### Swimming Pools At Rotan, Roby Opening This Week

Fisher County residents will be able to enjoy a reprieve from summer's heat at city pools beginning this week according to officials at both cities.

Wednesday was the official opening day for Roby pool. Hours will be Tuesday and Wednesday from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m.; Thursday from 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 to 9:00; Friday and Saturday from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. and 2:00 to 5:00 p.m. on Sunday. The pool will be closed on Mondays.

Children under six years of age can use the Roby pool for 75 cents while fees for anyone six years old and over are \$1.00.

In Rotan, the city pool will open either today, Thursday or Friday pending completion of maintenance work on the pool. According to city manager Kenneth Vann, chemicals for the water had to be added before the pool

could open. It was expected that this would be completed earlier in the week but time was needed to allow the chemicals to

work.

Hours for Rotan pool will be daily from 2:00 to 6:00 p.m. Extended evening hours are offered on Thursday from 8:00 to

10:00 p.m. The pool will be closed on Monday.

Cost for using Rotan city pool will be 50 cents for those eleven years old and

younger or \$1.00 for anyone over eleven. Season tickets can be purchased for \$10.00 (under eleven) and \$20.00 (over eleven).

### Texas Legislature Passes 38.6 Billion Dollar Budget

On the last day of the session, the Legislature passed a \$38.6 billion budget, and while lawmakers avoided a \$1.2 billion deficit crisis, they didn't sidestep a special session called to provide health care for the poor.

Less than an hour after the midnight gavel banged final adjournment, Gov. Mark White announced he was calling legislators back into session immediately to consider unfinished business.

Three days later, the Legislature approved a \$70 million health care plan for the poor. The money comes out of general revenue and contingency funds controlled by the governor, and does not call for a tax hike.

Although the plan was supported by Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and House Speaker Gib Lewis, the bill died in the final three minutes of the regular session when an opposition legislator talked it to death.

The bill provides that the state will pay for health care for the very poor, and for expanded medical services for mothers, infants and the elderly. County governments will be reimbursed for costs.

Indigent Plea Heard

Of course, the poor were naturally for the bill, but so were many rural hospital boards strained financially by indigent patients. Finding funds for the program was the major problem because few lawmakers were willing to vote for another tax increase. Most of them, in fact were careful to avoid even the appearance of voting for a tax increase so scared are they of voter reaction.

When someone proposed latching onto an eight-cent cigarette tax that the feds are rumored to be repealing, most legislators, and especially Gov. White, were uncertain and slow to act. Hence the delays in bringing the program to a floor vote.

An Election Issue?

But once the budget was passed, the extra money was found to pay for the program, and a tax increase was avoided.

In the early hours of the special session, the indigent care plan threatened to be the foremost election issue of 1986.

On one hand, Mark White and the Democrats, including most of the rural conservatives, had revived and advocated the program.

On the other, the Republicans had fought it all along in the belief they were avoiding a tax increase.

Wishy-Washy or Gutsy? The man in the hot seat was, and still is, the governor, alternately blasted for being headstrong and "wishy-washy."

Already he must stand for re-election with one bona fide tax hike on his record. He ran the risk of adding another, but by not adding a tax, he and lawmakers diminished the election bomb effect.

### Jail Commission Instructs County To Add New Jailer

The Texas Jail Standards Commission, in a letter to Fisher County Judge Marshal Bennett this week, informed him of the commissions ruling that a third full time jailer would be required before approval would be granted by the commission to certify the Fisher County Jail facility.

The commission, during their meeting on May 22nd, indicated that they could not grant approval of the recently approved move by Fisher County Commissioners to hire two full time jailers. The letter indicated that Fisher County Sheriff Mickey Counts would not meet the commissions approval as night jailer, because in the performance of his duties he is subject to be called out on nights, holidays and weekends thus leaving the jail facility without proper supervision.

Judge Bennett indicated that the third jailer would

push the budget for the new program up approximately \$39,000 a year.

Counts recently hired Allyn "Shorty" Acer, a Rotan

resident and Jerry Branson of Roby as jailers. He is expected to name the third new jailer later this week.

### Richard Smith Hired As New Rotan Jr. High Coach

Richard Smith, who will be entering his first year of coaching in the fall, has been hired as a teacher/coach in the Rotan School system, according to Athletic Director and Head Football Coach Richard Gorman.

Smith attended college at Angelo State University and will be teaching math in Rotan Junior High School.

He and his wife, Karen are both originally from Santa Anna. They have a 1 1/2 year old daughter.

Smith will be involved in coaching junior high football, assisting with junior varsity, coaching junior varsity basketball and boys junior high track.

Other changes include the hiring of Adriana Cox in the early childhood program as a 7th grade girls basketball coach and assisting in junior high girls track. Mrs. Jackie Gillis will be teaching English and coaching 8th grade girls basketball and junior high girls track, according to Gorman.

