Billy started killing early. At the tender age of 12 he shoved a homemade butcher knife between the ribs of a blacksmith in Silver City. Neighbors were inclined to look upon this homicide as a childish mistake and Billy boy was warned never again to enter Sunday School with clothes soiled with blood.

Billy boy was proud of his prowess with a pistol. He painstakingly sawed a knotch on the handle of his Frontier Colt (the song about Billy erroneously refers to it as a .44) for every man who went down before his smoking gun.

Legend doesn't relate how many of those who died thusly either were unarmed or shot in the back. On a sultry night in July of 1880, a conscientious sheriff, Pat Garrett, cornered Billy in the Maxwell House at Fort Sumner.

Bad boy Billy died as he had lived, to the reverberating sound of thundering guns.

Stockdale Announces Rehearsal

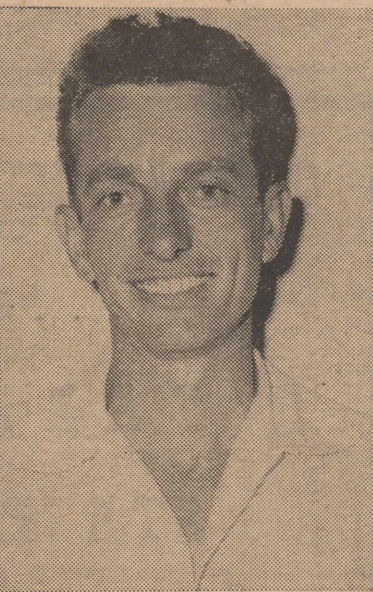
Band rehearsal has been announced for 7:30 o'clock next Monday night.

who'd once been his friend," mournfully wails the ballad to Billy the Kid. What a dirty lie. Billy the Kid never had a friend. Certainly he was no friend of Lawman Pat Garrett.

It is ironic. Around Billy the Kid's grave is a steel fence. The graves of Billy and two companions are well marked with a marble headstone. Also they are well kept—a shrine to Lawlessness.

Across the cemetery from Billy's grave is the grave of one of the most prominent men in the history of the Southwest—that of Lucien Bonaparte Maxwell.

Maxwell was a fur trader, trapper and businessman. He moved to New Mexico to take over management of one of the largest tracts of land ever to be owned by a single man.

His contributions to the development of his country must have been many.

Within less than 50 feet of the well-kept grave of New Mexico's most notorious outlaws is the grave of one of her most useful and illustrious sons. The Maxwell grave is enmeshed in a mess of weeds and prickly pear.

For shame on Fort Sumner. For shame on New Mexico. For shame on us all who revere the memory of an outlaw, hated and feared in his time, above the memory of those who were great in the service of mankind.

Lone Star Degree Goes To Nine Olton FFA Boys

Olton's FFA chapter has again won state recognition and appears on the way to national honors for the second consecutive year.

Nine Olton boys were named Lone Star Farmer this year. They are John Adams, Darryl Dennis, Ronnie Dennis,

Don Edwards, Charlie Giles, Tom McGill, Jerry Moore, Carl Natzger and James Simmons.

It was a proud day for Vocational Ag Instructors Harold Warren and J. C. Lane. Both men are leaving the teaching profession this year for other lines of business.

Lane will farm here in the Olton community while Warren has announced plans to go into the insurance business at Victoria.

Last year they saw 17 of their young charges get Lone Star Farmer degrees—a new all-time record for the State of Texas.

Over Quota

Applications of three other Lone Star Farmer candidates were turned down this year only because the state overshot its quota of such degrees.

Boys qualified for the degree but denied it because of the quota are Joe Riney, Lennon Young and Lonnie Miller. Lane said their records will be re-submitted at a later date and they, too, probably will become Lone Star Farmers.

The nine degrees awarded Olton lads this year brought to 31 the number of Olton boys to receive the Lone Star Farmer award under the tutelage of J. C. Lane.

31 Degrees

One boy received the degree in 1955, four in 1956, 17 in 1957 and 9 in 1958.

The name of Bobby Johnson will be submitted to the National Board of Directors and the National Board of Student Officers for their consideration of his application for the American Farmer Degree.

The Olton chapter was named first alternate for a National FFA Chapter Rating. Olton Chapter received the state Gold Medal Chapter award.

