Olton Elementary Named H. P. Webb

Olton elementary school has been named the H. P. Webb Elementary School. Olton school board took action Tuesday night naming the school in honor of Mr. Webb, who died in July of 1956. Mr. Webb probably was Olton's most outstanding educator and scientist. Mr. Webb served as Olton school superintendent from 1921 until 1943. He also was a former superintendent of Lubbock public schools.

Firemen Answer Cotton Fire Call

Olton Volunteer firemen extinguished a smoldering trailer-load of cotton shortly before noon today before serious loss occurred. The cotton, owned by R. A. Burgess, was saved, all but about 200 pounds. Pat Fuentez was driving the pickup pulling the trailer. He stopped about two miles east on Highway 70 and kicked off most of the smoldering cotton by the time firemen had arrived.

Castro County Unit of the American Cancer Society has arranged the showing of a free film entitled "Breast Self-Examination" at Hart school gymnasium next Tuesday.

The showing will be at 10 AM. Area women are invited to attend. It is designed to teach women simple steps employed in breast examination to detect possible cancer symptoms.

The Society quotes medical doctors as saying that if techniques taught in the film were practiced, the rate of breast cancer would be cut in half.

About 95 percent of such cancers are discovered by the women themselves, yet too many are found too late for effective treatment.

A great number of women die each year because of ignorance or fear of cancer. This film is a full color movie and is free to

Mustangs In Do-Or-Die Battle Here Tomorrow

ANTELOPES LOOM IN CHAMPIONSHIP PATH

Football again has taken over in Olton. The Mustangs stand a chance of winning the championship of District 2-AA.

Olton plays age-old foe Abernathy tomorrow evening at Memorial Field. The game is a must for the Mustangs. It is their last scheduled game of the season, and they must win to keep alive for title contention.

Olton has not won the title since 1955.

However, victory is spelled "IF".

If Olton defeats Abernathy, and both Abernathy and Lockney win over Muleshoe—the Mustangs will represent District 2-AA in bi-district.

If only one of the two teams, Abernathy or Lockney, defeat Muleshoe, and the other loses—the district will be in a three-way tie. In such a case, a coin would be flipped to select the representative.

So, Olton fans will not know, even if the Antelopes are defeated tomorrow night, whether they have a championship team until Nov. 14, when Abernathy and Muleshoe meet. Lockney hosts Muleshoe tomorrow night.

Largest Crowd Seen. The largest crowd of the season is expected to pour into Memorial Stadium to witness contest. Football has been the topic of discussion all week in almost every business house, and very little space is available on walls in high school for additional booster posters.

Abernathy has a powerful, well-balanced team, according to the Antelope record this season and scouting reports. The 'Lopes are also highly experienced.

Coach Royal James has eight starters back with him from the 1957 edition. Among the good-looking letter-winners returning is the all-district quarterback of last season, Lane Tannehill. Other starters in the backfield who have returned are Gerald Watson and Jimmy Cragg, halfbacks, and Danny Miller, fullback.

Four of the seven starting line-men this year were in the same positions at the start of each game last season. They are ends Jimmy Dye and Pat Atterbury, Charles Evans, tackle-guard, and Carroll Powell, center-tackle.

Scouting reports indicate Abernathy is ever-threatening with its accurate aerial attack. Tannehill has teamed up with Dye and Atterbury time and again all year long for lengthy gains and several touchdowns.

Powerful Reserves. The Antelopes have strong reserves, too. Sophomore fullback Aubrey Smith showed his power in the 20-3 routing of Spur when he ripped off 15 and 67-yard touchdowns in the second half of play.

Tannehill displayed his throwing ability when Abernathy defeated Morton, 38-0. He tossed two six-pointers, ran for another, and passed for points after one touchdown.

Miller was the leading ground-gainer of the game, racking up an outstanding 133 yards.

Abernathy was undefeated, untied until Lockney upset the Antelopes in a surprising 22-12 contest.

The Mustangs will be in full force tomorrow evening, according to Coach Joe Turner. Some concern was indicated over an arm injury sustained during the Lockney game by sophomore halfback Randeau Buchenu, but the stout line-buster has had no ill effects this week.

Robbins Is Honored. Senior end Jimmy Robbins was named Lineman of the Week by the Avalanche-Journal for his outstanding defensive play in the Olton win over Lockney, 18-14.

Royce Bodkin, halfback, was listed honorable mention. This is the second time this season he was named.

