John Shipp Wins \$600 Calf Purchase Certificate In Houston Show Scramble

John Shipp, 15 year old, 4-H member from Roby, was the winner of a \$600 calf purchase certificate sponsored by Branding Iron Western Corral at the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo's Feb. 25th performance.

The calf scramble is a rough, tough action-filled event that is the highlight of every rodeo performance. In the event, a dozen or so wild, young calves are turned loose in the vast Astrodome arena to be pursued by two dozen or so eager youngsters. To win, the calf must be caught, haltered and brought back across the finish line.

The winner then receives a calf purchase certificate valued at \$600 to be used toward the purchase of a registered beef or dairy heifer. These certificates are donated by Houston area businesses, firms and individuals who believe in the programs sponsored by the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo. These persons and firms have chosen to translate their support into action by donating these certificates.

Then, for each winner, begins a year-long involvement in a program designed to provide invaluable learning experiences. The heifer is carefully selected and all work done with her is done under the strict supervision of the winner's vocational agricultural teacher or county extension agent.

Each scramble winner agrees to keep accurate monetary records, submit monthly progress reports both to the livestock show and to the individual sponsor, photographically

chronicle the progress of the project and prepare a 500 word essay covering the entire year.

The entire learning experience will include proper livestock evaluation techniques, efficient cattle feeding and production methods, principles of economics and money management.

At the conclusion of the year and the showing competition at the Houston Livestock Show, the heifer belongs to the winner to use as desired. Most heifers become the basis for future cattle herds. Thus, a one-year learning partnership is stretched into a life-time career. For those winners who decide not to continue their cattle program, they have still enjoyed an invaluable learning experience and perhaps may choose some other field of agricultural endeavor.

Since its inception, the Houston Calf Scramble and its sponsors have put more than \$1.9 million—some 9,000+ quality animals—into the hands of Texas youth. These thousands of animals have been purchased from purebred herds, directly benefiting the cattle raisers. In addition, the purchase of feeds, supplies and tools have a multiplying effect on the hometown economies of

yearly generates more than half a million dollars in economic activity throughout the state.

Rotan One-Act Play Staged For Performance Tuesday

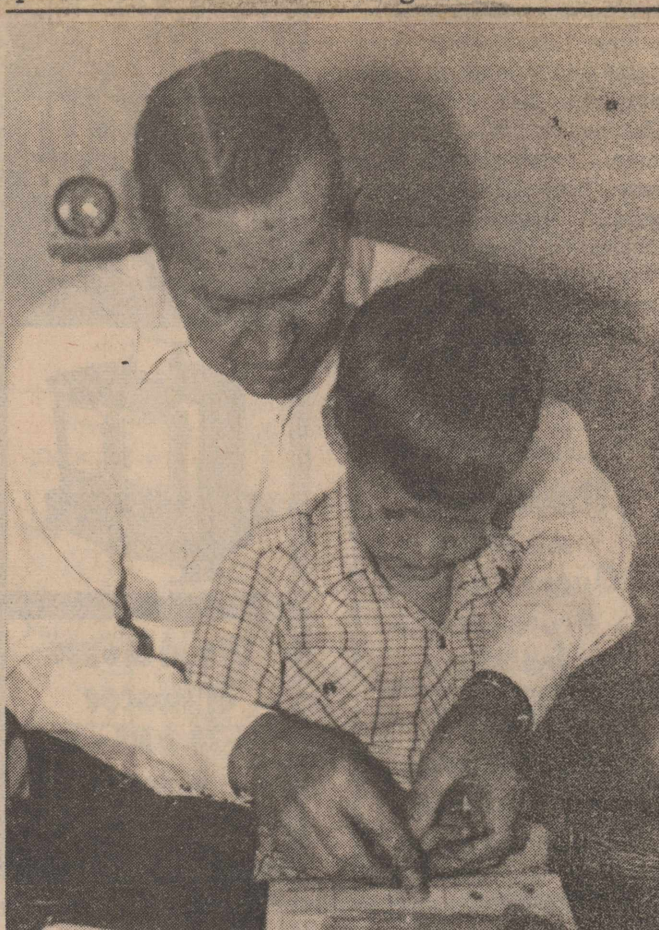

There is no charge for the general public. The cast will perform in the U.I.L. District One-Act Play Contest on March 20th at the Rotan High School Auditorium.

