought necessary to finance the program.

**GOC Needs New Members Officers Say**

New members of any age are needed for the Olton Ground Observer Corps. This plea for volunteers came from Mrs. H. H. Shanks, Chief Observer. Although all age groups are needed for the corps, adults are especially needed.

Oklahoma City is the headquarters of the Ground Observers. Olton's corps started on Nov. 6, 1956 when Sgt. Calvin Doyle of Clovis came to Olton to teach training classes in the fire station or in the Legion Hall. Mrs. Shanks, who had studied for a year, is now teaching the classes. These classes must be held until each volunteer earns 25 hours. When the entire group earns these hours, an alert will be held.

Upon earning six hours, members of the corps receive an identification card, and when 25 hours are earned wing pins are given. Hours of observation may be done at home, as well as at training classes.

The purpose of the Ground Observers is to be ready in case of an invasion and to know what to do in such an instance.

Training classes meet each Monday morning at 9:00 o'clock in the new press box at the football field.

### Church Workers

Draped over almost every piece of fence are grape vines, with the delicious fruit growing in abundance. They raise many vegetables in addition to the corn. But

the prettiest areas of the entire plot, are, of course, the flower beds.

"I just counted the other day," Mrs. Sherman boasts, "and I have 25 different kinds of flowers growing here." To name a few, dahlias, bachelor-buttons, marigolds, mums, astors, hibiscus, peonies, pinks, zinnias, peonias, bluebonnets, lilies, phlox.

"We've had lots of ups and

downs in these 50 years," Mrs. Sherman reflects, "but I'd say we've had a happy 50 years. We've shared everything together. He's always helped me in every way. He's been the most wonderful husband anybody in this world ever had."

And as Mr. Sherman smiles at his wife, it's evident he believes he has the most wonderful wife "anybody in this world ever had."

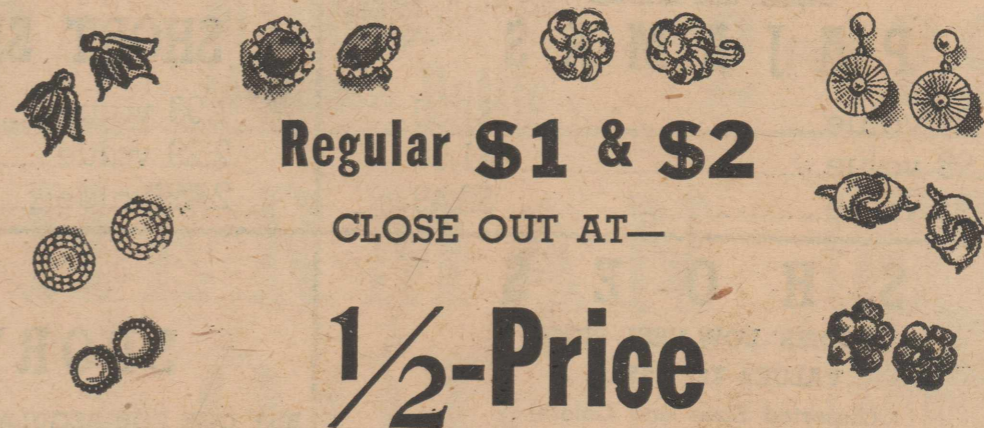
