## Olton Exes Use Gunsmoke Theme; Bob Fisher Elected 1958 President

More than 150 persons were present for the Annual Ex-Students and Teachers Banquet here December 26 to elect new officers, hear a talk by a veteran educator, and be entertained with a western theme.

Bob Fisher succeeds Cleo Smith as president of the organization. Mrs. A. J. Givens follows Mrs. R. V. Allcorn as vice-president; Mrs. Melvin Hines succeeds Mrs. Edd Lynn Burrus as secretary-treasurer.

Guest speaker for the occasion was G. A. Cryer, instructor at Amarillo Air Force Base. Mr. Cryer, a long-time superintendent of schools, told of the realization of his dreams when he was privileged to have a part in establishing Phillips Junior College at Borger.

The educator challenged the listeners with an explanation of what each color of the United States flag symbolizes: the red stands for courage; blue, for truth; white, for purity; and the gold-fringed edge, added only since World War II, for love.

Mr. Cryer emphasized the over all negligence of Americans to teach these qualities to our children.

Elmer Moore, another former school superintendent presently engaged in farming here, was master of ceremonies for the dinner. Invocation was offered by Don Carson, an ex-student of OHS, and the response was given by a former Olton coach, Ernest Jones of Lubbock.

A complete "Gunsmoke" theme was used in the decorations. Centerpieces were formed variously of old-fashioned wash pans filled with "gold nuggets;" sprayed guns spitting "gunsmoke;" and sprayed tumble weeds. A burro, complete with pack saddle, stood outside a sign reading, "Long Branch." Other creations included saddles and hitching posts, a painted desert scene (hand painted by Caron Copeland and Jerry Hatter), and a bar-room setting.

A skit of "Frankie and Johnnie" was presented, with Juan-elle Hatley, Jack Roy Straw, Clinton Billingsley, Torchie Cure, Sue Hair, Delmer Givens, Bill Austin and Joe Francis Miller.

The "men's chorus" included Lairy Hair, Houston Hamby, Jerry Moore, Basil Sherman, A. J. Givens, Cecil Gallaway and James Ray Hyatt.

# Weather Top Olton News During Turbulent 1957

## TORNADO, SNOW, HAIL, FROST, WIND, RAIN HARRASS FARMERS

The weather was far and away the top news in the Olton community during 1957.

Here's a brief summary of how the weather unfolded during the year.

Balmy breezes told a story of early spring the first part of March. But old lady weather proved more fickle than a Hollywood divorcee.

She swung a decisive punch the latter part of the same month striking down the Plains country ranchers' calf crop with a howling blizzard.

Hardly had the snow plows been put away when twisting black clouds began their reign of terror across the area.

Twin tornadoes left Hart Camp and Spade in shambles Easter night, and April 21, 1957 will long be remembered as Black Sunday in those two communities.

Hart Camp Co-op Gin was destroyed in a holocaust; the estimated cost of which was pegged at near \$300,000.

Cellar-digging contractors became the most sought-after folks in the region and there was good reason.

Olton had its trial by the elements Friday, May 24. A black cloud came boiling out of the west and by the time the sun shone again, some minutes later, the Olton community counted its material loss at upwards of \$600,000.

Rubble littered nearby farm land—much of it still unplanted.

Farmers planted late crops and breathed a prayer for a long, dry growing season. This they were not to have.

However, crops flourished and it appeared that the community would reap another bumper. Harrased farmers sat by helpless to harvest as the fall rains came.

There were no actual flooding conditions. Moisture fell in agonizing spurts that made harvest impossible. Cotton bolls became sappy and then the weather threw its most staggering blow . . . an early freeze.

Grades and price of cotton suffered. As if to demonstrate how nasty they could become, the elements sent a howling sand-storm and gale winds shrieking across the Plains. This laid low the grain sorghum crop which remained in the fields at that point.

If the farmer suffered from the weather, so then did the merchants. Mexican harvest labor became discouraged after weeks of bad weather and left for their south Texas homes. Behind them they left on the store shelves, merchandise purchased by merchants to have been sold during a fall rush which failed to materialize.

As the new year dawned, Olton farmers and merchants thought hopefully of "next fall" and the prospect of a better 1958 harvest.

There were many bright spots in the 1957 news. Olton organized a recreation center and acquired a 90-acre plot of ground south of town which already has been improved into a golf course.

Organizers of the group known as Olton Municipal Recreation Center hope to build a swimming pool there by May 1.

A Chamber of Commerce was organized and at the end of 1957 that association had almost reached its budget goal and was casting about for a full-time Chamber manager—first in Olton's history.

The school board appointed a survey committee to ascertain some of the physical plant needs of Olton school system.