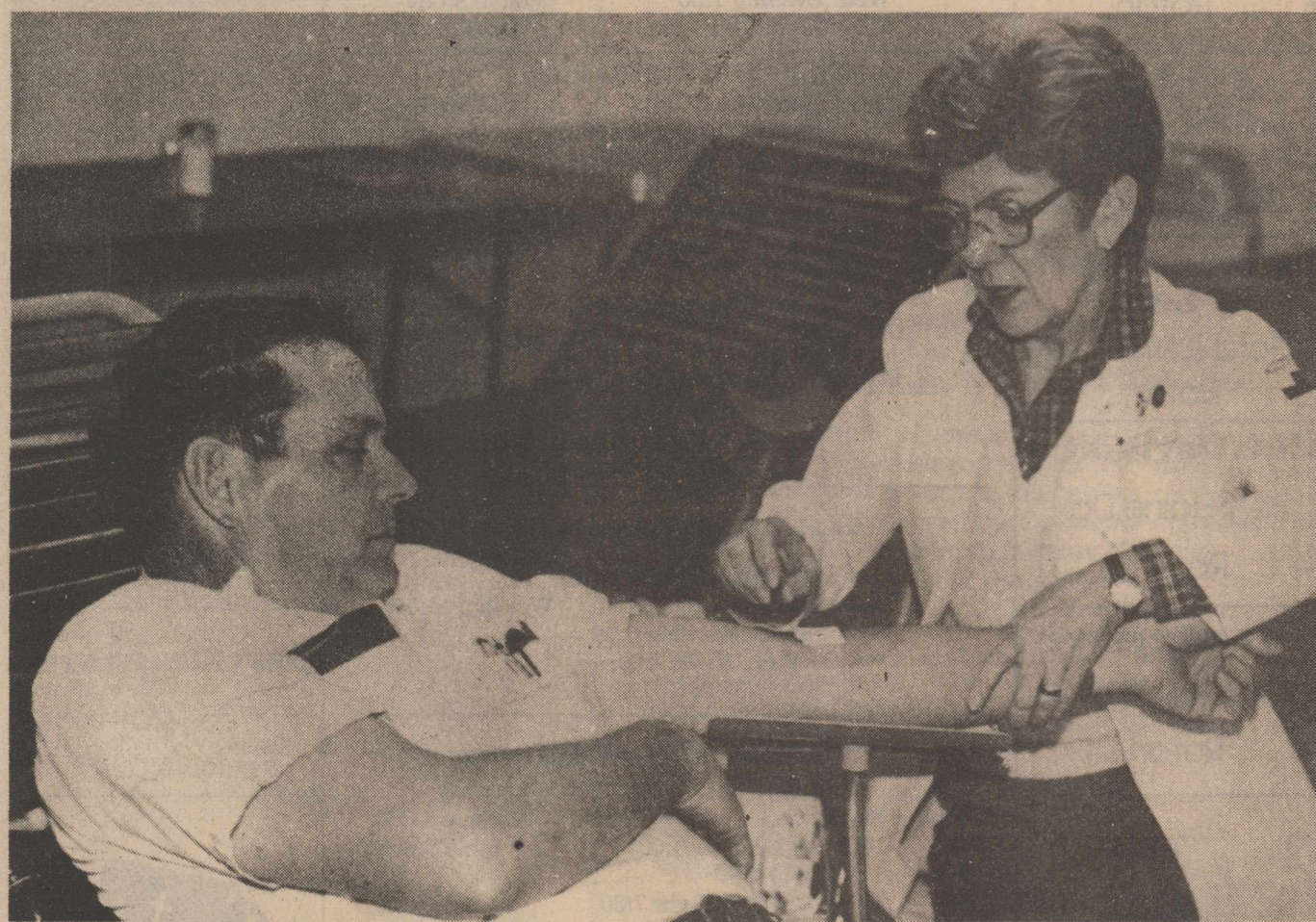

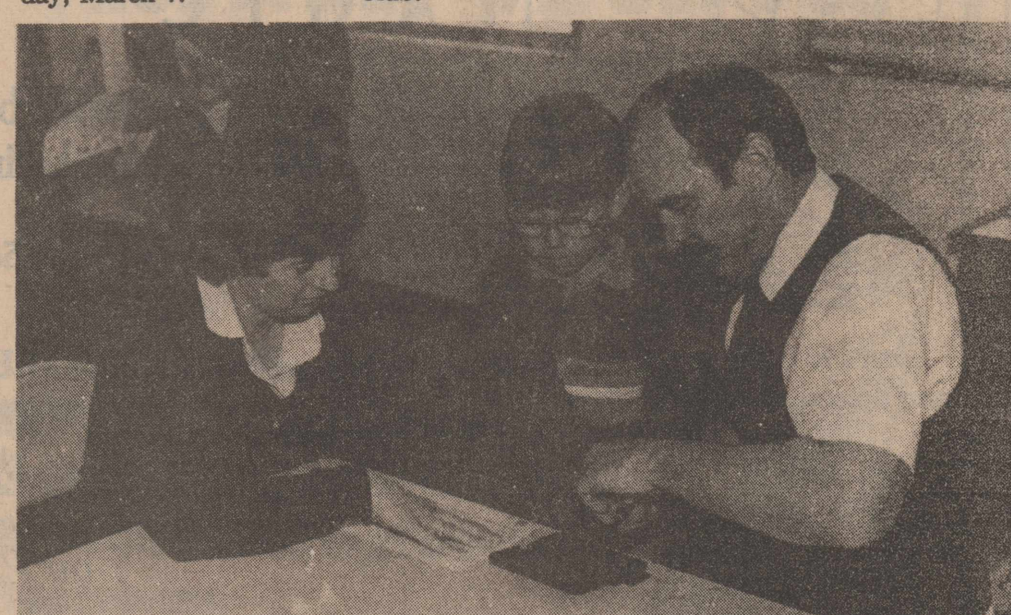

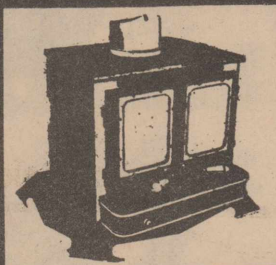

Often we stop short when confronted with stumbling blocks. But with God's help we can continue and overcome all obstacles.

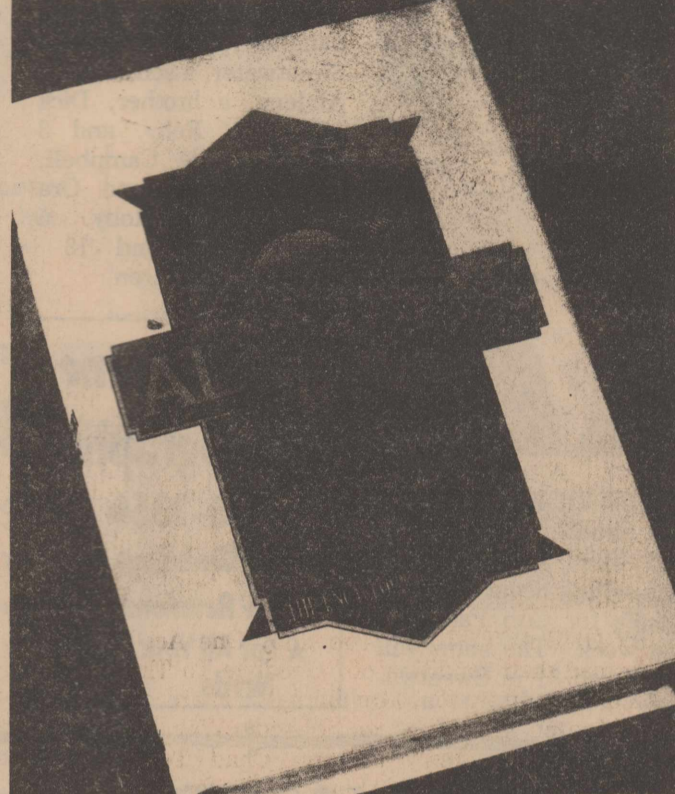

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Tax Planning by James Rodgers, CPA



IRS GIVES IN
(New IRA Advantage)

The requirement that a taxpayer actually make his IRA contribution before filing the tax return on which he takes a deduction for it has now been changed. A recent IRS ruling now allows you to file your income tax return and take a deduction for your IRA contribution of up to \$2,000 even though you have not yet put the money in your IRA. You then have until the filing deadline of your tax return to actually make your contribution.

This change in IRS policy allows for an interesting maneuver. Those taxpayers who will be receiving a tax refund can file early and take their IRA deduction, wait for their refund, then use the refund money to actually make the contribution.

