Extreme Wildfire Danger Warning

An extreme wildfire danger warning issued last week by the Texas Forest Service for the High Plains region continues, as dry, windy weather persists and wildfire activity picks up.

Vegetation is brown, dry and growing increasingly fire-prone, says fire prevention and assessment teams personnel assigned by the state forestry to this region. The risk has grown great enough that the Texas Forest Service has mobilized additional firefighting resources to the region to be available to assist area fire departments with fire response.

"The likelihood is growing that some areas may experience multiple wildfires or very large fires," says Les Rogers, regional fire coordinator with the Texas Forest Service in Canyon. We are just now entering the normally windy months of March and April when the danger of fast-spreading wildland fires normally increases.

Prepositioning firefighting resources helped minimize wildfire losses last year during the record fire siege, and our agency again has acted to get supplementary firefighting resources into a high fire danger area prior to a major outbreak of wildfires.

Many of the wildfires that have occurred in the region recently have been due to carelessness, according to Todd Nightengale, a member of the Texas Forest Service fire prevention team in Canyon.

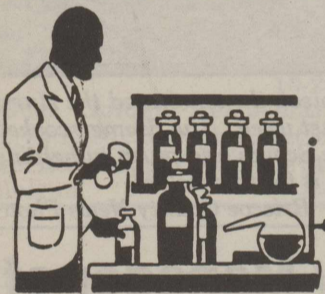

Look at March. I like putting on a little more fertilizer on the first application than in the following summer months. Your grass is starving for nutrients from the long winter's nap. So give it a good jump start; you will like the results! You probably noticed we don't fertilize in June, July or August. Fescue goes semi-dormant in the hot summer months. So all it needs is water and mowing. The ionate in April will make your lawn have a very pretty dark rich green color.

Coach Mantle will be calling you next August asking you if his team can work out on your lawn, it will be so pretty!

Fescue is really an easy grass to care for. You don't need to fertilize it the same way you fertilize Bermuda grass.

Okay, we'll let Rick off the hook this time on the bags of grass. A good use for the grass is to rototill the grass into your garden. Place the grass in your flower bed or this summer put it in your garden. This helps conserve moisture. If your lawn is not too thick you can mow it down and just leave the grass laying on the surface. Contact the city to see what the policy is for disposing of grass this spring and summer.

That's it for March. Next month we'll be talking about fertilizing Bermuda grass and controlling grubs. Congratulations to the Owls and Lady Owls! You have continued the winning tradition. Till next month, THINK RAIN. Vic

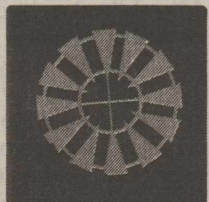
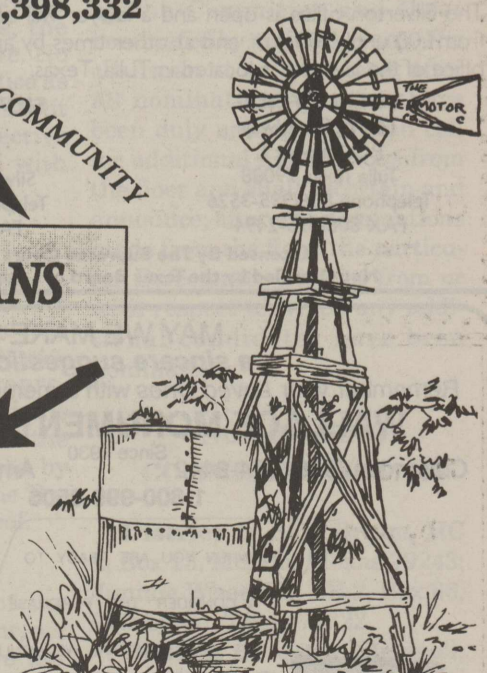
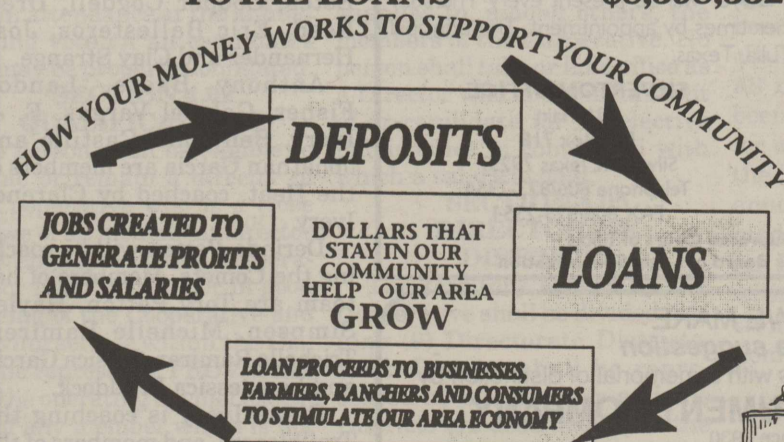

Showing Champion Was a Little Like Winning the Lottery For Teen

When 16-year-old Kenda Wood saw her steer win the Grand Championship of the San Antonio Livestock Exposition, it must have been a little like winning the lottery. In the grand champion run which took place on the floor of the Freeman Coliseum, Kenda's black AOB steer, Spike, was selected from among the 16 breed champion steers of the show.