The committee made recommendations, which if allowed,

Mrs. Gerry McKinzie sewed doll clothes for the gifts; Horace Cates cleaned all stuffed toys; White Auto Store donated other toys; P-TA and Eastern Star donated money to provide paints and other parts; Brownie Scouts made sock dolls.

V. L. Smith, assisted by the Ministerial Alliance, solicited donations from merchants and individuals for groceries and clothing, and directed the distribution of the gifts. He reports that everything which was presented Christmas Eve is paid for, as well as the 1000 packages of treats given at the Community Christmas Program earlier.

Mr. Smith and Mr. and Mrs. Dickenson join in expressing their gratitude to the many persons who brought toys for repair and who made other contributions.

J. D. Glenn, butcher at Sherman Food, is confined to the Littlefield Hospital. He suffered a light stroke Tuesday.

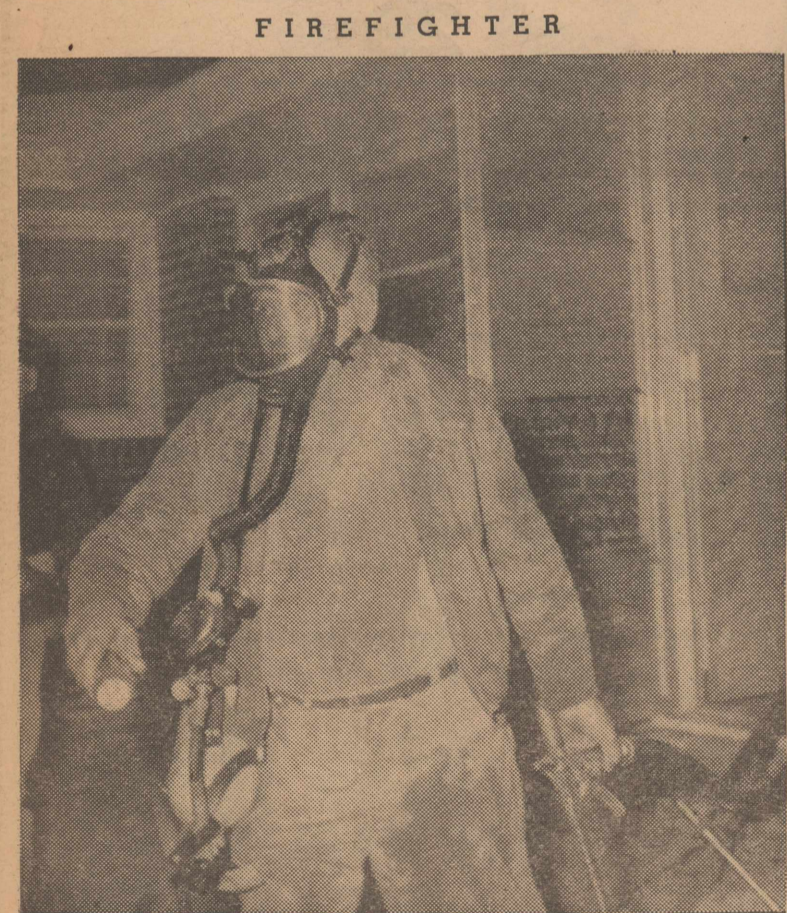
His condition was reported as good Wednesday night.