Howard Gordon, president of the Hobbs School Board, presented Mr. Maxwell with an engraved plaque in appreciation of his seven years of service as superintendent of the Hobbs School District. Mr. and Mrs. Maxwell were also presented with a money tree from all school personnel and board members.

According to available records, only two superintendents have been at Hobbs for a longer period of time than Mr. Maxwell. He is retiring June 15, 1985, completing a total of

37 years of service in public education. HE came to Hobbs in July of 1978 as superintendent from Sands I.S.D., where he was superintendent for seventeen years. Prior to that, he was high school principal at Ackerly for four years, elementary principal at Vealmoor for five years, coach at Novice for two years, and coach at Blackwell for one year.

### June 24 Final Day For Farm Loan Applications

The final date to file an application for an emergency farm loan for losses caused by this past summer's drought and extremely high temperatures is June 24, 1985, FmHA Acting County Supervisor said today.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30-percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan, Dennis Cumbe said. Farmers participating in the PIK or federal crop insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.

FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships, corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority

interest. The FmHA office is located at 111-B Garfield, Rotan, Texas, and is open from 9:00-5:00 Monday through Friday.

### Bullock Nails First In Sales Tax Money Theft

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday announced an Odessa grand jury has returned the state's first criminal indictment for theft of sales tax money.

In a case that could set a new precedent dealing with willfully delinquent sales taxpayers, Ector County grand jurors indicted Bill G. Overton of Odessa for theft of \$68,000 Overton allegedly collected as sales tax but did not send to the State Comptroller.

"Let this case be a warning to any business person who might be tempted not to send sales tax they have collected to the state," Bullock said.

Overton, who had never applied for or been granted a sales tax permit, operated an Odessa oil-field supply business. The alleged diversion of sales tax monies involved the use of altered invoices from Overton's firm and was discovered by a Comptroller auditor.

Bullock praised the grand jury's action saying, "If a merchant collects sales tax from his customers and fails to send it to the Treasury, he's stealing in

the name of the state. He's stealing from his customers who pay the tax in good faith; he's stealing

from his local government, which doesn't get its share and he's stealing from state government.

"It's also downright unfair to his competitors because it gives him an extra 5 and one-eighth percent profit margin over his competition and in

today's business climate, that can make the difference between staying in business and going broke. With the help of local prosecutors, we're going to see this kind of theft prosecuted to the full limit of the law."

A wise consumer shops carefully and watches advertising for bargains on items that are needed or desired. However, some advertising may be misleading.

In particular there is a form of advertising called "Distress Sale" advertising. All of us have seen advertising which tells of some natural disaster, unfortunate event, or unforeseen development which necessitates a quick sale at reduced prices.

#### Types of Sales

One example of this type of advertising is a "Fire" sale. In the event of a fire, businesses sometimes are forced to liquidate inventory rapidly because of damage to the inventory or a lack of storage space. Many times the price has been greatly reduced to speed this process, and consumers can get a real bargain. However, there have been instances of businesses advertising a "Fire" sale when there

has been no fire and the prices of the goods have not been lowered significantly. Consumers who have not familiarized themselves with general market prices of these goods in the local market place may be induced to buy something they may not otherwise have purchased because they thought they were getting a bargain.

Another similar type of advertising is the "Going Out of Business" sale. Here again, due to business failure, a company may be forced to sell its inventory at a greatly reduced price in order to move the goods quickly. Some businesses in the past have advertised a "Going Out of Business" sale when they never intended to cease doing business and did not significantly reduce prices.

A "Grand Opening" sale, though not the product of unfortunate circumstances, also means savings to many consumers. Stores, new to an

area in order to build a clientele, will offer bargains. However, in some cases these sales have been extended to the point that the prices are actually the prices normally charged for the particular items and the consumer realizes no real savings.

Other types of distress sales which have been legitimately used but also abused by some businessmen are "Flood" sales, "Hurricane" sales, "Tornado" sales, "Hail Damage" sales. All these terms lead the consumer to believe that, due to some event beyond the control of the businessman, prices have been reduced dramatically to facilitate the liquidation of inventory, thus providing the consumer with a genuine bargain.

#### What To Do

The best way to protect yourself from the businesses which may use these terms falsely is to be familiar with the prevail-

ing prices of the brand names being offered in your area. Additionally, become informed about the actual occurrence of the event which caused the distressed situation through the media and by reading the daily newspaper. Finally, if it is a "Going Out of Business" sale, check with your city or county tax assessor and collector to make sure that the business had made the filings required by law before this form of advertisement can be used.

### Protecting Wildlife In Harvesting Wheat & Oats

Don't forget wildlife when harvesting wheat and oats. Quail, mourning dove, turkey, and other birds find food and cover in fields of small grains.

