## Fertilizer Dealers Discuss Plans For Safety Meeting Here Soon

Raymon Long suffered serious chemical burns Friday afternoon when he came into contact with anhydrous ammonia with which he was working.

The accident took place about 5:30 o'clock in the afternoon at the Long farm, 41/2 miles southwest of Olton. Quick thinking by Don Spain and Jack Bristol probably

saved Mr. Long from even more serious injury.

Number 6

As of Wednesday night Mr. Long was in Olton Memorial Hospital being treated for first and second degree burns. His condition was described as greatly improved.