This was only her second year to show steers in San Antonio, even though Kenda has been exhibiting steers for nine years. She and her 1242-pound steer represented the Briscoe County 4-H.

Supporting the junior market steer exhibitors of Texas, busi-

ness leaders attended the 50th San Antonio Livestock Exposition steer auction on Saturday, February 20.

Kenda's Grand Champion steer, classified in the All Other Breed division, brought \$108,000. The buyers were Rush Enterprises, HEB, George and Norma Strait, Holt Machinery, Luke Soules Southwest, and Cardell Cabinetry.

In the name of all buyers, the steer was donated to the Baptist Children's Home.

Acreage Reserve Program Proposed

Reports from USDA indicate Secretary of Agriculture Dan Glickman intends to support new legislation to be proposed.

The bill is expected to be presented in the next three weeks and will propose the creation of a new conservation program that pays farmers to leave cropland idle.

However, the proposed new Conservation Reserve Program will differ from the current CRP which idles around 30 million acres. The proposed program would only request farmers leave land idle for five years rather than 10 years. Neither Glickman nor Roberts have yet commented on the number of acres the program is to target for inclusion or the payment rate for idling land.

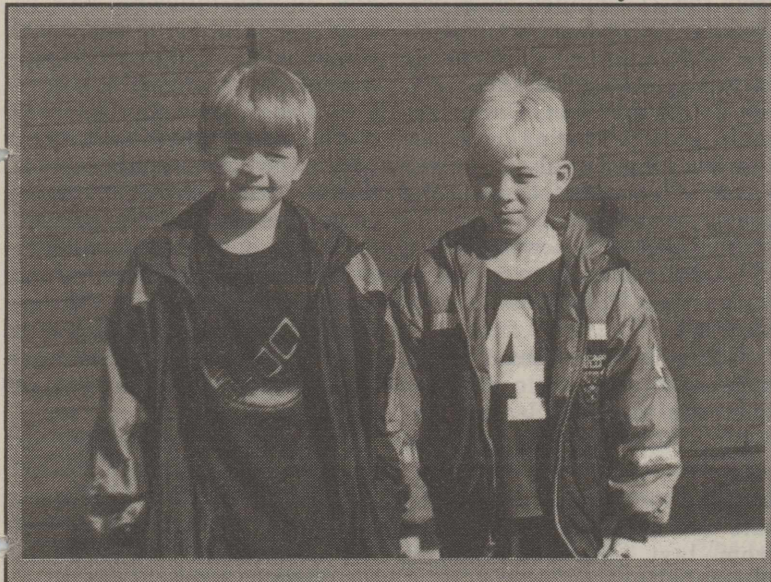

Lighthouse Electric Cooperative, Inc., the Board of Directors has appointed a Committee on Nominations to prepare a list of nominations for Directors to be elected at the annual membership meeting of the Cooperative on April 29, 1999. Three (3) Directors, one each from District 1, District 3, and District 4, will be elected in 1999. Although Directors are nominated from the District which they represent, all members in attendance at the annual meeting vote on all candidates who may be properly nominated.

SECTION 4.02

QUALIFICATIONS:

No person shall be eligible to become or remain a director of the Cooperative who is a close relative of an incumbent director or an employee of the Cooperative, or is not a member in good standing of the Cooperative and receiving service within the District he represents; PROVIDED, that the operating or chief executive of any member which is not a natural person, such as a corporation, church, etc., or his designee, shall be eligible to become a director, from the Directorate District in which such member is located, if he or such designee (1) is in substantial permanent occupancy, direction or use of the premises served by the Cooperative, and (2) is a permanent and year-round resident within or in close proximity to an area served by the Cooperative; BUT PROVIDED FURTHER, that no more than one (1) such person may serve on the Board of Directors at the same time. No person shall

be eligible to become or remain a director of, or to hold any other position of trust in, the Cooperative who does not have the legal capacity to enter into a binding contract or is in any way employed by or financially interested in a competing enterprise, or a business selling electric energy or supplies to the Cooperative, or a business primarily engaged in selling electrical or plumbing appliances, fixtures or supplies to, among others, the members of the Cooperative. No person shall take or hold office as a Director who is the incumbent of or candidate for an elective public office in connection with which a salary is paid.

