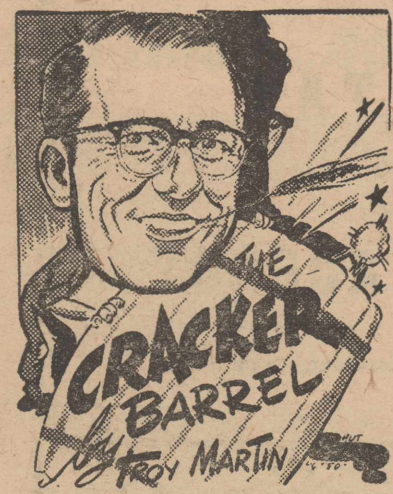

## THIEF TAKES \$330 FROM SUPERETTE

A thief who may have been locked in the building at closing time made off with an estimated \$330 in cash from Olton Superette.

Deputy Sheriff V. L. Smith and Police Chief Vernie Head are investigating.

The theft took place a week ago Tuesday. It was not reported in last week's Enterprise at the request of officers who said they were checking out a hot lead at that time and did not want premature publicity to flush the suspect.

The foregoing is a statement of policy of this newspaper. And since this is a statement of policy let us make another point clear.

## WOMAN DEAD WHEN PHYSICIAN ARRIVES AT SCENE OF MISHAP

A Lubbock man has been charged in the death of a Lubbock woman who was killed when the pickup truck in which they were riding overturned near here Friday night. Dead is Jo Nell Shelly, 29 years old. The attending physician said the woman was killed instantly.

The accident occurred about 2 miles south of Olton on Farm to Market Road 304.

Police say charges have been filed against Marvin James Stone, 37 years old, Lubbock.

The complaint was signed by Highway Patrolman Floyd Cavin and was filed in the Justice Court of Judge Louis Schreier of Olton.

Stone was released from Lamb County jail on a bond of \$2,000.

Officers said the pickup truck was traveling south on Farm to Market 304 at the time of the mishap. Patrolmen said indications are that the vehicle was on the wrong side of the road and then pulled back to the right only to cross the side of the highway and go into the ditch.

At this point the pickup overturned.

Authorities said they believe the Shelly woman was thrown from the truck and then that the truck may have rolled over her.

The complaint against Stone specifically alleges that he "did drive and operate a motor vehicle on a public highway while under influence of intoxicating beverage. Caused the death of Jo Nell Shelly."

Officers said Stone was employed by a septic tank cleaning firm of Lubbock and had been to Hale Center.

## TRF Offices Moved To Halfway

The office of the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation is now located just west of the research station site in Halfway.

The staff of the station moved from their temporary office at 704½ W. 5th, Plainview, on February 28. Increased tempo of activity at the 310-acre research farm made the early move necessary.

An acre of land just west of the station was purchased from Marvin Dean in February. A residence has been converted to an office. As soon as funds become available, a headquarters building will be erected on the south side of Highway 70, just east of the Halfway Baptist Church. The present office will then become the residence of a station employee.

Construction of an equipment storage barn is underway on the new acre site. The second irrigation well is being drilled on the east side of the 310-acre research farm. All the land has been plowed and is being floated, getting ready for the first year of research.

Leases on the site were completed January 9. This late season start is compelling the scientists and staff to work at high speed to "catch up."

Jerry Kemp, 7 years old, son of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Kemp, suffered serious injuries Thursday afternoon when he was struck by a car near the Olton school.

The boy was in x-ray at Olton Memorial Hospital. Relatives say he may have suffered an arm dislocation, collar bone fracture and pelvis fracture. Further details were not available.

Musings of the moment... We were just contemplating how dreary life could be at times minus a sense of humor. Of all the characteristics peculiar to the human race that we would be most reluctant to give up, that particular one would be among the top.

Humor has been defined as the salt of life and life without this salt would be highly unsavory. Nothing has quite the power of an exercised sense of humor to relieve the stress of a serious or uncomfortable situation. At times it seems that everyday living has become so complicated and hectic until suddenly we're bogged down in a rut of depression and heavy indecision... that's the time to call our sense of humor to the front to straighten us out. Problems will then assume their proper proportions allowing us to continue with renewed zest and sense of accomplishment. Yes, humor truly "clears the air" and acts as a tonic to our sluggish spirits.

There's no remaining doubt—inflation is REALLY here. Our First Grader came in last week dissatisfied with the pennies in her Penny Loafers... she indignantly explained that the "other girls" are now wearing nickels in their loafers... says they "shine better."

Heretofore, our only trouble was that the pennies needed replacing so often that we suspected her of robbing her shoes for bubble gum. If the penny

barrier is broken (so far we're holding fast), we just might find another use for airplane glue.

But we might as well face it—it may be that the Penny Loafer, beloved of school girls all over the land, will join the ranks of the good five-cent cigar, the nickel cup of coffee (praise be our hometown!) and the penny postcard.

And if you think that a five-cent cup of coffee isn't a rarity, just watch the expression on a stranger's face as he receives his change from the cashier in a local cafe. He's SURE there must be a mistake.

As we wind up the first week in March which is designated as Texas Teacher Appreciation Week as well as Public School Week, we need to stop our woolgathering and take a long, hard look at our attitudes and thinking on our school and teacher situation.

Instead of sitting on the sidelines and tossing out criticism and easy advice, we should make every effort to understand the many problems that beset our school board and school officials.

As far as our physical school plant is concerned, we are all aware of greater and lesser degrees that the time is nearing for action. Our requirements are already straining our present facilities and the situation will become more pressing in the ensuing years. So our community will have to come to grip with school needs as other communities have successfully done.

The National Citizens' Commission for the Public Schools began its work in 1949. At that time there were only a dozen or so local citizens' committees in the country. Now there are 10,000. Some were appointed by government agencies or simply invited by a government body to help with a specific problem. But most of these citizens' groups were initiated by the school boards or by school superintendents who invited them to work

with them to solve various problems concerning the schools.

As far as our teachers are concerned, most of us need a fresh outlook. A local teacher, much beloved in the community, handed us an article this week entitled "Take the Teacher In." It emphasized that a teacher should be treated as a person, not just as a source of knowledge.

Thinking of the size of a teacher's salary and the size of her classes is important, but actually not as important as remembering that teachers are human and that they, too, need encouragement, appreciation, and friendship.

Many of our Olton teachers are "homefolks", but what about new teachers moving to our community? If we are thoughtful, we will help a new teacher to feel a part of the community, invite her to church, to our homes, and help her to meet congenial friends. Teachers want to enjoy life just as the rest of us do and their every contact with parents should not center around

the children's problems in school.

According to this excellent article concerning the needs of teachers, "The best schools are those where there is a joint program between the school and the home; where the teachers and parents know each other and work together; where parents are a part of the school—not only as guests, but as co-planners and co-workers; and where teachers are a part of the community—not as classroom teachers, but as friends of the parents and the pupils."