Strips of unharvested grain around field edges near brush or tall grasses provide excellent food for quail and turkey. Quail will use unharvested strips along terraces or around

areas in the field that are too wet to cultivate. Mourning dove will feed on shattered seed where soils are shallow and the stand of grain is thin.

Even if the entire field is combined, these same areas can be left untilled until next planting season to benefit wildlife. Without tillage, waste grain is available to the birds and an 8 inch stubble provides suitable cover until it deteriorates.

If an area in the field has a thin stand of wheat and a good stand of native sunflowers, save this area for dove hunting next September.

Do not burn the small grain stubble. Wildlife benefits are lost as well as organic matter; it also exposes the soil to erosion. The Upper Clear Fork and U.S. Soil Conservation Service encourages soil protection through proper use of small grain residues.

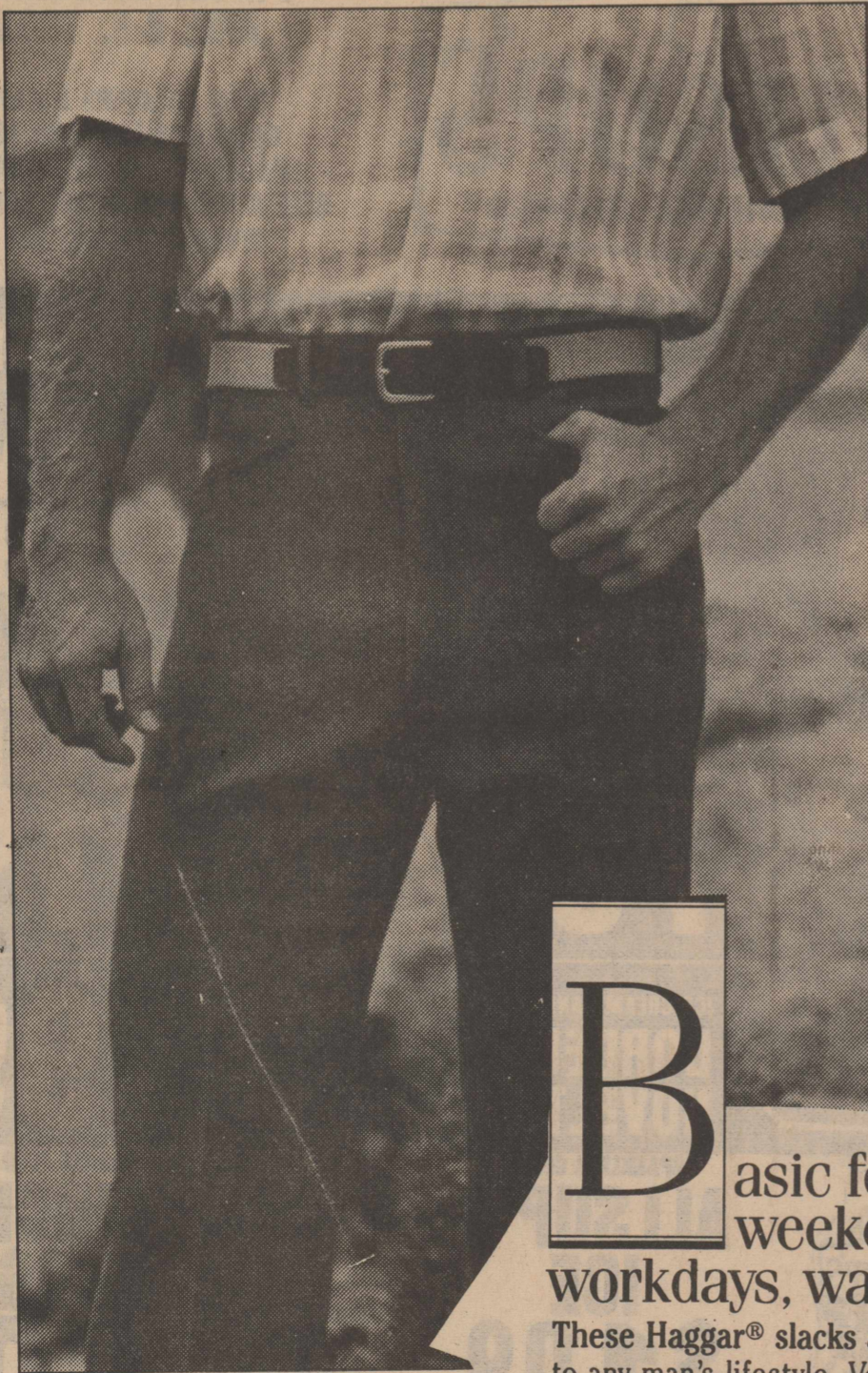

## Grasshoppers Potential Threat To Young Cotton Plants

Grasshoppers in weeds and grasses around cotton fields in Fisher County are a potential threat to young cotton plants. Grasshoppers can destroy the cotton stands.

