

### To Participate In "Homemaker" Contest Tuesday

Olton FHA girls will mark 'Homemaker of Tomorrow Day' as will a record number of high school senior girls throughout the United States Tuesday, Dec. 2. By taking a homemaking knowledge and attitudes test, they will compete for \$106,000 in college scholarships and an educational tour which this year includes the middle west in addition to historical sites in the east.

Enrolled in the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow this year are 349,150 girls from 12,260 schools. This is the largest number of participants in the five-year history of the scholarship program. Growth has been steady since 1955 when 187,463 girls in 8.040 schools participated. The 1959 All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will be announced in Minneapolis April 10 at the American Table Dinner in the Leamington Hotel's "Hall of States". She will be selected from among 48 state Homemakers of Tomorrow and the representative from the District of Columbia, each chosen in a written 50minute examination which will be administered in the schools Tues-

Minneapolis replaced New York as this year's finals site to permit the homemaking representatives from every state to visit the new Betty Crocker kitchens located in the home of General Mills, sponsor of this program. The state winners and their school advisors six days of educational sight seeing in Washington, D.C., colonial Williamsburg, Va., and New York

The All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow will receive a \$5,000 scholarship. The runner-up will receive a \$4,000 grant, third place winner a \$3,000 award and fourth place winner a \$2,000 scholarship. Each of the other state Homemakers of Tomorrow will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and the runner-up in each state will receive a \$500 scholarship college education.

The immediate objective of the 349.150 participants in this coast to coast homemaking program will be naming the Homemaker of Tomorrow in each participating school. The school winner's paper will then be entered in state competition. The test is designed and judged by Science Research

Each school Homemaker of Toorrow will receive a homemaking pin manufactured by Josten's which represents the slogan, "Home is Where The Heart Is". The school of each state winner will receive a set of the Encyclopaedia Britannica.
