## Enterprise Has New Equipment

Something is different about this week's Enterprise.

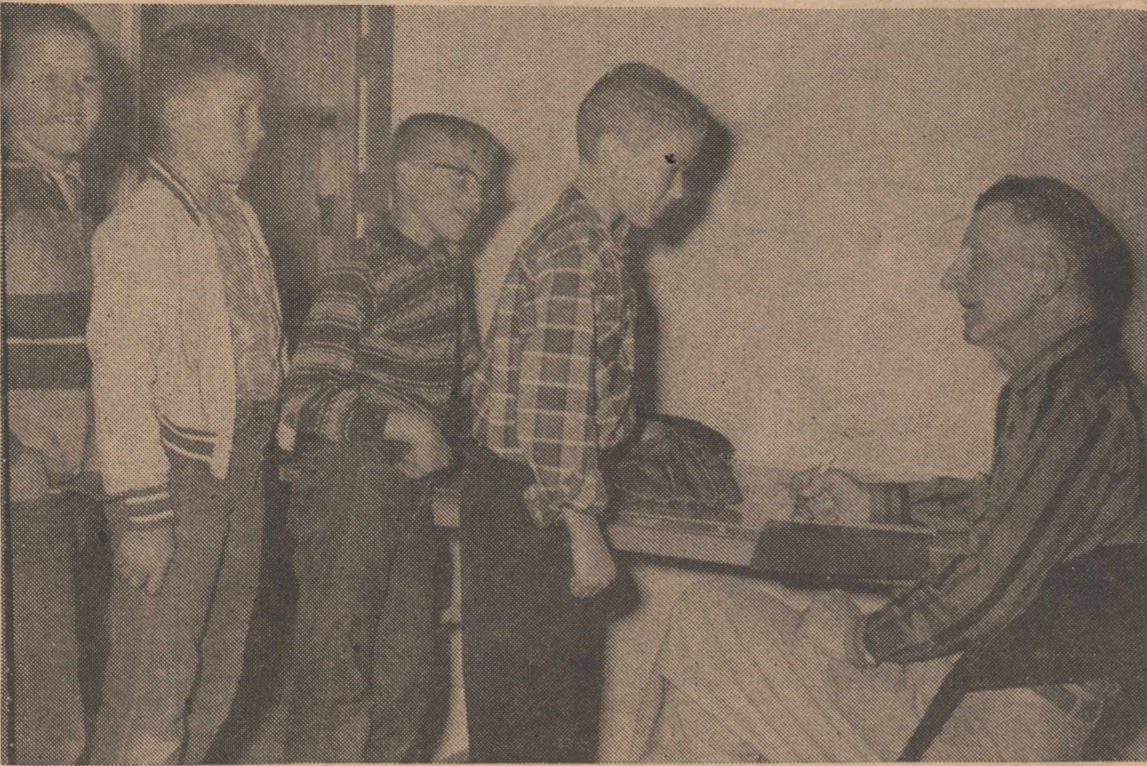
Bulk of the straight matter (a newspaperman's term for all the type except headlines and ads) has been set on the paper's new Teletypesetter.

The TTS was installed Monday and Tuesday on the Model C Intertype machine which has been manually operated in the past to produce the type.

In a nutshell, the operation works like this: a tape is "cut" on a machine with a keyboard similar to that of a typewriter. This tape is transferred to the Intertype and then, automatically, the Intertype, getting its "instructions" from the tape, produces the lines of type which make up the straight matter.

Troy Martin, Enterprise publisher, explained the paper's growth and increased use of type had made the purchase of the additional equipment necessary.

## 58 Little Leaguers Ready To Play Ball

A total of 58 potential Little League baseball players were registered at a meeting for that purpose Friday evening in the Legion Hut.

## Construction Underway On ORC Pool; Good Weather Hoped For

"All we need now is lots of pretty weather." That's what Carroll Cox, Olton Recreation Center president, said about the completion date of ORC's swimming pool—which is now under construction.

Work got underway Tuesday on the near-\$15,000 project. The completion date is still set for June 1. However, President Cox said the weather had a lot to do with how fast construction can move along.

