## New Christmas Decorations To Go Up December 1

Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture plans call for decoration of Olton business houses for the Christmas season by December 1. "We hope the decoration will be complete by not later than Dec. 10," declared Wayne Cooper, OCCA manager. "We hope that 100 percent participation in the effort will make our Christmas program a great success," he added. Lighting equipment has been purchased to decorate the downtown area and approximately 2 1/2 blocks on Highway 70. Volunteer workers will string 26 strands of wire with a total of 1,500 colored lights to help Santa find his way to Olton. Civic clubs are planning to participate in downtown Christmas scenes to be erected on the east side of the hospital square. Church congregations have been invited to decorate their churches with lighting and Biblical scenes. Mr. Cooper said several homes will be competing for cash prizes of \$25, \$15 and \$10 in the home Christmas lighting contest. The Christmas program committee of OCCA is planning to have Santa Claus in Olton Dec. 13. Santa will be accompanied by several area bands as well as a number of floats and other parade contingents.

## Various Faculty Groups To Study

Olton School System has launched a self-evaluation project with an eye to becoming a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools. School Supt. Joe Harper said the project is designed to determine the school's strengths and weaknesses. The school faculty is organized into various study groups. Coordinator for the project is Dr. Wallace of the Texas Tech Education Department, which he heads. Dr. Wallace is scheduled to meet with the Olton faculty Monday. Foremost committee is the steering committee. Its objective is to organize the entire self-evaluating project. The committee on Pupil Population in the School and Community will make an extensive study of school students. Its objective is to determine such things as the number of Olton graduates who go to college; how many graduate; type of work they do; how many drop out of school before graduating from high school; when and why. This committee also will make a study of the types of homes local students come from and their environment there. Educational Needs Another committee will study youth educational needs. "We want to see if we are meeting the educational needs of youth in this community," declared Mr. Harper. The superintendent said about a year will be required in making the study. After the committees have turned in reports and the self-evaluation is completed, an overall report on strengths and weaknesses in the system will be made. "We will then ask for an outside team made up of school and lay people from over the Plains area to make an evaluation study," Mr. Harper declared. "Then the two reports will be compared and if our standards are high enough, we can be admitted to the Southern Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges. If our standards are not high enough we have a year to improve our system to the point of acceptability." Mr. Harper said transcripts of schools belonging to the association receive the association's stamp. He said this is very beneficial to students entering college. Mr. Harper stressed the importance of raising school standards. "We must do a good job in raising school standards or we soon will see our students failing to be accepted into college," he asserted.

Bro. Huerta is majoring in Engineering and is planning to be a missionary after he graduates this year.

A veterinarian will be in Olton at 10 o'clock the morning of Nov. 29 to vaccinate dogs and other pets. This information came this week from Mayor D. Y. Ray. The veterinarian is Dr. Nace of Littlefield. At the November city council meeting, Olton city council laid plans to rid the town of stray dogs. Owners will be given an opportunity to have their pets vaccinated and tagged. The city plans to improvise a pound and will employ someone to catch untagged dogs. After elapse of a time prescribed by law, dogs not claimed will be destroyed. Councilmen acted after receiving complaints that packs of dogs roaming the city posed a health menace.

# Olton Cotton Crop Has Yielded 31,971 Bales

This year's cotton crop has been better in price and production than any harvest in the

history of Olton farming—according to several "old timers". Even though the bale count is more than 4,000 fewer than the same date in 1956, which was considered the best year until

now, price and quality is far better, the local experts said. A survey of the four Olton gins and Thompson Gin and Circle Gin this morning disclosed 31,971 bales had been hauled in from the fields. The 1956 figure for Nov. 21 stood at 36,453. Harvest, the gin operators said, is about 80 to 90 percent complete in the area. They said almost all fields should be stripped within the next 10 to 14 days. Weather attempted to stall the harvest the latter part of last week and early this week, but even with the elements, 4,565 bales were brought in. Olton received .18 of an inch moisture Monday morning. Merchants Optimistic Local merchants this week said they expect one of the biggest buying seasons in the town's history this Christmas. As one merchant indicated, "The people are almost completely out of debt from last year, the worst crop failure in our history, and they are going to be able to buy all the things they needed last year and this year, too."

