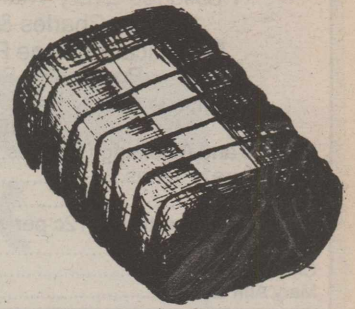

Some very painful things are in store for the residents of Silverton as a result of a complaint having been filed against the burning of trash here.

As a result of the complaint, the City has been ordered to stop all burning of trash within ninety days.

Not only is this a good way to fill up the landfills, but also is going to necessitate that the City either execute a contract with a company to handle its trash pickups from dumpsters or will require the City to provide the equipment and manpower to make trash pickups more often.

The burning barrels will disappear.

At any rate, it will require residents of Silverton to place their trash in plastic garbage bags, which will be an additional expense.

The biggest change likely will be that those who live in Silverton and have their trash picked up by the City will no longer pay a fee of \$7.00 or \$8.00 for this, but will be required to pay something like double or triple that amount for the service.

The City Council has not acted on this yet, because the word was just received last Friday, but the solution to the problem isn't going to be an easy one.

## County Clerk Joins In Urging Texans to Vote

County & District Clerk Bess McWilliams and Texas Secretary of State Tony Garza are teaming up to encourage the people of Briscoe County to get out and vote in the upcoming August 9 Constitutional Amendment Election. Mrs. McWilliams and Garza want the people of this area to take the initiative in shaping the state constitution.

Early voting for the August 9 Election began Monday, July 21, and continues through August 5 in the Clerk's office.

Other polling places for this election will be City Hall in Silverton, Voting Precinct #1; Community Center in Quitaque, Voting Precincts #2 and #6; Pioneer Room at First State Bank in Silverton, Voting Precinct #3; D&K Manufacturing in Silverton, Voting Precincts #4 and #5.

"Historically, a ballot with propositions does not generate as much voter excitement as a ballot featuring candidates and contested races," said Secretary Garza. "Even though the August 9 ballot will contain only one proposition, that doesn't make this constitutional amendment election any less important to Texas."

As a kick-off to the August 9 election, Secretary Garza is spending this week of the early voting period visiting more than a dozen Texas cities all around the state. This extensive "Get Out the Vote" tour is part of a multi-media effort to educate and motivate voters to go to the polls.

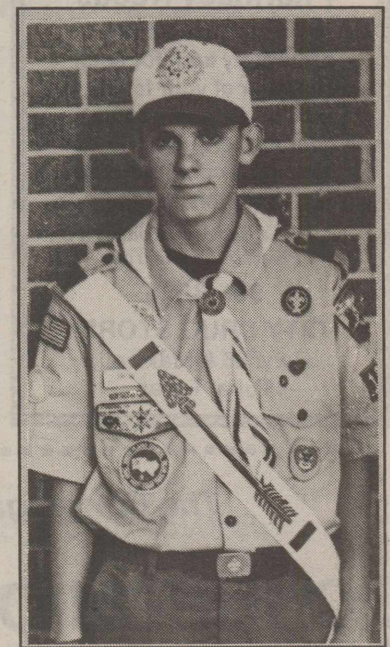
## Martin Younger Leaves Tomorrow For National Boy Scout Jamboree

Martin Younger, son of Cynthia Younger and the late Roger Younger, will be leaving from Lubbock at 6:00 a.m. tomorrow (Friday, July 25) enroute to the 1997 National Boy Scout Jamboree. Theme of this Jamboree is "Be Prepared for the 21st Century: Character Counts."

The Jamboree is held every four years. Younger is one of 36 boys from the South Plains Council and is the only boy from Silverton who will be in attendance.

They will be in the Nation's Capitol for three days, during which time they will see the White House, Smithsonian, National Archives, Ford's Theater/Peterson House, National Zoological Park, National Postal Museum, The Pavillion at the Old Post Office, Washington Monument, Lincoln Memorial, Jefferson Memorial, Vietnam Veterans Memorial, National Boy Scout Monument, and take part in a special ceremony at Arlington National Cemetery.

