Raymon Long Suffers Serious Burns In Anhydrous Ammonia Accident Fri.

Fertilizer Dealers Discuss Plans For Safety Meeting Here Soon

Raymon Long suffered serious chemical burns Friday afternoon when he came into contact with anhydrous ammonia with which he was working.

The accident took place about 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon at the Long farm, 4 1/2 miles southwest of Olton.

Quick thinking by Don Spain and Jack Bristol probably saved Mr. Long from even more serious injury.

Club Queen Contest Set By Lions

Olton Lions Club Tuesday appointed a committee of three to work out details for the annual Lions Club queen contest.

Members of the committee are George Redinger, David Tullis and Jack Bristol.

As of Wednesday night Mr. Long was in Olton Memorial Hospital being treated for first and second degree burns. His condition was described as greatly improved.

Mr. Bristol gives this account of the accident.

Mr. Long, Mr. Spain and Mr. Bristol were filling an anhydrous ammonia applicator tank from a nurse tank. Anhydrous ammonia is used as fertilizer here.

Don and Jack were on the ground and Raymon was on top of the tank. They had been unable to open the valve on the nurse tank and Raymon was about to try with a wrench when the pop off valve on the nurse tank suddenly opened.

(The pop off valve is a safety device and opened under overload pressure as it should have done.)

Raymon was directly over the pop off valve.

"He got the full strength of it," Mr. Bristol reported.

"He fell off the 6-foot tank to the ground and hit me," Mr. Bristol continued. "I got some of the fumes in my eyes and couldn't see him."

"He started for the house."

Don and Jack finally managed to stop the injured man. Don rushed to the house and returned with a pail of water and threw on Raymon.

They also doused him with water from the lawn sprinkler, which luckily was on at the time. They treated him with vinegar as first aid and then rushed him in a car to Olton Memorial Hospital.

Physicians at the hospital said Mr. Long had inhaled the anhydrous. Both eyes were burned, the right eye having been burned most seriously.

Mr. Long had suffered first and second degree burns about the left leg, left chest, arm and face.

As an aftermath, Olton firms selling anhydrous ammonia began making plans for a safety meeting.

Full details on the meeting, at which safe handling of anhydrous ammonia will be discussed by experts, will be announced in next week's Enterprise.

Royce McFadden Exhibits Champion Lamb in South Plains Stock Show

With Royce McFadden winning championship honors with his Hampshire lamb in the medium wool class, Olton FFA boys captured 23 places in the South Plains Fat Stock Show held at the Lubbock fairgrounds March 16-20.

Dale Elms of Elms Equipment Co. paid \$2.30 a pound for Royce's champion lamb.

The Olton FFA Chapter was awarded the showmanship award given the chapter putting on the best display.

In the lamb division, Royce exhibited the champion Hampshire lamb in the medium wool class and a second place heavyweight Hampshire lamb.

Derryll Dennis placed first with heavyweight Southdown, Jackie Pinson placed seventh and ninth and John Paul Jones placed thirteenth with their Southdowns. Houston Hamby showed the third and fourth place heavyweight Southdown and the fifth and sixth lightweight Southdown.

In the swine division, Sherill Alexander placed first and sixth with his lightweight Berkshires. Gary DeBerry placed eighth and Jack Hysinger placed tenth

and fourteenth with their lightweight Berkshires. Fourth place lightweight Chester White was shown by T. J. Smith.

John Adams placed seventh and thirteenth with his lightweight Duroc and thirteenth with his mediumweight Duroc. Jerry Mathis showed the thirteenth place mediumweight Hampshire while Jerry Moore took ninth place with his animal.

Showing a light and medium weight spotted Poland China, Jerry Edmonson took two fifth places.

Harold Warren, agriculture instructor, stated that 800 head of hogs and 350 head of lamb were entered. Olton boys entered 10 head of lamb and 24 head of hogs in the show.

A charge of \$1 for a one-year immunization and \$2 for a three-year immunization will be made. Tags will be issued.