Contractor for the job is Sea-

horse Company of Lubbock, the company which sold the recreation facility to the club. The pool was staked off Tuesday and digging of the hole began Wednesday.

The long-planned project is being constructed on the municipal land south of town where ORC's golf course is. To be more exact, it will be "roughly 300 feet southwest of the present pro shop." The pool will be modern in every detail with the latest and best possible equipment scheduled to be installed, a member of the club said.

Final planning for the American Legion team will be called sometime in the next two weeks. He expects material for the Legion group to be "light" on experience this season. "We just don't have many boys who have had much experience in Legion ball," Mr. Holt said.

## Mustang Band Captures Two First Division Ratings

Fred Stockdale's Olton Mustang Band won two first division ratings in University Interscholastic League contests Friday at Lubbock.

The top ratings were awarded in concert playing and sight reading — the only two contests held. This was the first time an Olton High School band has earned first division ratings in either contest since the school has been Class AA.

Also Jerry Meyer earned a first division rating for his efforts as a student conductor.

This year's performance showed improvement over last year. In 1957, the band was rated in the second division in concert playing and in the third group for sight reading.

Mr. Stockdale was well pleased with the band's performance Friday and said he was 'surprised' when he learned the band had reached the top rung in both contests.

The school will get a special award from UIL because of the top ratings in both divisions. Ab-

ernathy and Floydada were other AA schools in the area who were rated first in both contests.

Judges of the contests, which were conducted in the auditorium of Monterey High School, rated the bands in divisions from one through five.

A recording of the band's per-

formance will be played at the next meeting of band parents. That meeting is expected to be sometime in the next two weeks, Mr. Stockdale said.

Mustang band is made up of 58 members.

Next year, Cadet (junior high) band will compete in UIL contests,

the director announced. Divisions it will enter will be marching, sight reading and concert playing.

Tryouts for twirlers for the 1958-59 band are being conducted today (Thursday). Five are expected to be named. They will be announced in next week's issue of The Olton Enterprise.

## Margie Henderson High Student In Class Of '58

Margie Henderson is valedictorian of Olton High School Class of 1958. Her grade average during her four years in OHS was 95.06.

Salutatorian is Sharon Copeland, with an average of 93.41.

Highest ranking boy is Jerry Moore. His average is 93 even. With a score of 92.39, Lonnie Thomas is second high boy.

Announcement of the top students was made last week in an assembly program by J. A. Williams, high school principal. To be eligible for valedictorian or salutatorian, a student must have attended Olton High four years.

For her achievement, Miss Henderson will be offered a scholarship from all tax-supported colleges in the state. Texas Council of Church Related Colleges offers financial college aid to the valedictorian, the salutatorian and to the third ranking student if he or she is not the same sex as the top two, Mr. Williams said.

From a graduating class of 53 students, 13 were named in the first quarter of the class scholastically. Students in the top quarter and their averages, aside from those already mentioned, are Shirley Webb, 93.34; Jessie Thomas, 91.54; Shirley Nichols, 91.20; Doniece Silcott, 91.00; Kay Sherman, 90.64; Juanelle Hatley, 90.42; Oneeta Yates, 90.12; Latrell Stewart, 90.00; and Martha Hyman, 89.48.

This week, also in assembly, Mr. Williams announced the top students in the eighth grade.

Alice Ross Bryant, with an average of 96.50 is high. Runner-up is Geneva Curry. Her

average is 94.66. High ranking boy is Dan Long. Eighth grade averages were based on marks made during this year only, Mr. Williams pointed out.

# County Committee Asks More Money For Schools

More financial aid from the State was the primary request made by Lamb County's Hale-Aikin committee.

The committee, made up of 36 people who represented the county's six schools, began its study of school needs last fall and completed its report at a meeting this month.

Categories studied were school program, teacher supply, construction, and finance. Olton members of the committee were Supt. Noel Johnson, School Board President Louis Hair, Troy Martin, Wilton Bodkin, Mrs. Paul Burrus, and Mrs. H. B. Carson.