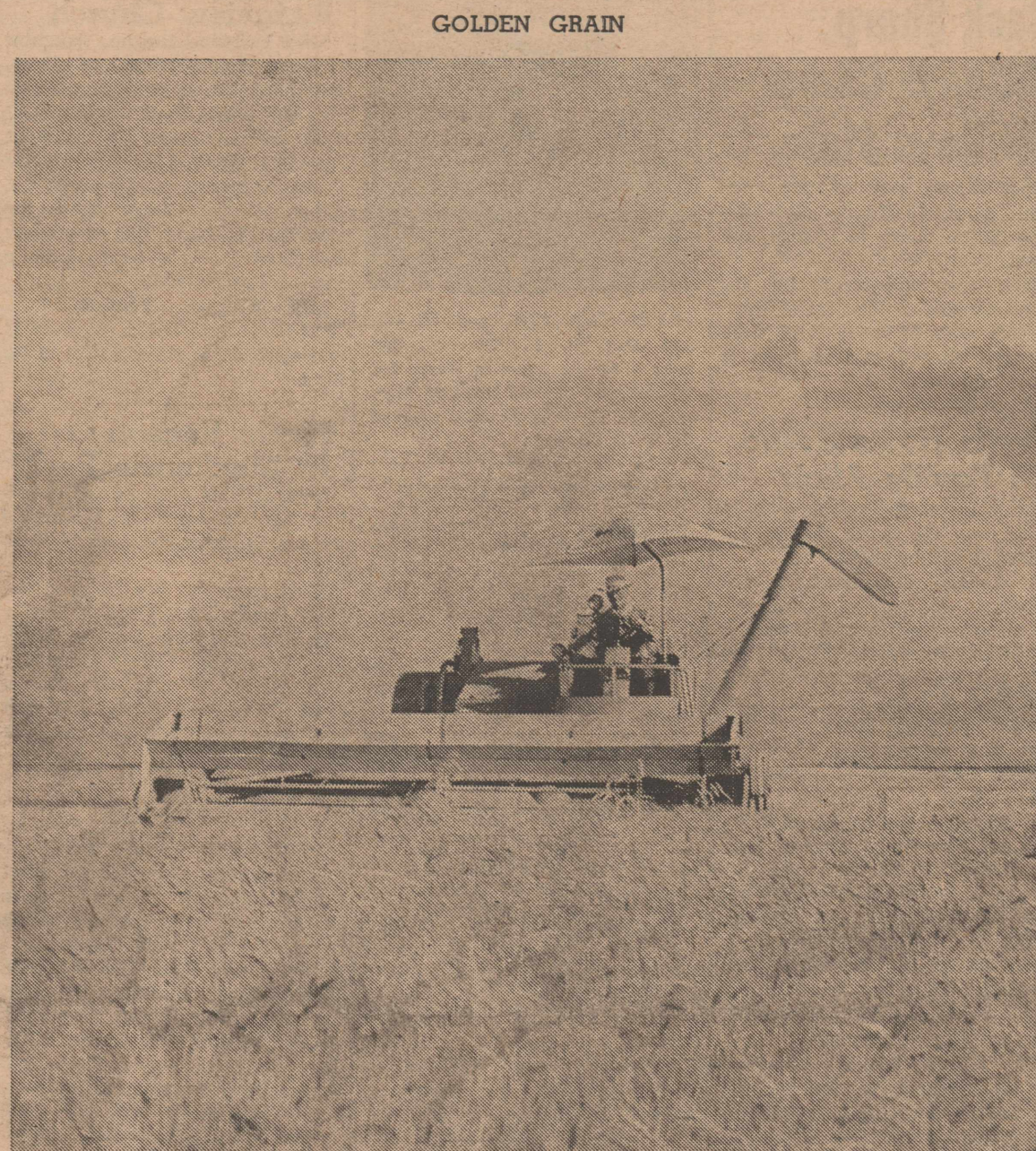
Dewey Hukill was awarded the Anderson-Clayton Scholarship.