Olton built up a 12-0 lead during the first three quarters of play, but saw the powerful Longhorns, led by fullback Bill Race, take over the lead by scoring two

touchdowns and one extra point conversion in less than five minutes.

However, a determined attack (five plays) by the Mustangs after the second Lockney touchdown was capped by a three-yard drive by quarterback Arno Hall. The Joe Turner crew was never again behind.

Bodkin Leads Scoring. Bodkin scored Olton's first two tallies from six and 10 yards out. He set up his second score by covering a Longhorn fumble on the Lockney 47, then taking a pass from Hall which was good to the 10, and going over on the next play.

Though Olton led in first downs, 14-13, the Mustangs fell behind in net yards rushing, 107-172, and total yards gained, 211-235.

In completing seven of 12 attempted aerials, the Mustangs racked up 104 yards through the air, while Lockney connected with only two of five attempts for 63 yards.

Both teams lost the ball once on fumbles. Lockney was penalized 10 times for 100 yards, while Olton had 35 yards stepped off in five trips.

Ten Mustangs To Play Last Game (We Hope Not)

Tomorrow night will be the last regularly-scheduled high school football game for ten Olton Mustangs.

Eight of the players will be lost from the squad via graduation and the remaining two by age eligibility.

Seniors who will play for the last time in their high school career are Arno Hall, quarterback, Royce Bodkin, halfback, David Hamm, tackle, Jimmy Robbins, end, L. H. McAdams, end, Lonnie Miller, halfback, T. J. Smith, tackle, and Jesse Joe

Raney, tackle. Smith, injured in mid-season, will not suit out.

Robert Diaz, tackle, and Billy Hair, end-tackle, will not be eligible next season because of age.

Light Voting In Olton; Went Democrat, Anyway

With only a token vote cast, Olton joined the remainder of the

state in giving Democratic candidates a landslide in the general election Tuesday.

Olton voted down five of nine proposed amendments to the state constitution.

Commissioner of Agriculture, Democrat John C. White, 183, Republican Grover Carothers, 21, Constitution Party H. W. Vogan, 3; commissioner of general land office, Democrat Bill Allcorn, 196, Republican W. C. Miller, 2; state treasurer, Democrat Jesse James, 196, Republican Bert Ellis, 3;

Comptroller of public accounts, Democrat Robert S. Calvert, 195, R. Glenn Florence, 2; railroad commissioner, Democrat Olin Culbertson, 193, Republican Howard Bumbaugh, 2;

Justice of supreme court, Democrat Robert W. Hamilton, 188, and Republican John Q. Adams, 16.