If you apply for the automatic extension that allows you to extend the filing date of your tax return to August 15th, you can file your tax return between April 15th and August 15th, wait for your refund and make your IRA contribution before the filing extension expires on August 15th.

You cannot, however, file your return before April 15th and then file for an August 15th extension to try to get additional time to make the IRA contribution.

Taxpayers who file and take a deduction for an IRA contribution but who actually never make the contribution by the due date of the return, are required to file and amended return eliminating the deduction. If they do not, the IRS can assess a negligence penalty of 5% or a fraud penalty of 50% of the additional tax due.

Since earnings in an IRA are tax free until withdrawal, consider making your IRA contribution early in the year. It is especially advisable to transfer money that's in a savings account or other taxable investment to an IRA early in the year. You'll have tax-deferred growth for a longer period.

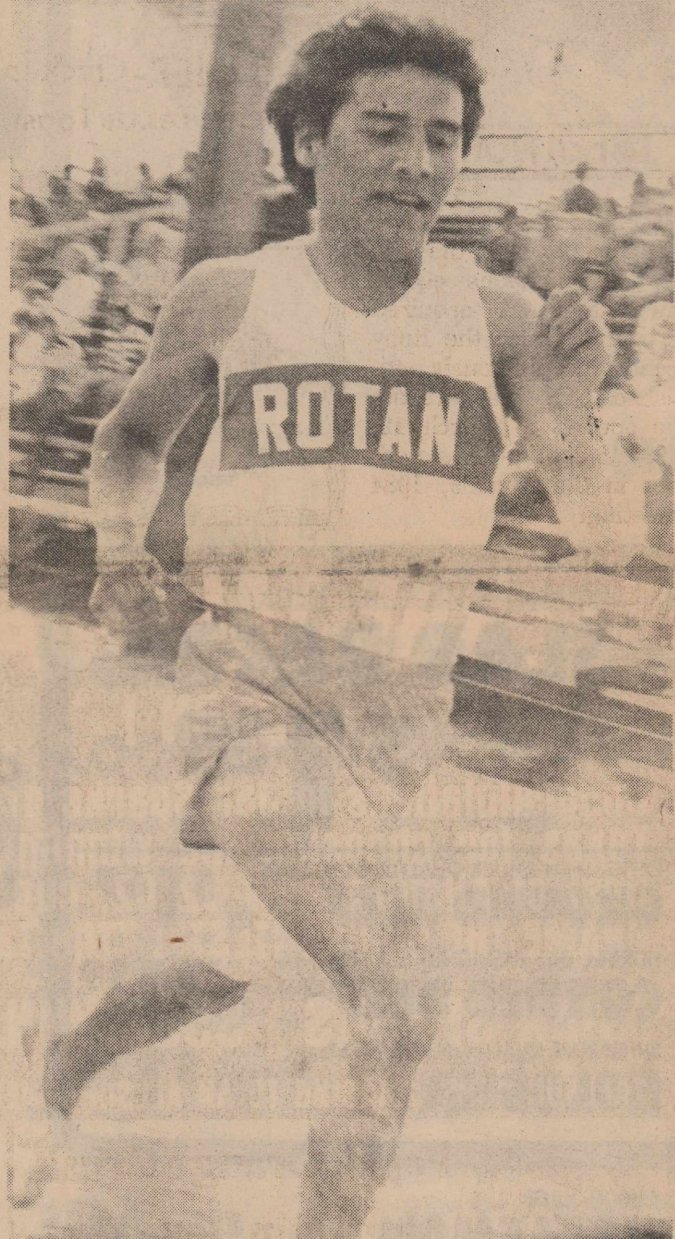
The medical insurance part of Medicare helps pay for doctor bills, outpatient hospital services, and many other medical items and services not covered under hospital insurance.

Protection for people who sign up during the general enrollment period will start July 1, 1984.

Medical insurance is financed by premiums paid by those enrolled and the Federal general revenue. Currently the Federal Government pays about three-fourths of the cost.

People who sign up during a general enrollment period may pay a higher premium, Hammons said. This is because the premium is increased by 10 percent for each full year a person could have had this protection but did not.

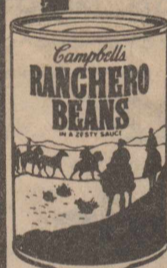