"Much of the credit for these achievements must go to the men

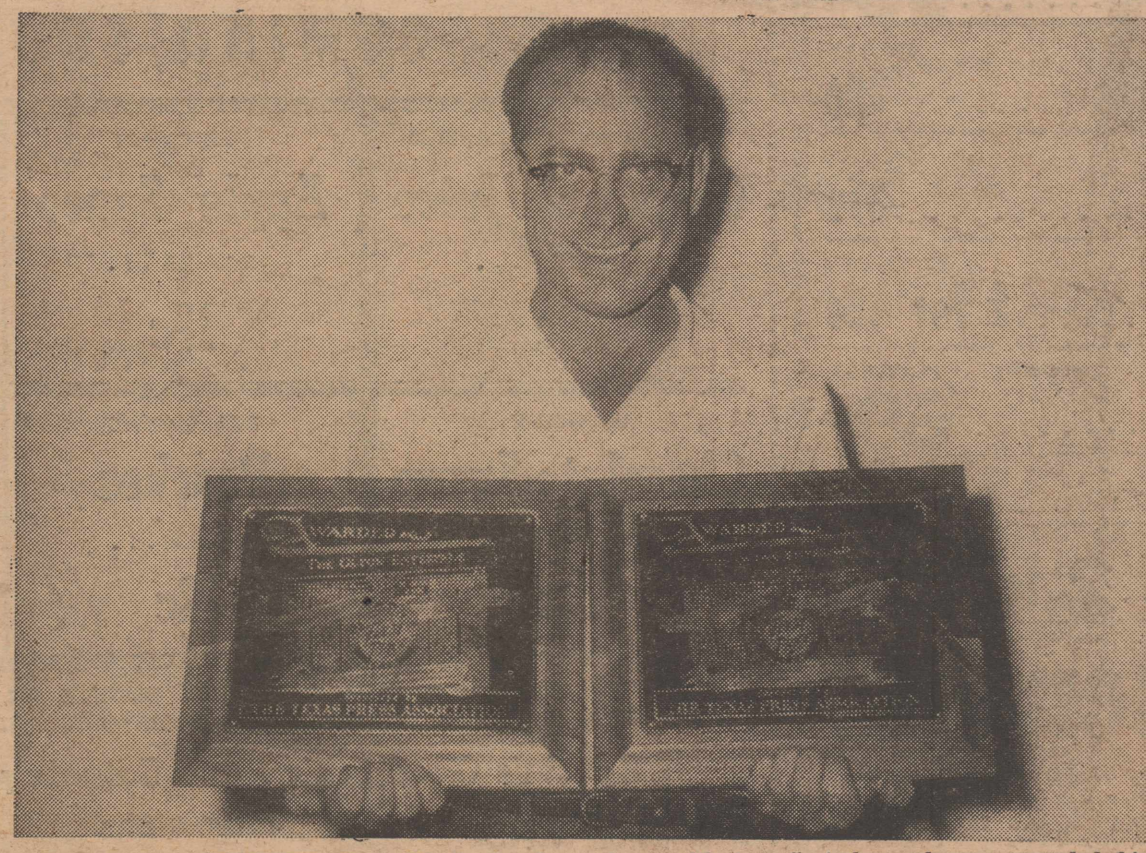

There had been a considerable build up of mosquitoes here the past few days. Residents said the single spraying Monday night improved the situation a great deal.