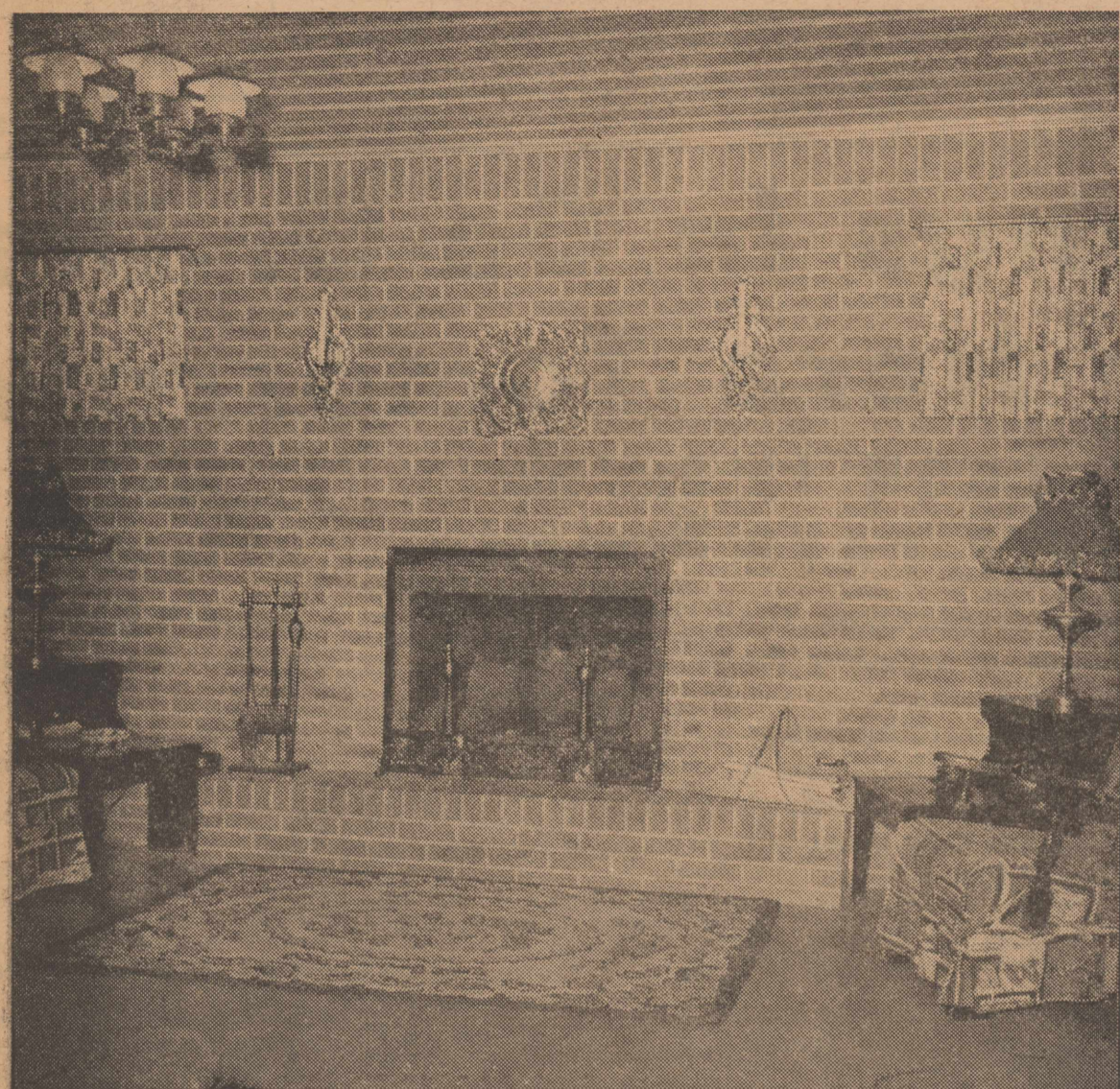

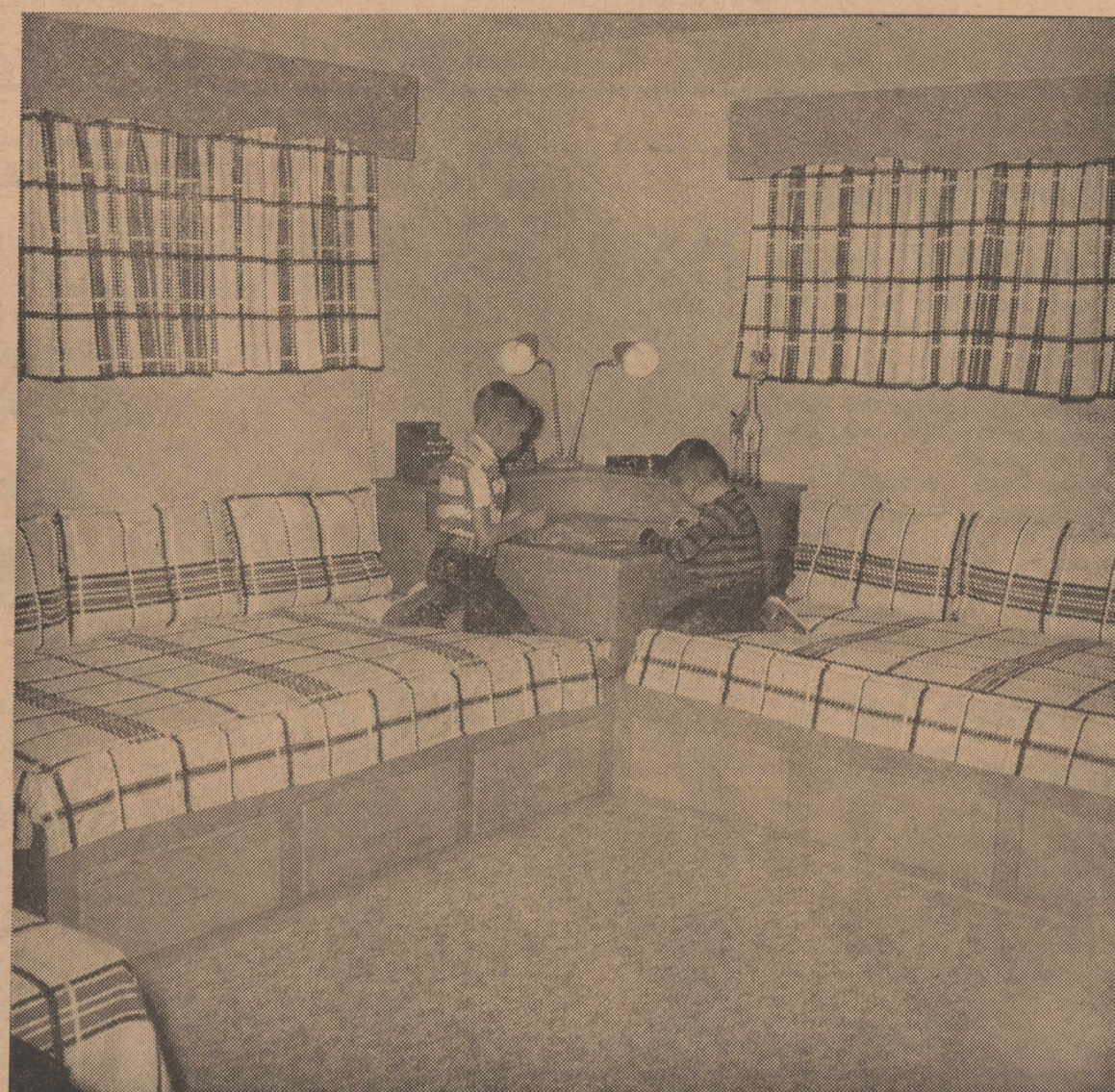
The Ed Thompson Home Is A Large Dwelling For A Large Family

