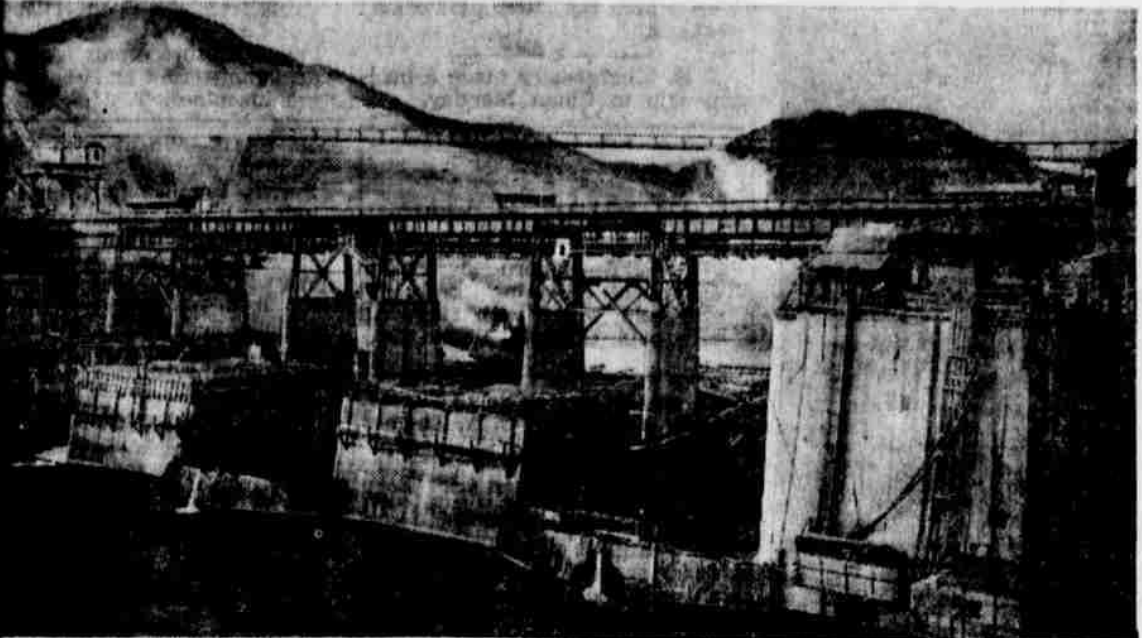


"Move Over!" Says Dam Builder to River