The lubber (jumbo) grasshopper is the major threat and there appears to be a large hatch of these grasshoppers in parts of the county. If there are two lubber grasshoppers per square yard in the vegetation around fields, the grasshoppers should be controlled now. If there are more than 20 grasshoppers per square yard of other species in the vegetation around the field, these should also be controlled prior to planting.

As cotton comes up until it reaches the six leaf stage, the stand can be damaged by grasshoppers. One lubber grasshopper or 10 other grasshoppers per three feet or row can cause stand loss. Grasshoppers often move into fields at the same places that were most heavily damaged in past years. Field inspection should start in these areas.

Some insecticides that might be used to control grasshoppers in non-crop areas are carbaryl (Seven 80S, XLR and Sevimo), malathion (91% ULV and 57% EC), Orthene 75S and Pydrin. If there are no weeds in the area to be sprayed use malathion. The same formulations of carbaryl and malathion

might be used to control grasshoppers in cotton. Carbaryl baits (5% and 20%) are also available to protect young cotton from grasshoppers. Several applications of these baits will probably be required to provide effective control. Toxaphene can be formulated into a bait when available and labeled for that use. The directions on how to formulate the bait can be

obtained from the Fisher County Extension Office.

Where grasshoppers are expected to be a major problem use a seed treatment such as phorate (Thimet) or use an in-furrow systemic insecticide such as Temik, Thimet or DiSyston. The seed treatment or in-furrow treatment might be used on the first 16 rows on the side of the field where grasshoppers historically cause

their damage.

Where grasshopper populations are heavy and continue to move into field margins control measures will be needed prior to planting and as the cotton stand develops. Field inspections once or twice weekly will be needed a cotton emerges through the four to six leaf stage to determine the need for additional control measures.

## County Agent Report

The rust has significantly reduced the county

wheat yields but in listening to farmers talk, there should be some fields that make 50 bushels. That's a pretty good wheat crop for Fisher County.

A problem frequently confronting gardeners with cauliflower and broccoli is when they stop growing, while still very small, and produce a tiny, mature head no bigger than a nickel.

This is known as "buttoning," and results from setting out transplants which are too old. "No matter how much you irrigate or apply extra nitrogen to stimulate vegetative growth, the little cauliflower and sometimes broccoli plants stop growing and enter a mature stage while very small plants."

If this happens, pull the plants up and start a new crop.

Cauliflower and broccoli plants are too old to transplant when they are older than six weeks and still confined to small pots or packs in which they were started in the greenhouse.

Gardeners must exercise great care in selecting young cauliflower, broccoli

or cabbage. "It is important to select plants that are young, healthy and growing fast." In the small containers or cell packs that are used to start these vegetables, the plants have room to grow rapidly for only about four to five weeks.

Gardeners should choose young plants and transplant them immediately into the garden, where they have room to grow new roots and expand their leaves rapidly.

"Don't purchase plants that are stunted and hard, or that have a yellowish look to the lower leaves. Buy plants from a fresh display or new shipment, take them home, transplant them right away, and water them in with a starter solution."

### IRS AUDITS

The IRS has three levels of examination (audits) of income tax returns. All are intended to review the facts and see that your return is properly filed. The agent is not to harass or belittle you. If you have filed your return with the correct numbers, don't lose sleep over an upcoming audit.

The simplest of the audits is a "direct correspondence." You may be asked to send photo copies of a few specific checks or documents.

An "office audit" will often be more detailed and may require you to take certain records to your nearest IRS office. A call to the examining officer for more information on what to bring could save you an extra trip.

The "field audit" is held at your home or place of business. It usually involves a full review of all major income and expense items. If you have income from a partnership or small corporation, they may also be brought into the audit.

The IRS has had excellent results by letting their computer select which returns are to be audited and most likely to produce added revenue for the government. The computer checks for certain "norms" in your return depending on the nature of your business, income level, etc. If you have abnormal figures such as excessive interest expense, high medical bills, etc., you should attach a photocopy of the document supporting the deductions. Such documentation may keep the IRS from contacting you.

If you receive correspondence from the taxing authorities, respond timely. Ignoring their first few notices will not gain you favor when you finally meet, and you will.

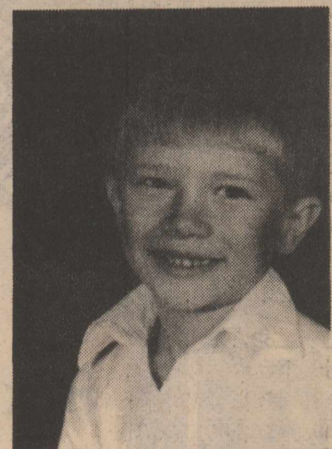