Every once in a while, you discover a house that offers a startling amount of useful space and usually it has a simple plan and clean, uncluttered lines. Such a house recalls a basic, centuries-old building fact: that simplicity and well-organized space nearly always go hand in hand.

The Ed Thompson suburban house on Highway 70, west of Olton city limits, is a perfect example.

Here's a house to win wives and influence husbands! Start with its soft, warm exterior. Details like the sliding glass doors into the patio, broad picture windows delight the ladies. Inside, a "command post" kitchen and an outside view win their vote every time. Men like the cozy family room connected to the kitchen. The "Ladies" and "Mens" baths appeal to both parents—especially when they have six children and a son-in-law.

The Thompson children are Mrs. Roy LaDuke of Amarillo, Louis who is in the Armed Forces and Johnny of Amarillo, Linda Gail Thompson, OHS cheerleader, and Barry Thompson, seven years old, and a foster son, Mike Hoffman, also seven years old.

The utility room, family room

and kitchen are all joined together in one long, rectangular-shaped room. The kitchen is between the two areas it serves: dining room (through doorway) and family room and it's next to the utility room also.

Compact space has everything—including built-in, copper oven and range top and dishwasher. Juanita Thompson also has a handy pantry in her kitchen. And a half-bath is at the end of the utility room.

Cabinets are all knotty pine and trimmed with hammered copper handles. Juanita has copper deep freeze, washer, dryer, and water heater. A sliding partition divides the utility room into two rooms, actually: a sewing and ironing room and a wash room.

A beautifully curved snack bar divides the family room and kitchen. Never has a room been more charming or more comfortable and relaxing than the Thompson family room! The walls in the kitchen-family-utility room are knotty pine wall paneling and the floor is tan and white tile.

The family room opens into the patio through sliding glass doors—that not only add beauty, but light. A built-in desk, bookcase, and TV set in knotty pine add attractiveness to the room. All the rooms for daytime living and working radiate from the family room fireplace. The completely bricked wall where the fireplace is, makes it a lovely "centerpiece" for the house.

The oriental-looking rugs in the family room are hand woven and add a glow of domesticity to the room.

Living room is a friendly, pleasant place to entertain or relax—and it's by itself, away from main traffic routes. Seating can be clustered near the huge landscape window or scat-

tered throughout the room. The dividers screens the entry for receiving visitors and screens the dining table at the opposite end for entertaining dinner guests.

The furniture is elegant. It is Italian Provincial, all charmingly arranged and matching the beautiful carved piano. The carpet is a blend of pink and brown high-low carpeting. The pink in the carpet is accented by pinkish beige walls, pink curved sectional.

