OLTON STOCK SHOW OPENS

Show Promises To Be Biggest Yet Declares Agriculture Instructor

Bigger and better!
This is the slogan of the 12th annual Olton FFA, 4-H Club and FHA Stock Show to be staged here this week-end.

To say bigger and better when referring to the Olton Stock Show is to utter the proverbial mouthfull because the Olton show already enjoys the reputation of being one of the "biggest little shows" in the state.

In spite of this, J. C. Lane and Harold Warren, vocational agriculture instructors, declare that the 1957 show promises to be the biggest yet.

Mr. Lane said he expects between 80 and 100 fat barrow entries and between 25 and 30 breeding swine. These will represent the six major meat type breeds, he said.

There will be between 40 and 50 swine exhibitors. Mr. Lane said one major change has been made in the

swine show for this year. Lightweight swine will range between 180 and 209 pounds and heavyweights between 210 and 240.

"We made this change primarily to get more in line with the market demands," Mr. Lane declared.

There will be between 35 and 40 fat lambs representing the Southdown, Shropshire and Hampshire breeds. "We expect

about 25 head of breeding sheep also," Mr. Lane reported. Some of the lambs in the show won outstanding awards at the Amarillo Livestock Show earlier this year.

In the breeding sheep class, the grand champion Hampshire ewe and ram and the grand champion Shropshire ewe and ram from last year's Houston show will be exhibited here.

Mr. Lane said between 20 and 25 milk fed calves will be shown and about 20 head of commercial steers will be in pens outside the show barn.

There have been slight changes in the calf show rules this year. Lightweight steers will be 650 to 899 pounds and heavyweight from 900 to 1150. This was done to more evenly divide the calves into classes, Mr. Lane said.

There also will be a rabbit and poultry division for 4-H and FFA boys and girls.

Judge for the stock show this year will be Stanley Anderson of the Texas Tech animal husbandry department. "We feel very fortunate to have Mr. Anderson judge our show as he is very much in demand at major state and national shows," declared Mr. Lane.

Mr. Anderson has coached several winning livestock judging teams for Texas Tech.

Sifting will be done by Willard Smith at 5:30 o'clock Thursday afternoon. Mr. Smith also is a member of the Tech animal husbandry staff. He has done considerable judging at state and district shows and fairs during the past year.

Poultry and rabbits again will be judged by Elmo Hall. Raymond Aiken and Gene Harris of Plainview will cry the sale at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon.

Last year's show sale was something of a record, according to Mr. Lane. Grand champion calf brought 75 cents a pound and the reserve champion went for 50 cents a pound.

The grand champion barrow was sold for 75 cents a pound and the reserve champion brought 60 cents.

The grand champion lamb sold for \$1.25 a pound and the reserve \$1.15. The remainder of the calves averaged around 35 cents, hogs 34 cents and sheep 36 cents.

Thursday was to be spent in weighing in and sifting animals. Grand opening of the show is to be at 10 o'clock Friday morning.

Judging of rabbits and poultry was to be at 11 o'clock as will be the judging of fat lambs. Judging of swine will be at 1 o'clock Friday afternoon and breeding sheep will be judged at 4 o'clock.

Commercial steers will be graded at 10 o'clock Saturday morning. The FFA cake sale cried by J. W. Brown will be at 11 o'clock. Judging of fat steers will be at 1 o'clock.

RULES CHANGED

"If a farm employer pays a farm worker \$150 or more in cash during 1957, the cash pay is covered by the law, Hutton stated.

Great Depression Engineer At It Again Declares Speaker Rayburn

Ex-President Herbert Hoover has another depression brewing! This grim declaration came recently from Speaker of the House Sam Rayburn as he talked to a delegation of Texas Farmers Union members, among whom were Carl Hooper and Tom Carlisle of Olton.

"He worked us into one depression and he's still the 'Great Engineer,'" accused Texas Sam alluding to aging Hoover. Mr. Hooper and Mr. Carlisle were members of a 38-man delegation which made the trip from Wichita Falls to Washington the latter part of January.

They left Wichita Falls Friday, January 25 and arrived the following Sunday morning. They spent the first two days sight-seeing and then got down to business.

Their first business was with the Department of Interior where they heard the government's Hells Canyon, Idaho, "give away" and the Oregon timber give away deal defended by a department employee.

They visited the Treasury Department and saw money being printed. Mr. Carlisle said money was packaged 4,000 bills to the package.

Then they contacted senators and representatives. They talked to Senators Johnson and Blakeley. Mr. Hooper said both men were sympathetic to the cause of agriculture.

"We went up there to give them our views on the price squeeze on agriculture," declared Mr. Hooper. "Everything we have to buy is going up and what we have to sell is going down. That's what we were up there about."

After visiting with Blakeley and Johnson the delegation (Minnesota, Texas and North Dakota were represented) toured the Supreme Court and the Library of Congress.

They talked to Congressman George Mahon. He was just coming out of a committee meeting as the group arrived. Mr. Carlisle said the Congressman listened but seemed to be preoccupied.

The Olton men said they met hostility only in the agriculture department. There the atmosphere seemed to be clouded with an unfriendly attitude.

"The Representatives said they appreciated our coming to the capitol and said they want us to write to them about our views," said Mr. Carlisle.

He pointed out that congressmen from states who send delegations of farmers to Washington have voted more consistently for legislation benefiting the farmer than have congressmen from states which have not sent delegations.

She received the highest score in a written examination on homemaking knowledge and attitudes taken by graduating girls in Olton High School.

Her examination paper now will be entered in competition with those of 635 other school winners to name this state's candidate for the title of All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow and will also be considered for the runnerup award in the state. For her achievement, she will receive an award pin designed by Trifari of New York.

Each state winner will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and an educational trip with her school advisor to Washington, D.C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York City. A \$500 scholarship will be awarded the runnerup girl in each state. The school of the state winner receives a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica.

More than 300,000 young women in 11,636 of the nation's public, private and parochial schools participated in the third annual Search sponsored by General Mills. The program is designed to assist schools in education for home and family living and to emphasize through a sound scholarship award program the personal qualities and sense of values necessary to successful homemaking. A total of \$106,000 in scholarships will be awarded.