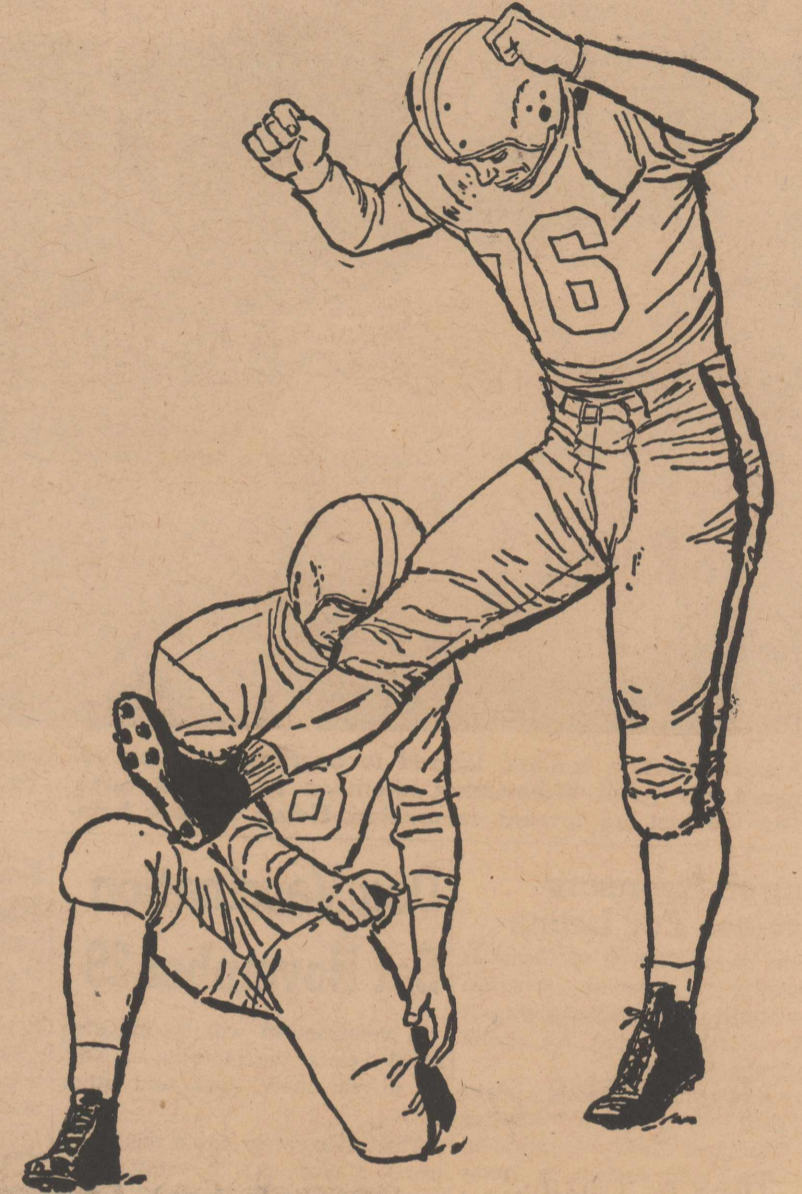

## Cherished Figurines Decorate Walthall Home

Where to begin? That's the usual question from a home-maker about to launch into the decoration of a room, or the remodeling of a house.

So it was with Mrs. Albert Walthall when she moved, remodeled and re-decorated her now-comfortable two-bedroom home. Mrs. Walthall, who is better known as Era Maye, lived on the farm northwest of Olton until her husband died of an heart attack January 13, 1957.

Era Maye was left with the choice of staying out on the farm or moving to town. She chose to move to town. She had moved a rather old farm house to her lot in east Olton.

What became of the farm house after it was moved onto the lot seems unbelievable. Era Maye with the aid of her two daughters, Mrs. Jack Coleman and Mrs. James Bledsoe of Odessa, and carpenters, simplified the plan to create the illusion of larger rooms and to open up space.