The divider at the entrance is a planter, which Juanita has put to good use for healthy green plants. The divider between the dining area and living room is also a planter on the living room side and gracefully converts into a china cabinet on the dining side.

Another picture window makes pleasant dining and the matching buffet and table and chairs are blonde.

One of Juanita's secrets for "not getting sand" is that she had the windows sealed, "since we have central heating and air-

conditioning". It's as true as it is logical—the Thompson house is easy to keep clean during sandstorms.

The four-bedroom wing leads off to one side of the living room. Possibly the most beautiful bedroom in the house is the guest bedroom. It has rose colored walls, white nylon curtains with a white quilted headboard above the bed and a white heirloom bedspread.

Linda Gail Thompson's room looks like where a teenage girl lives! It is almost cluttered with stuffed animals and dolls. The walls are rose with rose curtains, trimmed with charcoal and rose material. Her bedspread is made to match the curtains. She has a built-in desk, and book case and a brown bedroom suit.

Barry's and Mike's room is a picture-book room for little boys. Juanita is making charming plaid curtains and bedspreads. Actually the twin beds are built-in against

a corner toy box and lamp table (built-in) and Juanita is making the spreads and pillows to fit the beds and make little sofa-looking day beds.

For a family as large as the Thompson family, the men's and ladies' baths are ideal . . . and

they are right across the hall from each other. The men's is all green with a glassed in shower. The ladies' is a combination of pink, white, and grey, with plenty

