

Bison Find Home at Quitaque's Caprock Canyons State Park

A herd of bison with historic roots is being moved to Caprock Canyons State Park north of Quitaque.

The 40 to 50 bison are part of a herd started by pioneer cattleman Charles Goodnight in 1876 on the JA Ranch. Texas Department of Parks and Wildlife officials say they're the purest-blood bison left in North America.

But after the animals began wrecking fences and causing other problems, ranch manager Jay O'Brien signed an agreement last March to donate the herd to the state, which will pick up the \$100,000 tab to move the animals by February 1998. "The JA Bison Herd is a very

important part of the heritage of the Texas Panhandle," said Ron George, an official with the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department and Texas Bison Herd project coordinator.

West Texas A&M University had petitioned to keep the bison, its official mascot, in the Panhandle. The school bought its first mascot from legendary cattleman Goodnight.

Historical estimates suggest that the bison herds numbered between 40 and 60 million at one point, but dwindled to about 500 ecause of buffalo hunters


Cheerleaders Swamp the at Camp Competition







Mosquitos Are Evening Pests

Step outside in the evening and you're sure to be greeted by a blood-thirsty mosquito. You might be surprised to know there are more than 165 different kinds of mosquitos in the United States, and that Texas is home to half of them.

Extension entomologist Dr. Jim Olson keeps track of what's going on in other parts of the world so he knows how diseases like malaria and encephalitis are spread. He says a less familiar mosquito-carried disease threatening the United States is dangy (DAYNG-EE). It is a flu-like illness that causes severe headaches, nausea, a rash and aching bones. It can even result in internal bleeding that can kill you. Olson says it hasn't been a problem here in about 50 years, but there are numerous cases reported in Mexico that could prompt transmission to the U.S.

Citronella is the buzz word when it comes to repellents to protect yourself against mosquitos.

Olson says the candles work pretty well in areas sheltered from wind. He says some people don't know that citronella plants are only effective if the leaves are crushed. He says bug zappers do kill mosquitos, but they also can attract bugs.

He says covering yourself in products that contain "deet" is still your best bet. "Deet" is the active ingredient in many of the sprays and lotions you apply to your skin and clothing.

Olson says you can also cut down on the number of mosquitos by eliminating standing water. Beyond that, if you really can't stand them, avoid them by staying indoors from dusk to about eleven at night.

Contact your local County Agricultural Extension Agent for further information about these different kinds of mosquitos.

Social Security Questions & Answers

Q. When I started receiving Social Security disability benefits, I received a booklet that told me what I should report to Social Security. I misplaced the booklet. How can I get a new one?

A. Call Social Security's tollfree number, 1-800-772-1213, and ask for the booklet, *What You Need to Know When You Get Disability Benefits* (Publication No. 05-10153).

Q. My doctor wants to schedule me for surgery next month, but I don't think that surgery is necessary. Will my Medicare coverage pay for a second opinion?

A. Yes. Medicare will pay for the second opinion just as it pays for other doctors' services. To get a second opinion, ask your doctor to refer you to another doctor in that area of specialization of contact your local Medicare carrier.

Avoid Potential Problems When Selecting Garments

Despite using recommended care and storage procedures, some problems can occur in textiles when stored over time. Careful selection of new garments could reduce this potential

Trim that is glued rather than sewn on can oxidize, change color, yellow or come off over time. Even when sewn on, sizings present in lace or other trims can oxidize and yellow with age. Occasionally, dyes, especially ivory or ecru, are soluble in drycleaning solvent and bleach to white during cleaning. Little, if anything, can be done to correct these problems once they occur.

Sequins or beading may not survive cleaning well. Some glues dissolve in drycleaning solvent, causing the beading to come off. In some cases, the beading or sequins may lose color or become dull if not treated with solvent

resistant coatings.

Polystyrene beads are being used increasingly. They may look like pearls but will dissolve or soften when dry-cleaned. Once the damage has occurred, it cannot be reversed. These problems are not the fault of the drycleaner, but rather of the manufacturer.

Check care labels when buying a wedding gown or other special garment. All parts of the garment should be safely cleaned by the method specified on the label

Even with proper treatment, some garments will yellow with age. If these items are cotton or can be wet cleaned (laundered). occasionally, the yellowing can be removed. With protein fibers (i.e., silk and wool), yellowing is typical of the material's aging process. Some yellowing in textiles cannot be removed without harmful bleaching. It could be considered a "patina of age"--re-flecting the history of the textile. **MILDEW REMOVAL**

Mildew--How do we remove it from our clothes? As the seasons change, so do our wardrobes. It's that time of year when people begin taking summer clothes out

of storage. What happens when you start to put on that favorite blouse or skirt and you find a spot of mildew? Don't worry--it can be removed.

Steps should be taken to remove the mildew as soon as it is discovered. If left alone, mildew could weaken or ot the fabric. Brush or shake off the mildewed area; do this outside to prevent scattering the mildew spores in the house. Sun and air the fabrics thoroughly.

If mildew spots remain, they can be removed with chlorine bleach. Check the care label to determine if chlorine can be safely used on the fabric. Pretest an inconspicuous area of the fabric for color change before using the bleach


