





The Doucette Leadership program is a semester-long college course built around a focus of extensive leadership and economics training.

Preparation in the course focuses students on working to prepare for leadership positions, especially in the region's communi-

The leadership class is built around a theme of working with students who realize that the purpose of life is a life of purpose.

"Just do it," James Doucette said to the graduates, "because you know you can, and you should.'


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Awards Presented at the Annual Athletic Banquet Saturday Night

THE TAX ON LOVE AND MARRIAGE

f you're looking for romance, the tax code is not the place to start. Love may be blind, but the IRS isn't.

Our current federal tax code penalizes those who are married by requiring hard-working married couples to pay higher taxes on the same combined income than would two unmarried persons. In fact, in 1996 the law pushed 42 percent of married couples in America into a higher tax bracket. This is the so-called marriage tax penalty

For example, take a couple in which the husband is a new Houston Police Officer and his wife is a teacher for the Houston Independent School District.

The husband's adjusted gross income is \$33,500, his wife's is \$28,200. Combined, their incomes total \$61,700. Filing jointly, their tax liability is \$8,504. If they were allowed to file singly, their liability would be \$6,481.50. That's a difference of \$1,022.50 — enough to make several car payments, acquire a family computer or make a nice addition to their retirement nest egg.

Because American families increasingly have two breadwinners, instead of one, more Americans feel the pinch of the marriage penalty each year. Both spouses worked outside the home in 48 percent of American families in 1969. Today that figure is 72 percent.

The marriage tax penalty goes against the American grain. Under current law, the only way to avoid the marriage penalty is not to marry. Dollars and cents aside, this is inappropriate tax treatment for an institution that is one of the bedrocks of our society.

Things have gotten so bad that at least one counselor is warning engaged couples who are planning their weddings to "anticipate the extra tax you'll have to pay once you're married, and have your withholding tax adjusted."

(And oh, by the way, congratulations from your Uncle Sam!)
Right now, Congress' top priority is to eliminate this unfair burden imposed by the tax code, and to give families a fighting chance in their battle of the budget.

The congressional debate now is focused on the best way to go about remedving the situation

One proposal would be to allow a husband and wife each the flexibility to file single returns or a joint return, depending on which would be right for

A second proposal, "income splitting," also would allow couples to file as singles. But before calculating their taxes as singles, they would be permitted to add their incomes and divide the total in two for tax purposes.

Such an approach, included in a bill I introduced earlier this year, has the advantage of helping families in which one spouse earns considerably less than another or who may earn no wages at all because that spouse stays home to take care of the family

The third way Congress could remedy the tax code would be to double the amount of income at which married couples would be thrown into a higher tax bracket.

Bottom line here — and it is the bottom line for 21 million American couples — is that I'm for any effective way to eliminate the marriage tax penalty. Americans shouldn't have to choose between love and money

Prescription For Fire

Nothing was left to chance. As fire skipped across the ground, tufts of grass burst into bright orange flames. Yellow smoke rose as the embers reached green undergrowth. In a flash, the dry stalks curled and crumbled, leaving ashes that will nurture native plant life that's more suited to that area



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



States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency has been busy reallocating crop acreage and yield data from individual farm numbers to tracts.

The changes are being made by FSA in an effort to streamline the reconstitution process when farms are divided or sold. The reallocation of this data will not affect the manner in which program benefits are distributed.

Growers whose operations span more than one tract have been notified and have until June 12 to contact FSA and request a review if they disagree with the manner in which acreage and yield were allocated. If FSA agrees with the producer, changes can be made immediately. If not, the producer has the option of initiating a formal ap-

FSA officials note that by assigning the applicable data to specific tracts, owners will not have more specific information about yield and acreage.

U. S. agriculture won an important victory this week with Senate approval of the Conference Report of the Agricultural Research, Extension and Education Reform Act of 1998.

The Conference Report passed the Senate by a vote of 92-8 despite the last-minute efforts of Senators who had a problem with returning a portion of the savings identified to fund the Bill, to the Food Stamp program from which they came.

This is not the first time that nutrition issues have influenced efforts to invest funds in important agricultural programs. Returning a portion of these savings to the Food Stamp Program is seen as a good trade for stabilizing the Federal Crop Insurance Program and gaining new agricultural research programs, ac-

For the past year the United cording to officials at Plains Cotton Growers, Inc.

The Conference Report now returns to the House for approval before being sent to the President. There is apparently a small group in the House reluctant to bring the Conference Report to a vote because of the Food Stamp provision. Fortunately there appears to be a large bipartisan contingent that recognizes the importance of the legislation to agriculture and will push for its approval.

Growers and other interested parties should contact their Congressional leaders and encourage them to support efforts to approve the Conference Report and send the Bill to the President.