In the school program study, the committee suggested more adequate physical education, music, and arts and crafts programs. Also suggested was that foreign language, driver education and a fourth year of English be required of all students.

In the teacher supply division, more teachers and decreased work load for teachers were suggested as ways to achieve better utilization of teacher personnel.

In school construction, the group predicted a need for 39 more classrooms by 1963. Seven classrooms are needed now, the report reads, and 32 are predicted to be needed between now and 1963. Estimated cost of the needed classrooms was \$629,000.

The county committee's report has been given to a similar committee which operates on the state level. Work done in Lamb County was part of a state-wide plan to improve public schools in Texas.

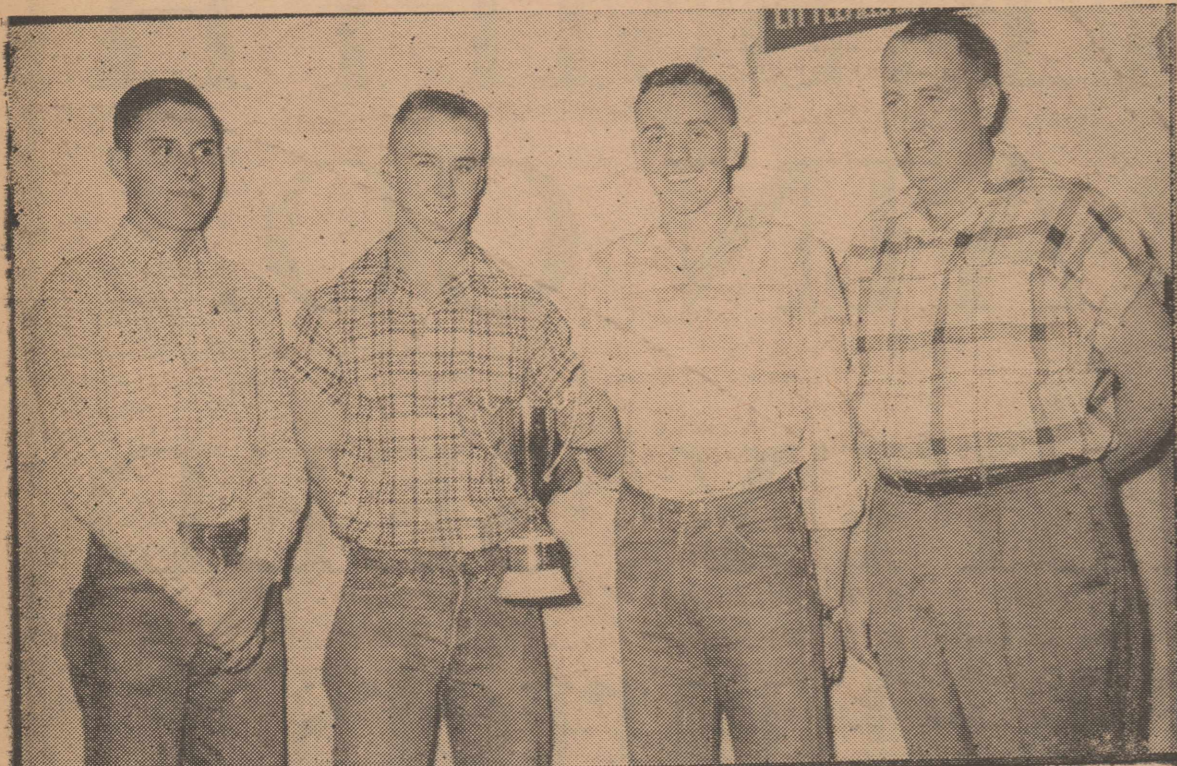

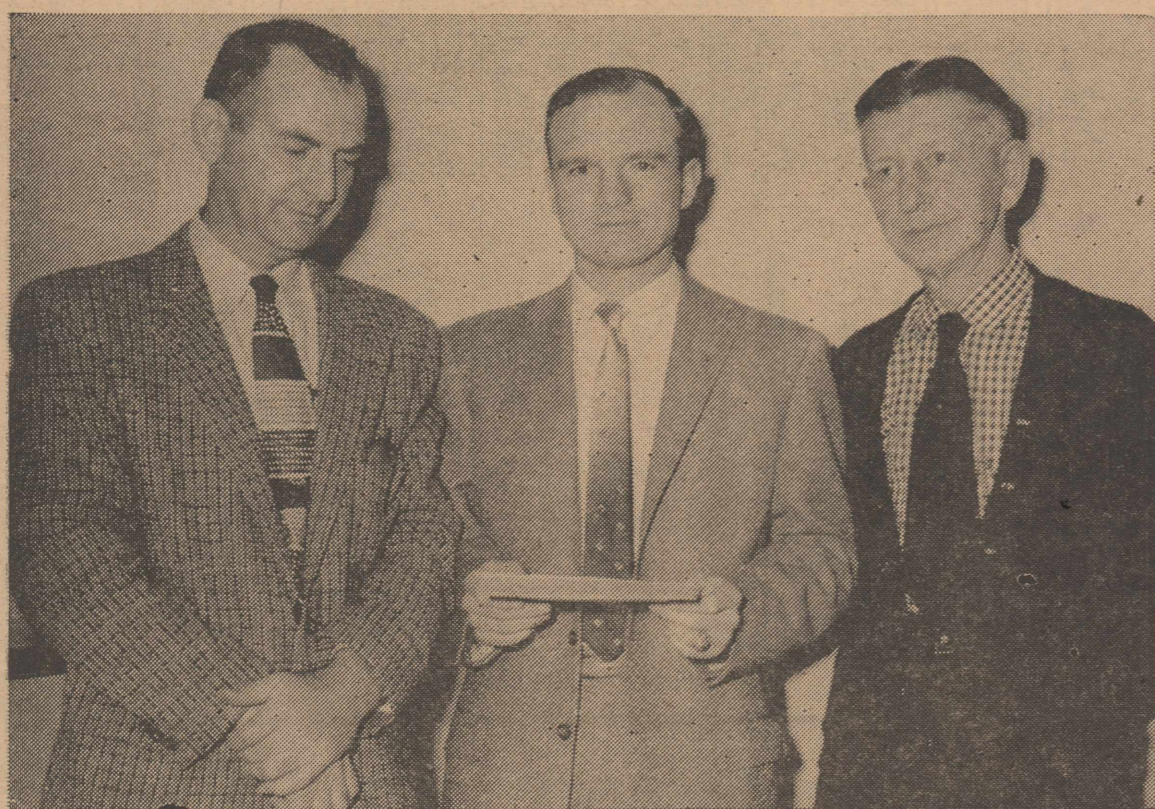

### Lecture, Demonstration On Safe Driving Given For High Schoolers

Olton High School students heard a lecture and saw a demonstration on safe driving Tuesday afternoon of last week. The program was sponsored by Texas Farm Bureau and was presented by Vernon Gayle, safety director of the organization.

Safe driving must be made a personal habit of every motorist if the slaughter on America's highways is to be curbed, Mr. Gayle told his audience prior to conducting the driving demonstrations.

"Excessive speed is the largest single cause of automobile accidents," he said. In the demonstration which followed, he pointed out the conditions under which even 20, 30 or 40 miles per hour may be excessive.

"When driver know the true facts and base their driving on these facts, highway accidents will drop sharply," he added.

The lecture portion of the program was in the school auditorium. Attending, other than students, were police officers, members of the city council, and several out-of-town visitors. The street west of the auditorium was the site of the demonstration.

Students and a teacher took part in the tests which were conducted in a specially equipped car. Jack Hysinger and Juanelle Hatley drove the car at 20 mph tests. Hayden Hankins was the driver at 30 and Mr. Carl McClure was the driver at 40 mph.

Test drivers were signalled to stop by an electrically controlled detonator. As the shell was fired, the street was marked with yellow paint. A second bullet was fired as brakes were applied and a third after the car came to a complete stop. Distances between the spots were measured to determine how far the car traveled before the driver applied the brakes, or the reaction distance, and how far it traveled

after the brakes were applied, or the braking distance.