## Owens Will Seek Second Clerk Term

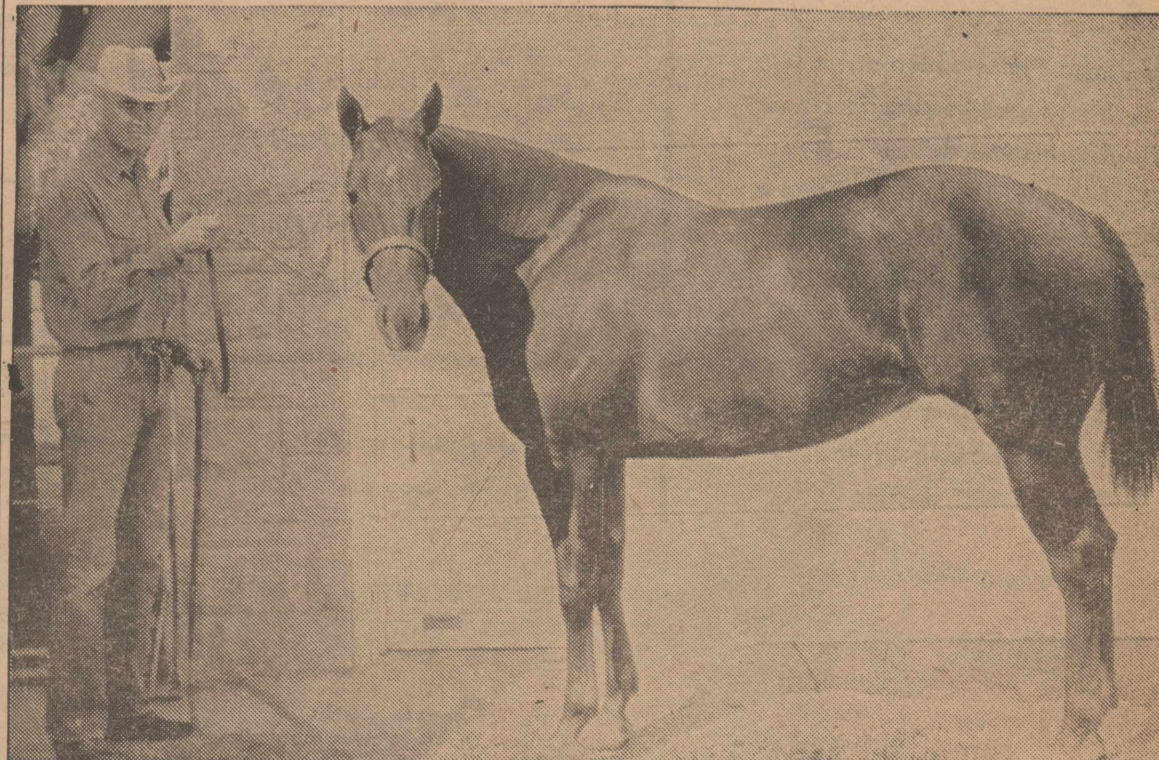
Ernest Owens has announced his candidacy for re-election to the office of district clerk.

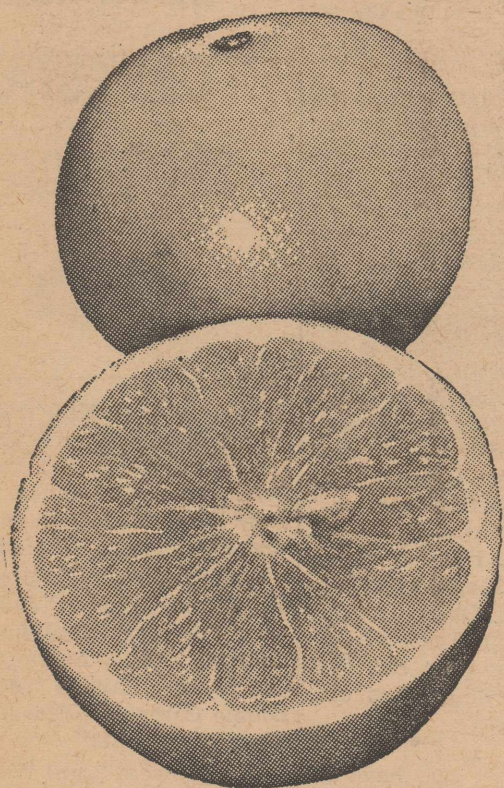

Although there is as yet no

cure for the disease, women who suffer its symptoms are not necessarily headed for the wheelchair.

With its present knowledge, medical science can prevent serious crippling in 70 percent of the persons who develop arthritis if symptoms are recognized early and treatment is begun promptly.

