



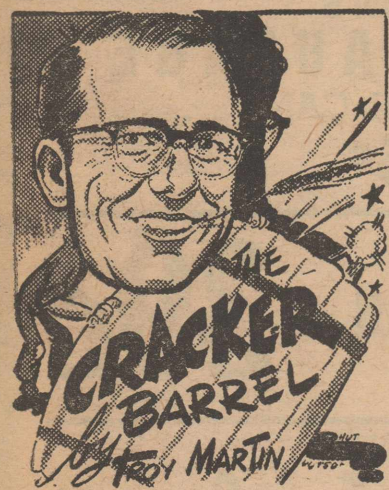

### Olton-Farwell Tilt Of Long Ago Leaves All Others Pale Says Scribe

(Editor's note: This column entitled "Big D" appeared on page one in The Dallas Morning News, January 2. It was written by Paul Crume, DMN columnist who formerly lived at Farwell.)

We watched Baylor and TCU defend their sacred honor on the football sod Tuesday. These were both pretty good games, but we feel bound to say they were not the equal of the Olton-Farwell game out in West Texas back in 1930.

A cold front passed through just before the game started, though nobody knew that was what had happened at the time. We were all ignorant in those days and couldn't really see what had happened. What we thought had happened was that a 60-mile-an-hour north wind had hit and the weather had turned cold.

The football field ran north and south, and the game was one marked by savage line play whenever the players facing the wind could get the sand out of their eyes. It is also the only game we ever heard of where the referee, eyes streaming at the time, vigorously called a personal foul on the head linesman. It was also the game in which an all-time football record for punting backward was set.

You can understand why most football games have seemed colorless to us, having seen that great one.

OUR TEAM lost the toss and had to face the wind the first quarter. At the end of the quarter, the score was 28-0 in favor of Olton. After the teams had changed goals, however, things went better, and the score at the end of the second quarter was 28-28.

It was in that first quarter that our punter set the record for punting backward. He was a tackle named Craig Walling, later an eminent Air Force servant who was pulled out of the line for punting. In those days, a punter did not stand way back to avoid the rushers. He met them man to man, preferably with a foot under the chin, and our man was one of the best. He was a consistent kicker of high 60 and 70-yard punts.

When he kicked the first

time against that wind, everything started out as usual, high and far. After the football had traveled about 20 yards up the field, however, it sort of curled over and floated backward. It landed about 30 yards back of where it had been kicked.

From this was deduced the famous West Texas football law: When on your 1-yard line and facing the wind, do not punt.

IN THE THIRD quarter, while Olton had the wind, the Olton quarterback unwisely attempted to pass and lost the football. Nobody ever found where that football went. This was a near catastrophe as West Texas school boards in those days only appropriated enough money for one ball each season. The game had to be finished with the practice ball, which was the game ball of the year before.

Our team finally won, 77-76, when the referee called a foul on the Olton man holding the ball for point-after-kicks. The referee ruled that the Olton man was merely flipping the ball into the air so it would blow through the uprights, instead of waiting for his kicker to kick it.

Mr. Walthall suffered a dislocated knee, three broken ribs, a shoulder blade fracture and bruises and contusions. He was treated at Olton Memorial Hospital and then transferred to Lubbock Methodist Hospital in an Olton Memorial Hospital ambulance.

the wars combined in which this nation has participated.

"I can remember when the automobile was looked upon with awe," the officer asserted. He went on to declare that the automobile no longer is looked upon with awe as the killer that it can become.

"We have come to look upon traffic deaths as death by natural causes," he said. "It is not death by natural causes. Traffic accidents can be prevented."

He pointed out that 2,547 Texans met death in 1955 in traffic accidents. "And by the time we have the 1956 death toll compiled," he went on, "we will have found that more than 2,600 Texans met death in automobiles—Texans who were just as good drivers as you and I."

He said automobile accidents kill more people than any given dread disease. "People will cooperate in stamping out dread disease," he asserted. "It is harder to get cooperation in stamping out traffic accidents which take their toll in human life."

"... And yet traffic slaughters 8,000 children a year."

