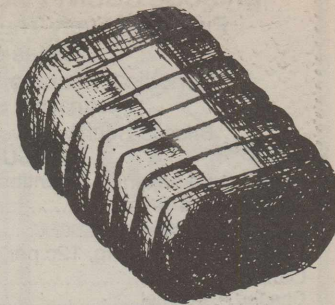

Behold the power of prayer! Wednesday night of last week, the people of Silverton gathered to pray for rain. It had been so hot and dry, and crops were suffering. Wells and center pivots had been running day and night, and still the condition of the corn and milo was declining.

The people had only to wait until 6:00 a.m. Sunday for their prayers to be answered. A down-pour of 1.10 inches fell at that time, and early Sunday evening another .10 fell. Unfortunately the evening showers were accompanied by damaging hail, and some residents had trees broken off or uprooted by the wind. Fortunately, the hail didn't cover a large area. In Silverton, little or no hail was received.

Other towns in this area didn't receive beneficial rains.

## Two Die in Tragic Accident At Lake Mackenzie Saturday

An eight-year-old Lubbock boy who teachers called "all boy" and a 17-year-old Lubbock girl who was six months shy of high school graduation were killed Saturday at Lake Mackenzie when the personal watercraft they were riding collided with a 16-foot boat.

A 15-year-old Kress boy, Dusty Street, a passenger in the boat, suffered a concussion but was listed in stable condition after being transported by air ambulance to Methodist Hospital in Lubbock.

Briscoe County Justice of the Peace Lynn Frizzell identified the eight-year-old as Robert Shane Shaffer, a second-grader at Bowie Elementary. The girl, Peggy Smith, was set to graduate from Frenship High in December. She would have been 18 on July 30.

The two were friends and were not related.

Frizzell said the accident occurred about 5:00 p.m. as both parties came around an island in the lake. The boat's driver reportedly saw the personal watercraft and tried to turn, but was unable to. Frizzell said Smith and Shaffer likely never saw the boat.

Briscoe County Sheriff Max Whitworth said the girl was the personal watercraft driver and the boy was the passenger when it collided with the boat. The boat was carrying four people and pulling a water skier.

Silverton emergency personnel tried to revive Shaffer and Smith for about 30 minutes, but both were pronounced dead at the scene about an hour after the accident. Frizzell said the pair likely died instantly when the collision occurred.

Preliminary autopsy results show that Shaffer and Smith died of head injuries Frizzell said Monday.

The accident happened less than a week after the National Park Service announced its plans to ban personal watercraft from national parks because of safety, noise and environmental concerns. Lake Mackenzie is not a national park and will not be affected by the ban.

Personal watercrafts comprise a significant number of boating accidents and fatalities.

Problems often occur when people approach an accident situation and release the personal watercraft's throttle—which controls speed, thrust and direction.

"If you let off the throttle in an attempt to slow down, not only do you lose power, but you lose control," said Dennis Evans, public information officer for the watercraft division of the Ohio Department of Natural Resources, who cited operator inexperience, general product design and methods of operation as factors in the rising numbers of deaths and injuries on personal watercrafts.

"People get so focused on fun, they get tunnel vision," Evans said. He added that the majority of personal watercraft-related accidents involve two vehicles, and the operators generally know each other.

"One zigs when the other thought they would zag," Evans said.

Paul Johnson with Good Times PowerSports of Lubbock said he sells about 300 personal watercrafts a year. Since 1978, Saturday's was the first fatal accident of which he has heard, he said. Accidents for personal watercrafts per hour used are no higher than any other boat, he said.

Johnson said every boat and personal watercraft he sells goes with a safety video and a Texas Parks and Wildlife book.

"We suggest people watch (the video) before they go out on the water," Johnson and Evans offered the same advice for people on lakes with personal watercrafts.

"Don't ride (personal watercrafts) without knowing all the rules," Johnson said. "There are definitely right-of-way rules—where/how to pass and operation at certain distances from other boats, personal watercrafts and the shoreline."

