#### **Enterprise Has New Equipment**

Something is different about this week's Enterprise.

Bulk of the straight matter (a newspaperman's term for all the type except headlines and ads) has been set on the paper's new Teletypesetter.

The TTS was installed Monday and Tuesday on the Model C Intertype machine which has been manually operated in the past to produce the type.

In a nutshell, the operation works like this: a tape is "cut" on a machine with a keyboard similar to that of a typewriter. This tape is transferred to the Intertype and then, automatically, the Intertype, getting its "instructions" from the tape, produces the lines of type which make up the straight matter.

Troy Martin, Enterprise publisher, explained the paper's growth and increased use of type had made the purchase of the additional equipment neces-





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