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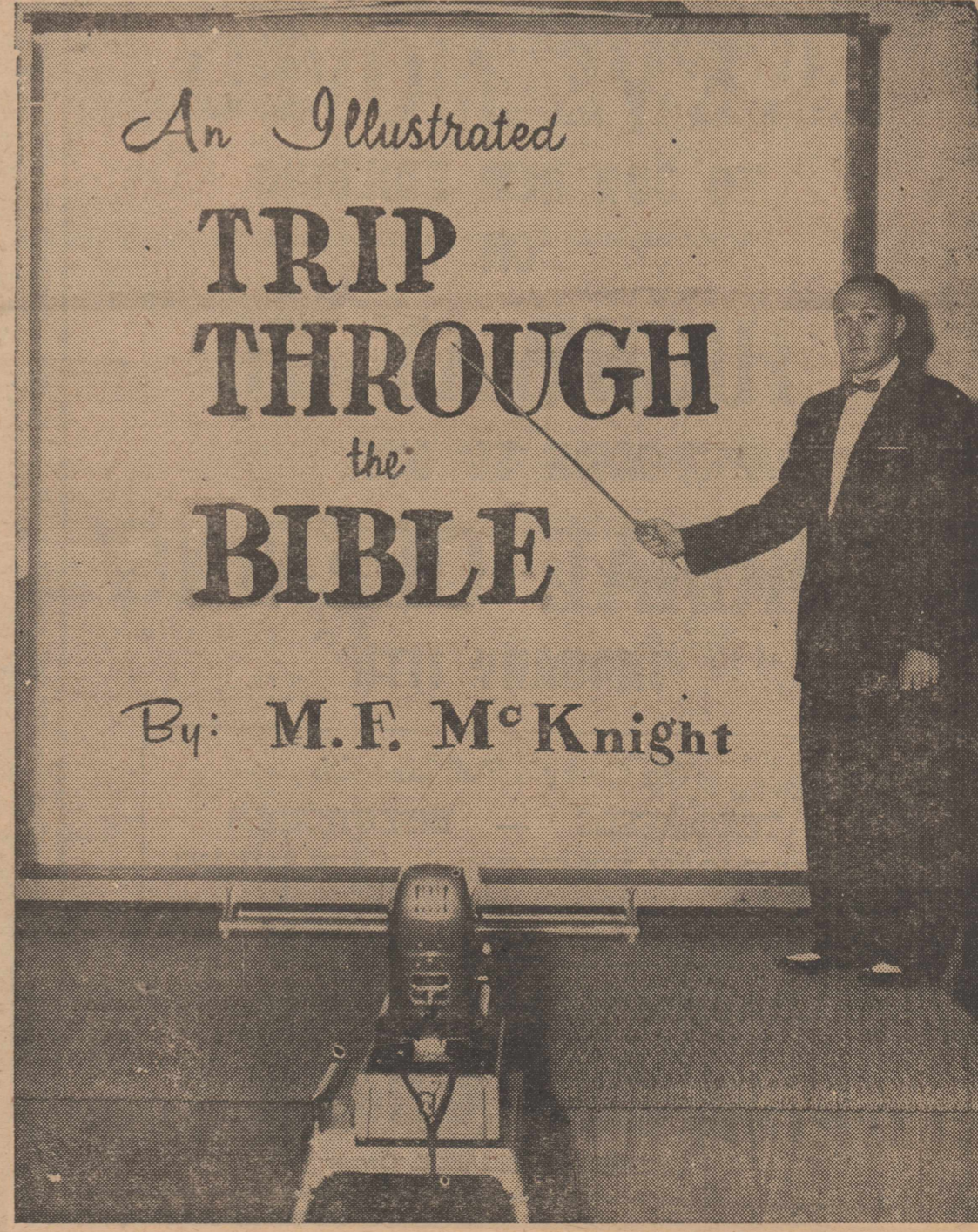

**THE LONG ROAD BACK**—The Story of My Encounter with Polio by Edward Le Comte, Beacon Press, \$3.95.

As the title implies, this is the true story of a man's struggle to attain normalcy after a near fatal bout with polio.

The author, Edward Le Comte, was a Ph.D. and professor of English at Columbia University. He was vacationing in France with his wife and small son at the time he was stricken and laid low by polio.

Far from home, friends, and familiar doctors this man fought for his life.

And later as paralysis kept a firm grip on his leg and arm muscles, he found compensation

in the freedom of the mind.

It is the author's knowledge of books and love of books which give spice and vitality to what would have otherwise been a very commonplace account of a man's illness—of hospitals and physical therapy.

For the innumerable references to the lives and literature of the past give meaningful universality to the book. The references to the polio-incurred handicaps of Sir Walter Scott, Franklin D. Roosevelt, and Marjorie Lawrence show that people can and do rise above their physical difficulties.

The Le Comte's bank account soon dwindled into nothingness because of the heavy drain of hospital expenses.

When he was able to be flown to a hospital in the States, he was offered help from the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis. Of this he says, "Paralytic polio is a disease so prolonged that hardly anyone can afford to have it, a fact which the National Foundation generously recognizes."

And in another reference to the National Foundation, he says,

"This wonderful organization, unlike others which spend their funds for research only, gives to patients material aid, which may range from payment of hospital bills to payment for braces and lending of equipment for hospital or home use."

And of the near-miraculous achievement of the funds spent for research—the wonderful Salk vaccine, he says,

"The Salk vaccine, which under the revised standards of preparation, has happily turned out to be not only safe but even more effective than the Francis report augured. As everybody should know by now, it's a foolish parent that doesn't give his children this protection, and while he's about it he'd do well to have it himself. The Salk vaccine, in existence but not taken, was of no good to say, the prima ballerina of the New York City Ballet when she became paralyzed on tour with the company in Copenhagen in November, 1956."

And although the book is definitely not an adventure in pleasure reading, it is a pleasure to meet courageous post-polios whose climbing a curb or step is just as great a victory as man's scaling of Mt. Everest.
