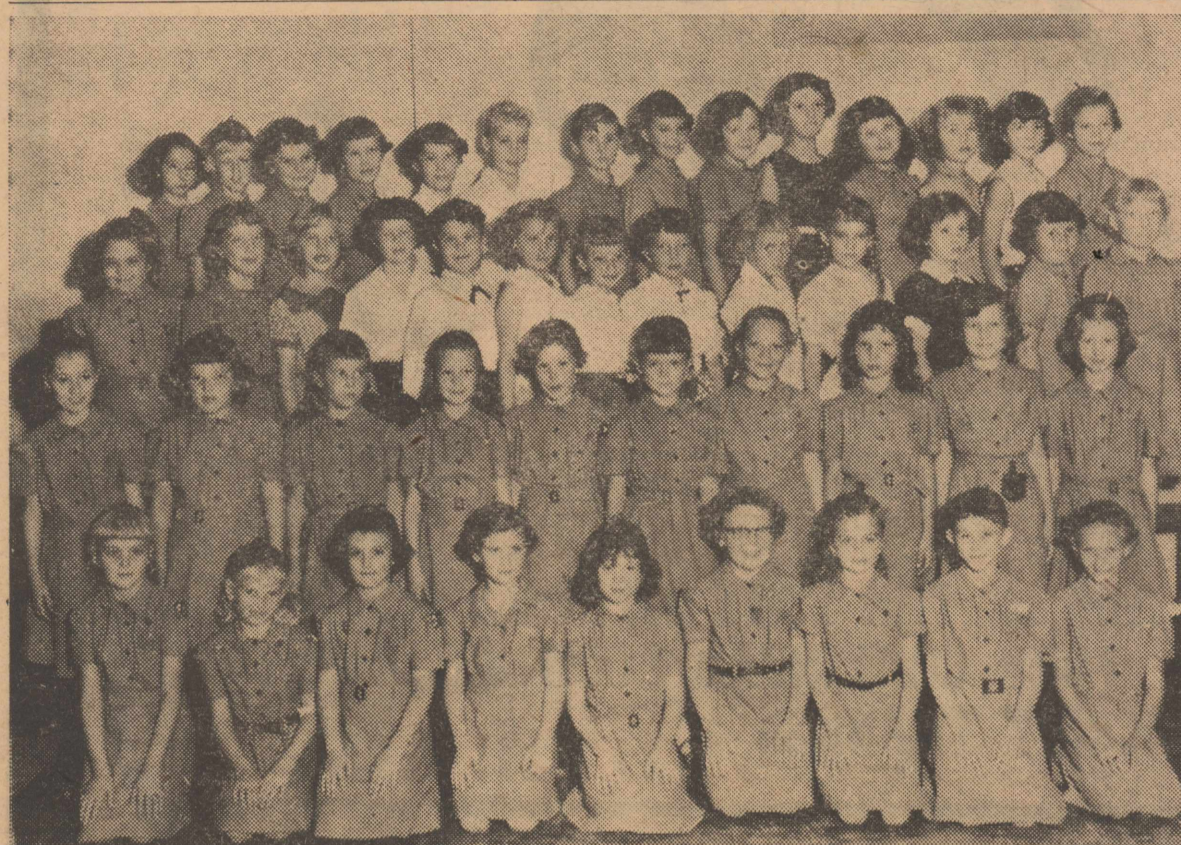

Mrs. Spain said the pullets, all DeKalb hybrid layers, should begin production by the time they are 20 weeks old. Mrs. Spain reports that the pullets have been debeaked and vaccinated for Newcastle and fowl pox. She said the pullets are ideal both as cage hens and ground layers. Mr. and Mrs. Spain have carefully supervised the care of the pullets since the chickens arrived at the Spain farm. Mrs. Spain said some 400 of the pullets already have been sold and the remainder will be available next Monday.

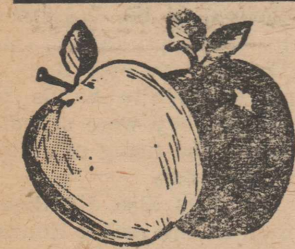

KAY GRANBERY AND BILL BOVERIE TO PARTICIPATE IN RECOGNITION SERVICE

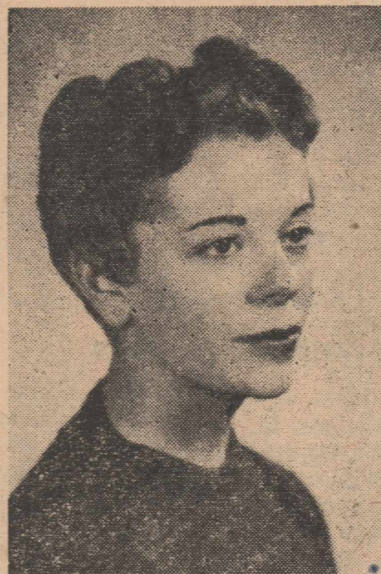

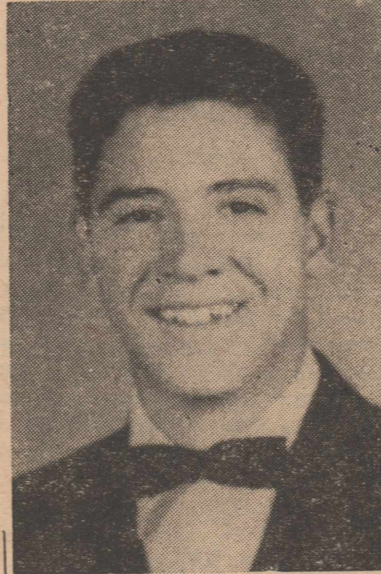

Why, I remember when the expression, "That's a good deal!" became so popular—back during World War II. And it's one of the fads which has become permanent, because "good deals" are still being made every day.

Another from the '40s was "rooty-toot." No, it wasn't some of that jitterbug language, exactly. It was just a good, snappy thing to say when you couldn't think of anything else to say. And nobody knew the difference. For a while, And then they began to catch on, so "rooty-toot" lost its purpose.

Remember the "gismo?" I still don't know how the word originated. But there was a time when it sufficed for anything of

which you did not know the name. Lots more, of course. In fact, if I were less indisposed to exertion, I might make a hobby of collecting old words, phrases, colloquialisms, provincialisms. Still might do it some day . . .

Do your children just talk all the time? Especially when YOU'RE trying to converse? My dear! Don't tell them to hush, or refer to it as yak-yak, or ask them to be quiet. Just remind them not to be so loquacious!

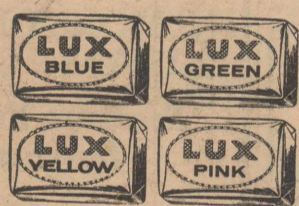

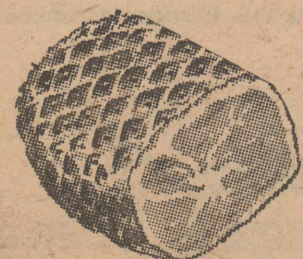
