

Fisher County Hospital Board Meets To Review 1983-84 Audit Report

Members of the Fisher County Hospital Board met in regular session last Monday night to accept Insurance bids on Professional liability and to review the 1983-84 Audit Report from Condley and Company.

In searching for an insurance company to cover professional as well as property and auto liability the board members found that numerous insurance companies had stopped writing such coverage until the Volitle insurance market leveled off. Joe Dale Burk of Rotan Insurance Company appeared before the board to present a bid. Burk contacted Saint Paul Insurance Company which is presently not writing liability cover-

age, but according to the Saint Paul Insurance representative the good record of the Fisher County Hospital District and the record of Burk were their grounds for making a special bid. United States **Insurance Group formerly** wrote the coverage for the hospital but withdrew their coverage. The proposed bid from Burk and Saint Paul Insurance Company would provide the hospital with property, professional, and auto liability coverage to a greater extent for approximately \$500.00 more in premium. The board members felt that their choices were few and the proposed policy was acceptable. Burk did inform the board members that two of the practicing

doctors at the hospital did not have adequate liability coverage under this policy and that he was not sure about the other. Burk told board members that Saint Paul would cover the hospital if the two doctors would extend their liability coverage to \$500,000. Dave Williams moved to accept the proposed bid from Saint Paul Insurance Company for \$22,002.00 which will be an umbrella coverage, the motion was seconded by Frank Mitchell and passed unanimously. The doctors will be contacted about updating their coverage before the policy will be accepted by Saint Paul Insurance Company. Board members heard