From July 28 through August 5, the group will be at the Jamboree at the Fort Phantom Hill, Virginia U. S. Army installation 20 miles southeast of Fredericksburg, Virginia, where Younger will take part in an attempt to break the "Guinness

**Sun Safety Tips**

Skin cancer is the most common type of cancer. The most deadly type of skin cancer, melanoma, is increasing five percent each year. Controlling the incidence of skin cancer requires reducing sun exposure especially before age 18. Avoiding blistering sunburns is particularly important; however, a 1992 statewide survey of middle school students conducted by the University of Texas M. D. Anderson Cancer Center reported that 85 percent of children spend a lot of time in the sun, and only five percent said they use sunscreen regularly.

How can parents reduce sun exposure and prevent sunburns for their children? First, limit the amount of time children are exposed to the sun between 10:00 a.m. and 4:00 p.m. or avoid sun exposure if your shadow is shorter than you are tall. Realize that cloudy days require precautions because 80 percent of the sun's rays come through light clouds. Protect children's skin even when under an umbrella; the sun's rays can reflect off sand and concrete. Next, apply sunscreen with at least SPF 15. Apply sunscreen 30 minutes before going outside, and reapply at least every two hours especially if swimming or perspiring. Provide children with a hat that shades their face, tops of ears, and back of neck. Children under six months of age should be kept out of the sun if possible.

Teach children by being a good example. Practice preventive sun protection habits yourself as well as for your children. Making preventive sun protection a habit during childhood may carry over into adolescence--a time when peer pressure to increase tanning increases substantially.

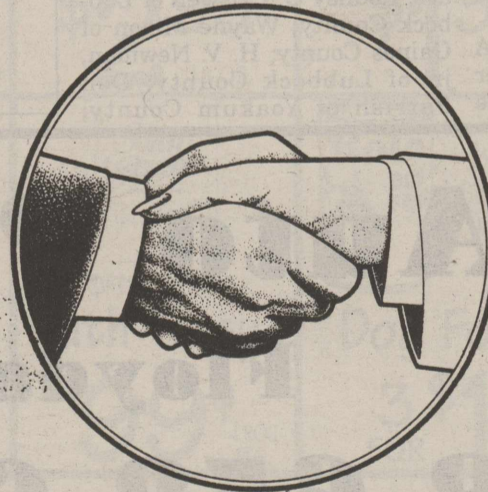

**Boll Weevil Trapping Report 1997**

Week 30 (07/14/97 thru 07/18/97)

High Plains cotton producers who face the possibility of increased pressure from aphids in 1997 will likely be denied the use of, arguably, the most effective aphid control tool available, Furadan.

According to Lubbock-based Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. (PCG), the Texas Department of Agriculture has not received any written confirmation about the status of its Furadan Section 18 request. EPA officials have verbally notified TDA that the request has been denied.

Mississippi agriculture officials have already received notification from the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) denying a Section 18 request under the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) for Furadan, whose active ingredient is carbofuran.

The EPA letter denying the Section 18 request states that the reason for the denial is the inability to make a determination of "a reasonable certainty of no harm," primarily for infants and children under the age of 12.

Cotton industry organizations throughout the Cotton Belt are pulling together through the National Cotton Council in an attempt to reverse this decision.

PCG has signed a letter being sent to Lynn Goldman, MD, EPA Assistant Administrator, laying out points of disagreement concerning EPA's decision.

The industry letter takes EPA to task for decisions made under the auspices of implementing the

Food Quality Protection Act and the ever-changing criteria EPA uses to make these decisions. The letter also asks for justification of the standard used to make the determination regarding carbofuran.