First she moved the double garage from the farm—connected it to the house by a 10-foot space that makes the dining area in her kitchen. Next she had the carpenters make a den out of half of the garage (the other half is used as a garage).

She had a French door made out of the small opening between

the living room and kitchen also. This gives a more spacious effect and makes the kitchen lighter for working.

Next came the decorating program.

The kitchen is oblong and decorated in shades of pink and brown. The cottage curtains add zest and color to the room. They are light brown with ming trees, birds, and flowers on them in dark brown, pink, and white. Her table centerpiece was made to go with the curtains—it is a ming tree with peach blossoms and candles and a pink bird, all beautifully arranged in a gold container.

The cabinets and walls are the same color—camelia pink and sandelwood mixed. It makes a "tanish pink". The china closet is natural and stands out against its pink surroundings. The linoleum gives a stripe-effect in beige, cream, pink, and aqua.

Through the French door, you enter a small but comfortable living room. Its walls match the kitchen in textstone, its carpet is in the Desert Rose design with pink the predominating color. Her drapes match everything in her kitchen and living room. "I took a sample of my carpet, linoleum and wall color to Lubbock and they matched my living room draperies to them," Era Maye declared.

The furniture in the living

room is mahogany—some of it she has "had for years and years." For instance, the lovely curved desk was purchased about 25 years ago. Over it, she has a large oil painting of her late husband.

Era Maye likes figurines, and they are mostly displayed in her living room. "Most of them have a certain significance to me," she remarked. She pointed to a shaving mug that her mother gave her father when she was 2½ years old; a "Goddess of Mercy" is the center-of-interest on the TV set (Albert brought it to Era Maye when he came back from a Waco trip); and she also has a old mustach cup.

The guest bedroom is all pink and black. The bedroom suite is Allelation Beach in black with gold trim. Her carpet is pink, beige, green, and brown; her walls are pink with white and black designs; and her pink nubby weave curtains are enhanced by black cornice boards. The pictures in the room were painted by her daughter, Mrs. Coleman. Black and white polka dotted lamps add variety to the room.

Era Maye's bedroom is a combination of brown and yellow—all frilly with brown organdy curtains and yellow rose wall-

paper. The patio at the back of the house is a gathering place for friends and family during the summer months and warm fall and spring days. It is fenced in with a white picket fence and surrounded with flowers, flowers, and flowers. Her patio furniture includes a picnic table, some chairs, and a glider.