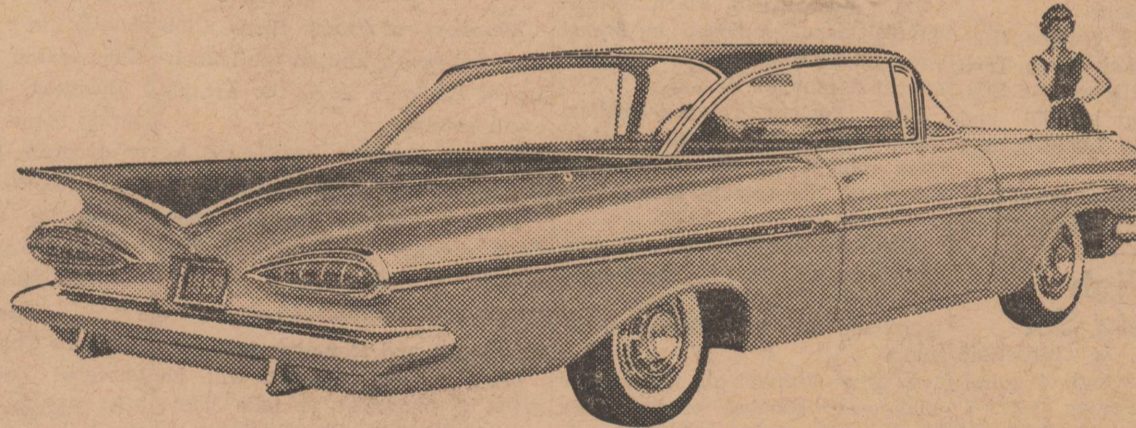

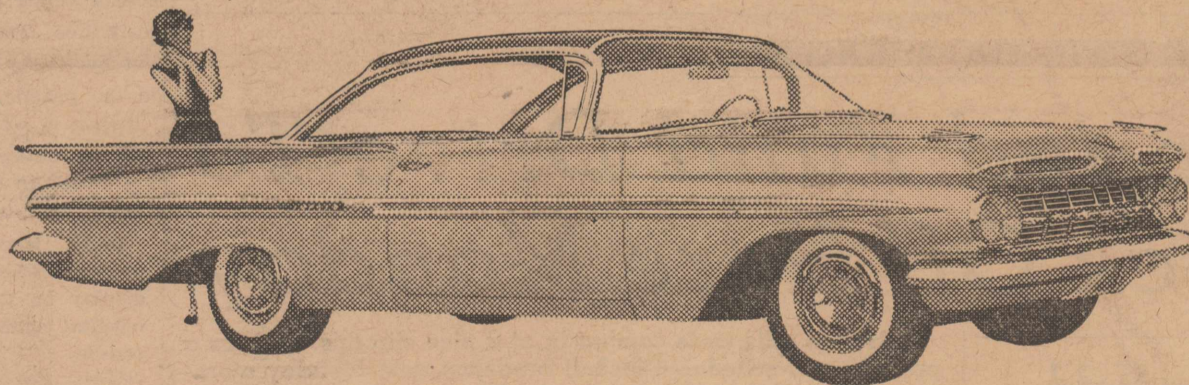

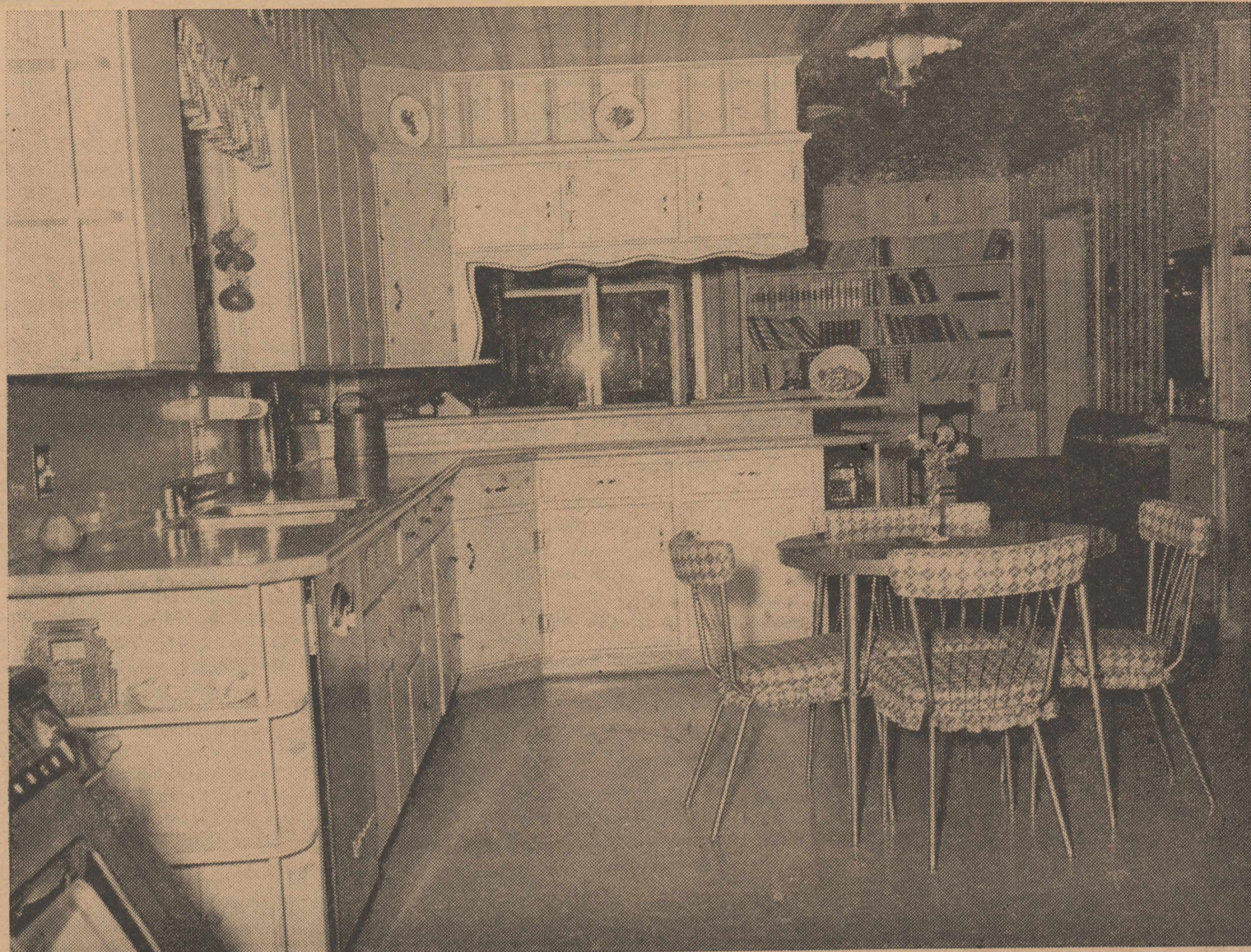

The master bedroom looks onto the patio from the opposite side as the family room. It has the sliding glass doors. The drawdrapes are rose-beige and match beautifully with the brown taffeta spread. The master bedroom furniture is driftwood Maple and a bulletin board made and painted to match the wall for their children's pictures adds a nice "interest center".