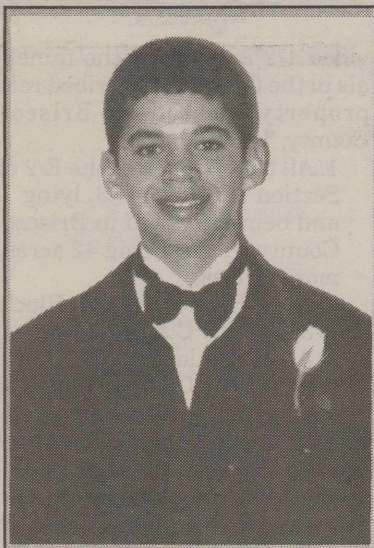

## Ivory is National Award Winner

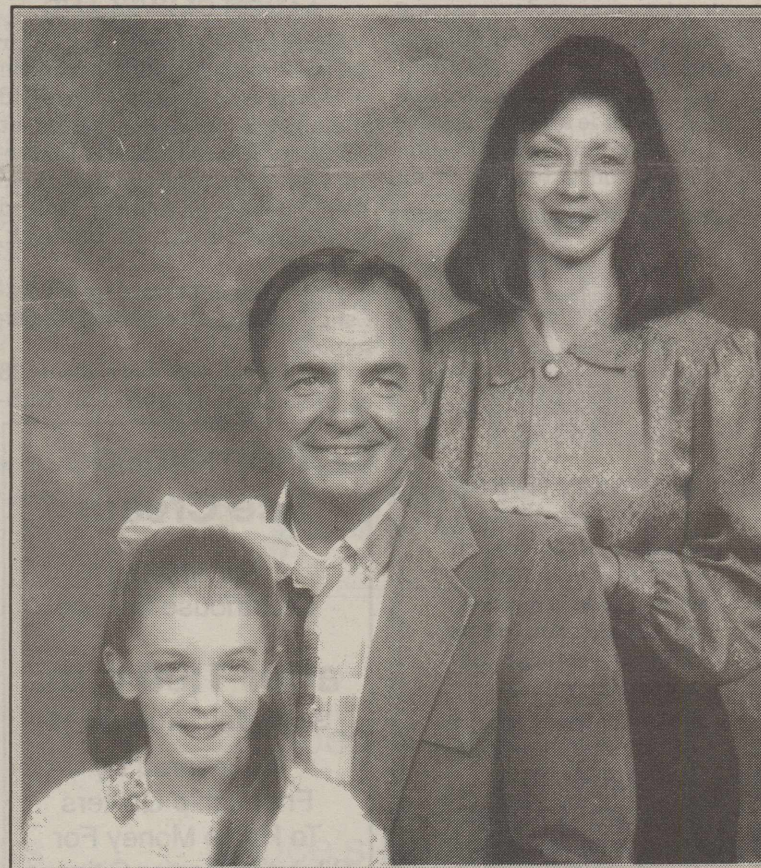
The United States Achievement Academy has announced that Isaiah Ivory of Silverton has been named a United States National Award Winner in Mathematics.

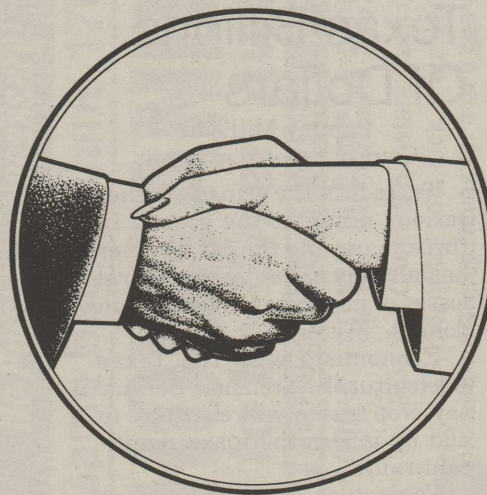

## Drought Costs Texas Billions Of Dollars

Texas is in the grip of another serious drought, the second in three years, and the dry weather has already caused agricultural losses of more than three billion dollars.

Economists with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service say crop losses will continue to add up unless there are significant rains.

Vegetables are withering on the vine. Corn and sorghum are burning up in the field. Ranchers are worried about feeding their cattle since there's little grass to graze on, grain prices are sure to rise and this year's hay crop probably will not make more than one cutting.

And then there's the state's largest cash crop--cotton. Extension agent economist Dr. Joe Outlaw says it is in serious jeopardy. He says it could result in losses of billions and billions of dollars.

The situation is compounded because many farmers still have not recouped their losses from the 1996 drought which was the worst on record in Texas in terms of economics. So as the sun bears

After falling behind 86-68, the North delivered one final flurry to make the East sweat. Cherry and Thomas accounted for 12 points in a 14-4 siege that closed the gap to 85-82 with 5:54 to play.

But Cody Wilson, who dumped in a game-high 28 points for the East, was just too much down the stretch. He hit consecutive treys from 25 to 23 feet and then stuck a dagger in the North's heart with a slick behind-the-back pass that resulted in an easy layup for a team-member.

Cherry scored 13 points for the North, while James Potts led the North with 20 points and Justin Stracener added 17. Stracener also had a game-high 13 rebounds and blocked two shots.

"We knew it was going to be a fast-paced game because they were so much smaller than us," said Cherry, whose nine second-half points sparked a North comeback. "What we didn't know was that they'd shoot like that. They lit us up."

## Briscoe County Is Now Approved For Emergency Grazing of CRP Acreage

The Deputy Administrator of Farm Programs has authorized Briscoe County to release CRP acreage for emergency grazing because of continuing drought.

CRP participants who wish to graze CRP must complete the following before grazing begins:

(1) Come to the FSA office and identify acreage to be grazed on aerial photocopy.

(2) Obtain a modified conservation plan to include grazing requirements as determined by NRCS (plan must be site specific and reflect the local wildlife needs and concerns).

(3) Record intended use on form DF-21.