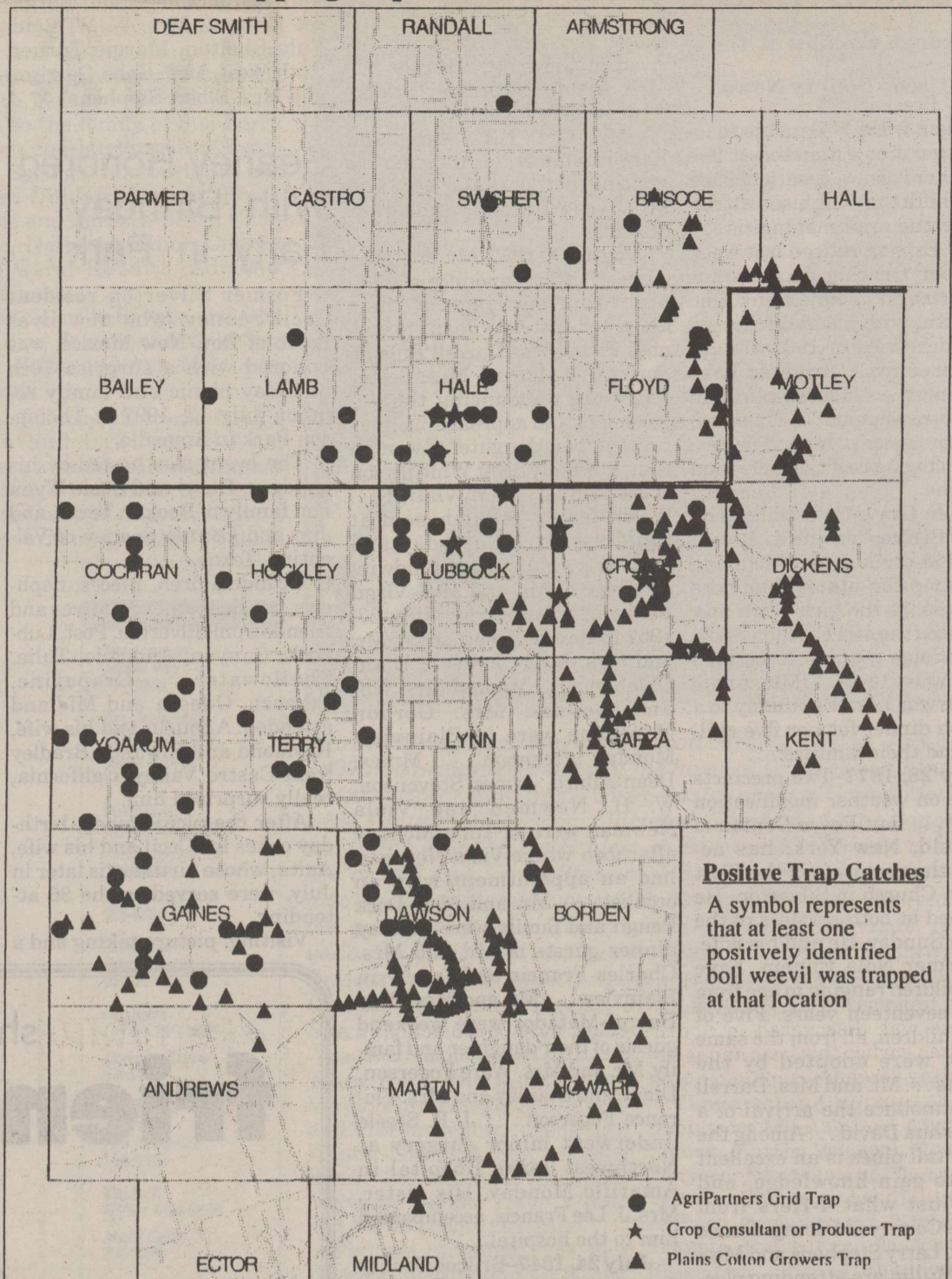
The loss of Furadan for aphid control means cotton producers who experience severe infestations may be left to fend for themselves. Finding effective control strategies for cotton aphids is difficult because of the explosive nature of infestations and the aphids' ability to rapidly reproduce.

Often, producers forced to use less effective products must apply higher rates of the aphicides currently available more often in an attempt to gain the level of control possible with use of Furadan.

Cotton producers in the proposed Southern High Plains/Caprock Eradication Zone will begin receiving referendum ballots in the next few days concerning possible implementation of boll weevil suppression activities.

PCG officials note that one important aspect of the ballot is the election of a SHP/C Director to the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Foundation (TBWEF) Board of Directors.