At the end of the utility room is another room that the Thompson's use for added storage—however, they hardly need it, what with huge walk-in closets in each bedroom, linen and storage closets galore!

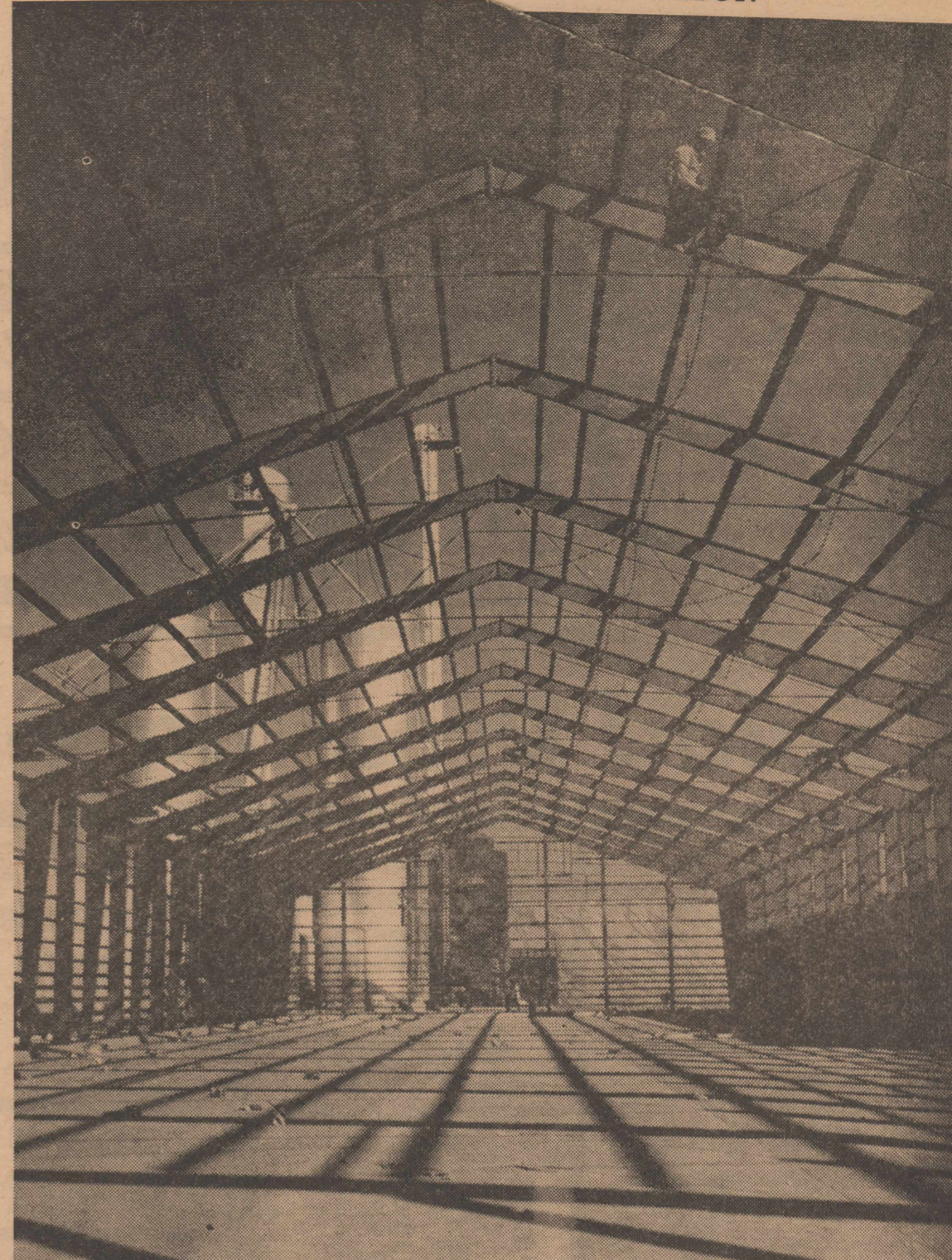

And among the wonderful new children's books are the following: Old Bill, The Whooping Crane by Joseph Wharton Lippincott Lippincott, \$3.00.

The life story of one of the last of the near extinct whooping cranes is one that should interest children and also anyone who appreciates wild life.

How Old Bill migrates from Texas to Canada and back; how he is in constant danger from nature and from man proves to be interesting reading, and interest is increased by the use of illustrations furnished by the US Fish and Wildlife Service.

