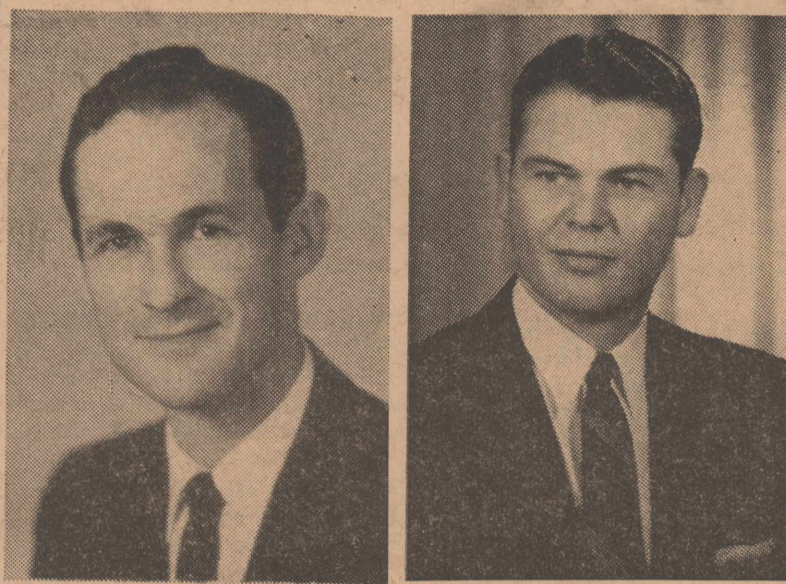

All three winners in the Little Miss ORC contest were presented trophies. There were some 40 "Little Miss" contestants.

