Public School Week To Be Spotlited D. Y. Ray Announces For Mayor By Open House And Program Tuesday G. H. Bley Says He Won't Run

In observance of Texas Public School Week, which is officially proclaimed for the first full week in March, a special program has been planned for Tuesday evening, March 5, in connection with the regular visitation procedure at the schools.

An open house at the Olton schools will be held from 7 to 8 p.m. Tuesday. Parents and other interested citizens are invited to tour the school plant and to visit their children's rooms. Teachers will be on hand in their respective rooms and students' work will be on display.

At 8 o'clock in the high school auditorium, a program will get underway with a short concert by the Cadet Band under the direction of Fred Stockdale. Numbers included in the concert will be "Activity March", "Big Rock Candy Mountain" and "Camp-town Races."

Highlighting the evening will be an old-fashioned spelling bee. Four Lions Club members will compete against four Parent-Teacher Association members and seventh and eighth grade students will spell against high school students.

Following the spelling bee, readings will be given by two declamation students, Judith Chester will give "Life's Mirror" and Harvie Jordan will deliver, "The Road to Vagabondia."

Vocal numbers by a student quartet will climax the program. Tentative quartet members and accompanist are De Veryl Daugherty, Barbara Jones, Anita Sorley, Sandie Loveless, and Janice Ford.

Rounding out the evening of education and entertainment, an art exhibit sponsored by the P-TA will be open in the school gymnasium following the program for the benefit of those who would like the opportunity to view 150 large colored reproductions of the Old and Modern Masters. Proceeds from the small admission charge will be used entirely for the purchase of pictures for the school.

Supt. Carl Macon, in announcing the special program, emphasized that all parents, students, and school patrons are cordially invited to attend. This evening program was arranged by a representative group including school officials, faculty members, student officers, and P-TA and Lions Club members for the purpose of increasing community interest in Public School Week.

School visitation is encouraged throughout the week Monday through Thursday. School will not be in session on Friday, March 8, due to the West Texas State Teachers meeting in Lubbock on that date.

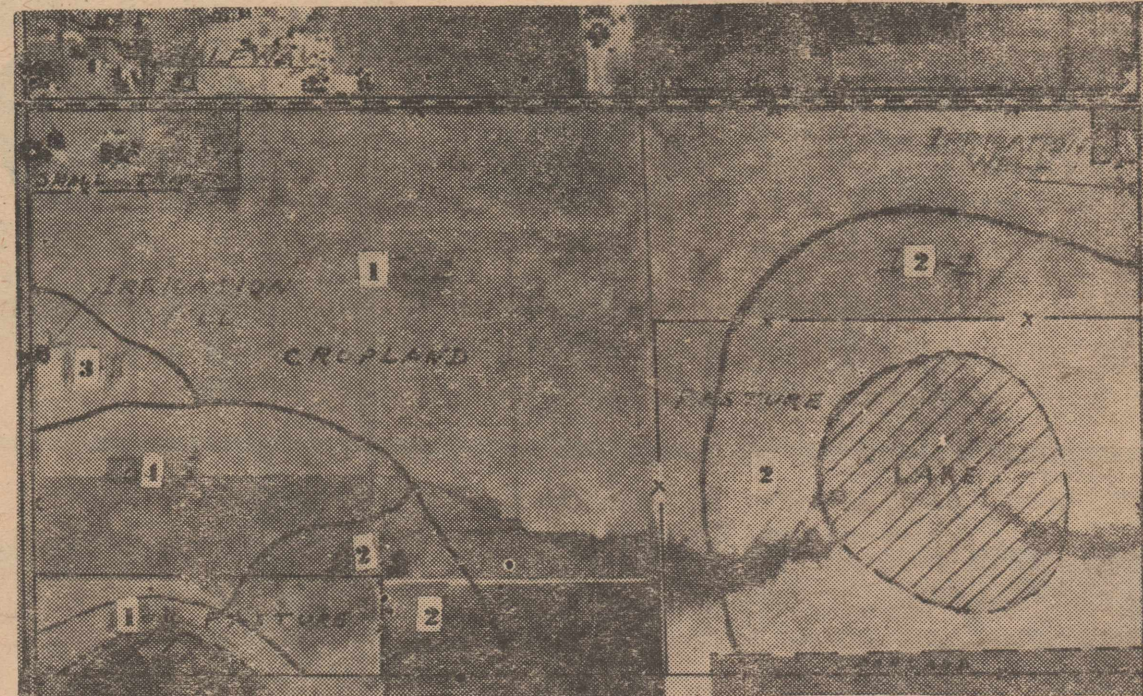
P-TA To Sponsor Art Exhibit In Gym March 4-7

In an effort to obtain pictures for the Olton schools, an Art Exhibit sponsored by the local Parent-Teacher Association will be held next week in the school gymnasium.