Mr. Gayle emphasized the fact that a driver who observes the speed laws carefully is not a safe driver if he neglects many other items such as proper signalling for turns, approaching an intersection in the proper lane for a turn, the proper way to turn around, and many other things which he demonstrated in the test car.

Tuesday's program, which was brought to Olton under the sponsorship of Lamb County Farm Bureau, is part of a long-range program of traffic safety now being conducted by Texas Farm Bureau Safety Department.

### Community Needs More Disaster Equipment, Fire Chief Reports

"It's not much, but it's all we have to offer." That's what Fire Chief Tom Smith said this week about the list of equipment Olton will have for use in case a tornado hits a neighboring town.

At a meeting here a few weeks ago, leaders of 12 towns in the area agreed to help each other at a time of disaster. As a part of the plan, a man from each town was appointed to compile a list of equipment in his town that could be used to help following a storm.

The Littlefield office of Pat Boone, Jr., county judge, is being used as "headquarters"—the lists are being sent to him. He, in turn, will send each town a copy of all the other lists.

Olton's contribution included one fire truck, two radio-equipped police cars with three men to each car, one dump truck, one tractor-mounted dirt loader, and one maintainer.

When asked what else he would like to have to add to his list, Chief Smith said Olton needs an electricity plant with a pickup or truck to transport it "four or five" stretchers, "about 25" blankets, and first aid kits.

However, he said he had no hopes that any of the additional equipment could be obtained this year.

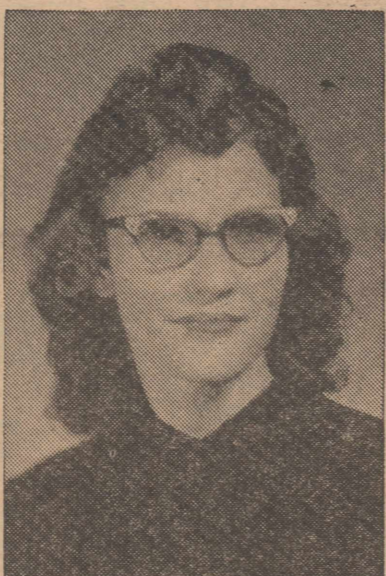

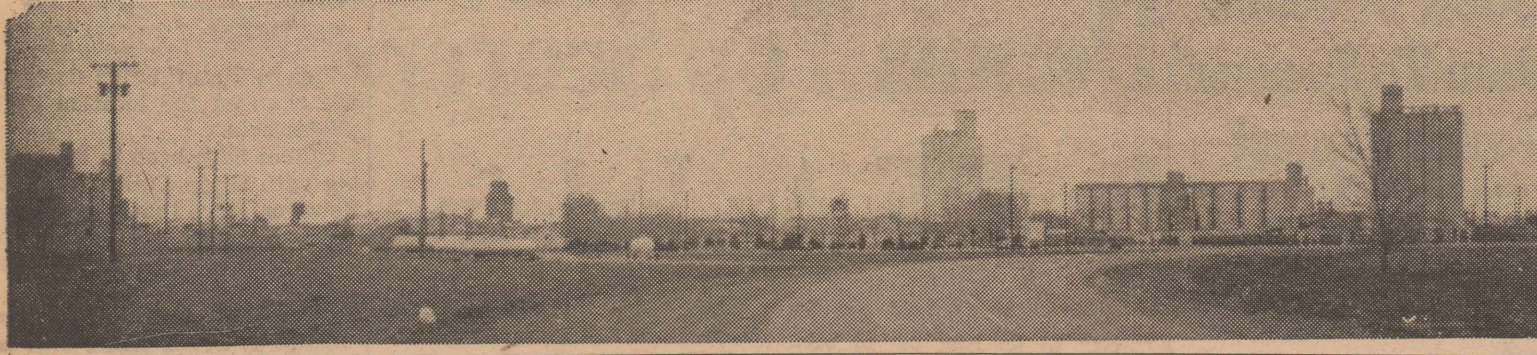
