Post Man To Open Funeral Home; Ambulance To Serve Community

Olton will have the first funeral home in its history within the next few weeks.

Percy Parsons of Post this week announced that he will open Parsons Funeral Home, here by the middle of August.

Mr. Parsons has purchased a duplex on Ninth Street from Paul Nafzger and it is being remodeled to house the funeral home. Re-

modeling is scheduled to begin this week and should be completed within the next three weeks.

Mr. Parsons said his firm will carry a complete line of funeral service insurance as well as a complete line of monuments.

The business will have a modern ambulance equipped with oxygen and the emergency vehicle will be on community call 24 hours a day. This will be the first local

ambulance service available to the people of Olton since such service was discontinued by Olton Memorial Hospital some time ago.

Mr. Parsons has been in the funeral home business for the past 12 years. He was at Brownfield before moving to Post where he was a partner in the Hudman Funeral Home.

He sold out his interest in the Post funeral home, July 1 of this year preparatory to making the

Olton Ships First Load Of Cucumbers To The Processor

Olton's first load of cucumbers rolled toward the Rainbo pickle vats in Texarkana, Monday night. Joe Wood, manager of Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, said the first load of cucumbers was brought in by Lowell Ray.

They graded 39 per cent number ones. Olton growers have a con-

tract with Brown-Miller Company, canners of Rainbo pickles, for \$5.00 per hundredweight for number one cucumbers.

Mr. Wood, who also works with the grading machine, said a load Monday graded 44 per cent number ones. He said cucumber harvest should get into full swing by the middle of next week.

Cucumbers are harvested on a 7-day week basis. Growers said laborers should make at least \$6.00 a day in the harvest.

One grower said an average of 1 1/2 workers per acre will be re-

quired to harvest Olton's 235 acre crop. Almost \$90,000 will be paid to workers during the six-week harvest and pumped into Olton's ever needful summer economy.

Bill McPherson who farms near Halfway says growers have about \$35 an acre invested in the crop at harvest time. "The crop looks good and we have hopes," he declared.

Mr. Wood said many growers have put bees on the cucumber acreage. He said experts at A&M College contend that bees will in some cases increase the yield of cucumbers as much as five-fold.

Hail Damages Wide Area Sunday Nite

Hail ravaged a wide swath in the Olton and Hart Camp communities Sunday night.

Hail damage was reported west of Olton on a line extending to points south of town. Insurance people here estimated that the swath cut by hail was about two miles wide.

Damage ran from negligible to an estimated 100 per cent in the stricken area.

Elsewhere feed crops were stripped of foliage.

