Agriculture Secretary Dan Glickman has announced that an "early out" of some Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) contracts expiring September 30, 1996, will

be available during a sign-up period to be held from March 20 through April 26 at local offices of USDA's Farm Service Agency.

Glickman also said that current CRP participants whose contracts expire on September 30, 1996, would have an opportunity to extend their contracts for only one year. "A one year extension is the most prudent option until a new farm bill is enacted giving USDA new enrollment authority and establishing a longer-term policy for the CRP," Glickman said. After the farm bill is enacted, USDA will announce a policy for extension for all CRP contract holders.

'Today's action is consistent with both the obvious growing need for increased grain production this year and with the Clinton Administration's commitment to preserving and protecting those lands which are most fragile," Glickman said.

Contracts with the following types of land will not be eligible for early out: land with an erodibility index greater than 15;

# **Teachers Interviewed About Success Rate** With TAAS Tests

Chuck Powell from The University of Texas was here Wednesday of last week interviewing Sheryl Weaver, Michelle Francis, Donnie Dutton and Nancy Wood about Silverton ISD's success with TAAS and the end-of-course Algebra I exam. Mr. Powell is conducting research on schools that have shown success on these two exams for his doctoral dissertation. He was particularly interested in how the Silverton students are prepared and other factors that contribute to their success.

The schools in Mr. Powell's study were selected based on student performance on the 1995 Mathematics Exit TAAS and on the 1995 Algebra I End-of-Course Exam. Sixty schools, including Silverton, had at least eighty percent of their first-time test takers pass 1995 Exit Math TAAS and a 23 average on the 1995 Algebra I End-of-Course Exam. These sixty schools are out of more than 1,000 schools in Texas serving grades 9-12.

# **Swisher Electric to Refund Patronage Capital to Members**

Charles Castleberry, general manager of Swisher Electric Cooperative, will announce a refund of \$258,824 in capital credits at the March 28 annual membership meeting in Tulia. The refund covers the remaining capital credits for 1971, all of 1972 and 1973, and 80% of 1974.

This is the third consecutive year the cooperative's board of directors has authorized a refund of capital credits, and the fourth refund in 4½ years. Since December 1991, Swisher Electric will have refunded over \$1,000,000 to cooperative members.

In addition to this year's \$258,824 general retirement, the cooperative is setting aside \$53,134 for retirement of estates, for a total retirement of up to Vegetable Meeting \$311,958 in 1996.





he average tornado is on the ground for less than 15 minutes, als about 6 miles, and moves at a rate close to 30 mph. ornadoes usually form in the southwestern quadrant of a severe

derstrom. eak tornadoes may be only a few yards wide and contain winds than 75 mph, but the most intense tornadoes may be more than a

wide with winds approaching 300 mph.
epending on the available light, a tornado funnel may appear st black in color or sometimes nearly pure white.

Large hail sometimes (but not always) precedes a tornado.

Most tornadoes rotate in a counterclockwise direction.

A funnel-shaped cloud does not need to extend all the way down to ground level to cause a tornado. If debris is sighted whirling at ground level beneath a funnel, a dangerous tornado is in progress.

Authorities now say that you should NOT open windows when a tornado approaches.

The worst tornado in Briscoe County history was the Silverton tornado on May 15, 1957, which killed 21. Since that time, there have been several tornadoes in Silverton and the rural area, with the worst killing four members of a ranch

# Taxpayer Information **Booklet Available** From Appraisal Office

Carlye Fleming, chief appraiser for the Briscoe County Appraisal District, offers property owners a 1996 pamphlet called Texas Property Taxes: Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies Responsibilities to help them save on their property taxes.

Published by the State

Comptroller's office in Austin, "Remedies" pamphlet explains how the property tax system in Texas works and tells property owners about possible

Mrs. Fleming noted that the pamphlet applies to property taxes collected by all types of taxing units: counties, cities, School districts and special districts (such as municipal utility, junior college and hospital districts).

"Homeowners may file for various property tax exemptions offered by taxing units on residence homesteads," Mrs. Fleming said. In Texas, a homestead is generally the house and yard used as the owner's principal residence. The pamphlet explains each exemption and how to apply for it.

For example, all homeowners may file for a \$5,000 general exemption from their principal home's value for school taxes. In addition, certain disabled homeowners and those aged 65 or older may qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption from the value of their homes.

"A tax freeze, or ceiling, for school taxes is a benefit for homeowners who were 65 or older on January 1 of this year," Mrs. Fleming said.

"In other words, an elderly homeowner's taxes that pay for public schools cannot increase above the total school tax amount on that home in the first year that the homeowner receives the over-65 homeowner exemption," Mrs. Fleming continued. "But, it may increase if the homeowner improves or adds to the house, such as adding a patio or adding a bedroom, etc.

The law provides an additional school tax benefit for certain homeowners. If the surviving spouse of an over-65 homeowner is at least 55 years old at the time of the older spouse's death, then he or she can keep the school tax ceiling. The tax ceiling, however, does not apply for other taxing units, such as the county and city.

The chief appraiser pointed out that homeowners age 65 or older DO NOT need to reapply for the exemption this year if they received the exemption and tax ceiling last year. Only those who became 65 during 1995 and those who have never had the exemption and tax ceiling—such as the surviving spouse age 55 or older-must apply in 1996. The pamphlet also describes

other exemptions available, such as those for disabled veterans, other disabled persons and senior