There are seven candidates for the TBWEF Board position. They are: Rodney G. Criswell of Lubbock County; Wayne Mixon of Gaines County; H. V. Newman, jr. of Lubbock County; Don Parrish of Yoakum County;



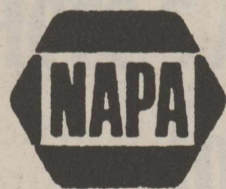
**Positive Trap Catches**

**Precision Agriculture**

Precision farming is the latest buzz word in agriculture. Looking out at a field there are spots where plants grow well and spots where they don't. That's the idea behind precision farming.

Extension agricultural engineer Dr. Stephen Searcy says farmers can now buy or contract with a commercial harvester for a device that records the amount harvested throughout the field. That results in a yield map that can determine which areas need more seeds, fertilizer, pesticide or herbicide during future crop seasons.

Searcy says installing a yield mapping system on a combine costs eight to ten thousand dollars. Contracting with someone to do it for you costs two to three dollars an acre.

Searcy says this concept is new to Texas and he's not sure how well it will be embraced.

Texas A&M is researching which practices are economically profitable for farmers.

**Sorghum Ergot**

Growers are being urged to keep an eye out for a devastating fungus called ergot. The disease was discovered in South Texas earlier this year and is infecting sorghum crops.

Extension agronomist Dr. Cloyce Coffman says farmers should look for white powdery spots on the leaves and a yellowish tan honey secreted from the flowering heads of the plant. Ergot attacks as the plant begins to pollinate.

Coffman is confident this year's commercial grain crop is safe because it pollinates quickly, reducing the chance of infection. He says the risk is higher to the seed production fields in the Panhandle.

Texas supplies 90 percent of all the sorghum seeds used worldwide. The industry could be devastated if ergot destroys those seed crops.

**Skin Cancer**

Skin cancer is currently the most common type of cancer in the United States. One in five Americans will develop skin cancer during their lifetime. Living in a sunbelt state such as Texas increases risk to one in three.

Certain risk factors for developing skin cancer such as light, fair skin, blonde or red hair, tendency to freckle in the sun, and family history of skin cancer are beyond one's control; however, controlling the amount of sun exposure, especially sun exposure resulting in blistering sunburns, is possible.

Melanoma is the most serious skin cancer, and incidence is increasing five percent each year. If not detected quickly, melanoma can spread quickly to other parts of the body. Only lung cancer is more deadly. Blistering sunburns before age 18 increase the risk of melanoma by two to five times. Sun exposure is the only risk factor for melanoma that can be avoided.

Children, teens and their parents must take precautions to lower the risk of skin cancer by reducing sun exposure. Wear protective clothing and sunscreen of at least 15 SPF. Wear a hat that shades face, tops of ears and back of neck. Do not use tanning beds. To catch problems early, examine skin regularly for moles, dark patches, or long-lasting pearly-looking bumps.

### Bank Account Could Affect SSI

People who apply for Supplemental Security Income (SSI) and have their names on bank accounts on behalf of relatives or friends should be aware that the funds will be considered as belonging to them and may affect their SSI eligibility. Under SSI rules, we must count the money as the applicant's even if his or her name is used merely as a convenience for the account holder unless the account is titled to restrict the applicant's access to the funds.

Since people cannot qualify for SSI if they have assets (including bank accounts) worth more than \$2,000 (\$3,000 for a couple), having your name on someone else's bank account may affect your SSI eligibility.

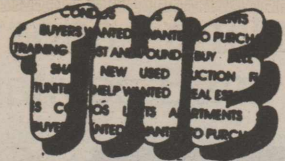

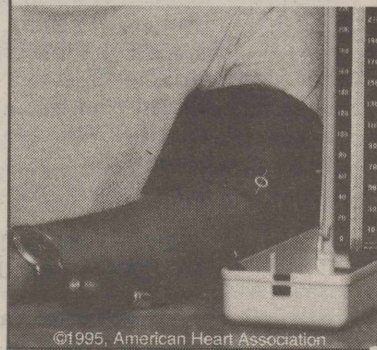