One hundred and fifty fine prints, furnished by the Colonial Art Company of Oklahoma City, will be on display Monday through Wednesday from 2 to 4 o'clock each afternoon. Plans also include the opening of the exhibition Thursday afternoon before and after the regular P-TA meeting in the auditorium. P-TA members will keep the exhibit open during the designated hours.

An admission charge of 35 cents for adults and 15 cents for students is being made, the entire amount going to the school picture fund. Tickets are being sold by school students.

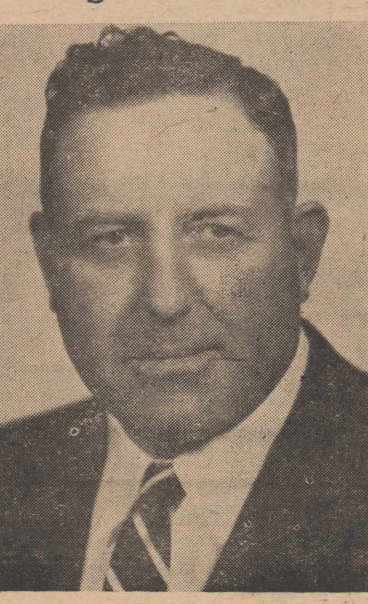

The key is: (1) This large section of the farm is deep, fine textured, slowly permeable Pullman clay loam soil with no to one per cent slope and no slight erosion. (2) These two areas of the site are the same as No. 1, except they have one to three per cent slope. (3) This small area on the west side of the half section, which includes the irrigation well, has deep medium textured, slowly permeable Amarillo clay loam soil with no to one per cent slope and little or no erosion. (4) This area is the same as No. 3, except that the slope is one to three per cent. Research plots will be located in the area along Highway 70. Signs will indicate type of research being conducted. The second irrigation well is to be located just south of the cemetery and it is planned to connect the two wells with underground pipe. Some dry land research will also be conducted. A temporary office and a storage shed are located west of the Baptist Church on an acre that has been purchased by TRF. Permanent buildings, including an office building, processing and storage building, and a greenhouse are expected to be located just east of the Baptist Church along Highway 70.

1957 Olton Red Cross Quota To Be Sought On One-Day Drive March 5

Truitt Sides, chairman of the Lamb County Red Cross chapter, has announced that local workers will attempt to raise Olton's 1957 quota of \$1,490 in a one-day concentrated drive on Tuesday, March 5.

This feat has been accomplished for the past four years in succession, Mr. Sides stated, "We appreciate this past cooperation and appeal for continued support of the Red Cross. Our quota is larger this year because of floods on the East and West coasts and in Tennessee, Kentucky, and other mid-eastern states."

Elmo Bryant is the Olton fund campaign chairman. Twenty-five men will work in teams covering the city and rural areas.

A county fund campaign organization meeting is scheduled for Thursday night, February 28, in Littlefield, where workers will receive materials and instructions.

Lamb County's goal is set at \$9,983. Of this amount \$6,000 will remain in the county and \$3,983 is earmarked for the national fund.

Other Lamb County board members include the Rev. Arthur Hunt of Littlefield, county fund chairman; Mrs. Bonnie Harber of Pleasant Valley, fund co-chairman; and Mrs. Lyle Brandon, executive secretary.

Clovis Poteet is the local representative to the chapter.

Mr. Sides, prominent civic worker in the community, has the longest record of service among the board members, having served with the county chapter since the early '40s.

The Lamb County Red Cross report for 1956 showed, among other accomplishments, that a total of 393 cases were handled during the year with financial assistance in the amount of \$1,391.80 given to 82 cases.

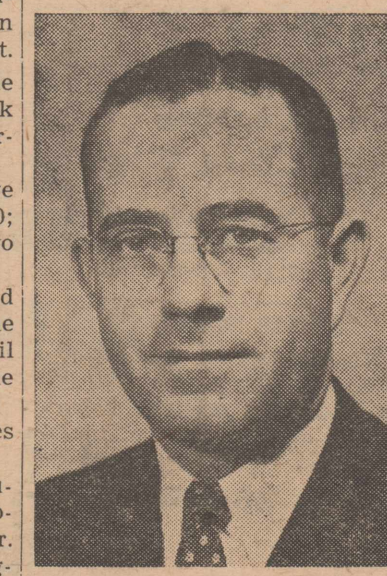

Services Held For Grandmother Of Mrs. J. Fite

Last rites were read for Mrs. James G. Curry of Colorado City, grandmother of Mrs. James Fite of this city, in the Main Street Church of Christ Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Mrs. Curry, 84, passed away Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock in Olton Memorial Hospital where she had been a patient since January 30, at which time she was moved from Root Memorial Hospital in Colorado City by her granddaughter.

