

It's never too late to start plan-ning for retirement. It's true that the earlier you start, the better, but experts agree that a late plan is better than no plan at all.

While your options may not be as great if you're over 50, you do have some options. The important think is that you recognize what they are and factor them into a plan of action. You need to understand, for example, that, statistically speaking, you need to plan on living longer than your parents and grandparents did. Remember, benefits decrease if you retire early. Although many people retire early, this may not be your best option. You can retire as early as age 62, but benefits are decreased for each month before age 65 you are receiving benefits, up to a maximum of 20 percent. Note that benefits increase

if you delay retirement. If you're in good health and don't mind working, you should know that Social Security benefits increase for each month after full retirement age (65 in 1997) you delay retirement. In 1997, the "delayed retirement credit" is five up to eight percent by the year

Know how other retireretirement, here are some Social ment income may affect your Social Security benefits. Most Find out what you've got types of retirement income will coming from Social Security. not affect your Social Security You should call 1-800-772-1213 to benefits. This means you can have income from savings and investments and other pensions over and above your Social Security benefits. In general, earnings are the most common income that may affect benefits.

Know how much you can earn in retirement. There is a retirement test that limits how much you can make and still receive Social Security benefits. It increases annually with increases in general wage levels. In 1997, people age 65 and over can earn up to \$13,500 without affecting their Social Security benefits. Benefits are reduced \$1 for every \$3 of earnings. Beneficiaries under 65 can earn up to \$8,640 a year. Earnings over the limit would reduce benefits \$1 for every \$2. The earnings limits do not apply to beneficiaries age 70 and older.





### **Key Dates If** You're Approaching **Your Retirement**

by Mary Jane Shanes Social Security Manager Plainview, Texas

Birthdays may seem less important as you cruise past age 50, but here are a few key dates to keep in mind as you plan for your retirement:

Age 50--A surviving spouse who is disabled can start collecting Social Security benefits on the record of a deceased spouse.

Age 60--A surviving spouse who is not disabled can begin collecting Social Security survivor's benefits. You can receive a percentage of the amount your spouse would have received upon reaching full retirement age, typically between 71-94 percent for a widow or widower age 60-64.

Age 62--You can begin collect-ing Social Security benefits based on your own record, or benefits to which you're entitled on the earnings record of your spouse or former spouse who is still living.

manently reduced by not waiting until full retirement age. If your full retirement age is 65, your benefits would be reduced about 20 percent if you elect to receive benefits at age 62. Age 65-67--Those individuals

who turn 65 before 2000 can receive full Social Security benefits at this age. The retirement age will gradually increase to 676 by 2027. Medicare eligibility begins on the first day of the month in which you turn 65.

Age 70--Social Security beneficiaries are no longer subject to deductions for earnings over a certain limit. For beneficiaries age 65 to 69, \$1 in benefits is withheld for every \$3 earned over the limit, currently \$14,500 in 1998. For people under 65, \$1 will be withheld for every \$2 in earning above the limit, currently \$9,120 in 1998.