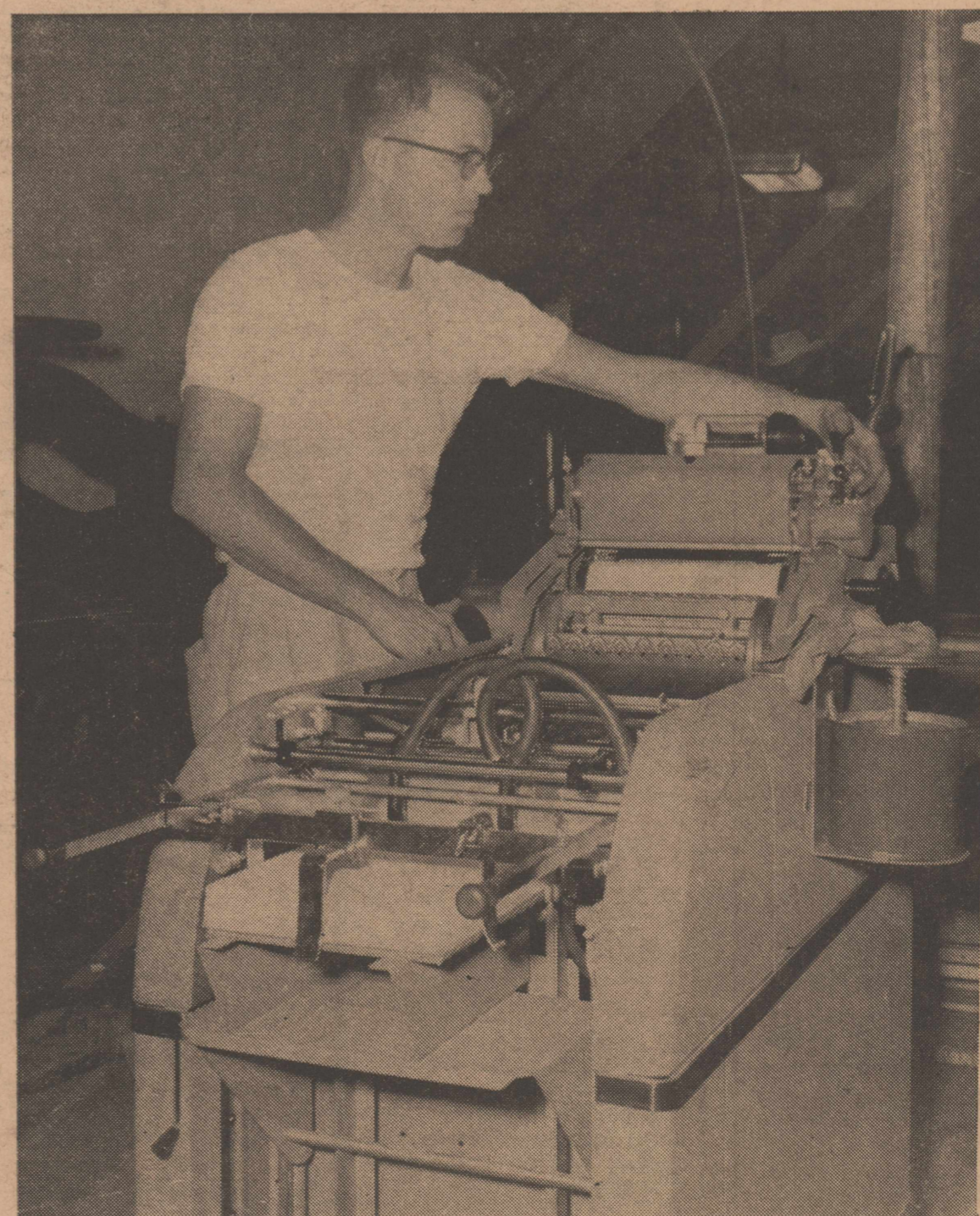
H. R. Monroe said damage was heavy in the Hart Camp area. He said hail stones as large as hens eggs were reported in that community.

normally politically minded Olton paid so little attention to an election. One contributing factor to the lack of interest is the fact that several county offices such as that of the sheriff and Olton's county commissioner are not to be filled this year.

The offices of sheriff and commissioner are now being filled on a four-year basis and incumbents will hold those offices until 1960.

Another contributing factor is lack of interest in state-level races.

Daniel In Most observers concede that Price Daniel, running for his second term as governor, will find Henry Gonzales of Bexar County, a pushover.

The only spark of political fire in top echelon races this year is in the Senatorial race where perennial campaigner Ralph W. Yarborough is pitted against William A. Blakley.

Hot Race

Thirteen places down the ballot is the next race that has attracted any attention whatever. It is the race for the 30th district state Senatorial seat.

Three men are competing in this mud-spattered marathon. They are Leroy Saul, state representative from Swisher County; Karl L. Lovelady, former legislator from Muleshoe; and Andy Rogers, incumbent from Childress County.

These three campaigners have given the local election scene the only smattering of color seen this year. They have kept the air filled with charges and countercharges.

Incumbent Pat Boone Jr., and Paul Lewis are in a hotly contested race for the office of Lamb County judge.

Four candidates are running for the office of county treasurer. Incumbent in the race is Mrs. Bill Pass. Others in the race are L. D. Stanaford, Mrs. Lucy Moreland and A. S. "Pete" Parrack.

Voting here will be done at the high school gymnasium. Presiding judge will be Eldon Franks. He will be assisted by Louis Hair. Polls will open at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and close at 7 o'clock Saturday evening.

H. V. Lynch will be presiding judge at the Hart Camp election which will be held at the Baptist Church. The precinct convention there will be held at Hart Camp Co-Op Gin.

Fieldton balloting will be at the butane company office. Presiding judge will be Sherman Rushing. The convention will be held at the Farmers Gin office there.