The former Barzetti Loftin, she was born May 20, 1872, at Cisco, Tex., in Eastland County. She moved with her parents, the J. T. Loftins, to Navasota where she met and married James Gettins Curry on Dec. 29, 1897. Twelve children were borne to them, nine of whom are still living.

In 1898 the Currys and five children left Grimes County in a covered wagon to homestead in Indian territory, settling in Tillman County, Okla. They lived there until 1925 when they purchased a small portion of the old Spade Ranch. A few years later they remained until they moved to the Rio Grande valley in the early '30s.

After her husband's death in 1925, Mrs. Curry moved to Colorado City, near her birthplace.

She is survived by a sister, Mrs. Milly Fulton, Shiro; three sons, E. H. Shafter, Calif., C. G. McNeal, Ariz., T. Jefferson, Houston; six daughters, Mrs. Roy Lamb, Fresno, Calif., Mrs. A. J. Smith, Plainview, Mrs. Roy Morris, San Marcos, Mrs. Jack McCarty, Donna, and Mrs. Edd Bidwell, Wichita, Kan.; 20 grandchildren, 29 great-grandchildren, and one great-great-grandchild.

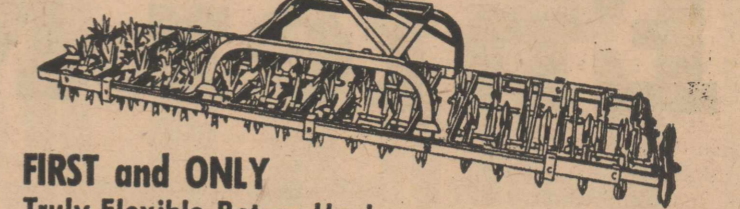

Put Phosphate Deep In Soil Spain Advises

Don Spain, local farm store operator, says phosphates should be placed deep on cotton land. The phosphates, unlike the nitrates, he said, move very little with the soil moisture. If you place 0-45-0, or 0-20-0, a mixed phosphate and nitrogen fertilizer in the top 2 or 3 inches of soil, that's where they will be next summer when the top soil may be too dry for a plant root to feed in it. He said deep placement stimulates deeper root development. This means a more drought tolerant plant. You will have more time between watering and moisture stress in the plant. Mr. Spain said he recommends deep placement of phosphates in a band on a 40-inch or 20-inch spacing, reducing the amount of phosphate that comes in contact with the soil. This helps eliminate much of the tie up of phosphate in some types of soil, such as we have at Olton and surrounding areas. The correct use of phosphates will mean more money to you when you harvest your cotton next fall, Mr. Spain declared.

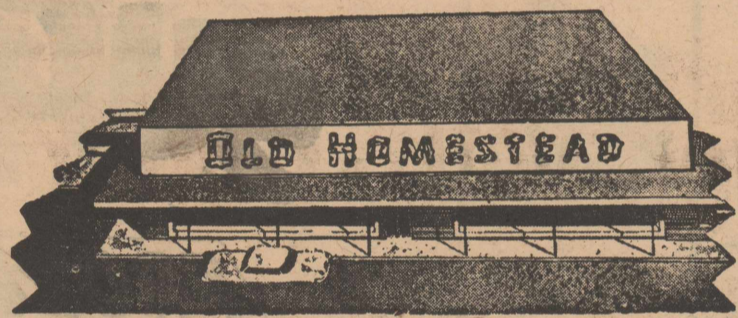

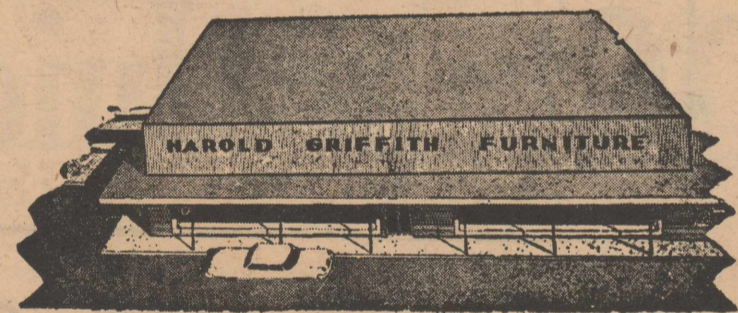