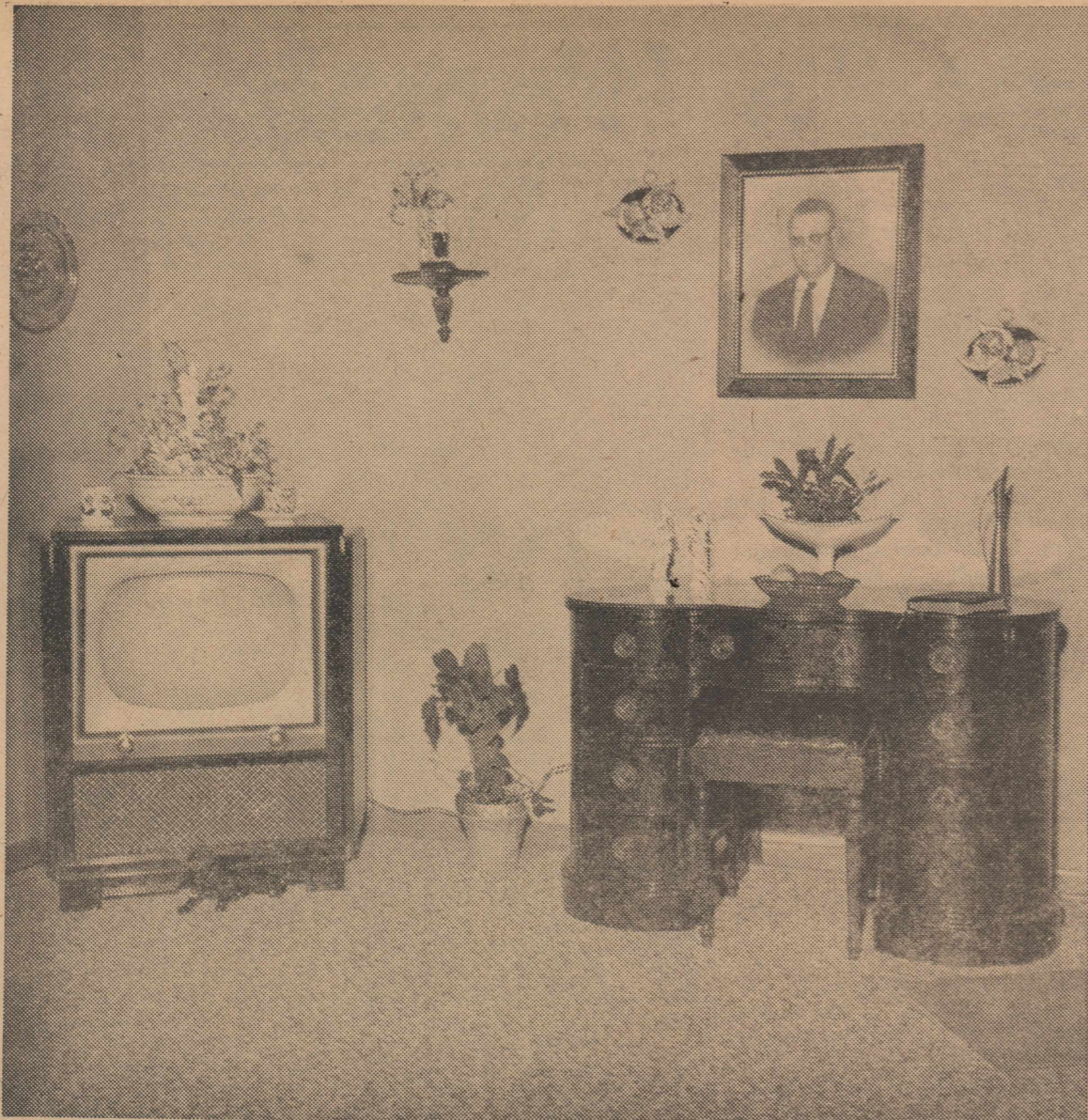
Era Maye, who has a somewhat "green thumb", did most of the yard work herself and surely grew a blossoming flower garden around the house. She even had a small vegetable garden.

When she moved into her home in March, Era Maye was honored with a housewarming by her friends. They gave her, among other things, some door chimes.