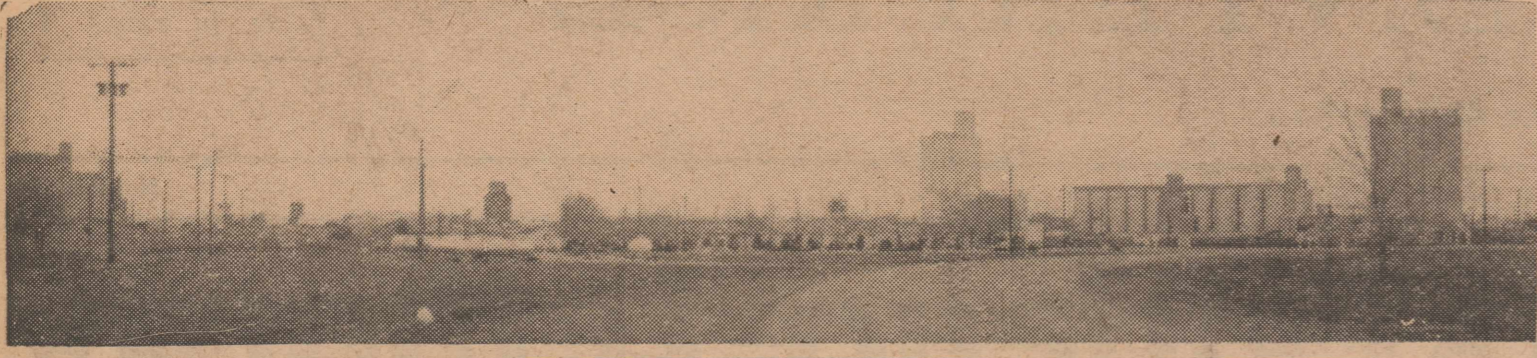

ONE OF THE most vital races in Saturday's Democratic primary is that of State Senator. There is much more involved than mere personality. Since the issues have been clouded by gossip, slander, false rumors and even defamation of character, the voter has a tremendous personal responsibility to sift truth from fiction, prejudice from objective appraisal, and fact from fancy.

WE ARE NOT supporting Senator Andy Rogers, the incumbent, because we think he is perfect, because he has pleased us all the time, because we think he is the only resident of the 30th Senatorial district capable of serving with ability and integrity. We are supporting him because he towers head and shoulders above the two men who now seek his place in the Senate. So completely objectionable are the other two men, in our opinion, that we would have to scratch both names if the name of Senator Rogers did not appear on the ballot.

HERE ARE SOME of our reasons for having to support Rogers. He is the incumbent, having served only one complete term in the Senate. And it is our belief that an incumbent deserves re-election unless there is a good reason why he should not be re-elected. In the case of a Senator, seniority is of utmost importance. It would be extremely unwise for a district to throw its seniority in the Senate to the wind. Senator Rogers already has the job. We owe nothing to a person, even a friend, who covets the job of his neighbor.

Secondly, anyone who studies Rogers' record carefully will soon find that he thinks like the typical resident of the 30th district. We have not always seen eye to eye with Rogers on every issue that has come up, in fact, on occasion we have attacked some of his decisions editorially—but we have approved his actions in a huge majority of cases. In voting, our choice is not to select the perfect candidate, according to our own specifications—our choice is to vote for the man who most nearly reaches perfection.

While Senator Rogers' batting average in the Senate is high, in our opinion, the voting records of his opponents are completely unpalatable in too many instances.

ONE OF ROGERS' opponents has represented big business interests, including the utilities monopoly, much more effectively than he has represented the farmers and smalltown businessmen of the 30th district.

The other man in the race, when he was in the Legislature, voted for exempting utility companies from the license fee (required of other appliance dealers) for the privilege of selling gas and electric appliances, parts and repairs in towns of 3,000 or less. He voted for a two per cent gross receipts tax on soft drink bottlers which Gov. Shivers offered. It was adopted 15-14, so his was the key vote. Later, the Senate reversed itself and killed this tax. He also voted to table Aikin's effort to reduce this bottle's tax to one per cent. Then Aikin tried to exempt milk from the bottle's tax and this candidate voted not to exempt milk.

THIS CANDIDATE introduced a bill to give the state a first lien on any property owned by old-age assistance recipients and to require that it be foreclosed on their deaths and the state welfare department would get back all they had been paid. This idea has been pushed by anti-pension folks ever since. He also introduced a bill regulating sale, distribution or possession of oleomargarine which hurts every cotton farmer. And most objectionable of all, he supported a two per cent state income tax proposal!

This is to say that Senator Rogers, the incumbent, is much better qualified to serve an agricultural district than either of his opponents. Ask any informed farmer who is familiar with REA and other major farm problems. Ask informed leaders of any farm organization who have had occasion to make trips to Austin in the interest of farm problems.

