

Petitions bearing over 3,000 signatures have been sent to the Texas Parks & Wildlife department asking that Colonel Charles Goodnight's buffalo herd be placed at Caprock Canyons State Park. This is very near the JA Ranch where the herd has lived for many years, and seems the most appropriate action.

The buffalo are adapted to this region. They are part of Panhandle history and deserve to have a permanent home here.

There were quite a few signers of the petition we had at the News office. If you haven't voiced your opinion on the subject of the buffalo, you may address letters o Texas Parks & Wildlife, 4200 Smith School Road, Austin, Texas 78744.

Buffalo from the Goodnight herd increased the breeding stock in Yellowstone National Park in 1886. The first buffalo mascot at West Texas A&M University in 1922 was taken from the same herd.

New Computer Courses To Be Offered Soon

Provided by Rebel L. Royall **Briscoe County Extension Agent**

Area farmers and ranchers can start registering for upcoming computer shortcourses offered by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, using its traveling computer lab, both in February and March at several locations around the Panhandle. Each shortcourse will be taught by Dr. Steve Amosson, Extension economist who specializes in farm and ranch management.

Computer shortcourses will be restricted this year to Quicken 6 for WINDOWS 95 and BUDPRO due to the high level of interest in these particular programs.

JANUARY 2, 1997

Classes will be taught in a two-day and one-day format and will begin each day at 9:00 a.m., ending at 3:30 p.m.

Registration fee is \$75 for the two-day Quicken 6 course. The fee for the one-day BUDPRO will be \$45. The registration fees cover computer lease payments and teaching materials for the courses. BUDPRO training registration fee includes the cost of the software, a \$100 value.

Couples are encouraged to attend and will be charged only one registration fee if they share one

computer. Registration will be limited to 14 to provide handson experience for all participants.

Several BUDPRO workshops are scheduled. Sites include Wellington on February 7. Claude February 10, Booker February 11, Perryton February 17, Panhandle February 18, Dumas February 19 and Dalhart February 20.

BUDPRO addresses the questions of "to make money or not to make money." The stand- alone menu driven package includes six "user friendly" programs utilized in projecting budgets for corn, wheat, sorghum, cotton, stocker cattle and cow-calf enterprises. In addition, the package calculates break-even prices and







Navy Offers Signing Bonus

Navy Recruiting is offering a \$10,000 enlistment bonus to qualified individuals who join the Navy's Nuclear Power Program.

"Sailors in our nuclear field go through an intensive training program, therefore our enlistment standards for joining this program are very high," said Cmdr. William Wheeler, Com-manding Officer of Navy Recruiting District San Antonio--the Navy's recruiting headquarters for a 180,000 square mile area of Texa's and eastern New Mexico. "Those standards equate to a

bigger challenge finding qualified applicants, so the Navy is now offering a significant bonus for those entering this program," Wheeler added. "A \$10,000 signing bonus is a nice chunk of money for a young person entering the workforce!

Persons selected for the Nuclear Field Program receive training in one of three technical fields: Machinist's Mate, Electrician's Mate or Electronics Technician, before beginning 18 months of training at the Navy's Nuclear Power School in Orlando, Florida. The training consists of intensive classroom instruction of nuclear power theory, mathematics, physics and basic engineering sciences, as well as rigorous operational training and qualification on nuclear reactor and prototype plants.

Much of the training can be transferred to college credits," said Wheeler. 'Add that to a \$10,000 check, and you've got a pretty good package. It's probably the best opportunity we're currently offering." Additionally, new sailors will automatically be advanced to paygrade E-4 upon completion of training, which is three paygrades higher than the ordi-
