Even though a big rain seldom makes ranchers mad, local cattlemen are counting a lot of dead bodies in the aftermath of the cold rainstorm that hit the Texas Panhandle on Thursday of last week.

The cattle apparently were miserable in the cold rain that continued without letup for several days, and in an effort to protect themselves they huddled together and smothered or trampled one another to death.

If the bodies were laid end to end, there would be miles of dead cows and calves. What a waste of good beef!

While there was a big loss involved, the pastures should be at their prettiest as soon as we have a few more warm days. The amounts received should have filled all the lakes and tanks in the pastures, cutting down on the distance the cattle have to walk to water.

We measured 4.40 inches in our backyard, but heavier reports were reported in numerous areas around Silverton. This brought the April total to 6.40, probably a record-setter in the annals of National Weather Service history.

The total received in the past week at Lake Mackenzie was 3.71 inches. Heavier amounts fell north and northwest of the lake, flooding the highway that runs north of the lake. I was told Tuesday that the intersection at Hwy. 207 was still under water.

Lake Mackenzie rose five feet with the runoff from Williams, Cope and Deadman creeks. A little water came in via the Tule, but rainfall amounts between Silverton and Tulia appeared to be lighter.

The Tule did run some in the Tulia area, but there are so many big deep holes and dams to fill that it doesn't get to the lake. Much more rain south and southwest of Tulia could change this to a flood situation again, but we really can't expect this sort of rainfall very often.

And now--when it's dry enough to farm and put in another cotton crop, the underground moisture will be superb and should carry the crop to a (hopefully) successful conclusion.

## 4-H To Have Car Wash Friday

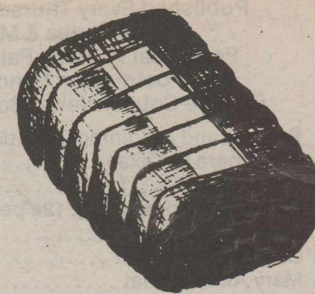
Briscoe County 4-H will be sponsoring a car wash beginning at 2:00 p.m. Friday, May 2, at Rick's Muffler in Silverton.

McWaters and Robison have served the community to the utmost of their abilities by making ambulance transfers as much as their work schedules will allow.

McWaters has been active with the service 17 years or more. He makes transfers when possible, mostly nights and weekends, then goes to work the next morning without complaining. He is also responsible for reviving the banquet by organizing, preparing and cooking the meat.

Robison is the youngest and newest member of the service. His enthusiasm and willingness

to serve has been a "boost" to the service. He makes as many transfers as possible, day and night, thanks to an understanding boss, Gerald Smith.

As deserving as the ones mentioned above are, each member of the service is vital. The ambulance service now has only nine members, but each one gives 100 percent, or more. Everyone is not always available due to jobs or other reasons, but when possible they are always there.

The greatest worry among the members, and should be a concern to the community, is what is going to happen when no one shows up for an ambulance call. This seems to be a concern around the country regarding "volunteer services." Is "volunteerism" dead?

People have stated, "I just don't think I could do that", but, somehow the EMS volunteers believe they are the ones missing the blessing. As anyone in the service can testify, the rewards and heartaches are all there when you deal with life and death situations. But somehow the rewards outweigh the heartaches.

## Celebrate Ties That Bind This Mother's Day

"Mother knows best" when it comes to advising daughters about the value of milk to help build strong bones to last a lifetime. And according to a new study published in the *American Journal of Clinical Nutrition*, daughters are following mom's example at the dinner table.

Researchers from Oregon State University in Corvallis found that some daughters are patterning their milk consumption after their mothers, a practice that may help reduce their future risk of osteoporosis. This is welcome news this Mother's Day--the official start of **National Osteoporosis Prevention Week, May 12-18**, an annual observance that aims to reduce the incidence of this debilitating bone disease.

Today, more than eight million Americans suffer from osteoporosis, and 17 million more are at high risk due to low bone mass. Eighty percent of these individuals are women. Due to an increase in life expectancy, the worldwide incidence of osteoporosis is predicted to increase three-fold over the next 60 years.

Researchers agree that osteoporosis is preventable and treatable. One of the best strategies to prevent the disease is maintaining adequate calcium intake, starting early in life to build peak bone mass.

Unfortunately, government food consumption surveys reveal that more than 50 percent of women fail to meet their needs for calcium. Simply put, they aren't drinking their milk or consuming enough other dairy foods--the predominant sources of calcium available from food.

"The adolescent years represent an important time period for building bone mass," according to author Cornelia Ulrich, who conducted the mother-daughter pairs research at Oregon State University. "If we really want to reduce the incidence of osteoporosis, we must start by working on our teens and on our children to foster skeletal health."

Ulrich and colleagues found that a mother's milk-drinking

practices can positively influence those of her daughter's, which can leave her on better ground to withstand the loss of bone mass that comes with aging. "If mom has a lifelong high milk consumption, her daughter seems to drink lots of milk as well."

Though mirroring mom's milk-drinking habits may help boost a young daughter's bone density and reduce the future risk of osteoporosis, the irony is that too few mothers made milk a daily habit earlier in their lives. Many are attempting to make up for low lifetime intakes and want

their daughters to learn from their "mistakes."

With this in mind, the main part of the program will focus on selection and evaluation tools that producers can utilize to evaluate and improve the carcass merit of cattle. The morning program will discuss conventional means of improving carcass merit such as sire selection based on breed complementarity, cow size, and carcass EPDs. Recent developments in the application of ultrasound technology to evaluate sires and feeder cattle will also be a program topic. The morning will conclude with a discussion of the bovine gene mapping project at Texas A&M, College Station, and the future of marker-assisted selection to improve carcass merit. Following a lunch sponsored by Texas Cattle Feeders Association, the Texas Beef Council will report on their activities. The program will close with a brief session to assist producers with interpreting Ranch-to-Rail data.