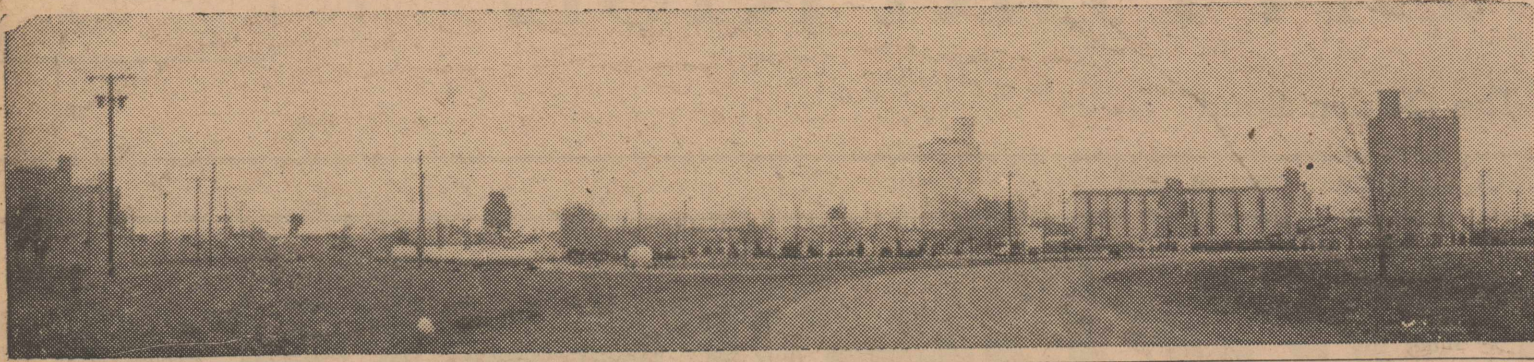
DEATH TO MOSQUITOES

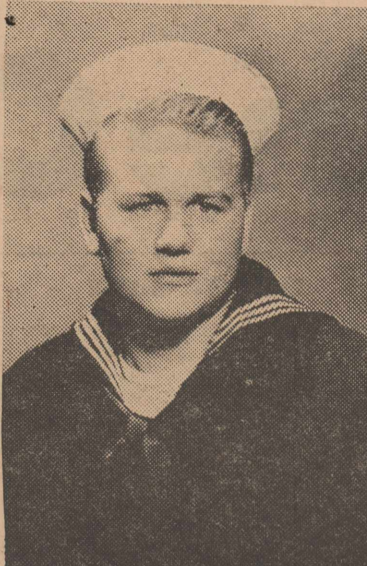

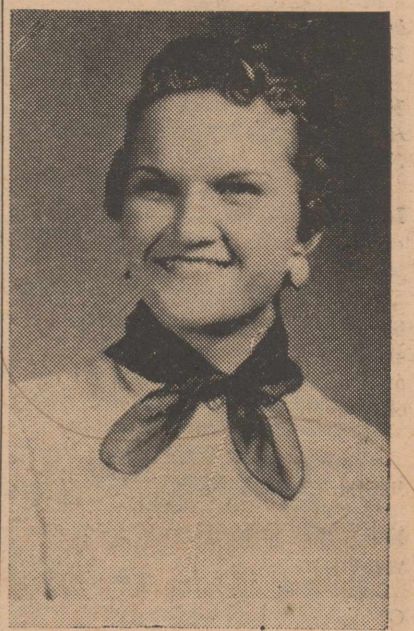

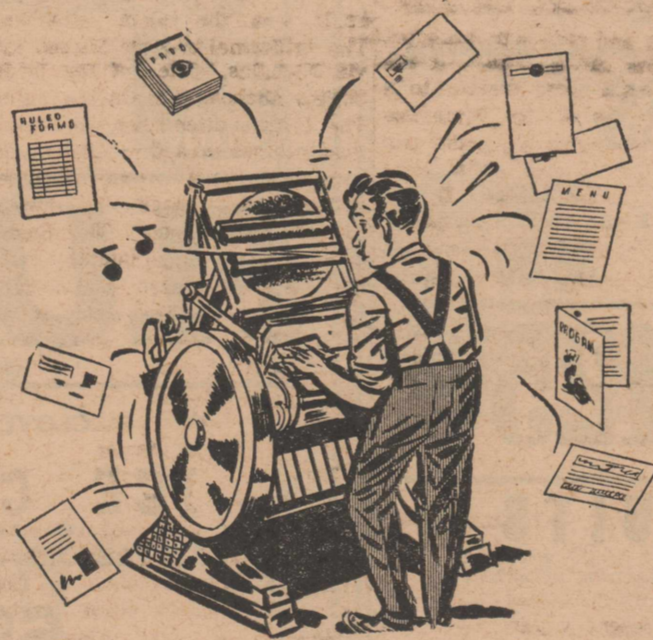

Instead of my usual attempt to write the conventional kind of book review I would like to share with you a quotation from the Antioch Bookplate Company's catalog:

2 cans asparagus
1 can pimiento

Grated Cheese

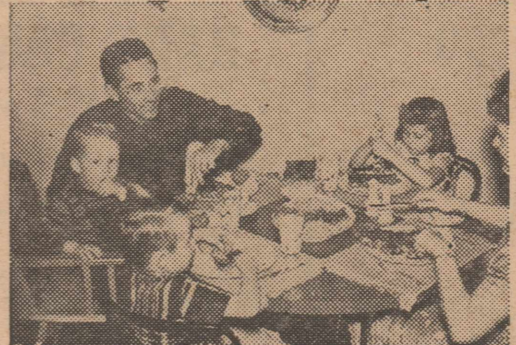
Drain liquid from cans of vegetables and arrange in bottom of the broiler pan. Place asparagus down center of pan. Place pimiento strips down the center of asparagus. Arrange 1 can of Mexican on each side of asparagus. Season vegetables with salt and pepper.