Coming back to his original statement that speed is a killer, Officer Marshall emphasized that the greater the speed the more severe the accident.

He cited the Pennsylvania Turnpike where there once was no speed limit. Speed limits brought a corresponding decrease in the traffic death toll there, he said.

"Sometimes people blame car manufacturers for the traffic death rate," he declared. "They are not to blame."

"Sometimes juveniles are blamed. They are not to blame. We adults must face up to the fact that we are to blame. That we teach our children our own bad driving habits."

He stated that car manufacturers actually have lowered the accident death rate by giving us safety glass, four-wheel brakes, safety belts, padded dashes—more horsepower to be used in an emergency.

The traffic scourge is just beginning unless drastic precautions are taken, he asserted.

"We can begin combatting the accident death toll when we adults face up to the fact that it is morally wrong to violate a traffic law," he declared.

"When the public begins voluntarily obeying the law, the death rate will drop.

"Until that time, an enforcement officer every quarter of a mile will not solve the problem."

He also praised driver education as taught in Olton High School. He said it reduces the accident rate about 50 percent and costs only about 37 cents per student.

On January 7th the campaign for investments in the 310 acre, High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway, reached a total of \$159,368.37.

This total included reports from the Big Gifts Committee, headed by R. V. Payne, Plainview; Special Gifts (Fertilizer Organizations) headed by Jason Gordon; Eastern Area and Hale County, Frank Moore, Area Chairman; Castro County, Edd McLeroy and Steve Taylor, co-chairmen; D. M. Granbery, chairman, Olton; Billy Barton, chairman, Springlake; W. L. Edelman, chairman, Friona; Bob Wilson, Bovina; and Jesse Osborne, Area Chairman, Western Counties.

The budget adopted by the executive committee and the advisory council for the five year period totaled \$550,000. Harold Hinn of Plainview, is general chairman of the 19-county area.

Members of the advisory committee in Lamb County are Paul Lewis, Littlefield; I. B. Holt, Olton; D. M. Granbery, Olton; and Jack Yarborough, Amherst, who is also a member of the executive committee of the station.

Campaigns for the station will be organized in Swisher, Floyd, Deaf Smith and Lubbock counties during January and February.