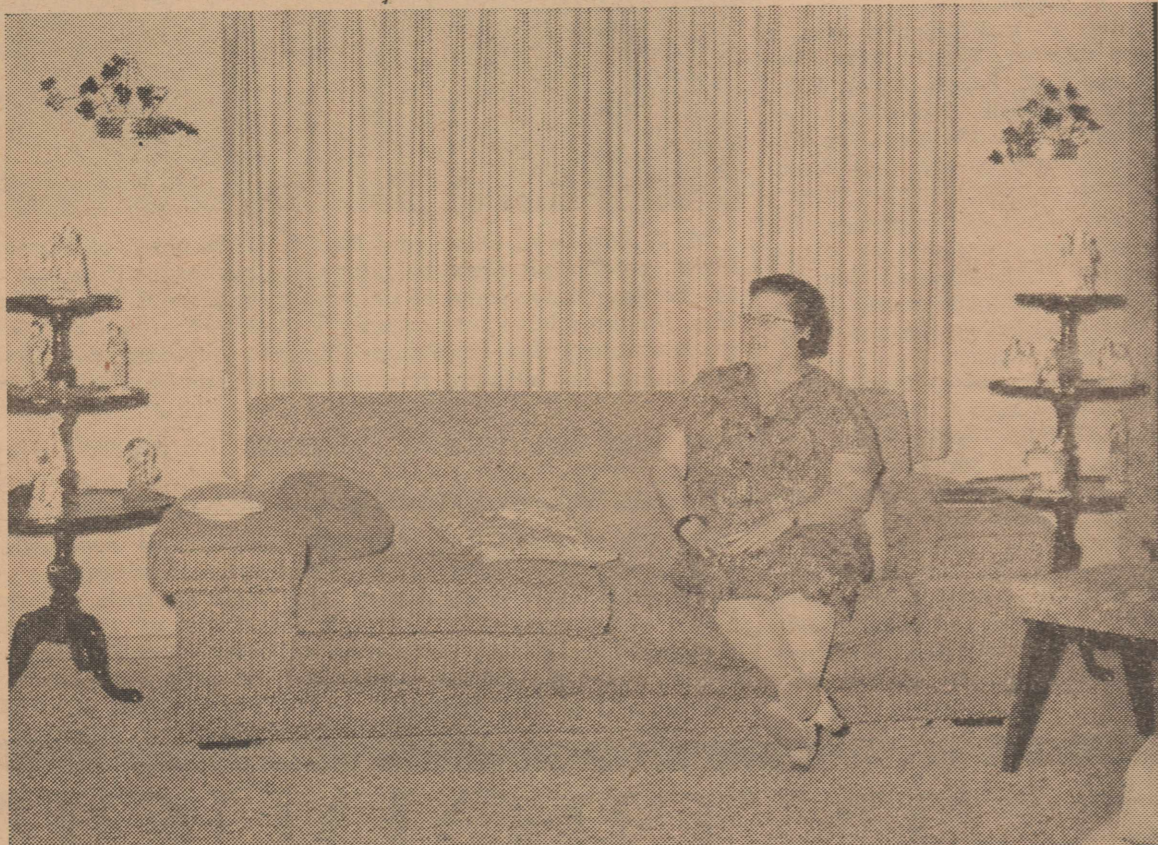
The interesting part about Era Maye's house is not because it is new or because it is large, but that she made a nice, attractive, livable home for herself from an old farm house and double garage.