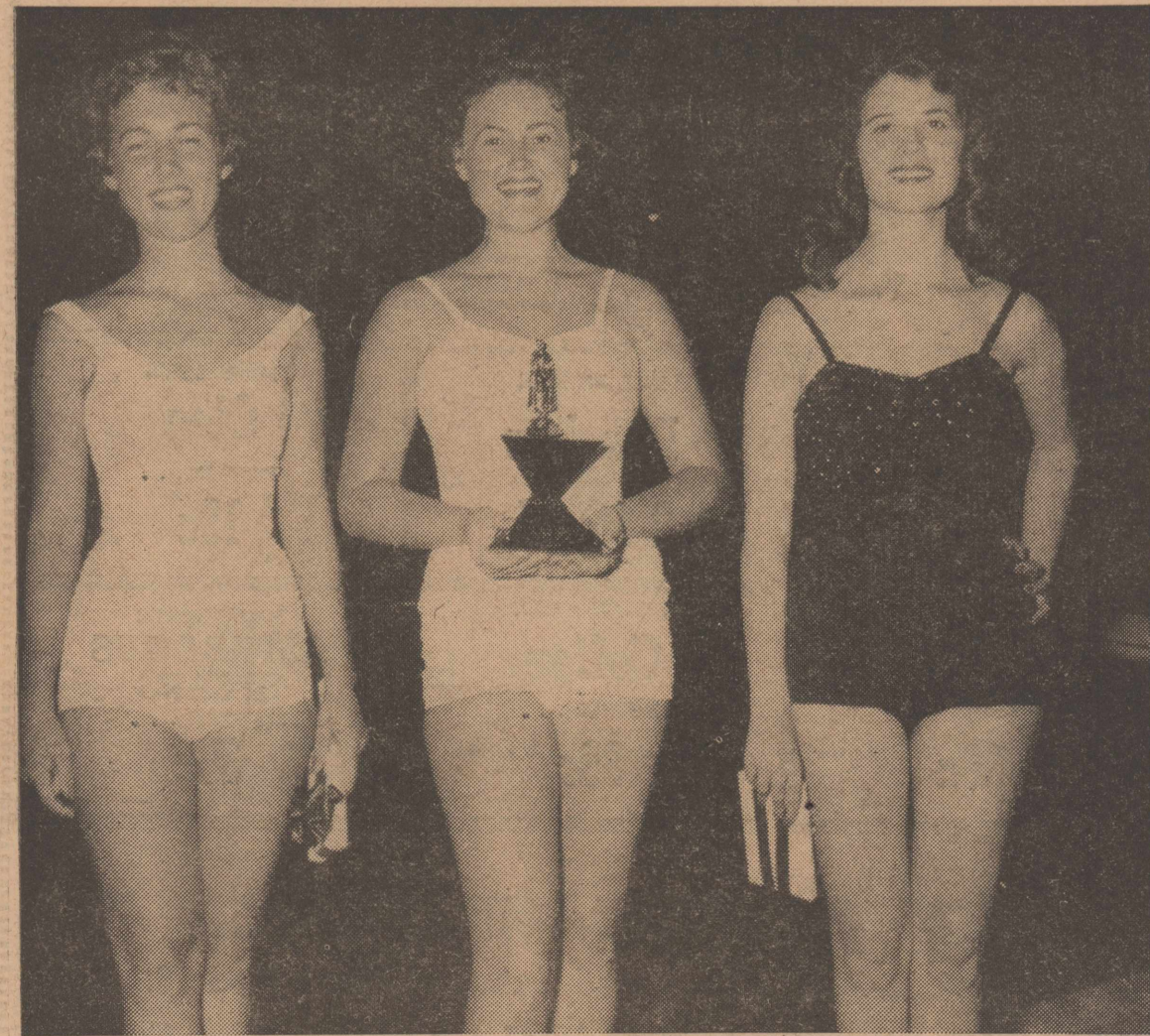

Twenty youth and Rev. and Mrs. Russell McAnally attended a Plainview District Methodist Youth meeting in Plainview Sunday afternoon.

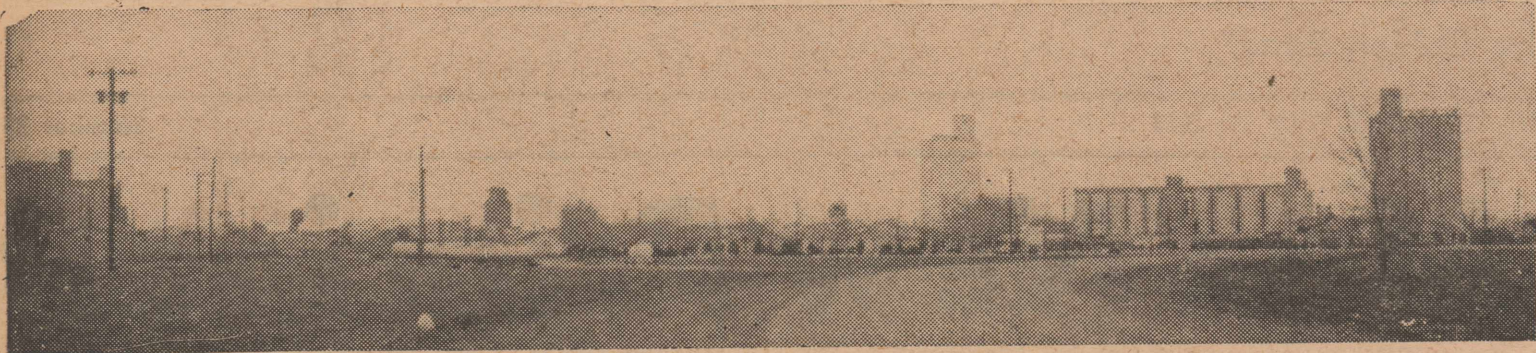

## New Senate Hand Aided Democrats

When William A. Blakley was appointed to the U. S. Senate in 1937, he was a political unknown in Texas. But Washington awaited his arrival with great interest. So close was the party balance in the Senate that Blakley's vote was the difference between Democratic and Republican control.