Mr. Smith urges all dog owners to take advantage of this opportunity. Although not a requirement, it is a service rendered by the sheriff's department as a precautionary measure to further city health standards as there is an increased danger of rabies during the summer months.

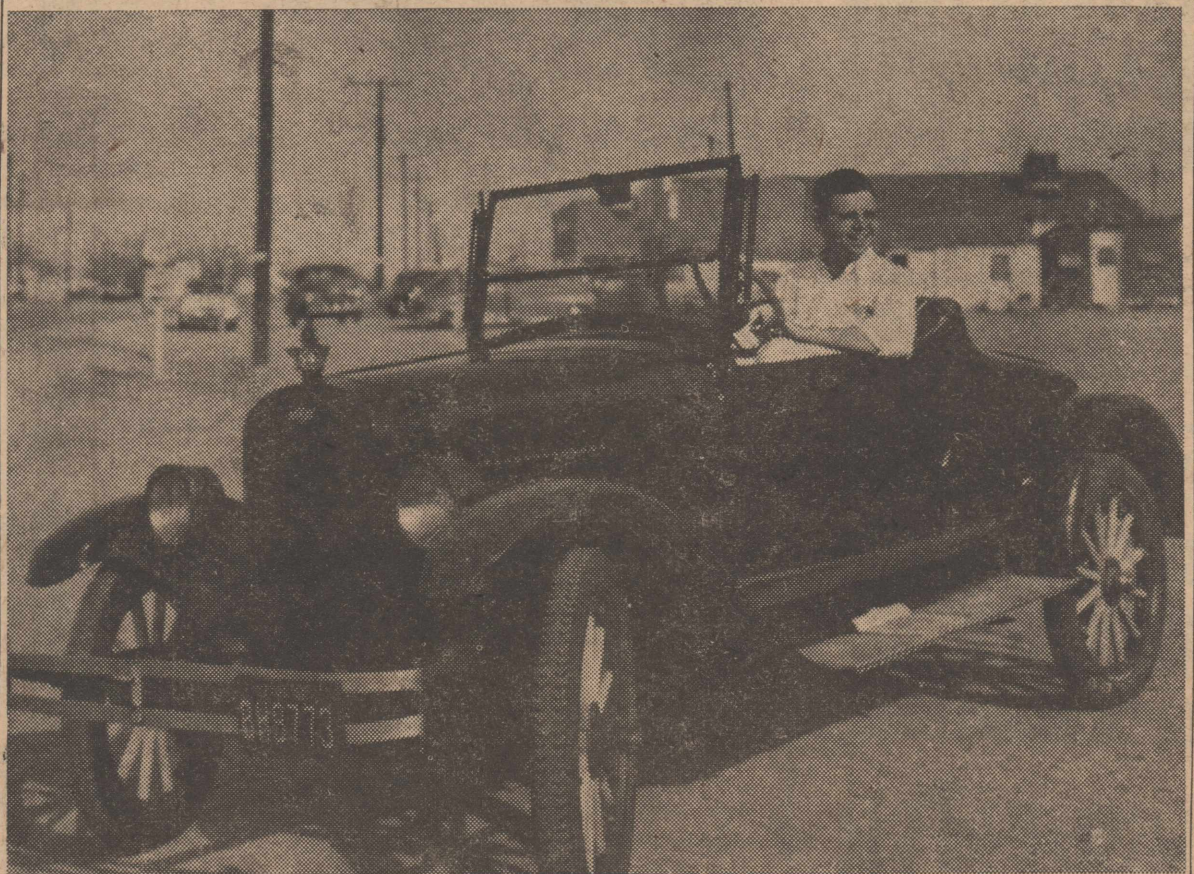
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HONOR STUDENT