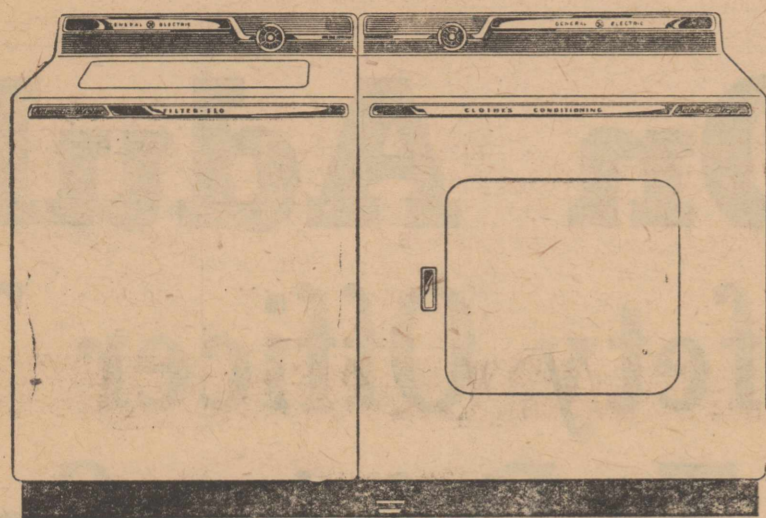

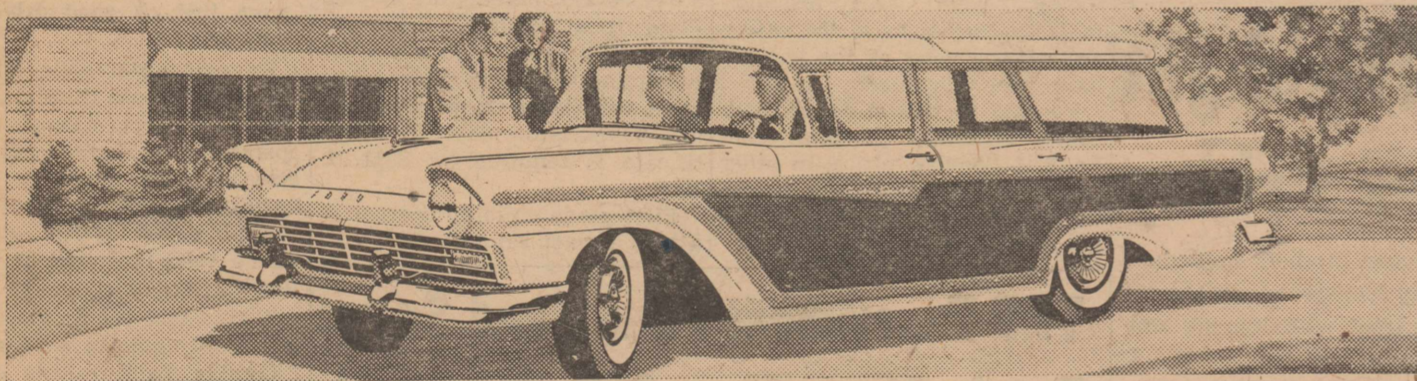
In ill health for the past two years, Mrs. Shull died on December 31 in a Wichita Falls hospital.

**'Burgers And Beans Is The Favorite Menu For 850 Olton School Students**

Is cooking for your family a problem? Get tired of the noise and confusion at mealtime? Just consider the problems of Mrs. Margie Slatten and her cafeteria workers as they face the momentous task of feeding— and pleasing—hundreds of school children five days a week for nine months of the year.

On Thanksgiving Day of 1956, 1,010 students were fed a sumptuous holiday meal—a record high in the 30-year history of the cafeteria. The average number of students taken care of in the cafeteria is 850 with approximately 225 of these in grades eight and above. About 60 per cent of the younger children are brought back for milk in the afternoon.

The cafeteria seats 325 at a time and a staggered lunch hour is scheduled from 11 o'clock to 12:30. Students in the first four grades pay 30 cents for their meal and others pay 35 cents. Five cents per lunch is received from the federal government. A maximum of 20 free lunches per day are supplied to needy children, after a check with the County Welfare Board as to true need.

"Margie", as all Olton children and adults call her, claims that the children's favorite foods seem to be hamburgers and brown beans. On hamburger day, 130 pounds of meat are prepared; the children "build their own" which adds more appeal to the meal. One hundred pounds of brown beans are cooked on "bean day." Milk is drunk in quantity—1300 half-pints when chocolate milk is served and 1100 when sweet milk is served. Until children reach the 8th grade, they are accompanied to the cafeteria by their teachers. According to Margie, the children are well-behaved in spite of the unavoidable din which is part and parcel of the kitchen and dining room during the lunch hour.

Cafeteria workers now number thirteen. At lunchtime, four are in the dining room taking tickets, serving milk, waiting on tables; seven serve the food from the steam tables; and two operate the automatic dishwasher.

Food preparations get underway at six o'clock in the morning, at which time Margie usually bakes her cakes and bread. Most of the other employees check in at eight o'clock. Following the noon meal, they prepare for the next day as much as possible, such as mixing dry ingredients for bread and cake. Present cafeteria workers are,

in addition to supervisor Margie, who took over in 1942, Mesdames A. B. Adams, Ozia Brothers, W. C. Dennis, Anne C. Grimes, Connie Johnson, Ruth King, Jettie Lawson, Virginia Miller, Ruby Ozment, Oleta Priest, Mae Scheller, and Mr. Pink Lawson. Substitutes are Mrs. Dial Henley and Mrs. Paul Featheringill.

These workers' period of service varies from two to fifteen years.

From 1926 through 1949, the school cafeteria was sponsored by the Parent-Teacher Association. In the initial year, the P-TA bought kerosene stoves, tables and benches, and the cafeteria was set up in the old gym under the supervision of Mrs. Mattie Moore, now deceased.

In the next years, the cafeteria underwent several moves—first to a two-room frame build-