Bohner school began operating on a half-day basis Monday. The announcement was made by Principal B. T. Graves this morning.

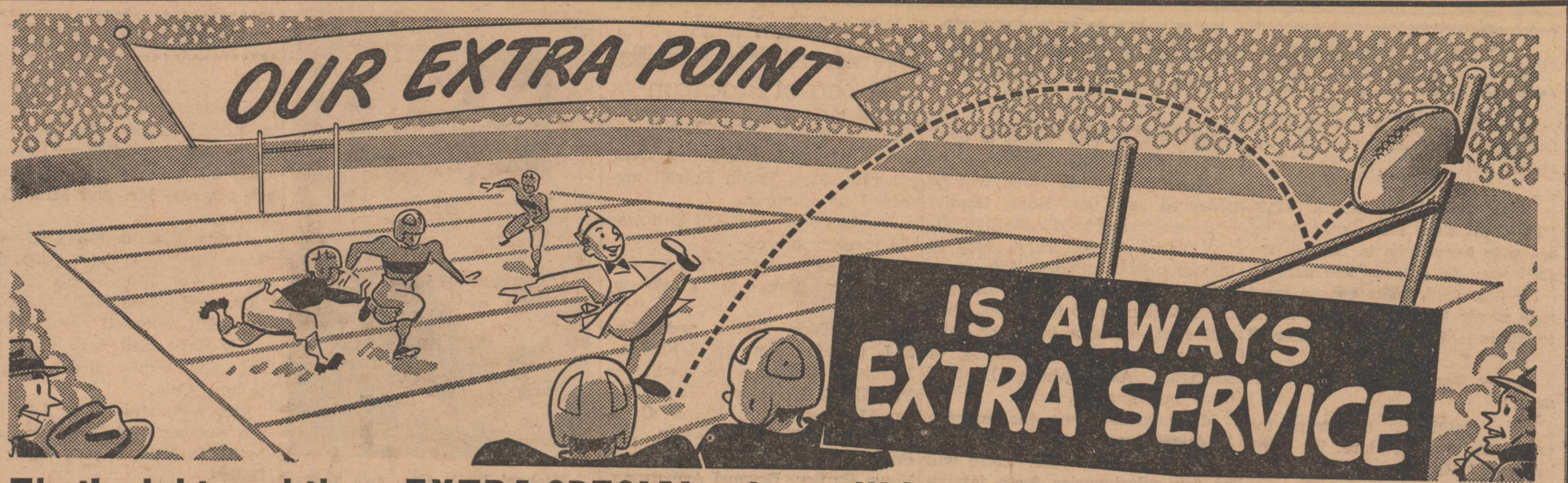
"Classes begins at 8 AM and dismisses at 1 PM for the next week, according to weather and conditions along with crop harvest," Graves said.

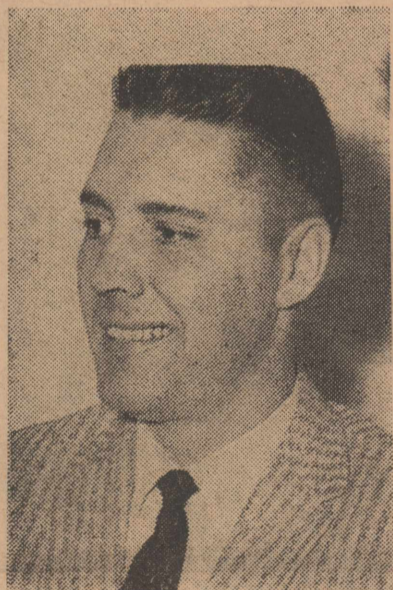

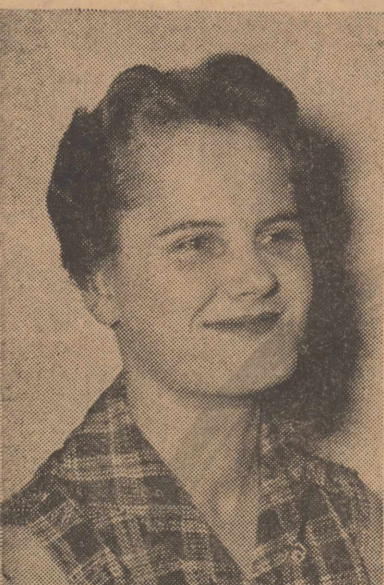