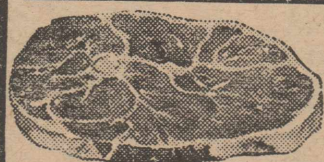

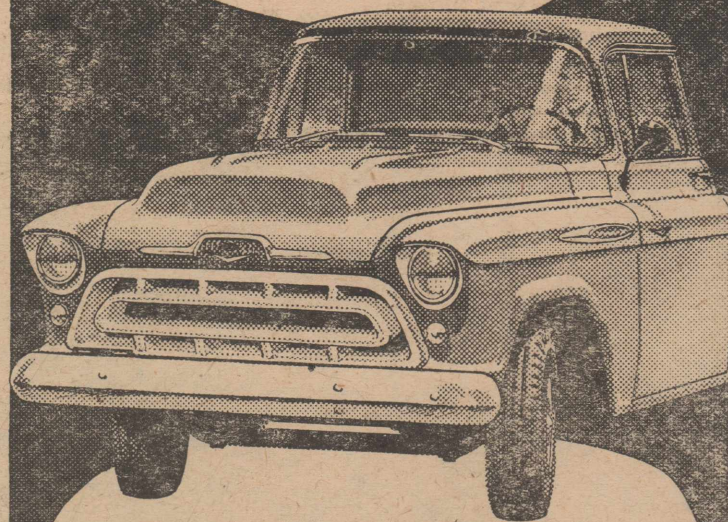

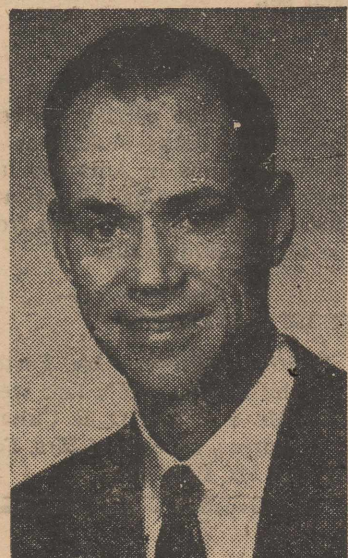

NEITHER HERE NOR THERE

Our thinking has been colored lately with the thought of community action toward a community goal, and we keep returning to the same question. Just what is a community?

Webster defines a community as being "a body of people living in the same place under the same laws or the people of a particular place or region."

It seems to us that, physically, our community boundaries extend as far as our school buses run, thus covering quite a large area.

Most families have common interests, problems, needs, and goals. And, actually, community action consists of families planning and acting together for each other in order to help themselves.

Admittedly, there are some community members who have little feeling of personal responsibility for community life. Their sights are turned inward to their personal lives with no thought that their family's lives are closely intertwined with those of others in the community. They fail to realize that community well-being makes vast contributions to high standards of individual and family life.

In our own community, we hear and indulge in much talk of the need and desire for various things to improve our way of life. Uppermost seems to be a community center, so perhaps the will to get together and DO something will counteract a dangerous lack of motivation and initiative.

A hard lesson for all to learn is that successful community action demands the efforts of many, not just a willing minority. Spirited action must replace "civic sluggishness" in order to accomplish anything worthwhile.

We all suffer from the tendency to "want something done" FOR us or TO us, while we sit back and reap the rewards. But when we wait for "someone else" to get things done, often the waiting becomes a permanent state.

Our personal feeling is that like a school child who coasts along with "C's" when with a little extra effort he can achieve "A's", Olton can "make the grade" on any goal that its citizens set up IF they consider it a vital community need. To be sure, a strong groundwork of planning and organization is necessary to any community-action program, but the follow-up tells the story of success or failure.

We've already stopped for the red light, we're racing our motor during the caution light, but when the green light flashes on, let's GO. Who wants to sit and block traffic when others want to move ahead?

ATTEND CHURCH SUNDAY

High Plains Research Program Approved By Regional Council

The program of research for the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation was approved by the Regional Council for the station at a meeting and tour of the station at Halfway, Saturday, March 16.

Twenty-two members of the council attended the sessions, representing 12 counties in the High Plains area. Also attending were representatives of newspapers, radio station, business men and farmers interested in the station. Sixteen projects are approved for the 1957 program. Some of which are contingent upon the completion of the budget and the employment of additional scientific staff.

Soil projects approved were fertilizer rates, time and methods of application to cotton, maize, soybeans, etc. All common sources of phosphate compared on cotton. Deep plowing vs. chiseling on yields of cotton and maize. Irrigation, rate and time interval effects on yield of maize and cotton.