IN THE THIRD place, we would have to vote for Andy Rogers because the special interests groups, the gas pipeline group, the utilities monopoly, the anti-farm group, those who would like to have federal and state control of underground water, those who consistently try to keep the lid on Austin scandals, those who do not want practitioners of the healing arts controlled or licensed by the state, those who have proved themselves enemies of the Farm to Market road program, those who abhor independent thinking, those who try to tell legislators to get on their team or else they will have to smear them, all have combined to try to move heaven and earth to defeat Senator Rogers. Rogers has been threatened by these interests which warned him not to run. He was told to be a good boy, to go back to Childress and settle down, and he wouldn't be hurt by the character assassins and gangsters who have a great deal of influence in Austin.

Perhaps Rogers would have retired to go back to Childress and make a living for his family had he not been threatened as he was. But there is something in a red-blooded American that causes him not to yield to gangster tactics. So Rogers defied the warnings.

We need more men like Rogers in Austin, men who will put principle above politics, men who will not sacrifice honor for expediency. Men like Rogers are and will be in a minority for sometime, but at least they will speak out against corruption so we can hear. To fail to re-elect Rogers would not be a step in the right direction.

AND FINALLY, even if we did not have the reasons mentioned above for supporting Rogers, even if we did not believe him to be the best man intellectually, morally and spiritually, we would have to support him because of the campaign techniques used by his opponents or supporters of his opponents.

This race, from the time it started with the mailing of anonymous smear literature, has been one of the filthiest races in the history of Texas politics.

We have had "Port Arthur" type stories in circulation almost weekly since early spring. Some of the false stories planted here and there have been petty. Others have been outright libelous. They include, for example, the testimony of a former medical doctor who lost his license, who has served numerous terms in penitentiaries in several states including Florida, Maryland and Oklahoma, who is at present under indictment for performing an abortion in a Dallas tourist court, who prejured himself when under oath he voluntarily made statements a week apart in direct conflict, who was convicted three times for being a confidence man.

Yet there are those having an interest in getting Rogers out of the Senate who produce a completely false statement signed by this character in trouble up to his neck which they expect people to believe in preference to the word of Senator Rogers, other members of the Legislature, official records in Austin, and even newspapers and public officials who have not been particularly friendly to Senator Rogers. And, strangely enough, one of the men attempting to unseat Senator Rogers served on the House investigating committee and would have had access to the official records which, had they contained information adversely affecting the senator, would have made a perfect rope with which to hang Rogers. Yet, instead of bringing about the prosecution of Senator Rogers, had there been any basis for doing so, he does nothing about it. Either this man is guilty of negligence of duty or the whispered charges against Senator Rogers are complete fabrications.

ALL OF THESE false stories, planted and distributed, appeal only to "the moron vote" because of their utter absurdity. As a Tullia pastor told us when we showed him some of the smear literature now in circulation against Senator Rogers, "When I see something like that, it spurs me on to vote for

WILLIAMS AFB, ARIZ.: Learning to exist in 112-degree desert heat and flying in jets on gunnery missions are a part of the routine for 14 Texas Tech Air Force ROTC cadets here.

Commanded by Lt. Col. Edwin Heller, veteran World War II and Korean Conflict ace, the cadets have also experienced ejection seat rides and altitude chamber "flights" in addition to the usual classroom work and rigid inspections at Williams.

commander of the AF ROTC at Texas Tech, is training officer for the summer camp.

Facets Of Military Life
During their summer tour, the cadets are familiarized with all facets of military life and AF training they will receive after they are commissioned.

Those who have signed up for flying training received a preview of their future military life with jet indoctrination rides and gunnery mission flights with Williams AFB pilots.

Survival training—in both water and desert—is part of a jet pilot's schooling and the cadets experienced a brief taste of both.

After a march into the furnace-like Arizona desert, they learned to get water by squeezing

the juices from cactus as part of their 24-hour trek.

Snake And Lizard Meat
Meals featuring snake, lizard, road runner and rabbit as the main course were the rule while they rested under lean-to's made from the stem core of Saguaro cacti draped with parachute canopies.

During the trek, cadets were "bombed" with flour bags, and "strafed" by Lt. Col. Heller flying an F-86 low over their camp site.

Water survival techniques were practiced in the cadets swimming pool.

A fire-power demonstration at Gill Bend gunnery range featured the F-101 Voodoo in action and a display of combat performance techniques of the F-100, F-86, and F-84 jet aircraft to give the cadets an idea of what they may fly in the future.

Their final days of training were highlighted by a tour of the North American Aircraft plant in Los Angeles, Calif., last week.

After completing the senior year of academic and AF ROTC work at Tech next spring, the cadets will be commissioned as second lieutenants in the US Air Force Reserve. They will serve three or five year active duty tours, depending on the type of assignment they have requested.