(4) Read and sign terms and conditions for emergency grazing of CRP acreage for 1998. If the payment reduction is to be taken out of the annual payment, all participants must sign agreeing to terms before grazing can begin.

(5) Leave at least 25 percent of each field or contiguous fields ungrazed for wildlife, or graze no more than 75 percent of the stocking rate determined by NRCS.

(6) Receive notification of approval from the county committee in writing.

The fiscal year 1999 annual rental payment scheduled to be made after October 1, 1998 will be reduced by the number of acres grazed (regardless of stocking rate) times the CRP rental rate per acre times 25 percent. (Ex. rental rate for CRP \$30.00/ac. graze 100.0 acres. Payment reduction will be 100.0 acres times \$30.00 times 25 percent equals a \$750.00 payment reduction.) Producers may prepay the grazing fee in advance if desired.

Eligible livestock producers (producers in an approved county) may rent or lease eligible

acreage from a CRP participant. The producer that rents or leases CRP must sign a statement certifying that they will not sublease the CRP acreage and must receive written notification from the county committee of approval before any grazing takes place.

CRP participants who rent or lease grazing to an eligible livestock producer will inform the county office of the producer's name and identify the acreage to be grazed on an aerial photocopy.

As in the past, CRP cover, if destroyed, must be re-established at the producers expense.

Grazing will end by the earlier of October 1, 1998 or a date the county committee or the state committee determine that emergency grazing is no longer needed.

Emergency haying is not authorized at this time.

If you are interested in grazing CRP, or leasing grazing to someone else, please make arrangements to come by the office before you graze the acreage. Producers who graze CRP before application and approval are subject to maintenance default penalties.

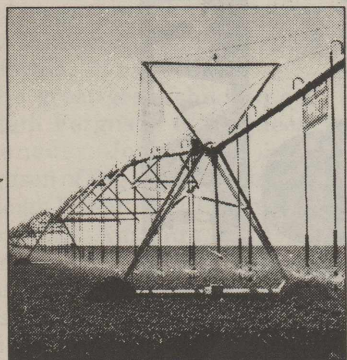

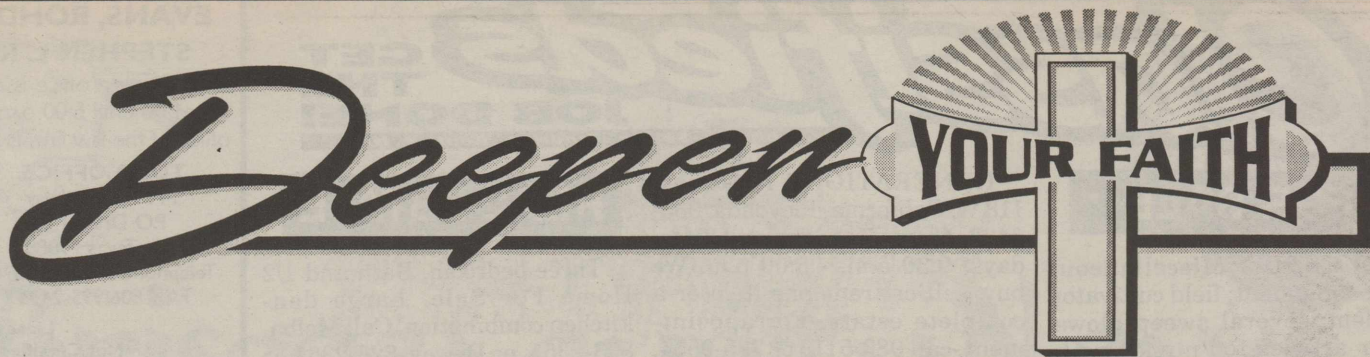

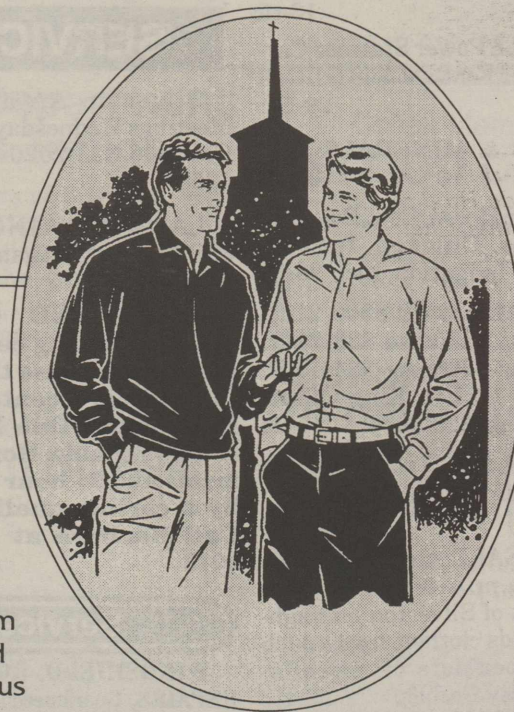


### How Should We Handle Criticism?