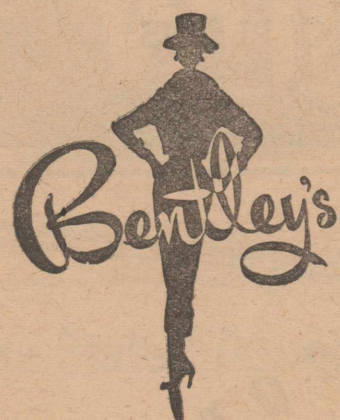

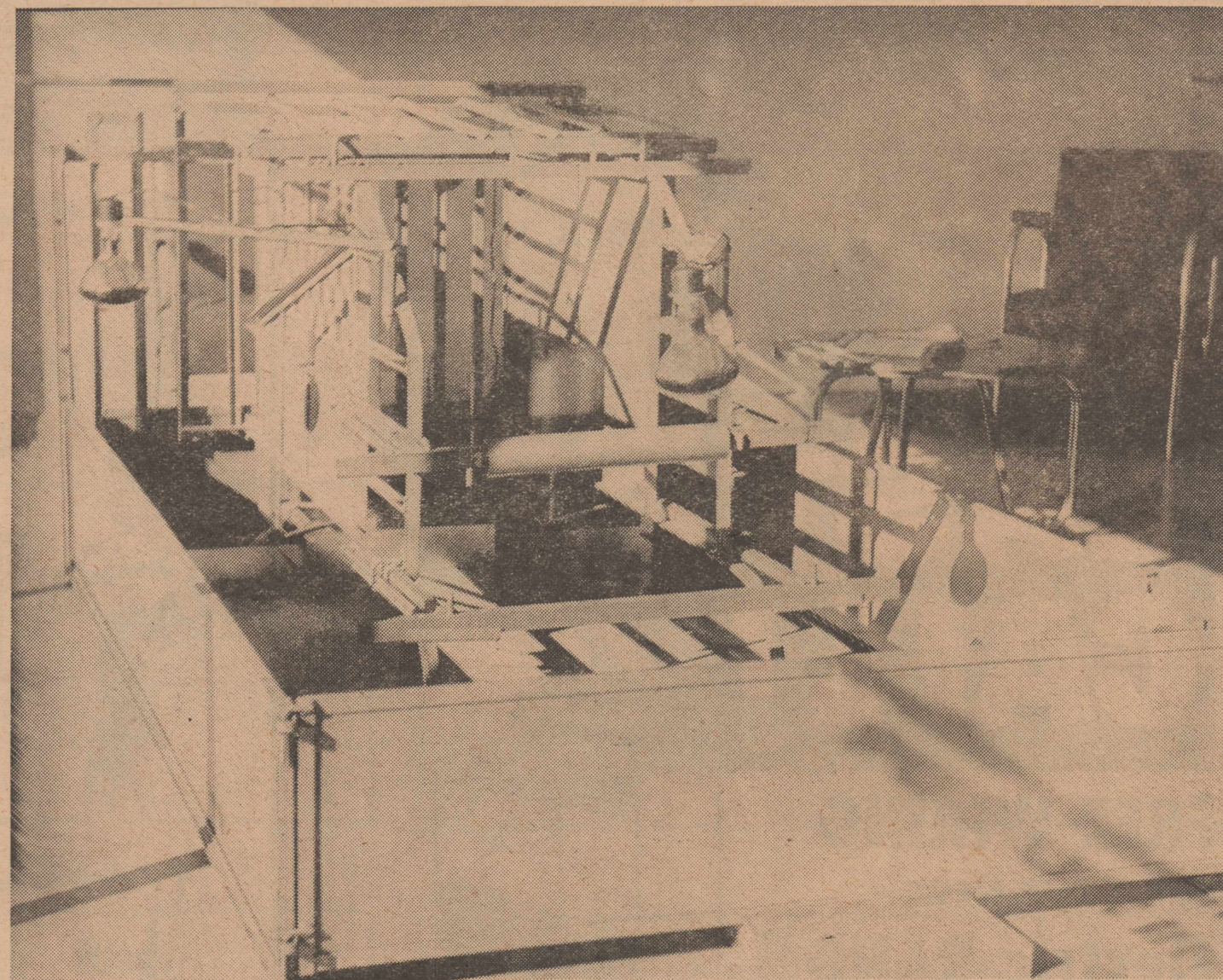

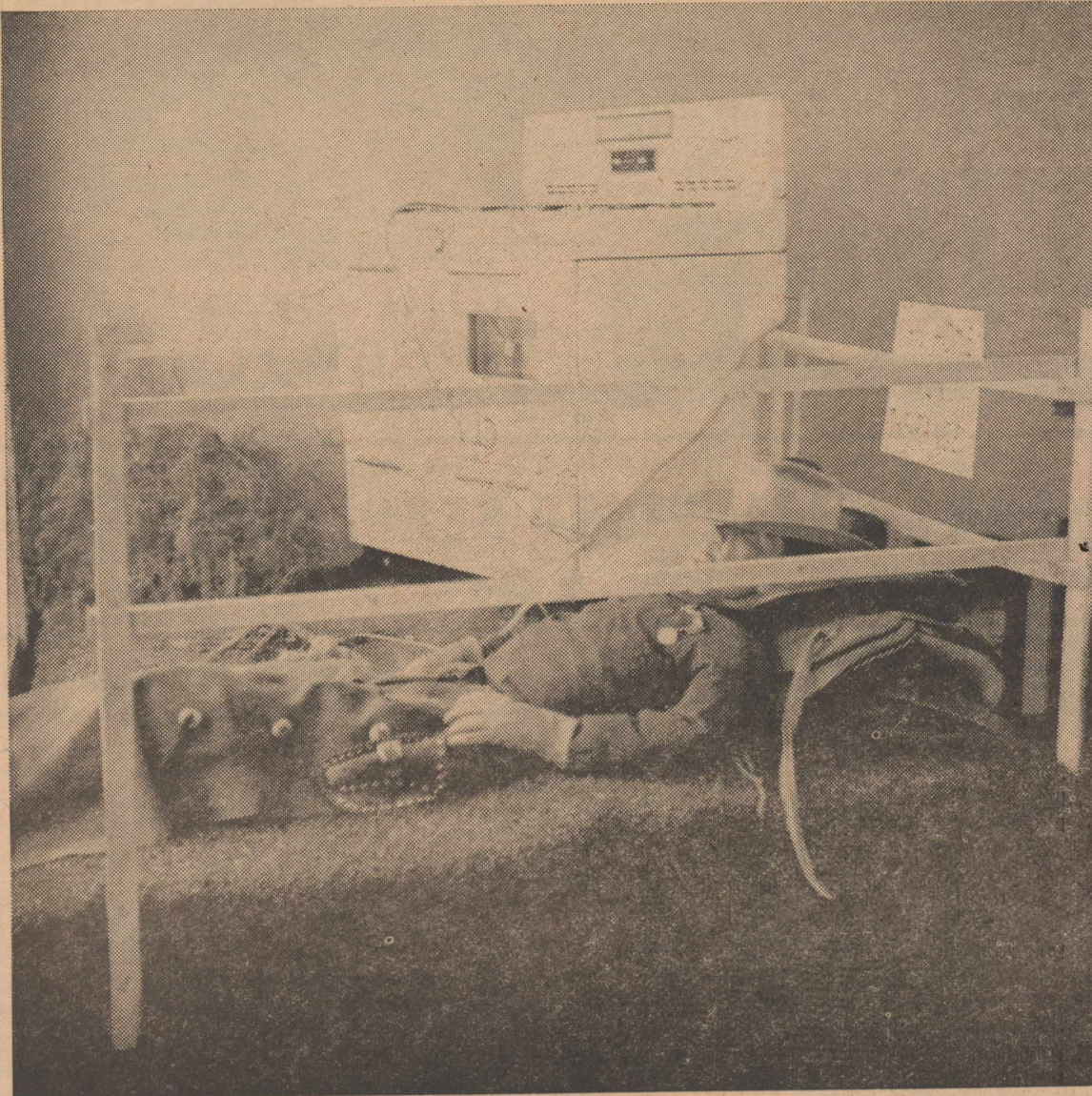

**Girl Scout Convention Is Held Recently In Houston**

Principles set up by Girl Scout leaders at the time the organization came into being some 45 years ago, are a challenge today for lady and professional workers as well as the girls themselves, Miss Oleda Schrottky of New York said Thursday evening.

An official of the Scouts for 30 years, Miss Schrottky was principal speaker at the dinner in the diner of the Crystal Ballroom of the Rice Hotel in Houston. The event closed a three-day conference of the "Cactus Region." More than 1,000 representatives from New Mexico, Oklahoma and Texas were registered for the party.

Attending from Olton were Mrs. M. G. Brown and Mrs. Paul Burrus.

The strength of the Girl Scouts, more than 3.6 million members in every country except behind the Iron Curtain who are living by our creeds, certainly can be a tremendous force for peace, if not in our time, in future years, the official said.

She pointed out that Girl Scouts cannot be efficient workers for good if they are interested only in the prestige and in large numbers and forget the major aim of the organization—which is to do a great service at all times to the communities.

"Man's Destiny depends not on whether he can learn new lessons or make new conquests, but on the acceptance of the lessons taught in the Sermon on the Mount. And as Girl Scouts we must, on our honor, abide by our laws, despite the changing time, for our fundamentals never change," Miss Schrottky said.

During the conference, the more than 1,000 lay and professional Girl Scout leaders of the three states, along with national officials, conducted round table discussions on Scouting problems and the opportunities for the future in a changing world, and they heard addresses by national leaders.

Houston Girl Scouts entertained the visitors with a costumed pageant one could observe the difference in the modern complexities of life with the simplicity and serenity of the wholesome Girl Scout way of life, which never change its basic principles.

Dr. Gerald Wendt, world-renowned chemist and physicist, told the leaders that "preparing girls and boys for life in this century is not enough because most of them will live until 2025 or 2030."

"The citizens of the 21st century

are already here in our homes and schools," he said. "The greatest challenge we face is educating them for a mode of life that will be wholly different from our own."

He emphasized that adjustability to change has become a necessity and sketched changes that are already noticeable in present times and others which can be foreseen as a result of the advances of science.

"Unpreparedness for it results in delinquency but an adequate education can bring a new Renaissance."