The Agricultural Research Bill designated approximately \$1.8 billion in funding over the next five years. Specifically it designates the following amounts over the years 1999-2003:

•\$600 million to initiate a new agricultural research program

•\$500 million to partially fund shortfalls in the Federal Crop Insurance Program

•\$82 million to the Fund for Rural America

•\$619 million to re-instate selected Food Stamp benefits to specified legal immigrants

All funding for these initiatives was realized through savings in Food Stamp Administrative accounts and through restricted funding for USDA agencies for the purchase of computers and related equipment and

While the funds specified in the Bill cover about half of the expected \$1 billion shortfall in Federal Crop Insurance funding, an additional \$500 million in funding is realized by making delivery costs for the program part of mandatory spending.



AVOIDING ANOTHER BOG-DOWN IN THE BALKANS

n November 1995, as Congress was debating the President's decision to send 20,000 U.S. troops to Bosnia, Deputy Secretary of State Strobe Talbott warned that, should Congress fail to support that decision, the conflict "could all too easily spread well beyond Bosnia."

Talbott's particular concern was the southern Yugoslav province of Kosovo, where ethnic Albanians making up 90 percent of the population are repressed by the Serb government in Belgrade. Recent fighting in Kosovo would seem to validate the doomsday scenario.

Unfortunately, the fighting has occurred not because we didn't send troops to Bosnia, but in spite of the fact that we did. It appears, however, that this subtlety may have been lost on the administration. In trying to rally the allies, Secretary Albright has warned that, "[t]he only effective way to stop violence...is to act with firmness, unity and speed... The time to stop the killing is now, before it spreads." It is the same argument that was made to justify our troop commitment to Bosnia.

The administration's response to the crisis has been consistent with the Clinton Doctrine for American leadership. As seen in Haiti and Somalia before, this doctrine calls for decisive action with overwhelming American force where our national security interests are poorly defined, or non-existent. In contrast, where a clear threat to long-standing U.S. interests is posed, such as North Korea's development of nuclear weapons or Saddam Hussein's saber-rattling, the doctrine says to cut a deal and declare victory, preferably with United Nation's help.

The Kosovo crisis is a microcosm of the racial, ethnic and religious tensions that were unleashed in the Balkans at the end of the Cold War. Since 1981, the Albanian majority in Kosovo has sought independence or autonomy. In the meantime, Albanians in Kosovo have boycotted all the institutions of the Serbian state, including local and national elections. For his part, Serb President Milosevic has brutally repressed the Albanians. The Albanians have countered violence with violence, directed by an underground faction called the Kosovo Liberation Army (KLA).

If this story has a familiar ring to it, it should. It was Bosnia's declaration of independence that led to four bloody years of war and the involvement of 20,000 U.S. troops. Again, America finds itself serving the purposes of the most unsavory elements in an ethnic crisis. We are trying to find an acceptable center between Serb strongman Milosevic on one side and a violent insurgency group — the KLA — on the other. In the meantime, ordinary people in Kosovo, both Albanian and Serb, suffer.

Rather than making clear to our allies and to the belligerents themselves the limits of American involvement, Secretary Albright's comments hold out the prospect for greater involvement. In Bosnia, this became a self-fulfilling

We must resist this in Kosovo. There is no reasonable number of American ground troops that can end this crisis. We can contain it, though, first by making clear to our NATO allies that we will not accept their involvement as belligerents. This is important because of the subsidiary interests of both Greece and Turkey in the southern Balkans. At the same time, we should make it clear to our other European allies that they have the means and the interest in resolving this crisis themselves.

The United States can and should provide a great deal of support, including airlift, intelligence and, most importantly, diplomatic good offices. But under no circumstances should we hold out the prospect of additional U.S. ground troops. In fact, we should use the opportunity to reconvene the parties to the Dayton Accords, expand the agenda to include the troubles in Kosovo, and revise the partitions already established in Dayton to permit an early American withdrawal.

Maintaining an open-ended troop commitment in Bosnia — and beginning a new one in Kosovo — will further deteriorate our ability to defend national security interests elsewhere, where no other power can lead. If we are not careful, we could find ourselves not only failing to reduce our presence in the Balkans, but increasing it dramatically. Congress should insist that the United States not add Kosovo to the long list of far-off places where American forces are stationed but which few Americans could find on a map

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A&M Concentrates On Fire Ant Enemies

Pammy Millican County Extension Agent

Texas A&M's contribution to the fight against fire ants concentrates on natural enemies found right here in Texas. They need not be imported from Brazil or Mexico.

Experiment staton entomologist Dr. Brad Vinson hopes with research funds provided by the

state legislature, scientists can adapt the enemies so they are more effective. One of the enemies is a parasite that injects its offspring into the ant's abdomen and the larvae literally eats the ant from the inside out.

An A&M researcher found the strepciptera parasite near College Station a few years ago. However, the tiny creature requires both fire ant and a rare species of cricket to reproduce.

A&M researchers are working on ways to make its reproduction easier. They're also studying another parasite called the oracema. Vinson says the oracema is a wasp that lays its eggs in flowers and it may turn out that planting more of the weed-like flowers could help in the fight against fire ants.

There's also a disease that's native to the U.S. and is fatal to fire ants. Vinson sees great promise in thelohania. The disease causes reproductive larvae to dissolve. Stop reproduction and you stop fire ants.