Crop projects will include study and comparison of present and introduced crop varieties under best known cultural practices with emphasis on quality as well as yield. Crops included

will be cotton, maize, tomatoes, corn, soybeans, sesame, sunflowers and castor beans. Wheat research will be included in the fall program.

Work underway at the 313 acre station at Halfway was observed by the council on a brief tour conducted by Dr. Johnny Davis, associate head. The tour included the farm, the observance of equipment, pole barn under construction, and the new office.

Appearing on the program of the meeting were Harold Hinn, chairman and host, R. V. Payne, chairman of Big Gifts, Frank Moore, area chairman, H. M. LaFont, Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Grady Goodpasture, R. C. Peeler, R. V. Patterson and John Paetsold.

Mr. R. V. Payne announced that \$266,350.00 of the five year budget of \$550,000.00 had been subscribed by 692 farmers and firms of the High Plains area. Frank Moore, area chairman announced that campaigns were underway in several counties and in the planning stage for others.

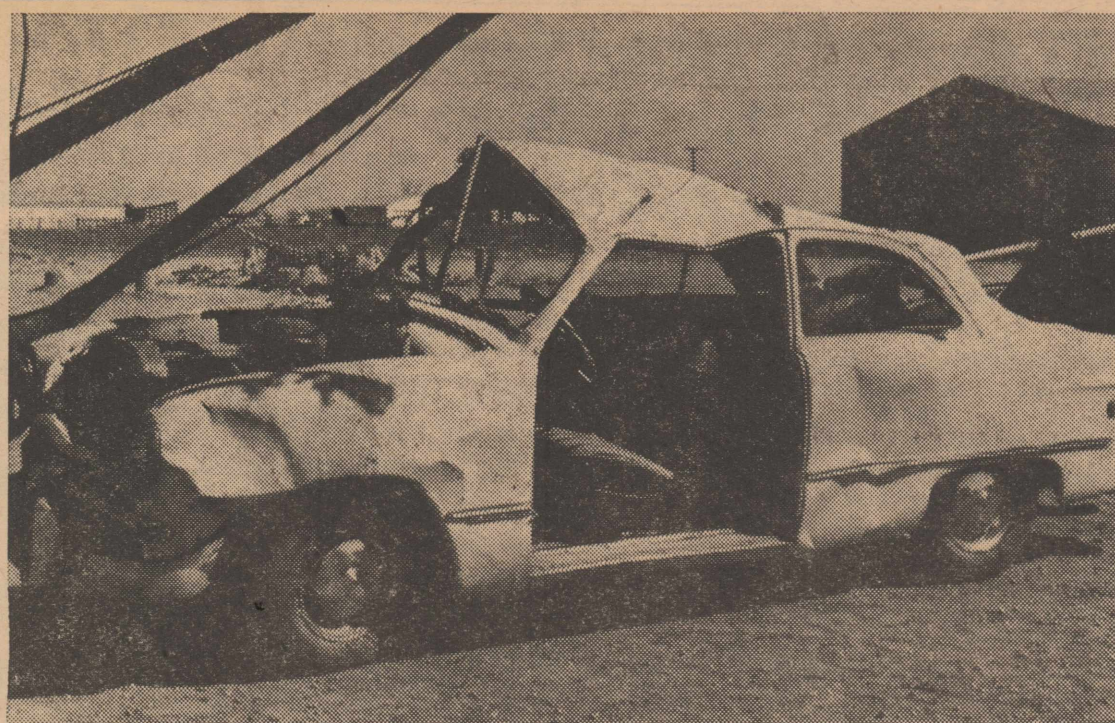

Mrs. Highgate, unable to tell the three apart, is completely bewildered by the appearance of her "artist" under the most amazing circumstances, while the detective is but little more enlightened.

The difficulties of these situations become more and more complex as the play progresses, involving a queer malady, "Pock-etitis" from which Florence, (Yvonne Pinkerton), the maid, is suffering; the timid love of Phillip, (Donald Mason), the butler, for her; the "human bloodhound" activities of Beagle