SECTION 4.05 DIRECTORATE DISTRICTS

The territory served by the Cooperative shall be divided into nine (9) Directorate Districts. Each District shall be represented by one director and the Districts are described upon the map on the territory served by the District attached to the Bylaws and made a part hereof.

SECTION 4.06 NOMINATIONS

It shall be the duty of the Board of Directors to appoint, not less than thirty (30) days nor more than one hundred eighty (180) days prior to the date of the meeting of the members at which directors are to be elected, a Committee on Nominations, consisting of not less than five (5) nor more than eleven (11) members. The Committee shall prepare and post at the principal office of the

Cooperative at least twenty (20) days prior to the meeting a list of nominations for directors to be elected, listing separately the nominee(s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which director must, pursuant to this Article, be elected at the meeting. The Committee may include as many nominees for any director to be elected from or with respect to a Directorate District as it deems desirable. Any fifteen (15) or more members of the Cooperative, acting together, may make additional nominations in writing over their signatures, listing their nominee(s) in like manner, not less than fifteen (15) days prior to the meeting, and the Secretary shall post such nominations at the same place where the list of nominations made by the Committee is posted. The Secretary shall mail to the members with the notice of the meeting, or separately, but at least ten (10) days prior to the date of the meeting, a statement of the names and addresses of all nominee(s) for each Directorate District from or with respect to which a director must be elected, showing clearly those nominated by the Committee and those nominated by petition, if any. The chairman at such meeting, after all nominations so made have been duly announced, shall call for additional nominations from the floor and shall ascertain and announce, after any nominations made from the floor, the particular Directorate District from or with respect to which any additional candidates have been nominated.

Efforts to revive USDA's Step 2 export subsidies and an ailing cotton crop in Australia also helped drive the market upward.

U. S. Representative Larry Combest, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, endorsed a \$1.0 billion request by the U. S. cotton industry to restore cotton export subsidies for the next three years. Combest announced he will try to secure new funding from Congress for the Step 2 program by the beginning of the new marketing year on August 1, 1999. The new funding will run through the expiration of the current farm law in July 2002.

Heavy rain in the eastern cotton areas of Australia also was supportive to the market. Adverse weather there has triggered concern over lower-quality crops and yield losses. Bridge

TELCOT[®] Report

A WEEKLY SUMMARY OF COTTON MARKETING NEWS

For the Week Ended March 4

Global Weather Services reported too much rain in the past several days is damaging maturing cotton and delaying the harvest. Worries about the crop have led Australia's cotton basis to jump 150 - 200 points. Basis has gone as much as 600 points over New York Cotton Exchange (NYCE) futures and has forced Australian merchants to withdraw export offers. The Australian situation could compound the current shortage of high quality cotton around the world.

Meanwhile, China's 1998 crop appears to have been smaller than expected. An article in the China Economic Times reported that China's State Statistical Bureau now pegs the country's 1998 cotton output at 20.2 million bales. Due to the impact of flooding last summer, the estimate for the 1998 season is down from the 21.1 million bales produced in 1997; however, the figure still is higher than earlier Ministry of Agriculture estimates. In addition, China appears to be producing more cotton than most analysts anticipated in the current season as the country's statistical bureau recently released a new figure for the 1999 cotton crop which is higher than USPA's estimate of 19.8 bales.

Closer to home, Texas again may experience dry conditions this year that may lead to another difficult growing season, according to one weather source. La Nina conditions may complicate and delay Texas' recovery from last year's heat and drought.

Despite the dry conditions, cotton planting in the Texas Rio Grande Valley now is in full swing. Most Texas Upper Coastal Bend growers report overall moisture in that area currently is adequate, and seeding will begin in the next two weeks. Field work also is underway on the High Plains, but producers are reluctant to fully prepare for planting until some moisture is received.

USDA's weekly export sales report held no surprises for the market as the department showed net sales of 18,100 bales and shipments of 38,600 bales for the week ended February 25. The new sales figure was lower than the previous week's 49,300 bales, but the market showed no concern. Japan was the largest buyer of U. S. cotton with purchases totaling 5,800 bales. Indonesia and Taiwan followed with receipts totaling 5,400 and 3,200, respectively. Export shipments continue to be strong. In fact, the U. S. now has sold approximately 97 percent of USDA's 1998-99 export target of 4.2 million bales, and more than 70 percent of that target already has been shipped.

In the spot cotton market, sales on the TELCOT electronic marketing system in the five trading days ended March 4 totaled 14,009 bales, an increase from the previous week's sales of 12,752 bales.

Average daily prices received by producers utilizing TELCOT ranged from 44.33 to 47.57 cents per pound, compared to a range of 43.04 to 46.11 cents per pound the previous week.


