Subscription Prices To Go Up

Prices of yearly subscriptions to the *Briscoe County News* will be increasing at the first of July 1997.

The rate for papers mailed in Briscoe and adjoining counties will become \$15.50 per year. This is an increase of almost four cents per issue.

The rate for papers mailed elsewhere in Texas will become \$17.50, and the rate for papers mailed to addresses outside of Texas will become \$18.50.

This increase is the first in several years, and is made necessary by rising costs.

We have recently been informed by the Baptist/St. Anthony's Healthcare System that the decision has been made to close the Briscoe County Clinic on July 3, 1997. We of the Briscoe Medical Foundation are very sorry for any inconvenience that this causes to the patients that use the clinic.

"We are very proud of the

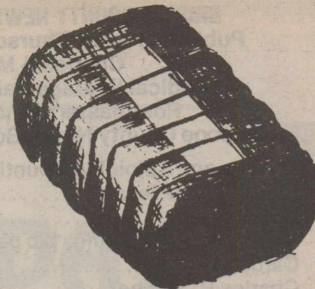
clinic and the services that it provides to all. Since it was opened approximately two and a half years ago it has gone from no patients to over 1900.

"The Briscoe Medical Foundation would like for all patients and future patients to know that we are actively seeking a solution to this problem. At this time we are in preliminary talks with two other agencies that have expressed a desire to operate the clinic.

"As patients of the clinic we would like to ask that you have patience and understanding with both us and the staff during this transition phase. We know that there will probably be some down time during this, but we hope to keep it as short as possible.

"Again thank you for your support," Kingery concluded.

Some Briscoe Acres Go Back Into CRP Program

By now producers should know whether or not their offers of CRP contract acres were accepted or rejected. Details are sketchy at this point concerning another signup.

There can be no haying or grazing until a contract expires, (most all existing CRP contracts will expire September 30, 1997).

"What do I do now?" seems to be one of the biggest questions surrounding rejected CRP offers. There are options a producer has if his or her land was rejected.

Option 1 lets the producer enroll the land into the AMTA program which is currently in the second of its seven years. Even though this program is oriented toward production, producers may leave their land in grass and have payments based on crop bases and yields on the farm when it went into the CRP.

Currently, there are no haying or grazing restrictions in this program, so a producer could hay or graze these acres after October 1.

Option 2 reoffers the land in a later signup. Producers may offer their land in subsequent CRP signups if certain eligibility requirements are met.

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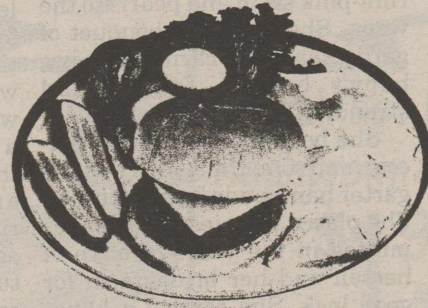

The first of the permanently disabled person placards that were issued in 1992 will begin to expire on June 30. The Briscoe County Tax Office reminds citizens that they must obtain new placards to remain in compliance with state and federal laws.

Permanently disabled person placards are hung from a vehicle's rear view mirror and entitle the holder to certain parking privileges. Placards also may be displayed in any vehicle used by or for the transportation of a disabled person.

"State law requires that permanently disabled person placards be renewed after five years," said Betty Ann Stephens, Briscoe County Tax Assessor-Collector. "We started using placards in July 1992 under the direction of state lawmakers and the Texas Department of Transportation. Five years later, the first wave of these placard holders must get replacements. Citizens should pay close attention to the expiration date because there won't be any renewal notices for placards."

Placard renewals will be processed through the Briscoe County tax collector. Citizens are asked to take their expired placards to the tax office, where they will complete form and pay a statutory \$5 fee per placard. Permanently disabled Texans may obtain up to two placards; they also have the option of getting one placard and one set of disabled person license plates.

Approximately 800,000 permanently disabled placards have been issued statewide since 1992. First-time applicants for permanently disabled person placards or license plates have to meet certain eligibility requirements; their application also must bear the signature of a licensed Texas physician or optometrist. The county tax assessor-collectors issue placards locally to individuals, not motor vehicles.

Ground Covers Hug Landscape

Do you have a tough area in your yard where nothing seems to grow well?

Dr. Doug Welsh suggests planting jasmine or juniper in sunny areas to establish ground cover.

In shaded areas, he recommends planting ivy, vinca or monkey grass. He says it is important to till organic matter into the top four to six inches of the soil before you plant. Welsh says you need to keep the weeds out until the ground cover is estab-

lished.

To make the plants spread quicker, he recommends nipping the tips out of buds that are growing upward instead of outward and fertilizing every two to three weeks. Plants should be watered every few days until the ground covers take off. At that point, Mother Nature's rainfall should be enough.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
SPECIAL ELECTION
AUGUST 9, 1997

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 4 proposes a constitutional amendment which would increase the school property tax residence homestead exemption from \$5,000 to \$15,000. The amendment would also authorize the Legislature to limit all or part of the exemption to political subdivisions that are the principal providers of elementary and secondary education within their boundaries.

In addition, the amendment would authorize the Legislature to allow the transfer of all or part of the age 65-and-over tax freeze to another homestead. Specifically, the Legislature would be authorized to provide that the current limitation against increasing school property taxes on the residence homesteads of persons age 65 or older, or their surviving spouse who is eligible to receive the exemption, may be transferred if the person establishes a different residence homestead.

The amendment would also allow the \$10,000 additional amount for the standard exemption to be used to lower the tax rate of persons cur-

rently receiving the 65-and-over tax freeze. Specifically, for a homestead affected by this limitation in 1996 or in an earlier tax year, the Legislature must provide for a reduction in the school property tax limitation in the 1997 tax year and subsequent tax years in an amount equal to \$10,000 multiplied by the 1997 school property tax rate.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment providing school property tax relief by increasing the residence homestead exemption by \$10,000 and providing for the transfer of the tax limitation to another qualified homestead for persons over 65 and a reduction in taxes subject to the limitation."

Before any decision or important event, ask God for His guidance and help. Be good to your family, because they know you better than others. Remember that we are also part of God's family. Love one another as God loves us.

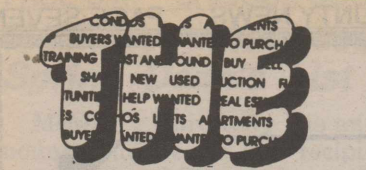

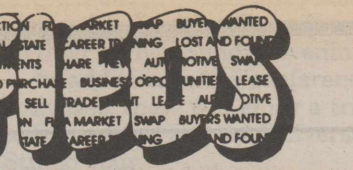
